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



St. Andrew's is the oldest university of George V's northern kingdom. Down to the fourteenth century, education was at to low an ebb in the Land o' Cakes that

King James I., himself a scholar and a lover of learning.

Its first rector was the Venerable Lawrence of Lindores, mentioned as Abbot of Scone. Among the benefactors of St. Andrew's, have been Pope Nicholas V., Pius II., and Paul III, Archbishop James Kennedy of St. Andrew's, who bestowed upon this seat of learning its great silver mace which is one of the most beautiful examples of artistic workmanship of the fiifteenth century; Cardinal Beaton Andrew Melville and Archbishop Alexander Stewart, and the late Marquis of Bute, the "Lothair" of Lord Beaconsfield's novel while its students include John Knox, Archibald Campbell, the great Marquis of Argyll, the "admirable" Crichton, Graham of Claverhouse, Sir Robert Murray, founder of the Royal Society; Napier of Merchiston and Lord Playfair, whose American widow, a daughter of Samuel H. Russell, of Boston, still survives. Lord Playfair represented the University of St. Andrew in Parliament for nearly a quarter of a century before being raised by Queen Victoria to the House of Lords on the nomination of his close friend and political chieftain, Mr. Gladstone,



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

MR. LOWELL IN TOUR OF THE WARDS

Gets Big Reception From Workers in Committee Rooms - Fine Meeting at Golden Grove

The workers in several of the city wards among them Wellington, Dufferin, Kings, Prince and Victoria, were visited by James Lowell, the Liberal candidate for the city and county, last evening and he was enthusiastically received in the rooms by a large crowd of earnest workers. Never, he said, had he seen so much enthusier, he said, had he seen so much enthusiasm evinced by the party as was the case this time and all signs pointed to a Liberal sweep. He gave a rousing speech in each ward room and was applauded to the echo. He dealt with the advantageous effect of reciprocity on the lumber market. Mr. Pugsley was the first speaker and referred to the sources of wealth in Canada and emphasized the fact that all but the manufacturers were favorably affected by the proposed reciprocity agreement. He went very fully into the question of Canadian trade with the United Kingdom and the United States and maintained that about 80 per cent of the items mentioned in the list of Canada's exports represented goods.

United States than to Great Britain.

Mr. Mahoney showed how the Tories of today are allowing themselves to be led by the hands of the great trusts and monised combines. Reciprocity, he held, was one of the strongest arguments used for confederation, it being argued that with the provinces united the chances for securing reciprocity would be greatly increased. He went fully into the reciprocity question and proved most conclusively that the adoption of the trade agreement would not result otherwise than in the best interests of the farmers, fishermen and lumbermen.

Dr. Lunney gave an able address in support of the trade agreement. His speech was entertaining as well as convincing and he was accorded a very warm reception. The way in which he illustrated his remarks by many pointed stories was one

Frank Hamm followed in a short address. The farmers and others in the vicinity of Golden Grove and Loch Lomond all seem to be in favor of the agreement and a large Liberal majority is looked for in that locality.



BETTER MARKETS WILL SOLVE THE PROBLEM OF ABANDONED FARMS

"It is very apparent that something must be done to fill up our vacant farms in Pictou county. If my memory serves me, there was only one farmer's son put on the list in this section in 1911, out of a total population of about 1,200 people. They are leaving the farms, which are now largely tenanted by old people. I have been told in the vicinity of Sunny Brae, on the East River, there are eighty-two vacant farms, and that in Plainfield one can walk from a certain spot ten miles toward the county line, and not get off the vacant farms. 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


Borden's Shameful Attempts SPORT NEWS OF to Mislead the Electors

In every speech Mr. Borden refers to statements by President Taft. Every one of those references is a garbling of Mr. Taft's words Taft. Every one of those references is a garbling of Mr. Taft's words or a misrepresentation of his meaning. He rings the changes on the words, "Canada is at the parting of the ways," and he suggests that in those words President Taft hinted at the possible separation of Canada from Britain. He does not indeed make the direct false assertion, but, after the manner of the skilful lawyer, he suggests the falsehood. He seeks to convey the false impression that the "parting of the ways" had to do with Canada's allegiance or her place and future in relation to the Empire. He knows—his studious care not to be direct shows his knowledge—that the reference was to tariff matters and tariff policy only. Why, then, does Mr. Borden stoop to the hackneyed trick of a second-rate jury lawyer?

The very words used by President Taft and the purpose of his argument show that the "parting of the ways" for Canada meant, in his judgment, the choice between the present Liberal policy of fiscal freedom and autonomy and the Chamberlain policy of fariff bargaining and restriction. He regarded the situation as "critical for reciprocity" because he thought Chamberlain's "system of pre




