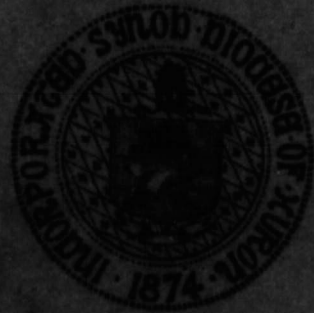

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PROCEEDINGS
OF THE
INCORPORATED SYNOD of the DIOCESE of HURON.

TWENTY-SIXTH SESSION.

(Being the Ninth under the Synod Act of Incorporation of 1874.)

FIRST DAY.

The Synod was convened at London, on Tuesday, 19th June, 1883.

Morning prayer was said in the Chapter House at 9 o'clock.

The Ordination Service commenced at 11 a. m., when the Lord Bishop admitted eight Candidates to the Priesthood and five to the Diaconate.

The sermon was preached by the Right Reverend the Lord Bishop of Toronto, from Jude, 6th verse.

The Holy Communion was administered by the Bishop, assisted by the Bishop of Toronto and the Dean of Huron, to the Clergy and Lay Representatives.

The Synod assembled at 3 p. m., in the Chapter House, for business.

The Lord Bishop in the Chair.

The usual prayers having been offered up by the Bishop, the rolls of the Clergy and Lay Representatives were called by their respective Secretaries, when 83 Clergymen and 95 Lay Delegates answered to their names.

Fraternal Greetings.

The Lord Bishop presented the following resolution to the Synod, which was received and adopted :

V. *Resolved*—That the Synod of the Diocese of Huron, in Session assembled, hereby desires to convey its cordial and sincere fraternal greetings to the General.

Assembly of the Presbyterian Church of Canada, now in Session in this City, with the earnest prayer that God will continue to aid and bless them in all their labors for the advancement of the Redeemer's Kingdom.

The Bishop directed the Honorary Clerical Secretary to bear this resolution to the General Assembly.

The Bishop's Address.

His Lordship then delivered his Annual Charge to the Synod, as follows :

BELOVED BRETHERN,—It is with no ordinary feelings and emotions that I meet you this day with the Apostolic salutation : *“ Grace be unto you and peace from God the Father, and from the Lord Jesus Christ.”*

For many years past, at Assemblies such as this, it has been my pleasing duty to deliberate with you upon the necessities and work of the Diocese, as one still actively co-operating with you for its welfare, and both personally and officially interested in its development and success.

It is now incumbent upon me to announce to you—as I have already done to the Standing Committee in March last—the approaching severance of a connection which has extended over so many years.

A thousand tender associations cluster around my heart at this moment, and make it hard for me to speak of parting from you ; and yet, in view of the summons I have received to another sphere of duty—unsought for on my part—I cannot but regard it as a leading of Providence. May I not crave from you, in my new field of labor, that kind sympathy and hearty good will with which you have never failed to sustain me ?

As I review the twenty years I have spent in this Diocese—during the larger portion of which I have occupied the Episcopate—I feel burdened with a sense of all that I owe to my Heavenly Father for His Providential care, and unnumbered and unmerited blessings ; more especially for the unity and brotherly good feeling with which He has blessed us as a Church in the prosecution of our work.

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Feeling thus, beloved brethren, towards you and the Diocese I am about to leave, I trust it will need no assurance on my part that my personal affection for you and interest in every department of the Church's work in this Diocese will not cease with my official connection with you; but that in the discharge of my Episcopal duties in the mother land, I shall lose no suitable opportunity of advocating and commending to the sympathy and co-operation of our English Church members the noble missionary and educational works in regard to which this Diocese has been so eminently distinguished and so signally blessed of God.

Your contemplated Cathedral, of which this goodly "Chapter House" is an earnest and a pledge; the "Western University," now fairly under way—these will still have claims upon my affection and active solicitude, which I shall never fail to recognize; nay, I am determined, so long as it shall please God to grant me health and strength, to plead and labor, as if I were still in your midst, as your co-worker in everything that will tend to advance the best interests of this Diocese ever dear to my heart.

May God the Holy Ghost, whose presence we have invoked, be sensibly in our midst, and may each and all of you experience His power, influence and guidance in causing you to make choice, whenever you shall be called upon to do so, of a man full of the Holy Ghost, fitted in every way to preside over you in the Lord, for the edifying of His Church and for the glory of His holy name.

EPISCOPAL ACTS, ETC.

As usual, a detailed statement of these will be printed in the Appendix to the Journal of the Synod.

ORDINATION.

We have been privileged to witness again this morning a large ordination,—nine for the Priesthood and five for the Diaconate. Thankful as we ought to be to God for this fresh supply of Gospel ministers, we still require more men and more means to meet the demands of this rapidly growing Diocese. Let us not cease to pray to the Lord of the harvest to send forth more laborers into His harvest.

DIOCESAN WORK, ETC., ETC.

My heart is full of joy and gratitude to God for having again crowned the year with His goodness, both in the increase of additional laborers and in the increase of our Diocesan income.

This being my last official Address to you, it is only right and proper that I should render to you an account of my Episcopal stewardship, and I cannot do this better than by reproducing here partly—what I furnished you with on a former occasion—a statistical statement of our Diocesan Church work from the year 1871, when I took charge of the Diocese, up to this present time. These statements of statistics are taken from the returns of the Rural Deans and from our audited accounts:—

WIDOWS' AND ORPHANS' FUND.

The income from this Fund, I am thankful to report, has more than doubled since 1871, the capital invested having reached the handsome sum of \$57,412.28. The object to which this Fund is devoted will, I feel sure, always command the hearty and liberal support of the members of the Church.

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more for that gracious Master who gave His own precious life for us, still it would be most ungrateful were we not to acknowledge here, with adoring gratitude, the signal proofs of God's favor to us as a Church.

The Diocese has sensibly advanced in the increase of faithful laborers; in the multiplication of Communicants, in the number of handsome Churches and Parsonage houses, in liberal contributions towards Parochial and Diocesan objects, and last, but not least, in the increased contributions towards Missionary work for "regions beyond."

While this prosperity, under God, may be traced to the faithfulness of the Executive, the untiring devotion of your excellent, hard-working Secretary-Treasurer, the indefatigable zeal of your Missionary Agent, the Rev. F. W. Campbell, and the love of harmony which ever characterized the action of Bishop, Clergy and Laity *in and out of* Synod,—yet I feel confident all of you will agree with me in ascribing to God all the glory and praise due to Him for His continued grace and favor towards us.

By way of remembrance, let me urge upon you, if this is at all necessary, to continue your aid towards our brethren in the North-West, and let me more specially commend the Diocese of Algoma to your prayers and substantial help. The following is a letter I lately received from the Bishop of Algoma, which will speak for itself. I shall greatly rejoice if in any way we could at once meet his wishes, and thus strengthen his hands and cheer his heart and those of his Clergy:—

Toronto, May 11th.

MY DEAR BISHOP:

There is a matter connected with the Missionary Diocese of Algoma to which I am most anxious to call your attention, and, if possible, through you, that of the Clergy and Laity of your Diocese, about to assemble in annual Synod.

I allude to the subject of a "Widows' and Orphans' Fund" for Algoma.

We have no such fund, and I find that this fact militates very seriously against an increase in the number of our staff of Missionaries. Men with families will not voluntarily enter a Diocese, where, among other great deprivations, they are required to confront a future which makes no provision *either for their own old age, or,*

after they are called away, for *their wives and children*. I myself *have forfeited the claim* which I once had on such a fund in Montreal, by my acceptance of the duty to which the Church has called me. This, I contend, is not just to the Bishop and Clergy of our Missionary Diocese. It virtually amounts to *the imposition of a penalty*. I cannot help feeling that many of the Clergy and Laity will sympathize with us sufficiently to be willing to adopt some reasonable method of remedying this condition of things. In Quebec, the Synod, last January, most kindly passed a resolution, instructing *every congregation* in the Diocese to take up *an offertory once a year, for three years, in behalf of our "Widows' and Orphans' Fund."* Is there any insuperable obstacle in the way of this being done in every one of the other Dioceses in our Ecclesiastical Province? I cannot think it. Objection may be urged on the ground of the multiplicity of special collections already required by the several Synods; but here we simply cast ourselves on the compassion of our brethren, and ask them whether this is not, in a peculiar degree, a case calling for the application of the Golden Rule, and affording to the Church in her collective capacity, a grand opportunity for the exercise of that "pure and undefiled religion" which consists, on its actively benevolent side, in "visiting the fatherless and widows in their affliction."

If you, my dear Bishop, sympathize with me, as I am sure you do, in this our "present distress," may I ask, on behalf of myself and the Clergy of Algoma, the favor of a *special mention of it in your charge* during Synod, and also the suggestion of some *immediate action*, at the coming Session, which will, in some way or other, help, at least, to meet the difficulty. If nothing else can be devised, we will be most grateful for a resolution similar to that adopted in Quebec.

Trusting that this may be another added to the many expressions of interest and sympathy received from your Diocese during the past year,

HURON COLLEGE AND THE WESTERN UNIVERSITY.

On the eve of my severance from the Diocese, it is but proper and natural that I should leave behind me, for the information of all concerned and interested in our educational efforts, a reliable record in a complete form.

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For this purpose I venture to furnish you with a succinct historic sketch of Huron College and the Western University from their original inception up to the present time.

HURON COLLEGE.

In the year 1861 the conviction forced itself upon my revered predecessor, the excellent Bishop Cronyn, that some provision must be made for the training of young men for the ministry of the Church, to meet the crying demands of his rapidly growing Diocese, and to supply the great influx of British settlers in his Diocese with sound and faithful Gospel ministers. This was one of the objects dearest to his heart, and his earnest labors for its attainment will ever be remembered with warm and lasting gratitude.

It was my privilege to be associated with him in the founding of Huron College. Twice I visited England to plead its cause, and through the liberal gifts of friends in the mother land, the grounds and buildings for the Divinity College were secured. Amongst the benefactors of this College, one valued friend, the Rev. Alfred Peach, endowed the Divinity chair with the munificent sum of £5,000 sterling.

Huron College faithfully fulfilled its trust and served its designed end. Over one hundred devoted ministers of Christ's Gospel have been trained within its walls, the majority of whom are laboring with success in our own Diocese, while the remainder have been called to occupy prominent positions in various other parts of our Dominion.

While acknowledging, with deep gratitude to the Head of the Church, the measure of success thus far vouchsafed to our efforts, we could not but recognize that the time had come when an extension and strengthening of our educational machinery was absolutely called for. It was felt by many, and chiefly by the Professors and Alumni of Huron College, that it was absolutely necessary, in order to secure the permanence of Huron College, and to increase its efficiency to supply the Church with well-trained clergymen of approved learning and piety, that our existing system should be extended, our course of study

developed into University proportion, and our Professorial Staff commensurately augmented.

Accordingly, a meeting of the Professors and Alumni of Huron College was held in Christ Church, in this city, on February 20th, 1877, and I cannot do better to show the origin of the Western University movement than give in full, *verbatim et literatim*, the report of that meeting as recorded in their own minute book:—

THE WESTERN UNIVERSITY.

INITIATORY MEETING.

A largely attended meeting of the Professors and Alumni of Huron College was held in Christ Church of this city on Tuesday, 20th Feb., 1877, to consider the propriety of taking such initiatory steps as shall secure for London and Western Ontario a University and University College. The specific benefits of such an institution are pointed out in the resolutions annexed, which were passed at the meeting, and in the brief remarks of the Very Rev. Dean Boomer, LL. D., Principal of Huron Divinity College, who was called on to preside. Rev. J. W. P. Smith, R. D., incumbent of Christ Church, was appointed secretary, and amongst those present were: Prof. Halpin; Revs. W. Davis, R. D., Wingham; D. Deacon, B. A., R. D., Bothwell; W. Logan, R. D., Lucan; R. O. Cooper, of Paris; C. D. Martin, Brantford; C. H. Channer, M. A., Goderich; T. Watson, Bayfield; W. Craig, Seaforth; H. Cooper, Brussels; I. Barr, Point Edward; W. Murphy, London; E. J. Robinson, Millbank; G. W. Racey, Markdale; G. W. Wye, Wardsville; F. Ryan, Exeter; T. R. Davis, B. A., Aylmer; S. L. Smith, Alvington; H. Bartlett, Blenheim; E. Davis, Westminster; J. R. Jones, Belleville; Mr. E. B. Reed, Secretary-Treasurer of the Diocese, and a number of Huron College students. After the Rev. Mr. Smith had welcomed the Alumni to the church, devotional exercises were indulged in.

Communications were received from almost all the absent Alumni, stating reasons for their absence, and expressing warm sympathy with the movement.

The Very Rev. Chairman expressed his thorough sympathy with the objects which the Alumni had in view. It would require their most prayerful consideration to devise measures to carry it out. One thing he wished to explain. It must always be kept in mind that this University is not commenced in opposition to any existing institution—(hear, hear)—because he sincerely believed there was need and room for all. It has been held by some that it would be better if there were only one great University for the Dominion instead of several smaller ones. But that was only one way of

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looking at the question, and the majority of the people seemed to think differently. He could see no necessity for a Western Ontario young man, struggling for the ministry, or medicine, or law, going either to Toronto or Kingston, in order to procure his degree, if there were a University in the West. In England, the Universities don't clash with each other; it is found rather to be a benefit than otherwise that there are more than one; and those in Canada have much wider domains than they have. Besides they were not beginning the University *de novo*, for they had already Huron College in existence. It is a great undertaking, but if each of the gentlemen present had the case at heart, he doubted not the Alumni would secure what was so desirable an acquisition to Western Canada. For those present did not represent London only, but the West generally. No doubt they might be looked upon with a little jealousy by other cities; but there must be shown that there is plenty of room for them to work, and for us, too. All they wished to accomplish was to procure the facilities for the education of those who may come amongst them, with the power, as in other Universities, to confer degrees. Some might look upon the undertaking as utopian, or too great to accomplish. The way to enlist the sympathies of such was to go heartily into the scheme themselves, and by their united influence throughout the West, prove that they were in earnest and meant to succeed. (Applause.)

Rev. Mr. Logan detailed the preliminaries which had been undertaken to secure the object in view, and stated that in the course of a personal visit to the Alumni during the past month, the scheme had been not only given their hearty support, but they had promised to subscribe about \$6,000 towards the movement. This was a tremendous sacrifice, considering the small incomes of these gentlemen, and showed that, if self-denial could accomplish it, they meant to have a University for Western Ontario. (Applause.)

The meeting then proceeded to consider the draft resolutions which had been prepared. They were considered and amended as follows:

RESOLUTIONS.

Moved by Rev. W. Davis, R. D., seconded by Rev. H. Bartlett:
I. Resolved, That we, the Professors and Alumni of Huron College, London, Ont., assembled this 20th day of February, 1877, in Christ Church, London, believing that the opportune time has arrived for carrying out the long-cherished design of the Bishop of our Diocese, and our own ardent desire, to establish a University and University College to facilitate the obtaining of the highest scholastic training and instruction in Evangelical truth for the future clergy of this Diocese and Dominion, and to meet the educational wants of the fast developing West by supplying it with an undenominational School of Arts, Law, Medicine and Engineering, do hereby form ourselves into an association, to be known as "The Association

of the Professors and Alumni of Huron College," to carry the said project into effect, and do signify the same by now signing our names in a book to be kept for that purpose.

This resolution has been signed in the minute book of the Association by the following gentlemen :

II. Moved by Rev. C. H. Channer, M. A., seconded by Rev. I. Barr, that Right-Rev. I. Hellmuth, D. D., D. C. L., Lord Bishop of Huron, be Patron, the Very Rev. Dean Boomer, LL. D., be President, and Rev. Professor Halpin, M. A., be Vice-President of this Association.

III. Moved by Rev. H. Bartlett, seconded by Rev. W. Craig, that the Rev. J. W. P. Smith, R. D., be Secretary, and Rev. E. Davis be Assistant-Secretary of this Association.

Moved by Rev. Murphy, seconded by Rev. T. Watson,

IV. Resolved, That the University be designated——, and be formed on the model of the University of Trinity College, Dublin, the functions thereof being limited to prescribing subjects of examinations for degrees, scholarships, prizes and certificates of honor, examining candidates therein, and conferring such degrees and distinctions as appertain to Divinity, Arts, Law and Medicine.

Moved by Rev. H. Cooper, seconded by Rev. T. R. Davis, B. A.,

V. Resolved, That the Bishop be requested to use his official and personal influence to procure the requisite charter for such University at the next session of the Provincial Parliament.

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Moved by Rev. I. Barr, seconded by Rev. S. L. Smith,

VI. Resolved, That when said charter shall have been obtained, the corporation of Huron College shall then be requested to affiliate with said University in the same manner as Art. 53 of its own constitution provides for its affiliation with the University of Toronto.

Moved by Rev. W. Craig, seconded by Rev. F. Ryan,

VII. Resolved, That in order to provide an efficient staff for the University College, immediate steps be taken to raise funds for the endowment of as many as six professorial chairs, and to secure the necessary building accommodation for lecture rooms and residences for students. That to accomplish the former the Bishop is earnestly requested to go beyond his own borders, and also carry our cause to England to plead the same with all upholders of Evangelical truth, and especially with those friends who so kindly helped us before; that to accomplish the latter, we acquire, if possible, the Hellmuth Boys' College and property, and for this purpose make a large pecuniary sacrifice ourselves, solicit subscriptions, and also appoint from our Association an agent to canvass the Diocese, and, if necessary, the Dominion, to attain the requisite additional funds.

VIII. It was further resolved that a committee be appointed to draft an address to the Bishop, in accordance with the foregoing resolutions, asking his sanction to each particular of the scheme, his hearty co-operation in carrying it out, and requesting of him a full statement of the terms upon which he will transfer to us his pecuniary interest in Hellmuth Boys' College.

Moved by the Rev. W. Davis, R. D., seconded by the Rev. S. L. Smith,

IX. Resolved, That having received the Bishop's sanction to our scheme, and having decided to proceed at once to raise funds in order to attain the object we have in view, we, therefore, deem it advisable now to appoint from this Association a Sec.-Treasurer, whose duties, subject to the direction of the Managing Committee, shall be to make a thorough canvass of the Dominion, and to place the moneys or equivalents he may collect in the hands of such Trustees as may be hereafter appointed by this Association, or monthly returns, and also submit to the Managing Committee, hereafter provided for, a quarterly report of work done.

Moved by Rev. H. Bartlett, seconded by Rev. I. Barr,

X. Resolved, That, with the Bishop's permission, the Rev. W. Logan, R. D., be and is hereby appointed Secretary-Treasurer of this Association, in accordance with the last preceding resolution; and that he be required to proceed to work at the earliest possible date.

Moved by the Rev. I. Barr, seconded by the Rev. W. Craig,

XI. Resolved, That inasmuch as we sincerely desire that Huron College should become the University College of the projected

University, the Trustees of this Association, hereafter to be appointed, shall be empowered eventually to hand over to the corporation of Huron College, as trustees, the funds raised by the Bishop, the Secretary-Treasurer of this Association, or other agents, to endow the professorial chairs and the property acquired by this Association, in case they signify their willingness to accept the trust and apply them to the objects we have in view in accordance with clause 19 of the constitution of Huron College.

Moved by the Rev. H. Cooper, seconded by the Rev. S. L. Smith,
XII. Resolved, That, in order to carry out the views of this Association, and to obviate the necessity of convening all its members too frequently, it is deemed advisable to appoint a Managing Committee, whose duty it shall be to transact all business, and direct and control the management of the funds of the Association in accordance with the foregoing resolutions.

That the Patron, President, Vice-President, Secretaries, and Secretary-Treasurer, shall be *ex-officio* members of the committee. That in addition there shall be elected annually by ballot ten members of the Association, five of whom shall be clergymen and five laymen; five members of the committee to form a quorum.

That the Chairman have power to convene the committee whenever he may deem it advisable; that the committee shall have power to call a general meeting of the Association at such time and place as may be considered most suitable.

Moved by the Rev. H. Cooper, seconded by the Rev. T. R. Davis,

XIII. Resolved, That Secretaries of the Association be a committee to wait upon five laymen of well-known business ability, who shall be requested to become members of this Association, and also to allow their names to be placed on the Board of Management, and that gentlemen so consenting are hereby accepted as members of this Association and Board of Management.

Moved by the Rev. Evans Davis, seconded by the Rev. J. W. P. Smith,

XIV. Resolved, That the following gentlemen be a committee to draw up a constitution for the Association in accordance with its resolutions, viz.: Revds. J. Barr, W. Logan and D. Deacon, and that they have permission to employ a lawyer of established reputation to attend their sittings and give all needed assistance and counsel.

Moved by the Rev. C. H. Channer, M.A., seconded by the Rev. W. Murphy,

XV. Resolved, That there be appointed two clergymen and three laymen, members of this Association, as Trustees, whose duty it shall be to receive or have conveyed to them in trust for this Association, all donations and bequests that may be given towards any

of the object collected for given to or deposit into Commerce, proved security to the time by this Managing Committee and make such Managing Committee, towards

of the objects of the proposed University; all moneys or equivalents collected for the same; to hold, sell or lease all lands that may be given to or acquired by the Association for aforesaid purposes; to deposit immediately all available funds in the Canadian Bank of Commerce, London, or withdraw the same for investment in approved securities, and for payment of current expenses; but all subject to the resolutions and provisions that may be made from time to time by this Association, and the direction and approval of the Managing Committee; and further, it shall be the duty of these several parties to execute and sign such deeds, conveyances and receipts, and make such payments as may be directed by the Association, or Managing Committee, through their President and Secretary in writing, towards the organization and establishment of said University.

Whenever a vacancy occurs in the aforesaid Board of Trustees, by any cause whatever, it shall be filled by the Managing Committee, or, if occurring within one month of the time appointed for the meeting of the Association, then such vacancy shall be filled by the Association at such a meeting.

Moved by Rev. J. Barr, seconded by Rev. E. Davis.

XVI. Resolved, that the Very Rev. Dean Boomer, Rev. J. W. P. Smith, and Messrs. V. Cronyn, E. B. Reed and A. Cleghorn, of the City of London, Ont., be and are hereby appointed Trustees of all property and effects, real and personal, of what nature or kind soever, belonging, or which by any means hereafter may belong to this Association, to be managed by them in accordance with the foregoing resolutions.

Moved by Rev. S. L. Smith, seconded by Rev. E. J. Robinson,

XVII. Resolved, That in order to meet the unavoidable expenses of the Association, each member shall contribute the sum of \$5.00 (which amount shall be deducted from his subscription towards the University), to be paid to the Treasurer of the Board of Trustees through the Secretary within one month from the date of his admission, and by the said Board to be paid to the order of the Secretary of the Managing Committee, when signed by the Chairman of the same, as provided for by resolution No. XV.

Moved by Rev. W. Davis, R. D., seconded by Rev. W. Craig,

XVIII. Resolved, That we gratefully accept the Bishop's offer with regard to the transfer of his pecuniary interest in Hellmuth Boys' College, on the terms and conditions as embodied in the statement this day furnished by the Rev. W. F. Campbell, Secretary-Treasurer of the said Boys' College.

The business of the meeting having been transacted, the Very Rev. the Dean closed the proceedings with the benediction.

ADDRESS TO THE BISHOP OF HURON AND HIS LORDSHIP'S REPLY.

The Association having deputed Rev. Dean Boomer and Prof. Halpin to present the address to the Bishop, these gentlemen, together with the Alumni, accordingly waited on His Lordship the following day, and presented him with the resolutions, along with the following:—

To the Right Reverend I. Hellmuth, D. D., D. C. L., Lord Bishop of Huron:

MY LORD,—We, the undersigned, having this day formed ourselves into an Association, to be known as "The Association of the Professors and Alumni of Huron College, London," beg leave respectfully to approach your Lordship on a subject of great moment to ourselves and to the Institution dear to us all.

Founded as a Divinity School, chiefly through your Lordship's exertions, the well-being of Huron College has always been a matter of deep concern to you; and we are aware that from the first you have cherished the design of making it a University College, and have looked forward for a day to arrive when you might become the instrument, in God's hand, of bestowing upon the Diocese, and the whole Dominion, an Evangelical training school for divinity students that would be an honor and a boon to our Church and our country; and also provide for the West an undenominational School of Arts, Law, Medicine and Engineering that would rank with the first colleges of the land.

Such a wish has also animated each Professor and Alumnus. We learned to hope for it in the old halls, when we buckled on our first weak armor to go forth to battle for the Master. Amongst a host of heart-cherished memories that will never fade, this hope has continued to brighten, and we look now for a speedy fruition.

Feeling that the time has come for action, and knowing your Lordship to be over-burdened with Diocesan cares and labors, we hereby offer ourselves (as an Association) to be co-workers with you to carry out our mutual desire.

We therefore beg to submit to your Lordship the following plan of operations, as contained in the accompanying resolutions, which were this day unanimously carried by our Association, hoping for your sanction and approval.—And,

First, we earnestly request your Lordship to use your official and personal influence to procure from the Provincial Legislature, at its next session, the requisite charter for a University, to be established

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in the City of London, Ontario, giving the powers mentioned in resolution No. IV., with which University, Huron College as the Divinity College when enlarged and endowed as proposed, may become affiliated. And permit us to add, that in this effort we feel it unnecessary to seek to be joined with you, inasmuch as the well-known achievements of your Lordship in the cause of higher education give you a strong claim upon the favorable consideration of the Parliament.

Second—By reference to resolution No. VII., your Lordship will see that we aim at making such a University College as will equal your most sanguine anticipations, by the endowments of as many as six professorial chairs, and by the acquisition of Hellmuth Boys' College to secure the necessary accommodation for Lecture Rooms and Residence.

With regard to the Institution which bears your own name, and which has already done signal service for our Church and country, we beg respectfully to say that we wish to acquire it not only in order to serve the interests of the proposed University College, but also that it may remain forever in connection with our Church, an honorable educational institution and a memorial of your Lordship's noble self-sacrifice and earnest devotion to the cause of Education.

To this course, indeed, we and many of our clerical brethren pledged ourselves at a Clerical Conference held in Hellmuth College in December, 1874, when we unanimously passed a resolution, moved by Canon Innes, seconded by Canon Nelles, to the following effect:—"That it is felt by many that the Bishop is bearing upon his shoulders an undue burden of care. The two colleges which bear his name are an onerous and anxious charge, which in conjunction with the labors and responsibilities of the Diocese, must press more heavily upon him than he should be called upon to bear. It is the duty of the Church to relieve him of these additional burdens by assuming them, if possible, upon herself. Therefore it is suggested that a committee should be formed to devise some plan whereby these institutions might be transferred so as to be placed under the management of a Board, and become in perpetuity the property of the Church in this Diocese." We now desire to assure your Lordship that this was no empty expression of transient feeling; and we hope by our individual and united efforts to give further and more practical proof to yourself, and to the Church, that we were then sincere in our profession.

We are aware that your Lordship refused to part with this Institution at any price when overtures were made for its purchase for Roman Catholic purposes. We appreciate more than we can tell the stand you then took as a true Protestant Bishop. But we are sure that you will not allow either the increasing value of the pro-

erty, or the desire of any others to obtain it, to influence you against transferring your pecuniary interest in it to us, on the easiest possible terms, a statement of which terms, if you will comply with our wish, we request that you will kindly furnish us.

The means by which we will endeavor to provide the funds for endowments and the purchase of property and all necessary buildings and improvements, you will also find in resolution No. VII. You will perceive that we are asking you to carry a heavy burden, but we feel that your energy and influence are sufficient for the task, and are more than persuaded that it is quite unnecessary to ask you to do what you can to consummate a design so long and dearly cherished by you. We are happy to inform you that the work has already made no little progress.

The Very Rev. Dean Boomer, LL.D., Principal and Divinity Professor of Huron College, has subscribed no less a sum than one thousand dollars. The Rev. W. H. Halpin, M. A., Professor of Classics and Mathematics, has followed with a similar sum of \$1,000, and 21 of the Alumni have added the sum of \$6,250, making a total of \$8,250. Indeed, so cheering is the prospect that we feel assured that we shall have no difficulty, should you consent to part with the said property, in taking it off your hands, and thus place you in a position to plead freely our cause in any place. And from expressions which have fallen from many of our brethren of the clergy and from many prominent laymen, we have reason to believe that our Diocese will not much longer be the only one in the Dominion which has done nothing for the cause of higher education, but that it will come to our aid heartily to do the work of God and our Church. We believe also that we shall not appeal in vain to the Protestant and Evangelical body of the whole Dominion, as the cause we seek to advance concerns them, and is dear to them as to us. Neither shall we appeal in vain to those kind friends in England who have stood by us in the past, to befriend us again. We feel sure that we can confidently appeal to all who stand upon the doctrines of the Reformation, and who love to establish and spread the simple truths of the Gospel of Christ. Therefore, we take courage, and trusting in God, fear not for the result.

In conclusion, we desire to say that at present we simply ask your Lordship's concurrence in our scheme to carry out a design that was at first your own, and your prayers that God will bless our efforts until we have freed you from all pecuniary interest in the Hellmuth Boys' College. And we pray that you will then take up the matter with your wonted zeal, and not slack your hand until, through the blessing of our Heavenly Father, our bright wish gives place to more brilliant reality.

HIS LORDSHIP'S REPLY.

Bishop Hellmuth replied as follows:—

Chapter House,
London, Ont., Feb. 21, 1877.

To the Very Rev. the Dean of Huron, Principal and Divinity Professor of Huron College; the Rev. Prof. Halpin, Professor of Classics and Mathematics, Huron College, and the Alumni of Huron College, etc., etc.—

MY DEAR FRIENDS,—I cannot but feel much gratified with your address, and reciprocate heartily your desire for the establishment of a University in this city. This has been a long cherished wish of mine, and as I was able to gain one step after another toward this goal of my educational labors, I have not unfrequently given expression to the probability of its accomplishment, little anticipating, however, that this desire of mine would find its expression on the part of the Alumni of Huron College.

In my first acquaintance with these Western parts, as General Superintendent of the Colonial and Continental Church Society, some twenty years since, they bid fair to become, as since we proudly know, the most prosperous part of the Province.

My effort then was to aid the late Bishop, whose memory is revered by all of us, in supplying the pressing need of his young Diocese. The wants of missionaries in his new but large Diocese were great in this respect, and there was a great deficiency in the opportunities of obtaining a higher academical education for the training of young men for the ministry. Hence the first requisite for enabling the Church, in discharging her spiritual work, to cope

with the growing wants of the Diocese, was the establishment of a Theological College, in which young men would be trained sound in the faith of Christ, and in the Protestant principle of the Reformation.

When Archdeacon of Huron, I was requested by the late Bishop, as his Commissary, to proceed to England, with a view of making known to Christian friends in the mother country the wants of his Diocese in this respect. God signally blessed my efforts, and within a few months I collected an amount which amply sufficed to purchase the present Huron College buildings, the extensive grounds, and to erect additions for lecture and library rooms, and residence for a limited number of theological students, leaving a balance at our disposal to commence an Endowment Fund.

On my second visit to England, in the year following, to secure means for permanently endowing the Divinity Chair, God again blessed our efforts by inclining the heart of a dear valued friend of mine, the Rev. Alfred Peach, to present us with £5,000 sterling, for that object.

Thus, through this noble and liberal gift, and through the generous contributions of English friends, we have been enabled to acquire the Huron College property, endow the Divinity and Classical Chairs, and a few scholarships besides. The commodious College Chapel is also the result of private bounty.

In 1862, Huron College was incorporated by an Act of the late Province of Canada.

With these comparative advantages, our Theological College has been doing good work, and can point to the roll of fifty, who, since its opening, have been admitted to the Ministry of the Church.

During the period of fourteen years which has elapsed since the opening of Huron College, the progress of this portion of the Province has been very remarkable. In the year 1851 the population amounted to 472,745; in 1871, to 600,500, and calculating the increase at the same ratio during the last six years, we may fairly compute the present population in this Diocese to be about 700,000.

During this period further facilities for obtaining higher education have been afforded, and I have the satisfaction of knowing that the impetus recently given to improvement in the High Schools and Collegiate Institutes of the Province, is the result of the establishment of the "Hellmuth College," formerly "The London Collegiate Institute," from which the Rev. Dr. Ryerson, late Chief Superintendent of Education in the Province of Ontario, adopted, as he has been pleased to declare, similar Collegiate Institutes as part of the Provincial system of higher education.

Having accomplished so much towards meeting the wants of this progressive part of the Province in higher education, one more stage remains to be overcome, when we shall see a Western University arising as the final achievement of our educational labors.

The district constituting this Diocese comprises 13 counties—

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148 townships of 12,000 square miles, with numerous flourishing towns and villages, and a population larger than that of the present Diocese of Toronto.

In that portion of the Province there are now the following Colleges and Universities: (1) The Provincial University with University College; (2) University of Trinity College; (3) University of Victoria College; (4) Knox's College; (5) The Toronto School of Medicine; (6) The Medical Faculty of Trinity College; (7) The Law School of the Law Society; and other institutions.

These afford to the youths of ability, especially in their immediate neighborhood, great facilities for obtaining the highest instruction in the Arts and Sciences, and in the different professions.

The population of the City of London is larger now than that of Toronto when the Provincial University was first established there. It appears to me, therefore, that "the opportune time," as you say, has now arrived for giving definite shape to your and my aspirations.

Our body, as a Church, feels the necessity there is in the progressive increase of its work of developing the facilities of our local institutions for adequately meeting the demand for more laborers in Christ's Vineyard.

We need in these days a sounder Scriptural, and a higher literary and scientific training, if the Church is successfully to meet the dangerous tendencies of a "Philosophy," falsely so called. Huron College, with its present limited professional staff, is imperfect for this work, and while the Church, in this rapidly increasing diocese, is responsible for more thoroughly equipping students for its own special work, it can, at the same time, extend all its advantages and appliances in generally promoting superior education.

I am confident that the people generally of this part of the Province, irrespective of denominational differences, would cordially second an effort of this kind, which would place within the reach of their sons the like advantages which other parts of the Province—especially Toronto—so favorably enjoy.

With reference to your desire of acquiring my pecuniary interest in the Hellmuth College property, I quite admit that when some of you, to my great surprise, first broached this question, I conceived then that I had strong reasons for withholding my consent, but the arguments and reasons given in your address are of that character that I can no longer refuse compliance. The accompanying statement will put you in full possession in regard to the property in question. Notwithstanding the promising circumstances which surround this movement, we cannot conceal that difficulties also environ it. These, however, every great and noble enterprise has also had to overcome.

A charter for conferring the different degrees of a University will no doubt be granted by the Provincial Legislature equally to this part of the Province, and to a college under our auspices, as has

been granted under the like circumstances, and no effort of mine will be lacking in securing those additional means and advantages which are required for placing the proposed University on a satisfactory basis; and aided by your efforts here, and by the co-operation of so many influential persons amongst us who are anxious to secure this result, I will proceed, with confidence in God's help, to take my share in our allotted work—not despising “the day of small things,” but looking upon our difficulties as God's opportunities. Our trust is in Him, whose the gold and silver are, and who can dispose the hearts of His people to devise liberal things.

As for myself, I shall consider it a privilege and a pleasure to contribute for the accomplishment of so noble a purpose the sum of \$10,000.

I fully appreciate your godly motives and your generous and self-denying liberality in your desire with me, not only to secure a University that shall afford the highest education for the young men of this section of our populous Province, but to train them up in the Protestant and Evangelical principles of our noble martyred reformers.

Commending you and your arduous undertaking to the God of all grace, and fervently praying that He may graciously own, bless and prosper your labor of love and self-denial for the glory of His holy name, and for the benefit of generations to come, ever believe me,

I. HURON.

After mutual congratulations, the interview was closed by his Lordship pronouncing the benediction.

At a subsequent meeting of the Managing Committee of the Huron College Association, held on April 24th, 1877, steps were taken to secure the transfer of the Hellmuth College property to the Association, and on motion of Andrew Cleghorn, Esq., seconded by Col. Taylor, D. A. G., W. P. R. Street, Esq., was employed to draft the necessary legal instruments for conveying the property, and setting forth the trusts on which it was to be held, and the condition on which it had been acquired.

The initiative having been thus taken by such an influential body of clergymen and laymen, at whose earnest solicitation I had consented to throw myself into the movement, I felt it my duty to bring the subject before the Synod of the Diocese on the first opportunity, and therefore at the annual meeting of Synod in June, 1877, I gave in my address to the Synod a sketch of the origin and object of the Western University, and the position and

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prospects of the undertaking at that early date. Whereupon I was again greatly encouraged to go forward with a good hope of success, by being addressed by a large number of the members of Synod as follows:—

(The address was read by His Honor Judge Kingsmill.)

"We are thankful that God has put it into your Lordship's heart to give your strength to what we will regard, when consummated, as the crowning act of your life—the establishment of a University and University College, for the instruction in Evangelical truth of the future Clergy of the Diocese, as well as providing for the educational wants of Western Canada. Those of us who have been connected with Huron College can bear testimony to the zeal with which your Lordship ever sought to teach, and have taught these same precious truths, and to drive out all contrary doctrines from those honored halls, and we have every confidence that such will be the case with the teaching of the Western University College. Well knowing the difficult position which you occupy as Bishop of this large Diocese, we desire to assure your Lordship of our hearty sympathy and support in the work you have in hand, and to which you have so largely and so generously contributed of your means."

NAME OF THE UNIVERSITY AND APPOINTMENT OF FIRST SENATE.

At a special meeting of the Huron College Association, held November 1st, 1877, the name was chosen of the "Western University," and the names of the first Senators were submitted to be drafted into the proposed Act of Incorporation.

From the foregoing you will see that the creation of the "Western University" owes its origin practically to the Alumni of Huron College, who, taught by their own experience the value of a thorough intellectual and theological training, were anxious to see those who may come after them in the enjoyment of even greater advantages than they themselves possessed. The deep interest manifested by the Professors and Alumni of Huron College in this undertaking, the spirit displayed by them in setting on foot the enterprise, and the sums of money they promised in order to accomplish it, stirred my heart within me to place myself, in compliance with their petition, at the head of the movement.

CHARTER.

Early in 1878 the Ontario Legislature passed an Act incorporating "The Western University, of London, Ontario," bestowing upon it all the necessary prerogatives and powers, including those of conferring degrees in Arts, Divinity and Medicine.

As a proof of the favor with which the project was regarded, it is worthy of mention that in the discussion of the measure in Parliament it received the support of leading men of all political and religious opinions, and the Bill of Incorporation with University powers passed by a large majority.

FIRST MEETING OF THE INCORPORATED SENATE ON THE 9TH OF
MAY, 1878.

At this meeting the following resolution was unanimously carried:—

“Moved by Canon Nelles, seconded by A. Cleghorn, Esq., that the Senate of the Western University purchase and take the conveyance of the Hellmuth College property” (upon the terms previously agreed upon with the Association of the Professors and Alumni of Huron College).

At the Synod in June, 1878, upon announcing my intention of proceeding to England to plead the cause of the University, I was once more assured of the hearty sympathy of the whole Church in this Diocese by an address, which was read on behalf of the Synod by the late Rev. Canon Caulfield, of which the following is an extract:—

“Another important duty devolving upon your Lordship is the advocacy of the claims of the contemplated Western University upon the sympathy and co-operation of our fellow Churchmen in England. Recognizing, as we do, the increasing necessity of such an institution to meet the demands of the whole Protestant population of Western Canada for a higher class of education, and especially the perpetuation of those true Evangelical principles so incorporated with the life and success of our Church, we thankfully and confidently entrust this matter to your Lordship's care. We thoroughly appreciate the many difficulties you must encounter in bringing this subject under the notice of those best able and most willing to assist us; still we have every expectation that with God's blessing upon your endeavors, you will yet be spared to see in the future flourishing University of this Diocese the full accomplishment of that noble plan for the Christian education of our people, which your Lordship has already advanced to so remarkable a degree.”

At the following Synod in June, 1879, in a resolution of welcome back from the mother country, the University movement was thus referred to:—

“His Lordship has placed the Diocese under an additional debt of gratitude, not only by his own munificent gift towards the estab-

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lishing of the Western University, but by his able and successful appeals to our friends in England, who have again generously contributed to aid the cause of a wholesome Christian education in Western Ontario. We cannot too strongly express our sense of indebtedness to his Lordship for his labors and success in this cause."

AFFILIATION OF HURON COLLEGE.

At the same meeting of the Senate (May 20th, 1881), a memorandum was read from the Council of Huron College, as follows:—

"The Committee on Affiliation with the Western University report as follows:—

"That the present state of the revenues of the College calls for immediate action by the Council, in order to provide suitable instruction for the students, and to that end the Committee recommend that Huron College affiliate with the Western University, and so soon as the Western University is opened and prepared to receive students, that all the property of Huron College should be held in trust to hand over to the University, the entire income and resources of the College, less cost of management, repairs, etc., to be applied by the University in providing and maintaining an efficient Faculty of Divinity in the University. But only so long as such Faculty of Divinity is maintained to the satisfaction in all things of the Council of Huron College, the right being reserved to Huron College to cancel said trust at any time, and resume the control of their property, income and resources."

This proposal having been accepted by the Senate, it was decided to make immediate arrangement for the opening of the Western University in the autumn of 1881.

And here I may point out how powerfully the conviction had forced itself upon the minds of all the friends and well-wishers of our Divinity College, and especially amongst the members of the College Council, that the very life of Huron College depended upon this progressive movement, and that unless University advantages could be afforded to our aspiring divinity students, they would seek those advantages elsewhere, and leave Huron College to become practically extinct.

At the Synod of 1881, I had the pleasure of announcing that "the affiliation of Huron College with the Western University is now a fact," and that in a very few months the University would be opened for the reception of students. Again the Clergy and

Lay Delegates of the Synod recognized the importance of the Western University, and promised their aid towards insuring its final success. The following resolution was carried unanimously:—

Resolved,—That the members of this Synod have had great satisfaction in listening to your Lordship's annual charge, and would desire most heartily to congratulate your Lordship on the still increasing prosperous condition of the financial as well as spiritual position of the Diocese; and this Synod cannot but feel that in the Providence of God this measure of increase is greatly due to your indefatigable zeal in the cause of Christ and our beloved Church in this part of the Province, and have to thank God that you have been again vouchsafed a safe return to us from your recent visit to our fatherland, and our fervent prayer is that you may be long spared to administer the Episcopal affairs of this Diocese. The Synod would further congratulate your Lordship on the success that has attended your efforts to establish a University and University College for the instruction in Evangelical truths of the future Clergy of the Diocese, as well as additionally providing for the educational wants of Western Canada. Your Lordship has ever been foremost in promoting the higher branches of learning, based upon sound Church principles, and contributed, we know, largely of your private means in furtherance of these objects; and while this Synod has no power vested in it to assist your Lordship in further promoting these objects, it may fairly pledge itself to give you every legitimate aid tending to the final completion of this undertaking, and trust you may be spared to see this great work carried to a successful termination."

In the following September the Standing Committee of the Diocese gave its sanction to employing our Diocesan Missionary Agent, the Rev. F. W. Campbell, for advocating the claims of the Western University as far as the duties of his office would allow.

In December of the same year further action was taken by the Standing Committee, as indicated by the following resolution, which was carried unanimously by a standing vote:—

"Moved by Rev. Rural Dean G. G. Ballard, seconded by his Honor Judge McMahan, That this Standing Committee hereby recommends the establishment of a classical chair in the Western University, to be called "The Hellmuth Chair," as a substantial expression of public appreciation of our Bishop's long and successful efforts for the advancement of education in this Diocese, and of the desire that thus his name should be associated for the future with an institution, the establishment of which has been mainly due to

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his personal exertion, and which is the perfecting of our Diocesan educational system. We further recommend that the Rev. Mr. Campbell be directed to seek subscriptions for this object from the Clergy and Laity throughout the Diocese."

Towards this Chair our friends will be glad to learn that the Bursar of the University has already received over \$7,000!

OPENING OF THE UNIVERSITY.

The Western University commenced its actual work of instruction on the 6th of October, 1881, since which date it has been in active operation.

INAUGURATION.

The inauguration of the Western University was a deeply interesting event, and was spoken of by our leading local papers as "an event of the utmost importance to London and the whole of Western Ontario, marking an era of great prominence in our educational history, which will long be looked back to with pride and satisfaction."

On that occasion, surrounded by many prominent Clergy and Laity, who had taken a deep interest in promoting the enterprise, I had the happiness to declare the Western University opened—a little more than four years after the question of its establishment was first mooted. The Minister of Education for the Province of Ontario kindly took part, and in the course of his address pointed out the need of additional University facilities in Western Ontario. Amongst others who spoke on that occasion were the Very Rev. the Provost of the University; V. Cronyn, Esq., Chancellor of the Diocese; Dr. Moore, Dean of the Medical Faculty, &c., &c.

The opening of the University was signalized by the Senate conferring the honorary degree of Doctor in Divinity on the Rev. Alfred Peach, M.A., thus recognizing his munificent benefactions and placing first upon their University register the name of one both widely and deservedly esteemed as the patron of learning and of sound Church principles.

At the regular semi-annual meeting of the Senate of the Western University, held at the Chapter House, on the 23rd

June, 1882, amongst other business, the following resolutions were passed:

Moved by Rev. W. Daunt, B. A., seconded by Rev. F. Harding,
 "That the report of the Auditors be received and adopted, and an abstract printed and sent to each Senator."

Moved by John Beattie, Esq., seconded by the Very Rev. The Provost, Dean Boomer,

"That the Senate is gratified to learn the satisfactory state of the University Funds, as shown by the audited accounts just presented and received (by G. F. Jewell, Esq.)"

Moved by The Very Rev. the Provost, seconded by The Ven. Archdeacon Elwood,

"That the statement of the Auditors, showing the solid and substantial position already occupied by the Western University, affords a fitting opportunity to the Senate to express their grateful thanks to His Lordship the Bishop of Huron, to whose indomitable zeal, and personal and self-denying labors and liberality, these gratifying results are mainly due; and although the Bishop has four times visited England, at much personal inconvenience, but with such valuable results, as shown in the audited accounts, this Senate cannot but express the hope that His Lordship will still further advocate the interests of the Western University both here and in the mother land."

In compliance with the foregoing resolution, I once more crossed the Atlantic, and my appeal for help on this occasion was again blessed of God—the sum of \$16,592 being added to the University funds.

The Senate passed the following resolution in recognition of this result:

"*Resolved*,—That the members of this Senate having heard the statement made by the Right Rev. The Chancellor, as to the result of his recent visit to England, and the large amount which he has thereby added to the funds of the University, desire to express their heartfelt gratification at his success and their determination to continue to the utmost of their ability and energy the good work of the University so happily inaugurated by the Bishop."

MEDICAL FACULTY.

The Medical Faculty in connection with the Western University has been in active operation, with an ample and able staff of Professors, since the 1st of October last, and is in a prosperous condition.

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CONVOCATION.

The first Convocation for the conferring of Degrees was held in the University buildings on the 27th of April last.

At the regular meeting of the Senate, held on the day of Convocation, the several Faculties reported 10 students in Theology, 16 in Medicine, and 7 in Arts.

From this brief sketch you can gather that God has indeed thus far blessed our efforts, and that the condition and prospects of our University are very encouraging.

We may honestly congratulate ourselves upon the great and rapid progress which we have made in our undertaking, and lift our hearts in thankfulness and prayer to Almighty God that as He has so far blessed our endeavors, He will bless them to the end. Our own Diocese has been, as yet, only partially and very superficially canvassed for subscriptions towards the endowment of Professorships in the Western University. The Clergy and the Laity have already given pledges to the amount of \$30,000, which will doubtless soon be collected in, to add to the efficiency of the work. Yet, great and praiseworthy as this effort is on the part of the Diocese, we have good reason to expect much more. Some have held back hitherto on the supposition that the work was far beyond the ability of the Diocese to carry out; that it might fail after much expense had been incurred, and they did not feel satisfied to contribute towards a probable failure. But now that success, under God, has been so positively assured; now that the University is a fact, with bright and still brightening prospects of usefulness and prosperity—with its charter, its valuable buildings, its Professorial Staff, its organized and working Faculties of Arts, Theology and Medicine, its first graduates from each department, its students in actual attendance, and every reasonable prospect of their number rapidly increasing—surely, under these circumstances, a fresh appeal for further assistance may fairly be made to our friends in the Diocese, as well as in England, who have not yet given assistance. At any rate, cherishing the hope of conferring a lasting benefit upon the Church and country, we shall proceed with double confidence in every department of this noble enterprise.

Obstacles and difficulties the friends and supporters of the Western University are still prepared to meet with; indeed they may be said to be in a measure necessary in order to develop that spirit of determination, persevering energy and unity of action, which are essential to success.

The large population in this section of the Province (one-fifth of the population of the whole Dominion), the increasing desire for superior education on the part of the rising youth of the country, the admitted impracticability and unsatisfactory results of any scheme of University consolidation, and the vigorous efforts now being put forth by Christian bodies to raise money for Educational Institutions, all point to the present time as most suitable and encouraging for a bold and united and persevering effort to go through the length and breadth of this Diocese for funds to put our Western University in a state of the highest possible efficiency. With all the gratifying prosperity and remarkable success which have been vouchsafed to our efforts hitherto, we must admit it is still "the day of small things," and much remains to be done. Books, Scholarships, scientific appliances, increased endowments for the several Chairs—these are the worthy objects for which we must still seek to stir up the public-spirited liberality and Christian zeal of all the friends of higher education.

APPEAL.

I, therefore, in parting, once more appeal in its behalf to the members of our beloved Church, and to all friends of intellectual advancement.

All who have the prosperity of the Church in this Diocese at heart, will, I trust, render that substantial and effectual assistance which you have in your power, both by word and deed. I further trust no pains will be spared, nor gifts withheld, which may serve to extend and strengthen, and as far as possible to perfect, the machinery of an Institution with which the very prosperity of the Church in this Diocese is so vitally connected.

CONCLUSION.

In conclusion, who that has the love of Christ in his heart will not pray, labor and strive that the cords of our beloved

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Zion may be lengthened, and her stakes strengthened, that she may be a joy and a praise in the earth?

To carry on and onward the missionary and educational work which your Heavenly Father has committed to your trust, suffer me, in parting, to say a word or two of counsel on the necessity of *prayer* and *unity*, so indispensable to labor with comfort and success in Christ's vineyard.

As to *prayer*, we have the Apostolic injunction, "Pray without ceasing;" and the precious, infallible promise of Christ, that whatsoever we shall ask the Father in His name He will grant us, is sufficient to encourage us to make all our "requests known unto God, with prayer, supplication and thanksgiving."

Prayer unlocks the treasury of Heaven, and opens to us all its rich stores.

Ever recall the Master's spirit and practice to your remembrance in the prosecution of your work. After the labors of His toilsome days, it was His practice to retire into solitude, where, to adopt the language of an English poet:

*"Cold mountains and the midnight air
Witnessed the fervor of his prayer."*

It is testified of our Lord that He spent whole nights in watchful supplication and intercession.

Had He a miracle of grace to perform, "*He lifted up His eyes to Heaven in prayer.*" Did He contemplate the general result of His ministry, it led His soul to renewed communion with His Heavenly Father: "*I thank Thee, O Father, Lord of Heaven and earth, because Thou hast hid these things from the wise and prudent, and hast revealed them unto babes; even so, Father, for so it seemed good in Thy sight.*" Was He in distress—in the language of filial confidence and perfect submission, He had recourse to prayer: "*Father, if it be possible, let this cup pass from me; nevertheless, not as I will, but as Thou wilt.*" Was He persecuted even unto death, He prayed for His murderers: "*Father, forgive them, for they know not what they do.*" Thus, everything that occurred in the experience of the blessed Master, led to intercourse with His Heavenly Father.

May it ever be so with you, beloved brethren, looking in prayer to your Heavenly Father for the supply of all you need to adorn the doctrines of the Gospel, and looking unto Jesus as your pattern and example, whose steps it is most blessed to follow.

And next in importance to prayer for God's blessing upon your labors, is *unity*: "*The unity of the Spirit in the bonds of peace.*"

The importance of unity and concord in the furtherance of God's work among those who are associated in such labors as yours, cannot possibly be over-estimated. Be ever ready to sacrifice everything but truth for the maintenance of this blessed disposition—unity. And with a view thereto watch continually over the selfishness of your own hearts. An unhallowed ambition may find nourishing food even in sacred assemblies. Place and circumstances have, of themselves, no power to repress its energies. An uninterrupted view of the Cross of Christ is its only effectual antidote. Maintain the abasing view which the great Apostle had of himself when he said, "*I am nothing.*" It is pride that is the cause of alienation of heart and dissension among Christians. "*Let each esteem other better than himself.*" Let each suspect his own judgment and his own motives. Guard diligently against the first breach in that unity of spirit which is your strength and bulwark against the enemy. If there be discord among the leaders of an army, the commanders of a fleet, or the conductors of any other enterprise, the spirit of prophecy is not necessary to foretell the failure. "*Divide et impera,*" is Satan's watchword in his opposition to Christ's Kingdom. Be it your constant prayer and endeavor to disappoint his schemes. "A house divided against itself cannot stand." Forget not, but ever remember, the great subject of the Saviour's last memorable prayer to His Father, that His disciples might be one, even as He and His Father are one.

I am fully persuaded, as I said on a former occasion, that the glory of the Church is her assimilation to Christ. And never will her usefulness and her splendor reach their meridian until the love of a common Saviour shall bind together every heart and unite every hand. Envy, jealousy, evil surmisings and

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uncharitableness can only tend to weaken and scatter the resources of the Church and palsy her exertions; but, when through the abundant outpouring of the Holy Spirit, arm shall be linked to arm, and heart to heart, and prayer to prayer,—when to love and serve Christ, and to anticipate heaven, and to save immortal souls,—when these shall be the grand and all absorbing terms of Christian communion,—oh, then, what a firm and powerful phalanx shall go forth from the Church of the living God against the powers of darkness and the enemies of men! For this ONENESS of aim I would again repeat, Pray, strive and labor.

And now, my beloved brethren, once more, in taking leave of you, even under the circumstances already stated at the commencement of my Address, I cannot describe what the separation is to me. You have joined so heartily with me in my work, and I have felt so thoroughly at home with you, that the wrench must necessarily be severe. Indeed, were there not added to other considerations the feeble health of Mrs. Hellmuth, which renders a milder climate absolutely necessary for her, I do not think anything could have induced me to break loose from ties and associations which have become well nigh a part of my very being.

The uniform kindness I have ever received personally and officially at the hands of the Clergy and Laity of this Diocese, will never be forgotten by me, but will be treasured up in my heart and will afford delightful reminiscences, while working in the mother Church, of the happy relationship that subsisted between us.

If my position, as your Bishop, has had its share of trials and difficulties, how small and insignificant do these seem at the moment of parting! They have only ruffled the surface, but not stirred the depths of our peace.

Trials are to be expected in every earthly career; indeed, they are a portion of the discipline we need, and often it is by means of these, as stepping stones, that God enables us to rise to a higher devotion to His cause, and to nobler and more unselfish acts of service. May it prove, beloved brethren, to be so with those to which we are severally exposed in our different spheres of duty.

All things considered, I do not think I could have been called upon to sever my connection with you at any period of my Episcopate with greater ease and satisfaction, or when the Diocese would have suffered less from a change in the administration. Thank God, peace prevails throughout this portion of the Church to a very marked degree, and the Clergy are loyally and faithfully laboring in harmony with their people for God's glory and the spread of His blessed Gospel.

The Missionary department is, thank God, in a prosperous, progressive condition, while the Western University, with its affiliated Divinity and Medical Faculties, is in active operation, and will, as the work becomes more fully known, gather to itself the interest and co-operation of all friends of higher Christian education.

For my part, I reiterate here my promise that I will lose no suitable opportunity of advocating and commending to the sympathy and co-operation of our English Church members the noble educational works in regard to which this Diocese has been so eminently blessed of God.

Let me here add that my heart's desire and prayer to God is that He may enable you to make choice of one to preside over you, full of the Holy Ghost, and in every way fitted to administer the affairs of this large and prosperous Diocese to the glory of God, for the extension of Christ's Kingdom, and for your own comfort and happiness.

"Finally, brethren, farewell. Be perfect, be of good comfort, be of one mind, live in peace; and the God of love and peace shall be with you."

Address to the Bishop.

The Committee appointed by the Standing Committee to prepare an address to the Lord Bishop, on his resignation of the See and departure from the Diocese, presented the following address, which was beautifully engrossed on vellum, and was read by the Very Rev. the Dean, as Chairman, the members of the Synod standing :

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To the Right Reverend Father in God, Isaac Hellmuth, D. D., D. C. L.

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR LORDSHIP.—On the eve of your departure we, the Clergy and Laity of the Diocese of Huron, under a deep sense of the value of your services and labors in the cause of the Church, desire to express our sorrow that the many and close ties that have so long united us are about to be severed.

Believing, as we do, in the continually abiding and directing presence of God, the Holy Ghost, in the Church, we are constrained to acknowledge that the call which you have received, to occupy the honorable position of Suffragan Bishop in the Diocese of Ripon, England, and the circumstances that have necessitated your acceptance, have been wisely ordered for the glory of God and the good of the whole Church; yet, while we believe this, and confidently trust that the good works which have been initiated or fostered by you will still prosper in the hands of him to whose guidance the Church shall be committed, it is with feelings of no feigned regret that we now say farewell.

Words of flattery would be as unseemly in us as they would be offensive to your Lordship, but plain truth is no flattery; therefore we would express in few words our sense of the obligations under which the Diocese of Huron is lastingly placed for the deep interest which you have always taken in the advancement of higher education, of which the noble institutions, which owe their existence to your exertions, will remain lasting monuments. We trust that the example your life has afforded, of exhaustless energy and ceaseless toil, joined with unflinching patience and courtesy, may not only be remembered, but followed as a pattern worthy of imitation. We now beg your Lordship's acceptance of the accompanying service of plate as a small and very inadequate expression of our love and esteem, and when far removed from us and busied amidst new scenes, may it remind you that in this your first Diocese there are many hearts that beat warmly towards you, and many prayers that ascend in your behalf for that blessing which alone maketh rich.

Praying that the great Head of the Church may grant to you and Mrs. Hellmuth many years of happiness, blessing you abundantly both in public labors and private life,

At 5.15 o'clock the Bishop pronounced the Benediction, and adjourned the Synod, to meet next morning.

SECOND DAY.

Wednesday, June 20, 1883.

The Litany was said at the Chapter House at 9 o'clock.

The Synod assembled in the same place at 10 o'clock.

The Bishop in the Chair.

Minutes.

The minutes of yesterday's proceedings were read by the Hon. Clerical Secretary, and being approved by the Synod, were signed by the Chairman.

Notices of Motion.

1. By Rev. E. M. Bland,

That a Committee be appointed from this Synod to confer with the Dioceses of Niagara, Toronto and Ontario, in regard to holding Church Congresses from year to year in our respective Dioceses, under the management of an Interdiocesan Committee, who shall be empowered to make such arrangements as shall best tend to united action upon this important subject.

2. By Rev. Rural Dean Hill,

That in the opinion of the Synod the thanks of the Diocese are due to Rev. Canon Innes for the zeal, courtesy and energy manifested by him during his tenure of the office of Commissary.

3. By Mr. William Grey,

That a collection be taken up in the several Churches in this Diocese for the purpose of aiding the Missionary Diocese of Algoma in establishing a fund for the widows and orphans of the Clergymen of that Diocese.

4. By Rev. James Chance,

That the delegates to the Provincial Synod from this Diocese be instructed to urge upon the Synod in session in September next the advisability of making (1) an official declaration as to what constitutes Church membership and a claim to the ministrations of the Church; (2) as to what extent the Clergy and Laity of the Church of England in Canada are bound by the Canons and Rubrics of the Church of England; (3) of effecting any change in said Canons and Rubrics which may be considered necessary for the greater effectiveness and progress of the work of the Church, and in order that our ecclesiastical system might harmonize (in the non-essentials to the existence, vitality and prosperity of the Church), with the laws of the country, so as to avoid any unnecessary collision therewith, and to be supported and protected thereby in its practical operation; (4) of liturgical enrichment so far as to provide suitable forms of prayer for Rogation days, laying the corner-stone of a church, consecration of a new church, for the re-opening of a church after it has been closed for extensive repairs, alterations of additions, a form of reception of converts to our Church from false doctrine, heresy or schism; (5) of providing a Canon on Discipline which shall be applicable to all the Clergy and Laity in all the Dioceses of the Ecclesiastical province.

5. By Rev. W. F. Campbell,

That this Synod strongly recommends to the Provincial Synod to take into consideration at its next session the desirability of the establishment of a "General Board of Missions of the Church of England in Canada," with the requisite powers and prerogatives—said Board to be organized upon a basis similar to that adopted and now in force in connection with "the General Board of Missions of the Protestant Episcopal Church of the United States."

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6. By Rev. John Gemley,

That this Synod respectfully requests the Provincial Synod at its approaching Session to take into consideration the question of the preparation of a form of morning and evening prayer for the use of those who may occasionally attend the services of our Church—said form to be called "Morning and Evening Prayer (from the Book of Common Prayer) arranged for the use of visitors." Accompanying this request a plan of arrangement is submitted, to which the attention of the Provincial Synod is with due respect solicited.

7. By Rev. John Gemley,

That the attention of the Provincial Synod is hereby respectfully solicited by this Synod to consider the advisability of some emendation of Canon VIII., of the Provincial Synod, upon the subject of Episcopal Resignations, so as to prevent the delay in accepting any such resignation, which, under the present Canon, is liable to occur. It is hereby proposed, that after the words in the aforesaid Canon, "the House of Bishops' consent," the following be added:—"Should a resignation be forwarded to the Metropolitan at any period more than one month prior to any duly authorized meeting of the Provincial Synod, the Metropolitan shall summon a meeting of the House of Bishops and shall lay before them, for their acceptance or rejection, such resignation, or should it be deemed by the Metropolitan inconvenient and unnecessary to call together the House of Bishops for this purpose, he shall by correspondence obtain their assent or refusal, and it shall have the same authority as if given in Session assembled as the House of Bishops."

8. By Rev. Rural Dean Ballard,

That the Bishop be requested to appoint a committee to devise the best methods to preserve the parochial records of the Diocese.

9. By Rev. Rural Dean Bland,

Question as to the eligibility of Lay Delegates to seats in the Standing Committee (a) after having removed from the Parish which they were elected to represent; (b) after being removed by the Parish at the Easter Vestry meeting from such representation.

10. By Rev. Rural Dean Bland,

Question as to the powers of voters to enroll their names in more than one Parish by signing a new roll without removing their names from that which they had originally signed in a former Parish, thereby obtaining an undue Lay representation in Synod, and as to the requirements of Incumbents to erase from the roll the names of all such translated voters.

11. By Rev. Rural Dean Hill,

That whereas the *Church Chronicle* is styled the organ of the Diocese of Huron, that some steps be taken to place it more immediately under the control of this Synod, and also to devise means to ensure its weekly publication and to increase its circulation.

The deputation, comprising Rev. Dr. Reid and the Hon. Senator Vidal, were then introduced, and were received by the members of the Synod standing, and Rev. Dr. Reid presented the following resolution :

The following resolution was unanimously adopted by the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in Canada :—The General Assembly desires to express and record the pleasure with which it has received the resolution transmitted by the Synod of the Diocese of Huron now in Session in this city. The General Assembly heartily reciprocates the Christian and fraternal greetings thereby conveyed, and earnestly prays that an abundant blessing from the great Head of the Church may rest upon the Synod in its deliberations at this time, and on all the work in which the Bishop and members of the Synod are severally engaged for the advancement of the kingdom of our Lord and Saviour, Jesus Christ.

The Bishop replied that the Synod were pleased at receiving the resolution and felt gratified at such courtesy. He hoped that Christian fellowship and love may inspire all who call themselves Christians. In the name of the Synod he welcomed them.

The Society for Promoting Christian Knowledge and the Religious Tract Society continue to supply our Depository with books at greatly reduced rates. Your Committee would again acknowledge the kind voluntary assistance rendered them by the Sec.-Treas. of Synod, Mr. E. B. Reed.

3.—LITURGY AND CLASS-BOOKS.

A Liturgy for Church schools, compiled from Liturgies of the Church of England Sunday School Institute, is on sale at Taylor's bookstore at 3 cents per copy. A limited number will be granted free of charge to poorer schools on application. A Class-Book, specially adapted for use in Church schools, has been compiled and arranged in convenient form. They may be had at Taylor's at the rate of 5 cents each.

3.—TRACTS.

Your Committee desire to acknowledge the following grants: From the S. P. C. K. a grant of tracts to the value of £10. These have been distributed *pro rata* among those who applied for them. Specimen copies of these tracts are kept on hand, and copies may be ordered on the first of any quarter. From the Religious Tract Society a grant of tracts to the amount of £100. A supply of these may be had free of charge on application. Our thanks are due to the Bishop, through whom these grants were obtained.

Notices of Motion.

That this Synod hereby records its conviction that the Church of Christ cannot, without guilt, acquiesce in the practical absence of religious instruction from the Public School system of this country, and feels that the circumstances of the times in which we live, and the manifest results of the purely secular system of education, call upon Christian men to take action to remedy this evil. Be it therefore resolved that a committee be appointed to communicate and co-operate with the representatives of any religious bodies that may be disposed to co-operate in this object; and to take action, should such co-operation not be secured, to devise a scheme for religious instruction in our schools, and to petition the Legislature for its adoption.

14. By Mr. F. D. Woodcock,

That His Lordship be requested to appoint a committee to consider the best means of raising the Sustentation Fund to at least \$100,000, so that our Missionaries may receive an adequate annual stipend, and that new stations may be opened and our scattered people reached.

A quorum of the Synod shall consist of the Bishop or his Deputy, and not less than thirty by each order of the Clergy and Laity, respectively, except when electing a Bishop, when there shall be present not less than seventy-five of each order of the Clergy and Laity, respectively."

To amend Section 24 of the Constitution of Synod, by adding the words to the end of the section, "present when the vote is taken."

XII. *Resolved*—That whereas doubts have arisen as to the legality of the report just read of the Special Committee, the same be referred to the Standing Committee, to report at the next meeting of Synod, with instructions to obtain legal advice on the Constitutional question, and with further power, if legislative sanction is needed for the proposed change, to apply for and obtain the necessary Act for such purpose.

This resolution was put to the Synod and declared by the Bishop carried by over two-third majorities of Clergy and Laity, respectively.

2. By the Bishop,

The Bishop informed the Synod that for reasons stated in his printed circular he had withdrawn his proposed Canon on the election of a Bishop.

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At the request of a member His Lordship submitted for the consideration of the Synod these rules :

Rules for Election for Bishop.

The Bishop suggests that the rules to be adopted for the election of his successor shall be similar to those on previous elections.

1. The list of the Clergy shall be that furnished by the Bishop.
2. The list of the Laity shall be certified in the usual way.
3. Scrutineers shall be named by the chair, viz.: Two Clergymen and one Layman for the Clerical Ballot, and two Laymen and one Clergyman for the Lay Ballot. Ballots shall be provided by the Secretaries.
4. The Synod shall assemble for the election at such a time as may be agreed upon.
5. When the Synod assembles for the ballot no nomination shall be allowed; nor shall any discussion on any subject be permitted.
6. The Hon. Clerical Secretary shall call over the names of the Clergy, and each Clergyman when his name is called shall rise and proceed to the table and deposit his ballot in the ballot box, and then return to his seat. When the clergy have all voted, the Hon. Lay Secretary shall call over the names of the Laity, who shall vote in the same way; and before each ballot is closed the Secretary shall ask if any Clergyman or Layman, as the case may be, has not voted, and if any such is present he shall then be permitted to vote, if entitled to do so.
7. An interval of not less than half an hour shall elapse between each ballot if more than one ballot be necessary, the precise time to be named by the Chair.

These rules were adopted by a unanimous vote of the Synod.

3. By Mr. Charles Jenkins,

To amend Canon XXX. on the election of Delegates and Committees.

Moved by Mr. C. Jenkins,

Seconded by Rev. J. Chance,

XIII. *Resolved*—That in Section 1 the word "third" be substituted for "second," in Section 5 the words "third morning" be substituted for "the next," and in Section 6 the word "third" for "second."

This resolution was put to the Synod, and declared carried by over two-third majorities of the Clergy and Laity, respectively.

The Clauses will read, as amended in 1881 and at this Session, as follows:

XXX.—On the Election of Delegates to the Provincial Synod and of any Committees of the Synod which are Elected by Ballot.

1. The election shall take place first in the order of business on the third day of the annual session of the Synod.
2. Four Clergymen and four Laymen shall be named by the Chair to act, in conjunction with the Honorary Secretaries, as scrutineers of the vote of each ballot for delegates to the Provincial Synod, and four of either order out of which members are to be elected, as scrutineers for each Committee that it may be necessary to elect.

3. The lists shall be furnished to the members of the Synod by the Secretaries on the first day of session, and they shall bring them completed the third morning, each member, who desires to vote, having put a cross opposite the names of the persons he votes for on the various lists.

4. The order of proceedings shall be varied on the third day of session, by the report of the Committee on Lay Delegates being presented and dealt with immediately after No. 6 of order of proceedings, and the calling of the roll postponed until after this report has been disposed of.

It being 1 o'clock, the Synod adjourned.

It is with feelings of no ordinary kind that I prorogue this Synod. I dare not trust myself to give expression to the deep thoughts that agitate my heart on the eve of my severance from you. Your renewed kindness to me personally and officially during the present Session, makes me feel the wrench of parting more keenly. I shall ever cherish in my heart of hearts your loyal and affectionate co-operation with me in promoting the well-being of the Church in this Diocese. You have my fervent prayers that God may enable you to make choice of one to preside over this Diocese, full of the Holy Ghost and pre-eminently fitted for the Episcopal office. Let no pre-conceived ideas and improper motives influence you in coming together to make the choice, but rather fortify yourselves with prayer. I can never sever myself in spirit from you and your work in this portion of the Lord's vineyard, for the bonds that unite us are indissoluble, and in my future Episcopal work you will always find me as ready with pleasure, by word or pen, to advocate the good cause of Huron as if I were still officially connected with you. I leave with feelings of harmony and love towards all, and if in human weakness I have given offence to any I ask to be forgiven. I again sincerely thank you for the many kindnesses you have ever shown me, and pray that the Divine blessing will ever rest richly upon the work in this Diocese.

The Bishop then pronounced the benediction, and declared the Synod prorogued.

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THE ANNUAL REPORT
OF THE
STANDING COMMITTEE
OF THE
INCORPORATED SYNOD of the DIOCESE of HURON.

For the Twelve Months Ending April 30th, 1883.

(Being the Ninth under the Synod Act of Incorporation, 1874.)

In presenting their Annual Report the Standing Committee desire, in the first place, to record their gratitude to Almighty God for the many evidences of prosperity which are furnished by a review of the past year.

DIOCESAN INCOME.

The Committee have again the pleasure of reporting a gratifying increase in the aggregate of Diocesan contributions. The amount received from the free will offerings, Synod assessments and fees is \$16,579.93, being \$1037.14 in excess of the previous year.

The steady annual increase in the amount of contributions received by the Synod for Diocesan and Missionary purposes during the past few years is most encouraging, as may be seen by the following statement :

DIOCESAN MISSIONS.

The amount received during the year for Diocesan Missionary work was \$10,862.58, being \$382.66 less than the previous year.

The statement given herewith shows the distribution of this decrease amongst the various sources of Diocesan receipts for the Mission Fund, as compared with the receipts of the previous year :

In connection with this statement it is only due to the members of the Church throughout the Diocese to mention the unusual severity of the past winter and spring, and the additional fact that several collections were received too late to be credited to the year's receipts; nevertheless it is a matter of satisfaction that the aggregate for Mission work is so largely in excess of any previous year.

MISSION FUND GRANTS.

The Committee have to report that the Mission Fund is overdrawn \$2,628.56, being an addition of \$857 32 to the overdraft of the previous year.

It is evident that an immediate effort should be made, not only to meet this amount, but to provide for the necessary extension of Missionary work in this rapidly growing Diocese.

The Committee are convinced that the proper remedy is for some of the older existing Missions to become at once self-supporting, and thus not only relieve the Fund, but enable the Synod to give the required support to those newer and weaker Missions which are being so speedily supplied with Missionaries.

The Committee are fully alive to the importance of dealing promptly and in some practical manner with the whole scheme of Mission grants.

WIDOWS' AND ORPHANS' FUND.

The amount received from the Diocese during the past year was \$1,317.82, being \$146.10 in excess of the previous year. Of this increase \$101.31 was derived from the half yearly collections.

Twenty-two pensioners received \$4,280.00 from this Fund ; and an addition of \$546.73 was made to the capital of the Fund, which has now a total of \$57,317.78.

SUPERANNUATION.

Pensions amounting to \$5,008.40 were paid during the year to fourteen clergymen.

GOOD FRIDAY COLLECTIONS FOR DIVINITY STUDENTS.

The amount received was \$369.85.

The Committee recommend that this amount be placed as heretofore at the disposal of the Bishop for the purpose for which the collections were made.

ACCOUNTS.

The printed audited accounts shew as usual the position of the various Funds.

THE RESIGNATION OF THE BISHOP.

At the quarterly meeting of the Standing Committee held in March, 1883, the Bishop stated that it was his intention to resign his present See. The Bishop spoke in the warmest terms of his long and happy connection with this Diocese, and of the cordial co-operation which he had always received from the Clergy and Laity.

His Lordship, having made the above explanation, was requested to leave the chair, and on the motion of Rev. Rural Dean Ballard, the Very Rev. Dean Boomer acted as Chairman.

It was then moved by Rev. Canon Innes,
 Seconded by Rev. Rural Dean Cooper,

That the following members of the Standing Committee be appointed a sub-committee to draw up a resolution to be presented to his Lordship at this meeting, expressing our deep regret at the announcement which he has just made :
 The Very Rev. the Dean, Archdeacon Ellwood, Rev. Rural Dean Ballard, Judge McMahon and the mover and seconder. *Carried.*

The sub-committee then withdrew, and upon their return, the Bishop left the chair, which was again occupied by the Dean.

The following resolution was then presented :

Moved by Rev. Rural Dean Ballard,
 Seconded by Mr. A. C. Clark,

That having been informed by his Lordship the Bishop of Huron that his connection with this Diocese is likely soon to be severed, in view of his becoming Suffragan of the Diocese of Ripon, with the title of Bishop of Hull, Her Majesty having been pleased to give her assent to the same,

Be it resolved, That we, as the Standing Committee of the Synod of Huron, desire to put on record our high esteem for his Lordship, as well as our deep regret in prospect of his departure from amongst us.

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 Diocese.

We are assured that our Bishop would not entertain a proposition which would involve separation from his present Diocese, to which he has been wedded by labors most abundant during the best years of his life, and where he has achieved so large a measure of success, were it not that he has reasons sufficiently urgent to justify such an important step.

We bow in submission to the will of an over-ruling Providence at this serious crisis of the history of the Diocese of Huron, praying that the Great Head of the Church will bless our dear Bishop in his new sphere of duty, crowning his latter days with joy and peace, and that He will guide us in the selection of a successor equal to the occasion.

In the administration of this Diocese for the last twelve years, we have recognized the consecration of many of those elements which serve to make a good Bishop, and which have given our Bishop a wider than Colonial reputation.

A ripe scholarship, great wisdom, enduring patience, unflagging energy, unstinted toil, large generosity: these have been unremittingly laid under contribution for the glory of God and for the furtherance of his Church.

With feelings of no feigned regret do we look forward to bidding good-bye to our Right Reverend Father in God, a regret, however, which is mingled with gratitude and hope—with gratitude to God that with His blessing our Bishop leaves behind him a Diocese which is full of promise of even greater spiritual and financial prosperity than in the past—with hope, that, though distant from it, this Diocese shall have the valuable advocacy of his lips and pen; and that we may be permitted from time to time to give his Lordship a hearty welcome to the Synods of future years.

The resolution was received with much applause, and was carried unanimously by a standing vote.

That this Standing Committee has learned with pleasure that his Lordship's resignation is not to take effect until after the meeting of the Diocesan Synod in June next; and would therefore appoint a sub-committee consisting of the Very Rev. the Dean, Canon Hill, Rural Dean Ballard, Rural Dean Bland, Rev. W. A. Young, Rev. J. Gemley, Judge Kingsmill, R. Bayly, V. Cronyn, L. Skey, W. Gray, W. J. Imlach, J. F. Bell, A. C. Clark, A. H. Dymond, and the mover and seconder, to draft an address to be presented to his Lordship at the meeting of the Synod, expressing our deep sense of the value of the services which his Lordship has conferred upon the Church and the Diocese during his connection of now over twenty years, and especially during his Episcopate, and to take such steps as may seem to them best to give in some substantial form a lasting testimonial of our love and appreciation. *Carried unanimously.*

The Bishop replied with much feeling, and while expressing his grateful thanks for their kind expressions of good-will towards himself, he assured them that his interest in the Diocese would not cease with his removal, and that he intended to continue his exertions on behalf of the Western University and contemplated Cathedral.

1. Rev. Rural Dean Jeffrey Hill—On having meetings of Synod alternately for discharge of business and for Christian Conference.....
2. By Rev. Rural Dean Bland—As to the eligibility of lay delegates to seats in the Standing Committee (a) after having removed from the Parish which they were elected to represent; (b) after being removed by the parish at the Easter Vestry meeting from such representation.....
3. By the Rev. Rural Dean Bland—As to the power of voters to enroll their names in more than one parish by signing a new roll without removing their names from that which they had originally signed in a former parish, thereby obtaining an undue lay representation in Synod, and as the requirements of Incumbents to erase from the names of all such translated voters.....
4. By the Rev. Alfred Brown—That this Synod hereby records its conviction that the Church of Christ cannot, without guilt, acquiesce in the practical absence of religious instruction from the Public School system of this country, and feels that the circumstances of the times in which we live, and the manifest results of the purely secular system of education, call upon christian men to take action to remedy this evil. Be it therefore resolved that a committee be appointed to communicate and co-operate with the representatives of any religious bodies that may be disposed to co-operate in this object; and to take action should such co-operation not be secured, to devise a scheme for religious instruction in our schools, and to petition the Legislature for its adoption.....
5. By Mr. F. D. Woodcock—That His Lordship be requested to appoint a Committee to consider the best means of raising the Sustentation Fund to at least \$100,000, so that our Missionaries may receive an adequate annual stipend, and that new stations may be opened, and our scattered people reached.....
