Latest War News

(Condensed)
Aug. 22.—The German Commander has levied a war tax of \$40,000,000 from the city of Brussels or he will bombard it. Namur is reported to have fallen; this has again been denied. Britain loans Belgium \$50,000,000 for war purposes. A number of German prisoners have been sent to England. French forces defeated German cavalry near Basel, Switzerland.
Aug. 24.—Japan declared war on Germany yesterday. Italy still remains neutral. While Italy remains out of the fight, France has to keep a large body of troops on the French Italian frontier. Big battle between the Allied forces and the Germans in Belgium began yesterday, and may last several days. Russia officially announced that her armies have severely defeated the Germans and Austrians. Austrian Emperor is said to be dying. Austria has suffered a defeat in a naval engagement in Adriatic.
Aug. 25.—Germans claim big victory over the French army in Luxembourg. British official press bulletin says the Allies failed in their first offensive movement against the Germans in Belgium. The British troops held their ground, but had 2000 casualties. The Russian army of 4,000,000 men are moving over the entire German and Austrian frontier, and are defeating the enemy at every point. The German fleet is still bottled up in North Sea and German commerce is paralyzed.
Aug. 26.—Germans are now held back in Northern Belgium by combined French, British and Belgian forces. French troops have been pushed from Alsace. Nearly 300 have enrolled for the Nfld. regiment.
Aug. 27.—German attack on Alsace Lorraine Tuesday repulsed. In Belgium the Allies are firmly entrenched in strong defensive positions. The Japs are preparing to besiege Tsing Tau. The Russians are attacking the fortress of Posen, only 150 miles from Berlin. The advance and success of the Russians will no doubt tend to weaken the German forces on the western frontier.

The German armed auxiliary cruiser Kaiser Wilhelm der Grosse has been sunk off the West Coast of Africa by H. M. S. High Flyer. Bravo!
The German cruiser Madgeburg was captured by Russian ships in the Gulf of Finland, and her commander beached her. The Madgeburg was blown up. The Russians announce victory after victory. They have taken 100 cannon from the enemy.
The Germans and Austrians are continually retreating before the advance of the Russians.

Notice to Owners and Masters of British Ships

The attention of Owners and Masters of British Ships is called to the 74th Section of the "Merchant Shipping Act, 1894."
74.—(1) A Ship belonging to a British subject shall hoist the proper national colours—
(a) on a signal being made to her by one of His Majesty's ships (including any vessel under the command of an officer of His Majesty's navy on full pay), and
(b) on entering or leaving any foreign port, and
(c) if of fifty tons gross tonnage or upwards, on entering or leaving any British Port.
(2) If default is made on board any such ship in complying with this section, the master of the ship shall for each offence be liable to a fine not exceeding one hundred pounds.
At this time of war it is necessary for every British Ship to hoist the colours and heave to if signalled by a British Warship; if a vessel hoists no colours and runs away, it is liable to be fired upon.





Reform or Redemption

In a recent discussion on "The Church and Commercial Life" the following utterances were made which have a wide application:—

"It is possible that the Churches have been dissipating their energies over many problems when they would have been wiser to confine themselves to what was, after all, the main business of the Church—the evangelization of the world and the upbuilding of Christian character. The supreme purpose of our Lord's Incarnation was not the re-organization of human society. Jesus Christ was neither a reformer nor an agitator; His supreme object was to bring men into a right relationship with God. Therefore, though there were many wrongs in His day that needed righting, He did not come with any plan of social reform. His gospel was one, not of social uplift, but of spiritual redemption. The Church to be successful, must follow in the footsteps of our Lord. Her first and chief concern must be with the souls of men. This is not because Christ had no sympathy with the suffering of men; but because there can be no true and lasting uplift of social conditions if any people without, first, the redemption of their souls. Being recreated in Him, we may go into all departments of national life, and purify every relationship."

This is a refreshing instance on fundamental realities. The Church will never do God's will unless it keeps to the front the purpose for which Christ sent His people into the world. Failure will be inevitable and disastrous unless we put and keep first things first.—The Canadian Churchman.

A Gift From Brandram-Henderson, Limited.



A Timely Sermon

On the Present European Situation

Reading from Rev. 7, 1-3, Elder Hubley began his sermon Sunday night by saying that a definite work was outlined in these verses immediately preceding the close of probation by which the people of God would be sealed for the Kingdom. This seal or sign of God's elect people being explained in Ezekiel 20, 20. In order thus to gather out those whose hearts are perfect toward Him, God sends a three-fold message contained in Rev. 14, 1-2, which, according to verse 6 is the everlasting gospel. This gospel must go to every nation and kindred, said the speaker, and then the end would come according to Matt. 24, 14. "Hence in these last days," said he, "we are to see a message of reform going to every nation under Heaven and calling all to obedience to every precept of Jehovah."

This work, which began somewhat in obscurity according to the symbol of the Angel arising from the East, would continue with increasing brightness and power to the close of probation, during which time four angels would be commissioned to hold in check the winds of strife. Dating back to the revolution of 1848, when so many European thrones toppled into the dust, nothing but political interest has existed since. New and unlooked for complications have arisen with occasional outbursts of fury whilst a thousand voices have been raised that the great crisis had come for universal war. But the conflict has been going on for months and the world has been proclaimed world-wide will the angels let loose. These occasional outbursts being the mutterings of Armageddon's approach to which the nearer time brings us, the more universal will be the complications."

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Orangemen Carry Green Flag

Feature of Derry Day Procession in London, Ont.

London, Ont., Aug. 12.—Pledges of unwavering loyalty to the British throne in the present European crisis and of the readiness of Orangemen to go to the front to assist Britain in, as Mayor Hooker of Toronto, put it, her "battle against despotism for the rights of mankind," characterized the speeches to-day in connection with the celebration of the relief of Derry, an innovation in Orange circles in Ontario which was participated in by over 2,000 members of the Black Knights of Ireland, from all parts of Western Ontario, including 300 from Toronto. A feature of the occasion was the carrying at the head of the immense parade of the green flag of Ireland, signifying a United Ireland in the present crisis.

Australia's Fleet

A Shanghai despatch reports that several Australian warships have joined the British squadron in East Asiatic waters.

The naval forces of the Australian Commonwealth in July comprised the battle cruiser Australia of 19,200 tons, with an armament of eight twelve-inch guns, sixteen four-inch guns and four three-pounder guns. She carries a complement of about 900 men.

Besides this first class vessel, Australia has several others in commission.

The turret ship Cerberus, of 3,840 tons, has four 10-inch, two 14-pounder and two 6 pounder guns.

The Encounter, a light cruiser, of 5,880 tons, carries eleven 6-inch, eight 12-pounder and one 3 pounder guns.

The Melbourne, a light cruiser of 5,600 tons, carries eight 6 inch and four 3 pounder guns, with a crew of 376.

The Pioneer, a light cruiser of 2,200 tons, carries eight 4 inch and eight 3 pounder guns and a crew of 227.

The Sydney, a light cruiser of 5,600 tons, carries eight 6 inch and four 3 pounder guns and a crew of 376.

The Derwent, the Parramatta, the Werrego and the Yarra, torpedo destroyers, are of 700 tons each and have crews of sixty six men. They are very fast.

There are also the Gayundah and the Protector and several sub-marines.

German Cruiser Sinks British Ship

New York, Aug. 22.—News has been received here to the effect that the crew of the British steamer Hyades who have landed at Rio de Janeiro report that their ship was sunk by the German cruiser Dresden.

Germany Rejects Japanese Ultimatum

London, August 22.—Germany has rejected the Japanese ultimatum demanding the withdrawal of German ships from the Far East and the evacuation of Kiao Chau, according to dispatches from Kiao Chau, which also state that the Japanese fleet will bombard that place tomorrow.

Russians Advancing

London, August 22.—A despatch from St. Petersburg says it has been officially announced there that the Russian army is now advancing along the entire Austro-German frontier and is successfully maintaining the offensive at every point of contact.

The World's Verdict

There are few publicists in any country, outside the German Empire, up to his time, who have ventured to demand, much less vindicate, the attitude of the Kaiser in forcing the unspeakable horrors of a European War upon the world. There followed in swift succession the German ultimatums to Russia and France forbidding them to mobilize their men; the declaration of war against Russia; the movement of troops against France; the invasion of Belgium; and finally war between Germany and Great Britain.

Yet the German Emperor complains that he has been forced into war in defence of the Fatherland. It is rank hypocrisy.—Exchange.

Successes of Allies

London, Aug. 22.—A despatch from Reuter's St. Petersburg correspondent says the Russian advance both on Austria and Germany is progressing without interruption. The cavalry engagement of the Northern army on Friday was a severe blow to the Germans of East Prussia, an entire German battery being captured. Aviators are continually throwing bombs on German entrenchments. In a battle of four days' duration the Serbians captured sixty Austrian guns.

The Call To Arms

Boon in Recruiting Follows Lord Kitchener's Appeal

Lord Kitchener's "Call to arms" has met with such success that it has been found necessary to open several new recruiting agencies, both in London and in the large towns in the North.

Six new agencies were established yesterday in London. Staffs of medical officers and clerks have been specially assembled to cope with the influx of recruits who continue to present themselves at the recruiting offices in increasing numbers.

For the last three days the numbers that have been enrolled in London alone are about 1,500.

Mammoth Pier Under Construction

A Stupendous Undertaking

The work of building the mammoth pier for the Furness Withy Company at the eastern section of the waterfront is progressing at a rapid pace. Quite a large number of men are engaged, nearly all of which came from Canada, they are skilled workmen and very efficient pile-drivers and wharf builders generally. During the short period that operations have been going on a considerable area of wharf has been constructed, due to the tact and business-like methods of those in charge. Yesterday while work was suspended, crowds of citizens visited the place and all expressed themselves as agreeably surprised at the headway being made with such a stupendous undertaking. The erection of the pier is certainly one of the biggest jobs ever tackled on this side of the Atlantic, but when it is finished, will be an ornament to St. John's Harbor, a credit to its builders and a lasting monument to the promoters and owners. The latter, no doubt, are to be congratulated for their enterprise and go-ahead-ness.—Telegram.

Dredging Operations

The dredge Priestman left here for Port de Grave on Monday morning last. During her stay in Bay Roberts dredging was performed at the west and central public wharves, also at C. & A. Dawe's east wharf to enable steamers to discharge cargoes of coal, the firm having erected recently a large addition to their already large store. The depth of water at the latter wharf at low tide is now from 13 to 17 ft.

At the central public wharf they found the bottom a solid mass of rock and heavy boulders on the east side. Consequently the water was made only 2 ft. deeper, it being now about 13 ft. at low tide.

Kyle Back From Labrador

The S. S. Kyle, Capt. Parsons, arrived from Labrador ports Monday, having been as far North as Nain. The weather during the trip was fairly moderate though considerable ice was seen. Capt. Parsons reports a decided improvement in the fishery North of Cape Harrison, and that a large number of floaters have done well during the last two weeks. South from Cape Harrison there is also an improvement and at some of the harbors 'voyages' have been secured. On the whole, however, the catch is well below an average. Some of the fishermen belonging to this section are getting fish, while others have caught very little. On the whole our people will have an average voyage.

NEWS IN A LINE

There is a very good sign of fish at Independent and Ironbound Islands.

There has been very little improvement in the Labrador fishery since last report.

Adj. and Mrs. Higdon, S. A., are at present on furlough at New Harbor, T. B.

Codfish was plentiful on the local grounds on Thursday morning. One man secured 8 lbs. in his trawl. Caplin were also plentiful.

All the outport newspaper editors have been nominated to the Patriotic Committee recently organized in St. John's.

Mr. N. N. Bradley, of St. John's, visited Bay Roberts this week, the guest of Mrs. Robert Earle, Country Road.

Forty-three naval reservists returned from Labrador by the Kyle Monday morning. Seven of that number belong to this section.

For the benefit of the general public the daily message concerning the war and other matters is posted in The Guardian office window daily.

Mr. and Mrs. Wm. Chard and baby, who came from St. John's on Saturday, returned to the city by Monday evening's train.

Capt. A. J. Moore, S. A., has been appointed to take charge of the S. A. school at Wintonon, T. B. She left for that place via Carboneau on Monday last.

Capt. Roberts, S. A., leaves next week for St. John's to enter the S. A. College to study for another grade. During his absence from the school here it is expected Lieut. Andrews, S. A., will supply.

PUBLIC NOTICE

The following sections of Chapter 28 of the Consolidated Statutes (2nd Series) and the Act in Amendment thereof, are published for general information:—

Sec. 12.—When any death takes place in this Colony, information of the same shall be furnished or posted within 48 hours thereafter to the proper officer appointed under this chapter to receive the same in the form of Schedule A, under a fine not exceeding Ten Dollars for every neglect to do so. The obligation to furnish this information shall rest, in the first instance, on the medical attendant; secondly, on the undertaker; and failing these, on the next of kin to the deceased person.

Sec. 14.—No sexton or other person having charge of a cemetery or burial place shall permit the burial of any person in such cemetery or burial place without first having received a certificate signed by a MEDICAL ATTENDANT, a CLERGYMAN, or TWO RELIABLE PERSONS cognizant of the facts certifying to the death of the person for whom burial is required, and setting forth as far as is known the cause of death; and all such certificates shall be forwarded monthly to the registering officers concerned.

This law does not apply to the City of Saint John's, where special and more strict regulations are enforced.

"Me and Gott"

The Kaiser is dragging God's name into the present war with the familiarity which is his wont, saying in effect that his heavenly ally will help him conquer the godless Russ and the rest of us.

This war is a war of defence against the aggressiveness of the Teuton; and every shot fired at Germany and Austria is aimed against the survival of a past filled with successive stages of tyranny and brigandage, and for the better fulfilment of human liberty and progress, with universal peace the future goal.

Britain, France, Russia and the other nations now armed against Teutonic brigandage represent the FUTURE.

If Germany and Austria are victors, Europe will be for an indefinite term under the heel of tyranny.

Are we to retreat into the past, or press toward a better future? Speaking from a coldly practical standpoint France and Britain delayed too long before they stepped into the tremendous conflict; but these two great nations, so long the leaders of the cause of justice, liberty and progress, will emerge with every honor, for in their long delay the world has fully realized that they the aggressed and not the aggressors.

Enlisting Volunteers

The Patriotic Committee, organized in St. John's recently, with Governor Davidson as its chairman, is now calling for 500 volunteers for service abroad. All ready a number of ex-Brigades men and others have volunteered.

The Magistrates in the outports have been asked to call public meetings for the purpose of taking some definite action in reference to recruiting. The time is a serious one for the world as well as the British Empire, and our homes and all we possess are jeopardized, to a certain extent.

The war to be waged will no doubt outrival any war in the history of the world in the number of men engaged, the nations involved, the number of dead and wounded and the awful sufferings and losses that are bound to follow in its train.

The Mother Country, which has been standing the burden and expense of our protection and safety as well as her own, is now calling upon her Dominions and her Colonies to come to her aid in the battle she is waging on behalf of Right and Freedom against Militarism and Despotism.

Let us therefore be prepared to follow the example of Canada and the Motherland and put aside for the time being at least all party strifes and differences, and combine to do everything in our power to strengthen the hands of Old England in her present fight.

We in Newfoundland know very little about the ravages of war, never having actually experienced them. All these years our homes and families have received protection from Britain's bulwarks at no cost to ourselves. The people of the British Isles have borne the expense and have freely given of their best manhood.

Shall we then, those of us who are able, not hear the call to Duty and buckle on the armor in defence of the glorious traditions and principles of the British Empire. The Liquor Traffic

At Central Methodist Church on Sunday evening Rev. W. Grimes dealt with 'The Liquor Traffic.' The text was Dan. 5: 27, 'Thou art weighed in the balances and found wanting.'

He showed how inconsistent it was with the goal of Christian civilization, which stood for a safer, happier, better world. Inconsistent, yet men defend it on the plea of personal liberty. But individual liberty is curtailed by the rights of others. No one is conceded the right to suicide, become criminal, or aid the enemy in war. Liberty to do wrong is not liberty, but license. It furnishes revenue, but costs far more than it supplies.

From the testimony of such men as General Booth, Archbishop Ireland and others, he showed how the traffic is responsible for from three-fourths to nine-tenths of the crime and poverty, one-fourth of the insanity and much of the slum conditions of populous cities. In the United States the various temperance societies are aiming at National Prohibition in 1920. The advice of Earl Kitchener to the British soldiers in Belgium, showed how the tide is setting. The Church should show uncompromising hostility to the traffic if it is to save itself and the people.
