PICKETS WATCHED FUNERALS. Police Will Accompany Corteges Cemetery to Guard Against Attacks by Strikers.

Chicago, Dec. 19.-Undertakers' wagnearly every instance the funerals were watched by union pickets stationed to see that livery carriages did not participate. The most prominent funeral of the day was that of Supreme Court Judge Jonas Hutchinson, whose remains were taken to Oakwood cemetery in an undertaker's wagon, while the private carriages of his personal friends were used for the family. Some disturbance was caused at the funeral of Mrs. Anna Vleek, a Bohemian woman, who was murdered three daysago by her husband. The undertaker was hooted and the police were called in to keep the crowds back.

A funeral street car, instead of a hearse as well as a police guard, was utilized by Undertaker Joseph Blake to circumvent striking pickets, from whom violence was feared at the funeral of the baby daughter of Joseph Keefer, president of the company. The mourners boarded a second car and the trip was made to Oakwood cemetery. The Keefer residence was surrounded at the time of the funeral by pickets.

Police protection against strikers for funeral corteges on their way to cemeteries was demanded to-night by the livery associations and was promptly promised. The chief declined to allow the officers to be seated on or drive the vehicles bearing the bodies, however.

"This interference with the burial of the dead is the meanest of the business the police had to cope with," said Chief O'Neil to-night. "No attacks have yet been made on ambulances bearing the sick, but the undertakers expressed fears that such would soon be the case. It is said that teamsters have threatened to drive the poles of their trucks through ambulances."

In cases of death from diphtheria and scarlet fever, where quick burial is demanded, the strikers expected to have grave results, as the infection may spread if funerals are delayed. SONG BIRDS.

To the Editor:—There are at least two reasons why the imported birds die off. First, because the cages are open only on one side, and direct sunshine has little chance to enter. In Vancouver the cages for small birds are open on three sides, and on the fourth side there is a dry and well ventilated house, where the birds can find shelter.

Secondly, while the imported birds are chiefly insectiverous they are being fed on seeds and grain.
