

PETERSBURG, Feb. 10.-The Putiloff Iron Works and the Franco-Russian works are again closed, the men having walked out in a body at 10 o'clock this morning in consequence of the refusal of their employers to grant an eight hour day. The men at the Putiloff works, who yesterday afternoon started enforcing eight hour shifts returned to work this morning, but subsequently at a conference of the directors the latter adhered to their refusal to grant an eight hour day and the men thereupon ceased work, inthe whole body quietly marched out and formed groups in the streets. The employes of the Franco-Russian works took similar action.
