

An interesting development comes out in Travers' testimony relating to the intervention of the Liberal whip, Mr. Calvert, in the matter. Travers was so shy an individual, and Mr. Fielding so hedged about with dignity and forms, that the Liberal whip's services were called in to perform the ceremony of an introduction. For this triffing courtesy, Mr. Travers says Mr. Calvert later received a loan without security for some thousands of dollars, and which was charged to "commissions," but which was afterwards paid back with interest.

The Boston Herald says of the reciprocity agreement:—"If will relieve the drain on our forests and give us cheaper and perhaps better material." The public will wait with much interest the progress of the investigation, and the additional evidence to be given, amongst which is that of officials of the Finance Department and probably of the Finance Minister himself. Parliament also will have scheduling to say about the matter. Altogether the probabilities favor a pretty thorough sifting of the whole abominable transaction.
