### WRITS SHORTLY TO BE ISSUED FOR GENERAL ELECTION THE FIRST WEEK OF DECEMBER

Andre Fanteaux Named Solicitor General-Winnipeg Liberals Display More Enthusiasm Than Judgment in Inviting Mackenzie King to Go West-Latest Revenue Statistics Shattered Claim of Agrarians Who Have Maintained Government Raised Too Much by Indirect Taxation.

Ottawa, Oct. 2.—Hon. Arthur Meighen announced Saturday that he
had recommended an immediate dissolution of parliament to His Excellency
who is visiting in Toronto, and expected that his recommendation would be
given effect at once. At the same time he stated that the writs would
shortly be issued for an election during the first week in December, the
definite date being made known as soon as all the electoral officers were
appointed. Several appointments were made Saturday and await the approbation of His Excellency.

Andre Fauteaux, K. C., who addressd the large gathering in the Monu ent National Friday evening, acompanied the Prime Minister from Montreal and will be named Solicitor General. He would have been sworn in Saturday if the Governor General had been in the city. Mr. Fauteaux will contest either Terrebonne or Laval Two Mountains. He has been notive in political 'life for several years. It is also possible that another French Canadian will enter the cabinet without portfolio. Another report here credits Hon. Rodolphe Monty with an inclination to test his fortunes in Beauharnois in the coming clettlon. This has always been good nghting ground and was represented for twenty-one years by the late Hon. J. E. The latest revenue statistics show that this criticism is not founded on fact. For the five months ending August 51st., of the present fiscal year, the Federal treasury has received from business profits tax and income tax \$61,600,000 and from customs and excise \$60,200,000. From inland Revenue the returns are approximately \$23,800,000 chiefly from the sales tax which is both direct and indirect in its application. It will be seen that the returns from specifically direct and indirect taxation are approximately equal. It is only fair to point out however, that in the remaining seven months the indirect taxation will greatly exceed the direct, but, even it so, the application of the principle of direct taxation has been greatly increased. While advocates of direct taxation the Agrarians made a sorry thowing in this method of contributing to the country's financial requirement. For the fiscal year 1320-21, 134,257 rate payers paid income tax and among these were only 16,652 farmers. The farmers of Canada in all contributed only \$611,736 while professional men paid \$2,642,635, employees \$11,301,806, merchants, \$7,685,521, manufacturers \$3,317,736 and all other taxpayers \$11,25,662, in their advocacy of the extension of the principle of direct taxation the Agrarians do not appear to be endangering their bank accounts.

### THE VATICAN SEES ANOTHER WAR SOON IF THE WASHINGTON PARLEY FAILS

Rome, Oct. 2—Cardinal Gaspari, papal secretary of state, sends to erica, the Papacy's wishes for the success of the Washington confer-

ence on disarmament.

"The conference must succeed," he declared in an interview granted today, "for if it fails there will be another war in a few years.

"Imagine Japan saying at Washington, "We won't disarm, for we will soon be stronger than America." The answer would be an immediate

war between the two powers.

"The Vatioan believes in the abolition of conscription as the est step towards disarmament. No nation can make war without con-scription, as was proved by America and England during the world conflict. War's failure to achieve results is established. What, fo stance, are Italy's gains worth compared with the loss of 600,000 of her best men and the economic rule she has sustained?

### INDEBTEDNESS DELICATE ONE

Great Britain Has No Inter tion of Injecting It lato Arms Conference.

### AWAIT SUGGESTION OF UNITED STATES

Financiers Point Out Great Economic Advantage Cancellation of Debts.

(United Press)

London, Oct. 2—The British Government has decided that, as far as Great Britain is concerned, there will be no attempt to inject: the question of Allied indebtedness to the United States into the Washington Conference, the United News learns from sources usually reliable.

In spite of the fact that the majority of the Cabinet and some of the press believe that the debt question should be brought before the conference while many British economists argue that it should play a major part in the November discussions, The Foreign Office holds to the view that the question rests solely with the Washington Government, and thet it would be unwise to introduce the subject except under America's initiative. This view receives additional emphasis when it is realized that Washington has received an impression that most Europeans, including the British Government, are either pessimistic, apathetic or unwilling to cooperate in the conference, and Foreign offices are convinced that this impression is based, in part, upon fear of the debt question being raised.

# **Vital Statistics**

Month of August With Increased Traffic Was Greater Decrease in Open ating Expenses.

Highest of Year

Montreal, Sept. 28—Possibly influenced by continued large through grain shipments, if not by an improvement in other lines of traffic, the earnings of the Canadian Pacific Railway for Angust, amounting to \$1.7.064,265, are the highest for any month this year to date. Also with the increased traffic there was a greater decrease in operating expenses as compared with last year, and net profits continue to increase, standing at \$2,576,139 atter the deduction of \$14,483,126 for working expenses, an advance of \$375,226. Compared with August last year, gross earnings decreased \$39,502, but the increase in net profits was accounted for by a decrease of \$1,305,829 in working expenses, as compared with August, 1920. The decrease in gross earnings is probabily accounted for by the lull in business which preceded the general shipment of grain late in the month. Montreal, Sept. 28-Possibly influ-408

The company's eight months to August 31 also show an advance in net profits, they being up \$2,323,38 over those of the corresponding period in 1920, standing for the first eight months of this year at \$17,580,631. In this instance, again, the reduction in working expenses overshadows the decrease in gross earnings. The gross earnings for the eight months are \$116,892,866, down \$10,535,249, while working expenses were reduced by \$12,867,380, as compared with the first eight manths of last reak.

### Reduction Has Been Accepted

15,000 Longshoremen New York Agree to 23 Per Eat Less Meat if Kidneys Feel Cent. Cut, Effective Today.

New York, Oct. 1.—A wage reduction of approximately 23 per cent, taking effect at midnight tonight, has been accepted by the International Longshoremen's Association representing upwards of 15,000 men employed along the Atlantic and Gulf quarters at the conclusion of a series of conferences which have been going on for several weeks between representatives of the longshoremen and trans-Atlantic steamship companies. The new contract provides that the 48-hour working week shall continue and that 65 cents an hour for straight time, and 31 for Sunday and overtime work. The former scale was 85 cents an hour for straight time and \$1.20 for overtime. The new contract ranse-Atlantic shipping and does not include coastwise traffic. 
