LONDON, Jan. 15. Mr. Gladstone, in writing from his residence at the Leader's party, writes to Earl Granville as follows: "The time has arrived when ought to revert to my letters of March last."

After receiving a number of public and private communications, Mr. Gladstone says: "It is no public advantage in me continuing to act as leader of the Liberal Party. After forty-two years of laborious public life, I have no desire to incur with the present opportunity. This retirement is dictated by personal view regarding the method of selecting the chief men of the party; and, as far as Parliament will continue to be governed by the same principles as heretofore, all arrangements for the treatment of general business to be made in the concurrence of the Liberal Party, will have my cordial support."

Earl Granville replies: "I am much gratified in the reasons, for which I profoundly regret, and deplore your decision. My late colleague agreed with you in regarding the safety of our cause, and doubtless the Liberal Party would have been more successful otherwise his testimony was of the strongest in his original charges."

London, Jan. 16.

The leading men of the Liberal party, with the exception of the Duke of Argyle, Viscount Cardwell, Lord Wolverton and John Bright, met at the residence of Earl Granville for consultation in view of Mr. Gladstone's retirement. It is understood that the prevailing opinion at the meeting was in favor of the selection of Mr. W. E. Forster as the future leader of the party. All present were agreed that Mr. Gladstone should be allowed to remain. It is stated that the constituency at Greenwich will present a requisition calling on the ex-premier to resign his seat for that city. His resignation of the Liberal leadership surprised his opponents. It was not anticipated that his successor will be formally announced until the re-opening of Parliament, when a general meeting of the party will be held.

The name of the Marquis of Hartington and Sir Wm. Harcourt were mentioned, as well as Forster, in connection with the leadership, but the indications are strong that Forster will be chosen.

A COALERS' STRIKE.

The leading men of the Liberal party, with the exception of the Duke of Argyle, Viscount Cardwell, Lord Wolverton and John Bright, met at the residence of Earl Granville for consultation in view of Mr. Gladstone's retirement. It is understood that the prevailing opinion at the meeting was in favor of the selection of Mr. W. E. Forster as the future leader of the party. All present were agreed that Mr. Gladstone should be allowed to remain. It is stated that the constituency at Greenwich will present a requisition calling on the ex-premier to resign his seat for that city. His resignation of the Liberal leadership surprised his opponents. It was not anticipated that his successor will be formally announced until the re-opening of Parliament, when a general meeting of the party will be held.

The name of the Marquis of Hartington and Sir Wm. Harcourt were mentioned, as well as Forster, in connection with the leadership, but the indications are strong that Forster will be chosen.

A COALERS' STRIKE.

A strike is in progress among the coal miners of Dean Forest, Gloucestershire, and the strikers have become riotous. Messengers have arrived at Monmouth asking for military to quell the disturbance.

A CREW SAVED.

The crew of the ship City of London, ashore on Carron Point, Ireland, have been saved. An effort to land the cargo will be made.

THE LOSS OF THE GEORGIA. The British Consul at Portland has ordered an investigation into the loss of the steamer Georgia, which had left that city two weeks ago. The captain abandoned the vessel to the insurance companies.

LOUISIANA. The Sub-Congregational Louisiana Committee, a body of prominent citizens, has presented to the Legislature a bill to make the Government as despotic. The full Committee goes to New Orleans to obtain further information.
