Social Science Congress.

Liege, Belgium, Sept. 8.—The Social Science Congress opened yesterday. Two thousand delegates were present from all parts of Catholic Europe. Cardinal Gibbons, Cardinal Manning, Dr. Windthorst and other Catholic leaders sent letters expressing sympathy with the objects of the congress. After a number of speeches had been made, it was resolved to send telegrams to the Pope and King Leopold expressing the devotion of the members.

In his letter to the Social Science Congress, Cardinal Manning urged the establishment of eight-hours as a working day for miners; that no women be employed in mines; the observance of Sunday by the workmen, and the adoption of a sliding scale of wages.

Across Niagara's Gorge on a Wire.
Niagara Halls, Ont., Aug. 8.—About
8,000 persons witnessed Dixon's feat of
walking a cable seven-eights of an inch-in
diameter stretched across the Niagara
gorge, between the suspension and cantilever bridges Saturday afternoon. When
about a quarter of the distance had been
traversed a halt was made. He stond on
one foot, holding out the other almost
horizontally, and waving his hand to the
spectators. Then he continued on his
journey until the center was reached, when
he sat down and threw both legs over his
balance pole, which was resting on the wire,
and stretched out at full length on his back
on the wire, crossing his feet and folding
his arms on his breast. Then he went on
until three-quarters had been passed. Then
he again stood on one leg and went through
a number of other maneuvers, after which
he ran up the incline, reaching the American side at 3422. After a rest of five
minutes Dixon returned to the wire with a
hoop on his ankles walked out to where the
Stars and Stripes floated in the breeze,
about 150 feet from the cliff, and went
through soveral maneuvers, winding the
flag about his shuilders, after which he
drove to the Canadian side, walked out

A SPOKANE FALLS CATASTROPHE.

Blast.

Spokane Falls, Wash., Sept. 7.—Last evening a premature blast in the Northern Pacific yards killed a large number of workmen. It was just before the hour of quitting work. A large force of men was engaged in blasting out a huge rock pile in the Northern Pacific freight yards in the castern part of the city. From 50 to 75 men were at work in the cut at the time. Some of the workmen were preparing a blast to be touched off after other workmen and teams had departed for the night. One blast had been prepared. In putting in the second it was exploded, the jar also touching off the first blast. Twenty-five thousand cubic feet of rock were thrown over upon the unsuspecting mass of humanity with terrible results.

At 11 p.m. the men engaged in taking out the mangled victims were forced to desist, because among the rocks which were being eleared away were five other blasts that might be exploded. Up to that hour eighteen bodies had been taken out. There are yet 27 men unaccounted for. There were about 200 pounds of giant powder in the blast. The accident was caused by some one's carelessness. The man in charge of the blast and three assistants were blown to atoms. The men had all finished their work and were getting ready to go to their homes, when they met a horrible and unexpected death. A man who was tamping paid the penalty with his life. A man who stood beside him escaped with slight bruises, although 20,000 cubic feet of rock were hurled for hundreds of feet in every direction. Another man who was near the deadly blast, and who was supposed to be dead, was seen shortly after the explosion in a half crazed condition, walking around with his clothing torn to shreds.

The men were working in a cut, leveling off the ground for the new freight yards. The cliff of rock on the side of the cut which was being removed was twenty feet high. The blasts are so arranged that the rock is thrown towards the cut. Not anticipating the blast, about 30 men were under the cliff when the blast exploded. A great mass of rock and earth rose in the air and pitched over into the cut, burying the men beneath its awful weight. Only a few escaped.

Soveral schemes have been proposed by the city for remedying the evil, such as placing milk of lime in the main sewer near its outfall; and, as seen from the Engineer's letter, they are now trying a similar scheme, viz. the Conder (system for precipitating sewage. But from the fact stated you will see that all fail completely in purifying the river, since the lowering of the water left the river bed a mass of putrescent sewage, made worse by the sluggish water of the mill-dam. Such methods must fail, because even though they precipitate the sewage it only passes into the river to there putrefy. What they must do if they wish to use chemicals, is to have, as I have often told them, settling tanks, and thereafter arrangements for carrying the clear affluence away, and from time to time emptying the tanks of sludge. Our committee recommended carrying down the sewage a mile or two to the flats, and there on grounds which are most favorable to establish a sewage farm or proper precipitation tanks. They have persistently refused, however, to take steps in any way equal to the emergency.

I have from time to time carefully inspected, have made analysis of the soil, the subsoil and the water therefrom, of the new sewage farm at the London Asylum during a whole year, and I am pleased to be able to say in accordance with the oninion of Mr. Horetsky, of the Public Works Department, and the Asylum officials, that the farm is in every way a perfect success. I have told Londoners to go and learn from that what can be done, and I see no reason why they should be in any way relieved from the pressure which the law has laid upon them.

Again it was laid down as a principle that, under the imperial law creating the Dominion, the Federal and Local Governments are each placed in possession of powers with which the other has no right to interfere. As the Chancellor ably puts it, "the Parliament of the Dominion and the Legislature and territory delegations of sovereign powers sufficient for all purposes of effect-ive self-government." THE WAY TO KEEP OUR RICHES. One of the most interesting features at the first meeting of the American Forestry Association, which began its sittings in Quebec on Wednesday, was the harangue of Old Sioui, whom ex-Premier Joly introduced as "the Huron chieftain, a valiant son of the forest." His plea for the retention of the forests was a novel one. "Gentlemen, he said "remember in your noble pursuit the sons of the forest; spare, if you can, our hunting-grounds from the merciless axe of the lumbermen, that our sons may find in them the game which is so dear to a Huron heart.'

It can hardly be expected that much attention will be expected that much at-tention will be paid to the reasoning of this fine old specimen of the aboriginal game-lover. But it seems to be conceded on all hands that the forests of the country are being cut down much too fast for the good of the Dominion. A change of policy is required on the part of both the Do-minion and Provincial Governments, if Canada is to be saved from the fate of all countries which have cut down their forests, and have failed to take proper means for reafforesting the territory controlled by them. It is acknowledged by every intelligent investigator that a country which would dged by every intelligent would tigator that a country which would continue fruitful must have plenty of trees in order to secure a proper distribution of rainfall. The sad fate of more than one old world nation has proved that. There is also good authority for the belief that it is in the interest of the public health that trees should be plentiful. 


