A Fair Average Yield Promised in England.

Encouraging Report From Buene Ayres-The U. S. Outlook.

London, Aug. 11.-The Times, in an article dealing with the English harvests, says today: "The long drouth and the recent storms have considerabv diminished the earlier prospects of fine crops; but the net result of the reports and figures before us seems to indicate a harvest of fair average quality and quantity." According to a dispatch to the Times

from Buenos Ayres, the wool crop is officially reported as superior in quantity and quality to that of 1896; wheat and flax are 50 per cent better than a year ago, and the grain is described rye, 89.8; oats, 86; barley, 87.5; buckwheat, 94.9; tobacco, 78.7; Irish potatoes, 77.9; The condition of corn, 84.2, is 1.3 points higher than last month, 11.8 points lower than on Aug. 1, 1896, and points lower than the August average for the last ten years. The condition of spring wheat, 86.7, is 4.5 points lower than last month, but 7.8 higher than on Aug. 1, 1896, and 4.5 points higher than, the August average for the last ten years. Advantages of the Route Vi Edmonton

As Described by Mr. Frank Oliver, M.P.

Doubt having been expressed regarding the feasibility of the route to the Yukon via Edmonton and the Mackenzie River district, a telegram was sent by the Winnipeg Free Press to Mr. Frank Oliver, M. P. for Alberta, who lives at Edmonton, asking his opinion. He promptly replied as fol-

"From Edmonton to the head of steamboat navigation on the Pelly is 800 miles; wagon and pack trails from Edmonton to the Liard 500 miles more and the boat and portage up the Lair to the Pelly 300 miles. This route is practicable for prospectors, but, o course, cannot compete with coast routes for freight and passengers. The route is well known to the Peace River Indians, who live at Fort St. John, to 12c. Cheese dull, 61/20 to 8c. Eggs and who hunt through the country with firm, 91/2c. From St. John to the Uppe horses. Report of the Department-Comments on the Over-Clearance of Timber in Southern Ontario.

The annual report of the clerk t fund. | forestry for the province, just out, commends the appointment by order-in-council of June 4 last of a commission composed of E. W. Rathbun, Deseronto; John Bertram, Toronto, and A. Kirkwood, of the lands branch; Thomas Southworth, clerk of forestry, and J. B. McWilliams, Peterboro, provincial superintendent of forest rangers, to investigate and report upon the subject of restoring and preserving the growth of white pine and other timber upon lands in the province which are not adapted for agricultural pur-

TIMBER RESOURCES.

The report states that the total area of the Province of Ontario is some 147,000,000 acres, and only about 23,000,-000 of this is sufficiently settled to be under municipal government, as shown by the assessment returns. Of the re maining 124,000,000 of acres there is a vast stretch of good agricultural soi north of the height of land sloping to Hudson Bay, but there is a very large area between the north and south agricultural sections that is not generally suited for agriculture and will under proper management, provide a large yearly cut of timber for all time. the great natural reservoir cultural land, and is therefore unlikely to pass from 'the ownership of the crown.

OVER-CLEARANCE.

Thirty of the counties of Ontario have ess than 25 per cent of their total area under timber. The proportion of woodland in sixteen of these counties is less than 20 and over 10 per cent, while still more conspicuous examples of the extent to which over-clearance has been carried are afforded by the following: In Dufferin, Wentworth and Huron counties the proportion of woodland to total area is 10 per cent; Prince away four gates. SOUTHERN ONTARIO.

The conclusion to which these figures when analyzed point is that throughout the greater extent of the really good and fertile agricultural region of Southern Ontario, where the land has been ongest settled, and the greatest inducements offered by natural advantages to its permanent occupation, the percentage of forest has been reduced far below that which should have been retained to insure the perpetuation of favorable conditie

The report deals extensively and in detail with methods of replenishing the deforested regions of the province.

WOOD IS MADE FIREPROOF. Successful Test of a New Process Made on Buildings in London.

Saturday, at Hurlingham, the British Nonflammable Wood Company gave an exhibition designed to denonstrate the security against fire of uildings constructed of timber treated by their process. The test was conducted on much the same lines as the trial which took place at Millbank in May before the officials of her Majesty's office of works, and which was witnessed by the Prince of Wales. For the purpose of the experiment, two buildings, about 11 feet square and 30 in height, had been set up near the ornamental water. They were similar all respects, except that one made of "treated" timber and the other of ordinary timber. Each was furnished with a chimney for the purpose of creating a strong draught and facilitating combustion. Outside the little houses, on the windward side, was piled firewood and shavings, which were set on fire simultaneously. In five minutes the building of ordinary timber was well all ght, and in about half an hour it had been reduced to ashes. But the other structure remained intact, save for the charring of the woodwork on the side exposed circles, where its advertisements are to the direct action of the flames.
