# French Slay 600 Germans In One Engagement

The Kaiser's Troops May Again Attempt a Dash On Paris

City Engineer Ashplant Declares Botha Can Handle Situation.

MET MARITZ PERSONALLY

Knew Leader of Insurrection While Serving in Cape Artillery.

**BELIEVES SPIES ARE BUSY** 

Says the German Bands Are Nothing But Expert Surveyors in Disguise.

City Engineer W. N. Ashplant, who spent eleven years, from 1896 to 1907, in South Africa, and is familiar with the German espionage system as practiced there then, is not surprised at the traitorous act of Lieut.-Col. S. G. Maritz and his staff going over to the Germans. He met all these officers in Cape Town, where he was with the Cape garrison ar ilery. He left the service because he refused to salute a German petty officer of whom he had grave suspicions. When the Boer war was declared this officer went over to the Boers, absolutely confirming Mr.

Ashplant's suspicions. Look Out for Sples.
"Nothing much will come of Maritz's

action," said Mr. Ashplant today. The engineer intimated, however, that England and Canada would have to be on the lookout for spies. He said that in South Africa one of the mysteries of the Boer war was how the Dutchmen in certain sections got their rifles and ammunition, as they seemed to be getting an endless supply. It was finally discovered one day that large shipments of pianos were being consigned to them. Nothing was thought of this for a long ime other than to remark that the Dutchmen were becoming quite musi One day the rope on a derrick, which was lifting these planes from a boat to the wharf, broke and the contents of the piano box was discovered to be rifles and ammunition. William's Congratulations.

Another time Mr. Ashplant recalls how Emperor William sent a telegram of congratulation to President Kruger on some victories his followers had obtained over the British. The day this news was given out a German band was playing in Mr. Ashplant's home district, and the Englishmen were so incensed at the German emperor that they made the band play "God Save the Queen," and then the crowd chased them out of town.

Mr. Ashplant is of the belief that the Germans have mapped out England the same as they mapped out Belgium and France. He believes their agents were in British Columbia in the recent trouble with the Hindus, and he is equally convinced that the little Gercan street bands which go about playdiscordant music are nothing, but ert surveyors who spend their evenngs drawing plans of streets and orts and obtaining the names of residents who can be seized as hostages or made useful in other ways.

# **ENEMY PREPARING** SIEGE OF BELFORT

Will Attack French Border Fortress With as Large Fc ce as Possible.

Pelletier and Nantel Resign-Hon. T. C. Casgrain Succeeds Former as Postmaster-General.

OTTAWA, Oct. 13.—The resignation of Hon. L. P. Pelletier, postmastergeneral of Canada, has been received and accepted. Hon. T. Chase Casgrain will be sworn in tomorrow morning as minister of the crown. He becomes postmaster-general, and will offer for election in Quebec county, the riding now represented by Hon. Mr. Pelletier. Hon. Bruno Nantel, minister of inland revenue, will leave the Government within a few days. He will be succeeded by E. L. Patenaude, organizer for the Conservative party in Montreal.

.The condition of Hon. Mr. Pelletier's health is said to have compelled his retirement from political life. The pressure of affairs has produced a complete breakdown, and has made necessary his withdrawal entirely from public affairs. Hon. Mr. Casgrain, who succeeds him, is one of the leading members of the Quebec bar. He has been a member of the Quebec Legisature and of the Dominion Parliament, sitting until 1904 as the representative of Montmorency. At one time he was member of the Quebec Government. It is understood that the retirement of Hon. Mr. Nantel is due to the desire of the Conservative party in Quebec for a ministerial representative who shows more activity in practical politics. Mr. Nantel is likely to be appointed to the board of railway com missioners, where he will succeed Hor Mr. Bernier, whose term of office has

### BRITISH CONSULS LEAVE BOTH OSTEND AND WARSAW

WASHINGTON, Oct. 13 .- American Consul Johnson, at Ostend, reported today that the British interests there had been turned over to him and the British consul would leave for England tomorrow. Whether this meant the abandonment of Ostend by British as well as Belgian military forces was not stated, but the dispatches indicate the rapid approach of the German's from Antwerp.

Mr. Johnson reported that communication between Ostend and Ghent had been severed since yesterday and the belief prevailed in Ostend that Ghent had fallen. He said he was able still to communicate with Bruges, not far distant from Ostend, disproying reports that the town had likewise been occupied.

The British Government has asked the American consul at Warsaw, capital of Russian Poland, to take over British interests in the event that the town is captured by the Germans. American Consul De Soto at Warsaw, cabled for instructions today, saying that there was every probability of occupation by the Germans. It is believed here that the Russians intend to evacuate.




