GAYNOR-GREENE

The Fugitives Begin Struggle All Over Again.

RESIST EXTRADITION

Mr. Taschereau, Their Legal Adviser, Says the U. S. Government Must Prove Theit Charge.

Quebec, Feb. 14. - John F. Gaynor and Benjamin D. Greene, who came to this city three years ago, forfeiting rather than stand trial before United States District Judge Emery Spear. upon indictments found against them connection with the Savannah Harbor frauds, are likely to continue residents of Quebec three years longer if they care to remain.

While disappointed at the adverse decision of the British Privy Council in the appeal taken by the Government from the decision of Judge Caron, of Quebec, in their favor, they are preparing to begin their fight all over again and are confident that they will win. Before the case is finally decided it romises to become one of the most elebrated in the history of extradition proceedings, involving as it does novel points of law and powerful social and political influence both in Canada and the United States. Col. Gaynor, who has gained in

HARDEST BLOW AT ANY PRESIDENT

U. S. Senate's Treatment of Mr. Roosevelt the Severest Ever Handed Out.

Washington, Feb. 15. - Other presidents have had pet projects squelched by the Senate, but no president in this generation, the wise men of the Upper Chamber say, has ever been blocked as President Roosevelt was Saturday.

There are many features manifest now that serve to emphasize the firm determination of the Senate to teach the President a lesson. The executive sessions preceding the final vote are described as the most dramatic in the memory of those who have been senators for twenty years. The intensity of feeling, the earnestness of speech, the unanimity of sentiment, have not prevailed on any similar proposition since the war. The criticism and censure of the President was virtually non-partisan.

The British Parliament.

The session of the British Parliament which opened yesterday is expected to be eventful and spectacular. A majerity of only 34, on the first division, is ominous for an administration which beasted a majority of 134 over Liberals and Nationalists combined, after the general election of 1900. The Government held its own fairly well until the fiscal issue was raised. Since then it has not been able to place absolute reliance on 30 or 40 of its nominal supporters in the House, while a few of the unbending free traders in the Unionist ranks, notably Winston Churchill seceded outright. But the Government has been weakened mainly by the bye-elections, which indicate that public opinion is flowing strongly

toward the Liberal party. Mr. Balfour protests against bringing the fiscal question before the present Parliament, but it is the issue upon which the next election will be fought, and the Opposition cannot be blamed for keeping it in the foreground. A Regina correspondent of the Toronto Globe has been discussing the school question in the Northwest Territories, and in his concluding letter gives an interesting description of the Territorial school system as it now exists. The educational department is directly controlled by the Government, through one of its members, who bears the title of Commissioner of Education He is advised by an educational council of five persons (two of whom must be Roman Catholics), appointed by the Government and holding office for five years. All general regulations respecting the inspection of schools, the examination, training, licensing and grading of teachers, courses of study, teachers' institutes, and text and reference books, must be referred to the council for its discussion and report. The functions of the council, however, are purely consultative and advisory, the full power being vested in the

No religious instruction is permitted in any school, public or separate, from

the opening of the school until onehalf hour previous to closing in the afternoon, after which any instruction desired or permitted by the board may be given. Attendance is not compulsory at these religious exercises, unless parents or guardians so desire. To meet the wishes of the different nationalities in the Territories, it is provided that teachers may be employed to give instruction in any foreign language to the pupils whose parents desire it. A special rate shall be levied upon such persons to meet the expenses of this course of instruction, which must not interfere with the regular work of the school. The following passage from the Globe correspondent's letter is particularly interesting, as illustrating the difference between the systems in Onto separate schools

"Between the work done now in the Territorial public school and that in the separate school up to half-past 3 o'clock each day there is practically no difference. Teachers undergo uni-form academic and professional training. In the high schools and normal school are found Protestants and Catholics, including members of sisterhoods, working together, without question as to nationality, creed or class. The course of studies i uniform. The text books are uni form, with the exception of the first and second readers. Inspection is common and uniform. Departmental examinations are uniform. The protongues are uniform, giving entire freedom to each school district."

Between 1898 and 1903 the number of organized public school districts increased from 509 to 1,022. BIG TRUNK LINES MAKE A PROPOSAL

Ask Toronto Wholesalers to Combine Shipments for Canadian Roads.

A very important proposal has been made by the freight traffic departments of the Grand Trunk and Canadian Pacific Railway Companies to the effect that the wholesale merchants of Toronto should confer together and agree upon an arrangement whereby they would bring all their shipments of reads Dickens; 'but in a Chadwickian goods from England by way of the systems of either of the above roads, thus cutting out American steamship lines and railways.

It is understood that the proposal has originated with the Canadian Pacitic Railway Company, for the purpose of building up the return traffic of their Atlantic steamship line, Since the conclusion of the ocean freight rate war this business has become much more profitable, as the company has been able to increase its Atlantic rates one hundred per cent. There is a considerable amount of freight imported by way of Montreal now in the summer time, but the high rate of insurance required on the St. Lawrence route, which is double that of the regu. lar marine insurance, operates as a great drawback in competition American lines. Doubtless if a larger volume of freight could be secured by means of combination of importers the railway companies would be willing to make some concession in freight rates. which would offset the unfavorable differences in other charges. Butchers' Cattle—The aggregate stocks of fresh meat have become very light, and some butchers say their supplies are practically depleted. Receipts of butchers' cattle for some time past have been exceptionally light, and stocks held here are rapidly decreasing. The trade is anxious to replenish the supply, and there was some very keen competition to secure choice cattle at the market this morning. George Rowntree paying as high as 34 65 per cwt for a straight load of fat, well-finished steers.

Export Cattle—There were practically no exporters marketed, and the dealers quoted prices nominally unchanged, with a good inquiry for select offerings.

RAILWAY STATISTICS

395 Persons Were Killed Last Year Throughout the Dominion.

Ottawa, Feb. 15 .- The Government paid out during the fiscal year 1904 the sum of \$2,046,878 in railway subsidies, bringing the total expenditure by the Government on railways up to \$12,351,-250. The expenditure on canals was Likely to Split Over Action of the \$2,980,558. The revenue from Governmen railways was \$6,627,255, and from canals \$79,536, mostly in the shape of rents. Since Confederation the Government has spent on railway construction and subsidies \$282,204,763 On June 30, 1904, there were 19,611 miles of completed railway in Canadaan increase in the year of 534 miles, besides 3.327 miles of sidings. The C. P. R. has 8.062 miles, and the Grand Trunk 3.158 miles. The paid-up capital amounted to \$1.186.546,918—an increase of \$39,996,149; gross earnings, \$100,219,-436; increase, \$4.154,909; working expenses, \$74.563,162—increase \$7,081,638; net earnings, \$25,656,274 decrease \$2,locomotives in Canada, The accident returns show a total of 395 persons killed, 25 being passengers, 192 employes and 178 others, and in addieion, 1,405 injured, of whom 234 were passengers. 912 employes, and 259 others. Butter and Eggs—The supply in this line was small; sales are brisk and prices are firm; butter in crocks sells at 200 to 23c per lb; pound rolls, 22c to 25c by the basket lot. Eggs are scarce at present; the cold weather keeps down the supply; prices are firm, at 24c to 25c per dozen, wholesale, and 27c to 30c per dozen for fresh-laid eggs.


