### HARD TIMES COMING

York, Feb. 27-J. J. Hill president of the Great Northern Railway company, says the tide of prosperity is turning and that there are indications of a significant recession in business. As Mr. Hill phrased it, "the sails of prosperity are being reefed. The year 1908 may be a hard year and many thousands of men may then be out of work."

"General policies of retrenchment are under way," said Mr. Hill. 'Less money is being spent on new works. The effect of this movement is being felt at present in the falling off of orders. The beginning of this movement is very evident in Chicago.

"While I would scarcely call it a recession in business, it is more of a drawing in. The railroads in general are curtailing their expenditures and placing fewer orders. This movement toward economy is scarcely perceptible, but it should be sufficient to relieve the strain from congested business. In a way it is a good thing. It is better so, as the curtailment is gradual. Otherwise there might be a sudden slump with serious results."

Provincial Surplus For Past Year Is \$429,299.32

ESTIMATES FOR 1907

Toronto, Feb. 27.—Ontario's Provincial surplus for the past year is \$429,293.2. Such was the satisfactory statement presented to the Legislature by Hon. A. J. Matheson, the Provincial Treasurer, at yesterday afternoon's session when he laid the Public Accounts of the past year on the table of the House. It bespeaks the exceptional prosperity of the Province and the enterprising and businessilke methods which have characterized the conduct of its financial affairs by the Government, in a year presenting many exceptional and heavy calls upon the Treasury for public development and improvement. The size of the surplus surpasses even the optimistic prophecies of the speakers on the address from the throne at the opening of the present session.

Expenditure \$6,519,131.08.

With the public accounts, the main estimates for 1907 were also presented. These provide for an expenditure of \$6,519,131.08, of which \$5,586,485.28 is asked for current expenditure, \$634,335 on capital account and \$298,311 for other purposes. With the advantage of two days' study of these two volumes before them the members of the House will be in a better position to follow Hon. Col. Matheson in the budget speech, which will be delivered Thursday.

Educational Developments.

The estimates this year include nothing for the University of Toronto beyond the statutory grant of \$7,000, as the finances of that great provincial educational institution are now provided for under the University Act of last session. The estimates foreshadow further notable developments, particularly along educational lines. The work of some of the present officials has been recognized by increased salary and provision made for such increases to the staff as the greatly expanding business of the departments has warranted. There are no increases for the Ministers, however.

Among the details of interest in the estimates are the following in the Attorney-General's Department: \$3,000 for the salary of a solicitor, which is a new office, and \$64,462 for the Railway and Municipal Board. In 1906 the vote for the Board, which did not come into existence until the last half of the year, was \$30,210.

In the Public Works Department estimates indication is given of the coming legislation to combine the fish and game branches, provision being

and game branches, provision being made for a superintendent of fish and game at \$1,900 a year, with a fish and game inspector at \$1,400. No deputy commissioner of fisheries—a position now in existence—is provided for Mr. Edwin Tinsley, formerly chief game warden, for which office there is no vote this year, has been in charge of the two departments since the departure of Mr. S. T. Bastedo, the for-

of the two departments since the departure of Mr. S. T. Bastedo, the former deputy commissioner of fisheries.

For Medical Health Department.

A vote of \$1,000 is asked in the Treasury Department estimates for an accountant to the succession duties branch. The Provincial Secretary's Department's estimates provide two votes of \$1,200 each for extra clerks and \$9,500 for contingencies. For the Board of Health, which is in this Department, the following are among the new items of estimated expenditure: Assistant bacteriologist and assistant chemist, \$600 each; tuberculosis exhibit, \$1,000; to cope with outbreaks of communicable diseases and to make sanitory investigations, \$5.000. The items under the head of Legislation comprise indemnity to members, including mileage, \$102,000, compared with an actual expenditure in 1906 of \$100,901.40. For the administration of justice in the various sections of the Province, as distinguished from the organized sections of Ontario, there are increases in most cases.

Grants to Rural Schools.

Grants to Rural Schools.

As before noted, and without regard to the University of Toronto, there is a great increase in the amount of money asked for education, viz., \$1,396,266.27, compared with an actual expenditure last year of \$1,320,221.71, the latter including \$123,837.91 to the university. The increase is due to the larger grants to the rural schools announced by the Prime Minister, Hon. J. P. Whitney. One of the items, indicating a new departure, is \$6,000 "for agricultural training in the high schools." a valuable innovation by which students may be trained in agricultural pursuits.

to \$40,000; \$2,000 is provided for assistant departmental examiners and \$5,000 for the expenses of the Advisory Council of Education. For the school of mining at Kingston, which last year received \$29,500 for maintenance and \$7,500 for equipment, the amounts asked for this year are \$34,500 and \$7,500 respectively, in view of the great development of mining and the need for Ontario's young men to have technical training.

Estimates for Agriculture.

The estimates for agriculture include those of the Ontario Agricultural College, in which provision is made for a professor of English at \$2,000 per year and for several assistant demonstrators in various departments.

Children's Shelter and Refuges.

The sum of \$10,000 goes to the Children's Shelter and revoles of \$4,000 each are made to the County Houses of Refuge in Hastings, Prescott and Russell and Peterboro. Another \$100,000 is provided for the new normal schools and the alotment for colonization roads and for forest ranging and forest reserves increased.

To Work Gillies Limit.

Under the head of mining development there are estimates which foreshadow important improvements and work upon the public-owned Gillies' Limit. One item is \$6,000 for preliminary operations, including surveying, purchase of machinery, mining, treatment of ores, etc., and another \$25,000 for a sampling plant, a total of \$35,000, compared with an expenditure last year of \$19,159.48. The sum of \$3,300 also appears in this portion at the estimates for an assistant geologist. A clerk of geological explorations is provided for, \$3,000 being asked for salary and expenses.

Miscellanceus Estimates.

Among the miscellanceus estimates are the following amounts: Statue to Hon. John Sanfield Macdonald, \$10,000; to Batoche column, \$200; South African monument, \$2,500, and to Bell Telephone memorial, Brantford, \$2,000 Division on Prison Labor.

MANY EVILS; NO REMEDIES.

Report of Insurance Commission
Presented to House Yesterday—Investigation Was Justified.

Presented to House Yesterday—Investigation Was Justified.

Ottawa, Feb. 27.—The report of the Royal Insurance Commission, together with the evidence taken before it, was laid on the table yesterday a year to the day from the appointment. The evidence has been printed and the report soon will be out as presented to the House yesterday atternoon. It consists of 500 pages of typewriting. This report has already gone to the printing bureau and some days may elapse before the public is fully seized of all its contents.

Charges Are Proved.

One thing at least is evident. Every charge for the investigation of which the royal commission was appointed, has been fully proved, and every abuse (except political contributions) found to exist in the United States is found by the commissioners to also exist in Canada. Unfortunately the physicians who diagnose the disease are unable to suggest a remedy. They pronounce against state insurance and profess to find but slight promise of relief from any possible action by the Government. A draft bill is presented, but it does not promise any radical legislation.

The commissioners subscribe a draft of new insurance list, which is much wider in its scope than the present bill.

There is of course no chance of the bill being dealt with by Parliament this session. The only use to which the report will likely be put on at the present time is that of party politics.

Mr. Preston Holds Seat.

Toronto, Feb. 27.—The Court of Appeal decided the Rainy River election case yesterday, dismissing H. W. Kennedy's appeal from the judgment of Justices Anglin and Teetsel, giving the Conservative member, W. A. Preston, the seat.

Justice Clute stated that it appeared a rather startling proposition that upon scrutiny an alien who has voted can be struck from the list of votes cast. He, however, refers to the object of the voters' list to settle in a cheap and satisfactory way the list of those entitled to vote, to avoid the ruinous expense formerly incurred in a scrutiny.

Peterboro, Feb. 27.—A remarkable cure of lockjaw is reported at Nicholls' Hospital.

# MRS. THAW COLLAPSES

She Fainted And Lay Unconscious For Two Hours

DEFENSE CLOSED SOON

New York, Feb. 28.—Mrs. Evelyn Nesbit Thaw collapsed utterly yesterday at the close of the gruelling to which she has been subjected by District Attorney Jerome.

Recalled to answer a few questions, by which Jerome hoped to lay the foundation for evidence in rebuttal to attack her credibility, the frail girly who so bravely has sacrificed herself to save the life of her husband, tottered into an ante-room, fainted and lay unconscious for two hours. She was taken to her apartments in the Hotel Lorraine, a nervous wreck.

May Close This Week.

It was announced by Delphin M. Delmas that the defence probably would close this week, which means that the case should go to the jury by Tuesday; that is, if Jerome fails to carry out plans to demand a lunacy commission, forecasted last week and indicated in his cross-examination of experts yesterday.

Dr. Britton D. Evans, director of the New Jersey Hospital for the Insane at Morris Plains, an alienist for the defence, occupied the stand for the greater part of the day. He had testified that Thaw was suffering from "melancholia" at the time he made his will, and was mentally unsound when he killed Stanford White.

Alienists In Opposition.

Jerome forced him to admit that there was a recurrence of the affliction in at least one-third of such cases. This apparently was to controvert the expert's opinion, that Thaw was sane at present.

Mr. Jerome said he intended calling as a witness in rebuttal Dr. Allan McLane Hamilton, the alienist who first was employed by the They do

Dr. Hamilton is reported to have said that he thought Thaw was insane at the time of the tragedy and that he is insane at present.

The district attorney also said he would have Dr. Charles F. Bingaman of Pitteburg, the Thaw family physician, testify in rebuttal.

Dr. Bingaman was on the stand briefly, but Mr. Delmas objected to cross-examination as to insanity in the Thaw family, on the ground that the witness had not qualified as an expert. Mr. Jerome thereupon told Dr. Bingaman to hold himself in readiness to take the stand for the state.

Howard Nesbit to Testify.

By recalling Mrs. Evelyn Nesbit Thaw to the stand for a few questions, which he had omitted on his long cross-examination, Mr. Jerome indicated that he will call Howard Nesbit, her brother, to contradict her in a matter of credibility.

Bought a Pistol?

He asked Mrs. Thaw if she did not tell her brother that Thaw treated her cruelly while they were abroad, because she refused to tell lies about Stanford White. He also wanted to know if her brother did not buy her a pistol with which she might defend herself against Thaw.

The defendant's wife denied absolutely that there was any truth in any of these statements.

# KING OF THE BELGIANS

WHOSE REPUTATION DOES NOT SEEM TO IMPROVE WITH AGE.

Aged King Is Unique Inasmuch as He Has Not Quit Sowing His Wild Oats at 82 Years of Age-Has "Gone the Pace" All His Life With Astonishing Recklessness Even For a King -- Tyrant of the Congo.

Among all the crowned heads of Christendom the aged King of the Bel-gians is unique. Leopold II., who has exceeded by

two years the scriptural age limit of threescore years and ten, has not yet finished sowing his wild oats.

It is not because he did not begin the greater between the control of the cont

the operation betimes. There is no record to show that he was ever compelled to struggle against an inherited predisposition toward goodness.

Nor has it been for lack of application. There is no evidence that he
has been slothful as a sower.

With abundant and long continued

with abundant and long continued opportunities to arrive at absolute surfeit he has embraced none of them, but has continued to exhibit a pertinacity and an endurance that would have made a hero of him had they been exercised in a less unconventional manner.

Glaring as they have been Leon.

Glaring as they have been, Leo-pold's moral shortcomings alone might not have condemned him in the eyes of an age which does not expect conspicuous virtue in those who sit in the seats of the mighty. Other kings have been morally derelict and have escaped universal reprobation. It is



MOST RECENT PICTURE OF LEOPOLD II. true that some of the heroes of happiest memory were decidedly lame morally, and the "gently modifying years" have transformed their frailty into something that horrifies no long-

So it is not the venerable rake's moral lapses alone that have made his name a byword and a reproach among all the nations. The one thing that makes the civilized world shud-der when the name of Leopold II. is spoken is his conduct as sovereign

and tyrant of the Congo.

He has been ruling Belgium for more than 40 years, and the country has prospered greatly under his administration. He came to the throne about the time of the close of the American civil war. Since that time American civil war. Since that time Germany, France and other countries on the European mainland have pass-

ed through various political changes, but Belgium has shown no disposition to try another form of Government. He is only the second king that Belgium has had as an independent state. Until 1830 it formed a part of the kingdom of the Netherlands. In that we are it become an independent that year it became an independent Government, and the father of the present king, Leopold I., was ohosen by its congress as its constitutional by its congress as its constitutional sovereign. It was to the interest of Great Britain, France and some of the other powers to have a Government not allied to the rising greatness of Germany in that part of the continent, and they agreed to maintain its neutrality. Within a short time all the states of Europe recognize

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### THE FLAG IN HISTORY

DRIGIN OF NATIONAL EMBLEMS OF THE OLD WORLD.

Joan of Arc and the White Banner France—The Tricolor of Helland. St. Augustine, the Missionary, In-troduced Flags Into England.

The first western sovereign to adopt a flag was Clovis, king of the Franks. After his conversion to Christianity in fifth century he took the "chape St. Martin" as his standard. according to some writers, was actually part of the cloak which the saintly of Tours cut in two in order to chare it with a beggar at Amiens. More credible authorities, however, assert that it was the blue dag of St. Mar-

tin's abbey.

After Clovis, the Merovingian kings seem to have returned to the ancient emblems. They were content to fight under eagles, flowers, crosses or the images of saints until the time of Charwacant lot owned by the C. P. R.. She was covered with snow and practically frozen into it. Her dlothing was disarranged and near her were two empty whiskey flasks. She was about 60 years old, wore a black velvet hat black short coat, black skirt and a red handkerchief around her neck. The color of the French flag was changed in 1124, when Louis the Fat carried the red oriflamb of St. Denis in his struggles against the German emperor Henry V. This continued to be the official French flag down to the battle of Agincourt in 1415. In the meantime the blue flag had again made its appearance, now decorated with the fleur-de-lis instead of the roses of Charlemagne. In this form it was carried at Acre and Crecy and Poitiers, until in the fifteenth contury it became the banner of France.

The first white flag in French history was the banner of the Virgin Mary borne by Joan of Arc in her heroic campaigns for the defense of the dauphin. A pure white flag was occasionally used by Francis I. in his struggles against the Emperor Charles V., but it did not become the permanent royal banner until Henry IV., the first Bourbon, ascended the throne in 1589.

The tricolor of the French revolution was a compromise. The cockades of the revolutionists were composed of two colors, the red of the Paris commune and the blue of the ancient mon-archy. In the troubled times just preeeding the deposition and exe Louis XVI., Lafayette, to signify the desire of the people for a reconcilia-tion with their king, added the Bourbon white to the cockade. The tricolor a national emblem was adopted by the convention in 1794.

Long before this, however, the tricolor had been the national flag of Holland. The Dutch were in fact the first to use it. When the United Provinces gained their independence from Spain in the sixteenth century, according to a favorite old story which can-not be authenticated, they invited Henry of Navarre to choose their colors and he suggested orange, blue and white. Whether he selected this combination or not, such were the colors of Holland until some time in the seventeenth century, when the orange was replaced by red. When William of Orange became king of England in he crossed the channel under the



CRIMINALS IN INDIA

WHOLE TRIBES WHOSE HEREDITARY PROFESSION IS THEFT.

Robbers Born and Kept So by Caste They Are Polite and Modest Until the "Profession" Requires Them to Become Cruel and Ferocious.

India is usually spoken of as a land where life and property have become safe under British rule. True, the bands of thugs have been broken up, the Pindharee hordes have been suppressed, and the British police system is spread over the whole country, but the criminal tribes or castes, those whose hereditary "profession" is robbery and nothing else, remain, their instincts strong, wanting only opportu-nity to practice their traditional calling, which the Indian caste system for-bids them to abandon.

These tribes are most numerous and most wayward in the united provinces, in which are Cawnpur and Lucknow, the cities associated forever with the

They have no unusual vices; they do not get drunk or riotous; they are civil, courteous and unassuming. Cruelty and ferocity are with them neither habits nor pleasures, but simply methods of business.

During the excitement of a sudden attack the people if they do not run away will turn out and aid the police in repelling or capturing the robbers.

But if a police inquiry begins two or three days after the robbers have done their work unmolested the people will usually do nothing to help in tracing them and will even deny that they have lost anything.

The word "dakaiti," also spelled "dacoity," means robbery by a gang of armed men, and a dakait, or dacoit, is a member of such a gang.

An assault by robbers in India differs from one in Europe or America in that it always takes place at night and is accompanied by a tremendous amount of noise. The Indians are a noisy people at all times, and in a robbery with violence the robbers' object Is to terrify their victims into a panic hence whether travelers be waylaid on a lonely road or a wealthy man's house be attacked in a village the assault is always made suddenly, with outs and yells and in the case of a village with beating of drums and

waving of lighted torches.

The persons attacked bellow for all they are worth, but rarely offer resistance, and the general effect is so terrifying to the cowardly people that the neighbors either fly or else barricade ors either fly or their doors and lie still till the robbers have got at least a mile away with their plunder. England is a Little Anxious About Her Enterprising Ally.

Great Britain's enterprising ally, Ja-

pan, intends not only practically to double her army, but to spend £7,000,-000 on the increase of her navy as well. The ships will presumably be built in Japan, where possibly facilities for the production of armor plate will be installed. If this be so, with the cheap labor available, the sum named ough to give the Japanese at least five if not six ships of the type of the Dreadnought or something approaching thereto. She may, however, elect to build two or more cruisers, it not being nese have followed our example in merging the two classes into the "capi-tal ship." Perhaps four battleships and two armored cruisers may be the outof the proposals.

If this be so, how will Japan stand when her new programme is complet-ed? The Mikasa has been raised, so she will have four ships of her old bat fleet, to which may be added the Orel, Peresviet, Retzivan, Poltava and Pobleda, taken from the Russians; the Kushima and Katori, the Akl and Satsuma and the (presumed) four new battleships, in all seventeen ships, the worst of which is a little better than our Royal Sovereign class. Backed by some sixteen good armored cruisers. the total is a formidable one, which any except the "mightiest power" may well think twice before tackling. It amounts practically to a fleet of six Dreadnoughts, two King Edwards, three Formidables, three Canopuses one Majestic and two Royal Sover eigns. Where, it may fairly be asked, to be found the enemy against whom it is expected that this formidable arvessels will be employed?

I do not care to attempt to give an answer to the question. It is sufficient to know that in the belief of the Japanese the new vessels will see service But no man knows where the conditions of the latest power are leading her nor what obstacles in her path she foresees. Any one can for himself imagine half a dozen possibilities, probable or improbable. It suffices to say that ten years is no long time in the construction of a fleet, and that at the expiration of that period it may be necessary again to keep a squadron of battleships in the seas of the far east. The possibility should be taken into account in considering the building programme of the next four years. Alliances are not eternal, and we need not be the less friends with Japan if we recognize that in her future rela tions she will consult her own imperial interests, with little regard for ours The existing alliance gives her a breathing space, and in admiration of it. But this does not absolve us from the duty of making preparations to "keep our own head" should the situanine years hence be totally changed from what it is now .- St. James Gazette.

Fever In Vegetables. When plants are wounded their respiration increases and their tempera-ture perceptibly rises. In recent experlments a thermo-electric apparatus pable of registering a change of one four-hundredth of a degree was employed. When a potato was wounded the fever manifested itself by an ele vation of temperature which was greatest at the end of twenty-four hours, when it began slowly to de-cline. An onion similarly treated acquired an increase of temperature nany times greater than that sh by the potato, and the fever instead of being confined to the neighborhood of the wound affected the entire onion In fact, the onion proved to be more readily affected to this way than any other vegetable experimented with The rise of temperature is caused by increased absorption of oxygen.-Port land Journal.

Fish and Game Laws.

There were two outstanding features in yesterday's session of the Legislature, the introduction by Hon. Dr. Reaume, Minister of Public Works, of the Government bill regarding fish and game, which is in many respects most radical, and the important pronouncements of Government policy by Hon. Frank Cochrane, Minister of Lands and Mines, while his new mining bills were under discussion in committee.

Inspect Mining Claims.

Mr. Cochrane said the Government purposed setting aside a section of the Cobalt district in which the claims would be inspected before titles were given. This was not necessary generally, but in a rich section, where claims were readily saleable, whether minerals existed or not, this safeguard was deemed necessary. This policy is to be extended to the Larder La'e district, though in all cases, the Minister said, claims that are staked now will come under this plan. Mr. Cochrane also intimated that Prof. Miller, the present Government geologist, and Prof. Brook, of Kingston, will make the inspection for the department.

Inspectors of game and fisheries, not exceeding three in number, are to be appointed to see that the wardens and overseers carry out their duties properly. The Board of Game Commissioners, in existence since 1892 is abolished. Mr. H. S. Osler, K.C., of Toronto, is the chairman of the present Board.

The present regulations of forest and other Crown reserves are re-enacted.

Close seasons are enacted as followise, Deer, moose, reindeer or caribou, between Nov. 21 and Oct. 19 of the following, year; both days inclusive; grouse, pheasants, prairie fowl or partridge, woodcock, black and gray squirrels, between Dec. 15 and Sept. 15 the following year; quail or wild turkeys, between Dec. 1and Nov. I the following year; swans or geese, between May I and Sept. 1 the same year; duck of all kinds or any other water fowl, between Dec. 31 and Sept. 1 the following year; snipe, rail, plover or any other bird known as shore birds or waders, between Dec. 15 and Sept. 1 the following year; capercailzie from Dec. 15 to Sept. 15 the following year, but no capercailzie to be hunted, taken or killed before September 1909; hares, between Dec. 31 and Oct. 1 the following year.

Respect For Sabbath.

Hunting on the Lord's Day is prohibited. Licenses must still be obtained to hunt deer, moose, reindeer, and caribou. No gun of the description known as automatic, in which recoil is utilized to reload, can be used, and no person employed in the construction of a railway or public work shall own a gun, riffe or other fire-arm unless authorized by special license.

It shall be an offence for any hotel, restaurant or club to sell as part of a meal any game or fish under any pretended name, or under the designation of anything which might at the time be lawfully supplied.

The cutting of live timber, the property of the Government, by anyone holding a license or permit to fish is prohibited except where absolutely necessary for the purpose of camping, or shelter.

Trent River Water Power.

Hon. Mr. Cochrane, replied that the question brought up the status of water powers where the land was held by private owners on each side. In these cases he had already told owners they better not build too much on their possession of the water until the whole question was looked into.

EDUCATION OF THE PROVINCE. Hon. Dr. Pyne Issues His Annual

Hon. Dr. Pyne Issues His Annual Report.

The report of the Ontario Department of Education for 1906 has been printed, and forms a bulky volume of interesting statistics. An introduction by Hon. Dr. Pyne, Minister of Education, reviews the recent changes in the school laws.

The statistics given in the report relate to 1905, as it would be impossible to collect for 1906 the great mass of material used in making up the returns. The report shows that in 1905 there were in Ontario 5,793 Public schools, with 397,170 pupils, 428 Separate schools with 49,324 pupils, and 140 High schools with 49,324 pupils, and 140 High schools with 28,661 pupils. The respective expenditure for these schools were: Public schools, \$5,524,162; Separate schools, \$657,-134; High schools, \$1,004,498. The total expenditure was \$7,165,734. The total expenditure was \$7,165,734. The total apportionment by the Government to the schools in 1906 is given at \$289,195.

ment to the schools in 1906 is given at \$289,193.

The report shows that teachers salaries in rural schools tend to increase. The average for male teachers in these schools increased from \$385 in 1904 to \$402 in 1905, and for female teachers from \$294 in 1904 to \$311 in 1906.
