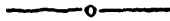

FOURTH SESSION OF THE TWENTIETH GENERAL ASSEMBLY.

TUESDAY, February 16, 1858.

THE House having, by several Proclamations hereunto annexed, been prorogued until this day, then to meet for the dispatch of business ;

And being met—

A Message from His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, by Henry Palmer, Esquire, Usher of the Black Rod :

Mr. Speaker ;

His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor commands the immediate attendance of this Honorable House at the Bar of the Council Chamber.

Accordingly, Mr. Speaker and the House went up to attend His Excellency in the Council Chamber ;

And being returned—

Mr. Speaker reported, that when the House did attend His Excellency this day in the Council Chamber, His Excellency was pleased to make a Speech to both Houses of the Legislature, of which Mr. Speaker said he had, to prevent mistakes, obtained a copy, and which was read by the Clerk, and is as follows :—

Mr. President and Honorable Gentlemen of the Legislative Council :

Mr. Speaker and Gentlemen of the House of Assembly :

I have convened you, at the usual period of the year, for the consideration of the affairs of the Island, relying with full confidence that your labors will be resumed in a spirit which will attest your zeal for the public welfare.

A beneficent Providence has again blessed us with an abundant harvest ; and the state of the Revenue, which exceeds in amount that of the previous year, is satisfactory.

I must not, however, omit to direct your attention to the probable diminution of Revenue in the current year, which there is but too much reason to apprehend will follow from the depression so universally experienced at present, in all branches of commercial industry, and from which this community is not exempt.

Mr. Speaker and Gentlemen of the House of Assembly :

The accounts of the past year, and the estimates for the current year, shall be laid before you, and I rely on your readiness to grant the necessary supplies for the public service.

Mr. President and Honorable Gentlemen of the Legislative Council :

Mr. Speaker and Gentlemen of the House of Assembly :

The circumstances of the last Session having been such as to prevent Her Majesty's Government from proposing to Parliament to guarantee the Loan intended to be raised for the purchase of Lands in this Island, that measure was unavoidably postponed to the present Session of the Imperial Parliament.

A copy of a Despatch from the Principal Secretary of State for the Colonies, on this subject shall be communicated to you.

The Mutiny which has so lamentably disturbed Her Majesty's East Indian possessions has already been reduced, by British valor and heroism, to a point which leaves

no room to doubt its final suppression ; but the unexampled atrocity by which it has been characterized has occasioned a vast amount of destitution and suffering to the surviving victims, which appeals forcibly on their behalf to the generous sympathy of their fellow subjects in all parts of Her Majesty's dominions.

I must again earnestly recommend to your consideration the adoption of more efficient means for the suppression of illicit traffic, which there is no reason to doubt is still carried on in this Island, to the great prejudice of the morals of the people, and to the serious injury of the Revenue.

I have great pleasure in referring to the improvement which, during the past year, has been manifested in the prosecution of the fisheries, which, if hereafter continued, will doubtless add much to the welfare, and increase the wealth and prosperity of the Country.

The marked improvement in Agriculture and Farm Stock throughout this Island is, under Providence, attributable to the liberal grants made by the Legislature for the encouragement of that important branch of industry ; and I have no doubt that your fostering care will still be extended to so desirable an object.

You do not, I trust, require to be assured of my ready co-operation in any measures you may entertain for the honor and advantage of the Island.

The Hon. the Colonial Secretary announced to the House that the Hon. Mr. Lord had, during the recess, been appointed to, and had accepted, the office of Commissioner of Public Lands, whereby his Seat in this House, as a Member for the Third Electoral District of Prince County, had become vacant ; that a Writ having been subsequently issued for a new Election, James C. Pope, Esquire, had been returned as duly elected to represent the said District ; and thereupon

Mr. Pope appeared at the Bar, and, being led into the body of the House, and introduced to the Speaker by the Hon. Mr. Montgomery and the Hon. Mr. Haviland, two of the Members, took the Oaths.

Mr. Muirhead then moved that the House do come to a Resolution as followeth :

Resolved, That James C. Pope, Esq., the elected Member for the Third District of Prince County, be requested to deliver to the Clerk of this House a Schedule

containing the particulars of his qualification, conformably with the provisions of the Act 11 Vic., cap. 21, intituled " An Act to consolidate and improve the laws for the election of Members to serve in the General Assembly ;" and that Mr. Pope shall deliver to the said Clerk the title deeds, documents or papers on which he claims title to the property in said Schedule, or true copies duly attested.

And the motion being seconded, and the question put thereon, it was agreed to by the House.

And then Mr. Pope delivered to the Clerk the following papers, viz :

A release in fee, from William Murray *et* Uxor to James Pope, of ninety-two acres of land on Township No. 25,—dated April 17, 1849.

A deed of trust from James C. Pope and his Wife to William Pethick,—dated January 22, 1855.

On the said deed of trust is endorsed a revocation of the trusts in the said deed set forth,—dated June 18, 1855.

Resolved, That a Committee of three Members be appointed to provide Stationery for the use of the House.

Ordered, That the Hon. the Colonial Treasurer, Mr. Clark and Mr. Muirhead do compose the said Committee.

Resolved, That a Committee of three Members be appointed to receive Tenders for the printing of the Journal of this House, and to report thereon to the House.

The Hon. Mr. Longworth moved that the said Committee be chosen by vote of the House, and that Mr. H. Haviland be one of the said Committee.

So it passed in the negative.

Ordered, That Mr. Clark, Mr. Muirhead and Mr. H. Haviland do compose the said Committee.

Resolved, That a Committee of seven Members be appointed to prepare and report, with all convenient speed, the draft of an Address in answer to the Speech of His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, delivered this day to both Houses of the Legislature.

Ordered, That Mr. Cooper, Mr. Macgill, Mr. Macdonald, Hon. Mr. Whelan, Mr. Muirhead, Mr. Laird and Mr. Perry do compose the said Committee.

Ordered, That the Thirteenth Rule of the House be suspended, and that the Hon. the Colonial Secretary have leave to introduce a Bill relating to the Fishery Reserves in this Island.

He accordingly presented the said Bill to the House, and the same was read the first time, and ordered to be read a second time to-morrow.

Resolved, That a Committee of six Members be appointed to keep up a good correspondence between the two Branches of the Legislature, and to report their proceedings from time to time, with power to send for persons, papers and records.

Ordered, That the Hon. the Colonial Secretary, the Hon. Mr. Wightman, Mr. Macgill, the Hon. the Colonial Treasurer, the Hon. Mr. Haviland and Mr. Pope do compose the said Committee.

Ordered, That the said Resolution be communicated, by Message, to the Legislative Council.

Ordered, That the Hon. the Colonial Secretary do carry the said Message to the Council.

Resolved, That a Committee of three Members be appointed, to whom shall be referred every Private Bill, to report thereon to the House.

Ordered, That the Hon. Mr. Whelan, Mr. Clark and H. Haviland do compose the said Committee.

Resolved, That a Committee of seven Members be appointed to examine and report on the Public Accounts, with power to send for persons, papers and records.

Ordered, That Mr. Macdonald, Mr. Macgill, Mr. Perry, Mr. Muirhead, the Hon. Mr. Haviland, the Hon. Mr. Longworth and the Hon. Mr. Montgomery do compose the said Committee.

Resolved, That a Committee of five Members be appointed to revise the Journal of each day, after the adjournment.

Ordered, That Mr. Muirhead, the Hon. Mr. Mooney, Mr. Laird, the Hon. Mr. Longworth and the Hon. Mr. Wightman do compose the said Committee.

Resolved, That a Committee of five Members be appointed to examine Bills to be engrossed or that have been engrossed.

Ordered, That Mr. Clark, Mr. Macdonald, Mr. Macgill, Mr. Muirhead and the Hon. Mr. Longworth do compose the said Committee.

Resolved, That a Committee of three Members be appointed to examine what Laws have lately expired or are near expiring, with leave to report from time to time, by Bills or otherwise.

Ordered, That Mr. Macdonald, Mr. Muirhead and Mr. H. Haviland do compose the said Committee.

Ordered, That a copy of the Journal of this House be sent to His Excellency the

Lieutenant Governor, each day, as soon as may be, after the adjournment.

Ordered, That the postage on all letters and printed papers to and from Members of this House, during the Session, be charged to the contingent accounts of the House.

Resolved, That no Petition praying aid for Roads, Bridges or Wharfs, or for any

object of a local or private nature, be received after Friday, the 5th day of March next.

Ordered, That the said Resolution be inserted in all the Newspapers published in Charlottetown.

Then the House adjourned until tomorrow at ten o'clock.

Ordered, That the foregoing Accounts be referred to the Special Committee appointed to examine and report on the Public Accounts, to examine the same and report thereon.

Then the House adjourned for one hour;

And being met—

Mr. Clark, from the Committee appointed to receive Tenders for the printing of the Journal of the House, and to report thereon, presented to the House the report of the said Committee, which report was again read at the Clerk's table.

Ordered, That the said report be now committed to a Committee of the whole House.

The House accordingly resolved itself into the said Committee.

Mr. Clark took the Chair of the Committee; and after some time spent therein

Mr. Speaker resumed the Chair;

And Mr. Clark reported that the Committee had gone through the report of the Special Committee, without making any amendment thereto; and the said Report being again read at the Clerk's table, was agreed to by the House, and is as followeth :—

The Committee appointed to receive tenders for printing the Journal of the House, during the present Session, have to report, that they have received four tenders, viz.:

First:—From Mr. Thomas Burris; offering to perform the work at the rate of Thirty-six Shillings per sheet; binding, in the usual style, four shillings and six-pence per copy; stitching, one shilling and six-pence.

Second:—From Mr. John Ings; for each sheet of four pages of Journal, Thirty-four Shillings and five-pence; half-binding, each copy, three shillings and nine-pence; stitching, each copy, one shilling and six-pence.

Third:—From Mr. Samuel Cooper; for each sheet of four pages, Twenty-seven Shillings and three-pence; binding, per copy, four shillings; stitching, per copy, one shilling and three-pence.

Fourth:—From Mr. George T. Haszard; offering to print one hundred and sixty copies of the Journal of the House, at Twenty Shillings and six-pence per sheet; binding, as usual, three shillings and four-pence per copy; and in paper covers, one shilling per volume.

From an examination and comparison of the several tenders, we find Mr. George T. Haszard's tender the lowest, and recommend the House to approve of it, for the present Session.

Mr. Macdonald, from the Special Committee appointed to examine what Laws have lately expired or are near expiring, with power to report from time to time, by Bills or otherwise, presented to the House the Report of the said Committee, which Report was again read at the Clerk's table, and is as followeth:—

Your Committee appointed to examine what Laws have expired, or are near expiring, submit that—

The Act Tenth Victoria, Chapter Five, intituled "An Act relating to the Pumps and Wells of

Charlottetown, and to repeal a certain Act therein mentioned;"

The Act Fifteenth Victoria, Chapter Twenty-three, intituled "An Act to provide a Summary remedy for females in certain cases of Seduction;"

The Act Fifteenth Victoria, Chapter Twenty-nine, intituled "An Act to alter and amend an Act passed in the Sixth year of the Reign of Her present Majesty, intituled 'An Act to alter and amend the Act for the establishment of an Academy in Charlottetown,'" and

The Act Fifteenth Victoria, Chapter Thirty-one, intituled "An Act to regulate the publishing of Notices and Advertisements relating to the Public Service,"—will, respectively, expire at the end of the present Session of the General Assembly;

And the Act Twentieth Victoria, Chapter One, intituled "An Act for raising a Revenue," will expire on the Second day of May, One thousand eight hundred and fifty-eight.

Ordered, That the said Report be committed to a Committee of the whole House to-morrow.

Mr. Cooper, from the Special Committee appointed to prepare and report the draft of an Address in answer to the Speech of His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor to both Houses, at the opening of the present Session, presented to the House the draft of an Address as prepared by the Committee, which Address was again read.

Ordered, That the said draft Address be committed to a Committee of the whole House to-morrow.

Then the House adjourned until to-morrow at ten o'clock.

THURSDAY, February 18, 1858.

THE Clerk acquainted the House that the Bond for printing the Journal of the House had been executed by the contractor, and security taken for the due performance of the work.

The Order of the Day for the House in Committee on the consideration of the draft Address reported from the Special Committee, in answer to the Speech of His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor to both Houses, at the opening of the present Session, being read—

The House accordingly resolved itself into the said Committee.

Mr. Macdonald took the chair of the Committee; and after some time spent therein,

Mr. Speaker resumed the Chair;

And Mr. Macdonald reported that the Committee had gone through the draft Address reported from the Special Committee, paragraph by paragraph, and had adopted the same without making any amendment thereto; and the said Address was again read at the Clerk's Table and is as followeth:—

To His Excellency Sir Dominick Daly, Knight, Lieutenant Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over Her Majesty's Island Prince Edward, and the Territories thereunto belonging, Chancellor, Vice Admiral and Ordinary of the same, &c. &c. &c.

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR EXCELLENCY;

1. We Her Majesty's loyal subjects, the House of Assembly of Prince Edward Island, thank your Excellency for the Speech with which you were pleased to open the present Session, and for having called the Legislature at the most suitable season to take into consideration the affairs of the Colony; and your Excellency may rely upon our best endeavours being directed to promote the public welfare.

2. We have reason to be thankful to Divine Providence for having blessed the labours of the husbandman with the abundant fruits of the earth, and for the

seasonable weather with which he has been enabled to gather in the harvest; and it is gratifying to learn that the revenue for the past year exceeds in amount that of the previous year.

3. Fully apprehensive that the revenue for the current year will be less than that of preceeding ones, on account of the depression so universally experienced in all branches of commercial industry, our attention will be directed to this important consideration, in making the usual and necessary provision for the public service.

4. The accounts and estimates for the current year shall receive due examination; and Your Excellency may rely upon our readiness to vote the necessary supplies.

5. We regret that any circumstances should have arisen to prevent Her Majesty's Government from proposing to Parliament to guarantee the Loan for the purchase of Lands in this Island; but we trust that that measure will not be delayed beyond the present Session of the Imperial Legislature.

6. Any despatch bearing upon this subject, which may be submitted to us, shall receive our attentive consideration.

7. It is a source of the highest consolation to learn that the Mutiny which has so lamentably disturbed Her Majesty's East Indian Possessions has been brought to such a point by British valour and heroism as to leave no doubt of its final suppression. We sincerely sympathise with our fellow subjects, in that distant portion of the Empire, in the painful sufferings and destitution which they have endured from the unexampled atrocities by which this Mutiny has been characterised; and confident that this sentiment is shared by all Her Majesty's dutiful subjects, we have no doubt that the appeals which have been forcibly made on behalf of the surviving victims, will meet with a generous response.

8. We will give our most earnest attention to any measure that may be submitted to us, calculated to suppress illicit traffic in this Island. Such a measure we deem to be of the highest importance in order to prevent loss to the revenue and injury to the morals of the people.

9. We rejoice at the improvement which has been manifested in the prosecution of the fisheries during the past year; and we sincerely hope that this branch of industry will continue to receive the attention which it so justly merits; as we are confident that its zealous

prosecution is one of the best means of promoting the welfare and prosperity of the country.

10. It is satisfactory to know that the improvement in agriculture and farm stock throughout this Island is attributable in some measure to the liberal grants given by the Legislature for the encouragement of agriculture; and we desire to assure Your Excellency that the fostering care of this House will be readily extended to so desirable an object, when it can be done without prejudice to other public interests.

11. We rest assured that Your Excellency will readily co-operate with us in any measures which we may entertain for the honour and welfare of this Island.

And the said Address being again read,

The Hon. Mr. Haviland moved to amend the same by striking out the fifth and sixth paragraphs thereof, and inserting the following in lieu of the same.

“We will give due consideration to any Despatch which Your Excellency may see fit to submit to us, explanatory of the cause which prevented Her Majesty’s Government from proposing to the Imperial Parliament in the last Session, to guarantee the loan intended to be raised for the purchase of lands in this Island.”

THE Hon. the Colonial Secretary, by command of His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, presented to the House the following Message :

D. DALY, Lieutenant Governor.

The Lieutenant Governor deems it his duty to bring the system that has hitherto been in operation in this Island, for the collection of the Impost Revenue, under the special notice of the House of Assembly, with a view to its revision.

Bonds at a long date, not bearing interest, are deposited in the Colonial Treasury, in payment of duties; whilst the Money Warrants, issued by the Government for the public service, and bearing interest, are not convertible into money, except at a discount.

The manifest injustice thus inflicted on the holders of the Government securities does not end here; as the parties in whose hands the public revenue is permitted to remain, are enabled to avail themselves of the depreciated Government Warrants, obtained at a discount, to meet their Bonds at the Treasury as they fall due; and frequently, at a further sacrifice of the interests of the public creditor, when Warrants that have not been issued more than a few hours are received as cash in the Treasury, and thus obtain precedence in liquidation over those that may have been issued as many months, and still remain inconvertible.

The Lieutenant Governor is far from desiring to restrict, in any degree, such encouragement as

can properly be given by the Legislature to legitimate enterprise, in all its branches; but he trusts the House of Assembly will concur with him in regarding the importance of maintaining the public credit, and the integrity of the Government transactions, to be paramount to any other consideration, as vitally affecting the honor and interest of the Island.

each, which has been by no means sufficient to support the institution; that it is the intention of the Right Reverend founder thereof to have taught therein, in addition to the present branches, all the branches usually taught in seminaries; that the pupils, now numbering 33, are from the country districts of this Island, and that it is the only institution on the Island of which the poor country people can avail themselves, to give a superior education to their children; that it is not exclusively an ecclesiastical seminary; that, notwithstanding it is a Catholic institution, if any Protestants shall enter the college, they shall be required to conform to the rules of the house, but their religious opinions or belief shall in no wise be tampered with; that, from the time of the opening of the college until October, two Professors were employed therein; that since that time four have been employed;—and praying the House to grant from the public funds, to the said college, such sum as they may consider just and sufficient for the services rendered to education during the last three years, and moreover to endow the institution with an annual grant sufficient to assist in obtaining maps, books and apparatus, and in maintaining a sufficient staff of Professors.

The Lieutenant Governor transmits, for the information of the House of Assembly, copy of a Despatch from the Secretary of State for the Colonies, and its enclosure, from the Secretary of State for War, having reference to a transfer of the Barracks in Charlottetown to the local Government, as well as to the Arms supplied for a Volunteer Militia Force, and to the pre-

sent condition and prospect of future efficiency of such a force for the defence of the Colony.

A definite expression of the views of the Legislature regarding the Barracks has become indispensable, if they are to be acquired for the use of the Colony; and as the retention of the small supply of Arms now in possession of the local Government depends upon the establishment of an efficient Volunteer Force, which the Lieutenant Governor is led to believe cannot be effected without some allowance for clothing, he recommends an appropriation for that object, to the favorable consideration of the House of Assembly.

The question being then put on the main motion, as amended, it was carried in the affirmative, and

Ordered, accordingly.

And then the House resolved itself into the said Committee.

Mr. Macgill took the Chair of the Committee; and after some time spent therein,

Mr. Speaker resumed the Chair;

And Mr. Macgill reported that the Committee had gone into the consideration of the matter to them referred, and had come to a Resolution thereon, which Resolution was again read, and is as followeth :—

"Whereas the Legislature of this Colony has hitherto acted on the principle—so generally adopted in every free and enlightened country—of keeping its educational establishments free from religious tests, believing that these tests tend rather to retard than advance the cause of Education, while they never fail to promote acrimony and ill-feeling in a community composed of different denominations of Christians, and are, consequently, as injurious to the spread of true morality and religion, as they are to education :

"And whereas the Law entitled 'An Act for the establishment of an Academy in Charlottetown,' passed more than thirty years ago, provides that no religious test whatever shall be used in the said Academy; and during this long period only one attempt has been made—and that by a small section of the general public—to enforce, by Act of Parliament, the reading of one version of the Holy Scriptures in the said Central Academy :

"And whereas, by an arrangement between the Board of Education and the Master of the Normal School, certain hours have been set apart for the reading of the Bible in that institution, by those children whose parents may desire the same; and as there is no obstacle to the

adoption of the same practice in all the common schools of the Colony, this House is of opinion that legislation upon the subject is quite unnecessary, and, if resorted to, would be subversive of the rights of conscience :

“ And whereas certain petitions now before this House, purporting to emanate from the Protestants of Prince Edward Island, wherein the petitioners claim a right to have their children instructed in the Protestant Bible, which they believe to be “ the fundamental Law Book and the recognized standard of true morality,” concludes by praying that this House shall “ adopt such means as shall redress their grievances, and grant them the enjoyment of their rights,” by enforcing the reading of the Holy Scriptures in the Normal School and Central Academy—thereby inferentially leading to the conclusion that the use of the Scriptures is not prohibited in the common schools :

“ And whereas it has been shown in these premises that there is nothing to prevent the voluntary use of the Bible in the Normal School, while its introduction as a class book into the Central Academy, which would constitute a religious test, is expressly forbidden by a law which has remained on the statute book for thirty years ; and that successive Houses of Assembly since, never regarded this law as an infringement of the rights of any portion of the inhabitants of the Colony ; nor has any complaint been made of the enactment in question, by any considerable number of the Protestant parents of children who are sent to the Academy for instruction, and who might be reasonably supposed to be the most deeply interested in the matter. The House, therefore, deems that as there has been no infringement of a right, no substantial grievance can be said to exist—

“ **RESOLVED**, therefore, That it is inexpedient to comply with the prayer of the several petitions now before the House, asking for an Act of the Legislature to aompel the use of the Protestant Bible, as a class-book, in mixed Schools, like the

Central Academy and Normal School, which were established for, and are supported by Protestants and Catholics alike,—this House feeling assured that so unwise and so unnecessary a measure is not desired by a majority of the inhabitants of the Colony, nor essential to the encouragement of Education and Religion.”

The Hon. Mr. Palmer moved to amend the report, by leaving out all after the word “ Whereas,” and inserting the following in lieu thereof:—

“ It is inexpedient that any law or rule should exist by which the use of the Holy Scriptures should be excluded from the Central Academy and Normal School of this Island, in any case where the parents or guardians of any scholars placed in those Institutions may require such Holy Scriptures to be used or read therein, by such scholars —

RESOLVED, therefore, That it is necessary to provide by law that the Holy Scriptures may be read and used by any scholar or scholars attending either the Central Academy or Normal School, in all cases where the parents or guardians of such scholars may require the same to be so used by them, while attending such Institutions respectively.

The House divided on the motion of amendment :

The Hon. Mr. Wightman then moved, in amendment to the said report, to leave out all after the word "Whereas," and insert the following in lieu thereof:—

"While this House repudiates the principle of encroachment upon the religious opinions of any denomination, it considers that the most effectual evidence of the true spirit of Christian liberality will be afforded by allowing to each class of Christians, the use of the copy of the Holy Scriptures in which it believes.

"And whereas the parties attending, for instruction, at the Central Academy and Normal School, belong to the Protestant and Catholic communions, and it is not inexpedient that the copies of the Holy Scriptures to which they respectively adhere, should be read without note or com-

ment, to the parties belonging to each denomination, respectively.

"Be it therefore **RESOLVED**, That the Board of Education should authorize the reading in the above institutions, of the Holy Scriptures, without note or comment, during school hours, in such versions and by such of the pupils and students whose parents or guardians may desire it."

The House divided on the motion of amendment:

And the names being called for, they were taken down as in the last preceding division—

And the numbers being equal,

Mr. Speaker gave his casting vote in the negative.

So it passed in the negative.

Then the House adjourned until tomorrow at ten o'clock.

Ordered, That the said reports and accounts be referred to the Special Committee, appointed to examine and report

on the Public Accounts, to examine the same and report thereon.

The Hon. Mr. Wightman, from the Special Committee to whom was referred every Petition praying for the opening of new roads, to examine the same and report thereon, presented to the House the report of the said Committee, which report was again read.

Ordered, That the said report be now committed to a Committee of the whole House.

The House accordingly resolved itself into the said Committee.

Mr. Muirhead took the Chair of the Committee; and after some time spent therein,

Mr Speaker resumed the Chair ;

And Mr. Muirhead reported that the Committee had gone through the report of the Special Committee, paragraph by paragraph; had amended and then adopted the same, and the report, so amended, being again read at the Clerk's table, was agreed to by the House, and is as followeth :—

Your Committee to whom were referred the several Petitions for the opening of new lines of Roads, to report thereon, submit the following recommendations :

1. Your Committee recommend that a Commission be appointed to appraise the damages, if any, which may accrue on the opening of a new line of road between the farms of Richard Green and Alexander McRae, a distance of 60 chains, on Lot 49.
2. That the Government do order the Road Commissioner to ascertain the expense of a new line of road to be opened from the farm of James Doyle to the main road on Lot 48, a distance of 22 chains.
3. That a Commission be appointed by the Government, on a line of road that runs from the Malpeque Main Western Road to the County line, on the line between Lots 19 and 25.
4. That the Road Commissioner be ordered to report to the Government respecting the alteration of a line of road which runs through the farm of Alexander C. Manson, on Lot 28.
5. That the Road Commissioner of the District be ordered to report to the Government, on the propriety of opening a new line of road, from James McKenzie's, Lot 48, to the Main Road.
6. That an inquisition be appointed for the opening of a new line of road from Fifteen Point chapel to Miscouche Bay.
7. That an inquisition be appointed on a new line of road, through the farm of Michael McInnis, from John McInnis's house to the old Galow's Point road,—the petitioner, John McInnis proffering to pay any damages that may be awarded by the Commissioners.
8. That a new line of road be opened to meet the old road on the line between Widow Maceachern and Michael Morrison, crossing Neil Morrison's farm, to Middle River Bridge.

9. Your Committee cannot recommend the prayer of the petition for opening a new line of road from Alley's, Head of Cardigan, to the Main Georgetown road.

10. Your Committee recommend that the Road Commissioner be ordered to report to the Government, the propriety of opening a new line of road from the Grand River road to Launching road, on the division line of property owned by Lord Melville and the Earl of Selkirk, Lot 53, being a distance of two miles.

11. That the Road Commissioner be ordered to report to the Government, the necessity and expense of opening a new line of road to connect the road at the Head of Souris to the line road of Lot 45, through the Farm of Alexander McGilveray and Donald McCormack.

12. That the Road Commissioner for the Townships of 54 and 53 be ordered to report to the Government the probable expense of opening a distance of one and a half mile on the line between said Townships, which road has been partially opened as a Winter road, and will, if improved, be of much benefit to the inhabitants of St. Peter's Bay, Cardigan road and Little Baltic Settlements, Grand River and Launching.

13. Your Committee recommend that the road laid off on a plan submitted by the Surveyor General, shaded green from A. to B., leading from the Hillsborough River, Lot 38, to the Portage road from the West River to Surveyor's Inlet on Lot 47, be opened under the Road Compensation Act.

Resolved, That a Committee be appointed to prepare an Address to His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, praying His Excellency to direct that the recommendations contained in the foregoing report be carried into effect.

Ordered, That the Hon. Mr. Wightman, Mr. Muirhead and Mr. Macdonald do compose the said Committee.

The Bill to continue a certain Act therein mentioned, relating to the Central Academy, was, according to order, read a second time.

Ordered, That the said Bill be now committed to a Committee of the whole House.

The House accordingly resolved itself into the said Committee.

Mr. Macdonald took the Chair of the Committee; and after some time spent therein,

Mr. Speaker resumed the Chair;

And Mr. Macdonald reported that the Committee had gone through the Bill without making any amendment thereto; and the report was again read at the Clerk's table.

Ordered, That the said Bill be engrossed, and that the title be "An Act to continue a certain Act therein mentioned, relating to the Central Academy."

Resolved, That the House do now resolve itself into a Committee of the whole House, to take into further consideration all matters relating to roads, bridges and wharfs.

The House accordingly resolved itself into the said Committee.

The Hon. the Colonial Treasurer took the Chair of the Committee; and after some time spent therein,

Mr. Speaker resumed the Chair;

And the Chairman reported that the Committee had made some progress, and had directed him to move for leave to sit again, which the House agreed to.

The Chairman also acquainted the House that, in the course of debate in the Committee, the following expression was used by the Hon. Mr. Mooney: "a corrupt majority of this House clubbed together to rob my constituents," and he (the Chairman) had taken the words down, by direction of the Committee, for the purpose of reporting them to the House.

Mr. Speaker having called the attention of the House to the words spoken by the Hon. Mr. Mooney, and the Hon. Mr. Mooney having refused to retract them, withdrew; it was thereupon

Resolved, That this House do now resolve itself into a Committee of Privileges, to consider certain words spoken by the Hon. Robert Mooney, in Committee of the whole House on the consideration of all matters relating to roads, bridges and wharfs.

The House accordingly resolved itself into the said Committee.

Mr. Macdonald took the Chair of the Committee; and after some time spent therein,

Mr. Speaker resumed the Chair;

And Mr. Macdonald reported that the Committee had come to a Resolution, which Resolution being again read at the Clerk's table, was agreed to by the House, and is as followeth:—

RESOLVED, That the Hon. Robert Mooney, one of the Members for the Second District of Queen's County, having in debate, in Committee of the whole House on roads and bridges, asserted "that a corrupt majority of this House clubbed together to rob my constituents," is guilty of a grossly indecorous and unmerited reflection upon this House, and of a breach of the privileges thereof, and that he, the said Hon. Robert Mooney, be required to apologize to this House, at the Bar thereof, in the following words:

"Mr. Speaker,—I apologize to this House for having this day reflected, in gross and indecorous language, upon the majority thereof, and for having thereby committed a breach of the privileges of this Honorable House."

Ordered, That the Messenger be sent to require the attendance of the Hon. Mr. Mooney.

The Hon. Mr. Mooney having appeared at the Bar, and Mr. Speaker having communicated to him the Order of the House, the Hon. Mr. Mooney declined to make the required apology, and then withdrew.

The House then came to the following Resolution:—

Whereas the Hon. Robert Mooney, a Member of this House, has this day been adjudged to be guilty of a breach of the privileges thereof, and of a contempt of the Order thereof, this day committed in presence of this House, by refusing the apology dictated to him by this House—

RESOLVED, therefore, That the said Hon. Robert Mooney, for his said contempt, be committed to the custody of the Sergeant-at-Arms, until the further pleasure of the House be signified, and that Mr. Speaker do issue his Warrant for that purpose.

Then the House adjourned until Monday next, at Ten o'clock.

MONDAY, March 22, 1858.

THE Hon. Mr. Mooney having appeared at the Bar, in custody, and having made the apology dictated by the House, on Saturday last, for his breach of the privileges thereof,

Ordered, That the Hon. Mr. Mooney be discharged.

Resolved, That the said Address be engrossed.

Read a third time, as engrossed, the Bill intituled "An Act to continue a certain Act therein mentioned relating to the Central Academy."

Mr. Macgill presented to the House a return from the Postmaster General, of the number of Post Offices in Prince Edward Island, with a detailed account of postage collected at each Office, in the year ended the 5th January, 1858.

Your Committee further recommend the sum of £10 to be paid to the Rev. Mr. Fraser, in consideration of the services of the late James Gillanders, Teacher at West Cape, towards defraying the funeral expenses and lawful debts of the deceased.

Your Committee further recommend that the sum of £10 be paid to Mr. Abercrombie Willock, for three months' less eleven days' services, as Teacher at Black River School, in the year 1856.

Your Committee cannot recommend the prayer of the Trustees of the South Shore School, as such school is provided for by Statute.

Your Committee cannot recommend the prayer of the Petition of Daniel McKinlay, as he receives the amount provided by Statute.

Your Committee would recommend, that, in future, no Petition praying for an allowance to unlicensed Teachers, be entertained by the House, unless it shall clearly appear that the Inhabitants petitioning, could not obtain a Teacher qualified according to law; and every such Teacher shall, within 20 days, notify his engagement, and furnish a copy of his agreement with the inhabitants, to the Board of Education.

Your Committee submit, that, when the House is in Supply, a sum sufficient be appropriated for the services herein set forth, agreeably to the foregoing recommendations.

The Hon. the Colonial Treasurer from the Committee appointed to prepare and bring in a Bill to provide for the hearing and determination of causes in the Supreme Court, in certain cases, presented to the House a Bill, as prepared by the Committee; and the same was read the first time, and ordered to be read a second time tomorrow.

The Hon. the Colonial Secretary from the Committee appointed to join the Committee of the Council, to prepare an Address to Her Majesty the Queen, congratulating Her Majesty upon the marriage of the Princess Royal with Prince Frederick William of Prussia, presented to the House the draft of an Address, as prepared by the joint Committee, which Address being again read at the Clerk's table, was agreed to by the House, and is as followeth :—

TO THE QUEEN'S MOST EXCELLENT MAJESTY.

MOST GRACIOUS SOVEREIGN;

We, your Majesty's faithful subjects, the Legislative Council and House of Assembly of the Island of Prince Edward, in Parliament convened, beg leave to approach your throne, with sentiments of loyalty and attachment to your person and government, and with the expression of Your sincere congratulations upon the happy event that has recently taken place, by the marriage of one of your illustrious family.

We trust that the auspicious union of the Princess Royal, with Prince Frederick William of Prussia, will be conducive to the happiness of their Royal Highnesses; and that this marriage will cement that national amity which has long existed between Prussia and Great Britain.

We assure Your Majesty that the welcome reception given to the Princess Royal, by the subjects of the Kingdom of Prussia, has afforded us unalloyed pleasure, and we pray that in her adopted home, the Princess Royal may be as happy as she was when under the parental care of your Majesty, and His Royal Highness the Prince Consort.

Ordered, That the said Address be engrossed.

The Hon. the Colonial Secretary, by command of His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, presented to the House

Copy of a communication from His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor of New Brunswick, dated Government House, Fredericton, 5th March, 1858, enclosing

Copy of a memorandum of the Executive Council of the former Province, respecting the establishment of a system of steam communication between Canada, Nova Scotia, Prince Edward Island and that Province.

See Appendix (U.)

Ordered, That the said papers do lie on the table.

The Hon. Mr. Mooney read, in his place, a Petition of John Campbell, who formerly served in the Royal Navy, setting forth his present infirmities and destitution, and praying for admission into the House of Industry, or for other relief; and thereupon

Ordered, That the Order limiting the time for the reception of private Petitions be suspended;

And then the said Petition was received and read.

Ordered, That the said Petition do lie on the table.

Mr. Perry, from the Committee to whom was referred the Petition of Patrick Cadden, to examine the same and report thereon, presented to the House the report of the said Committee; which report was again read at the Clerk's table, and is as followeth:—

Your Committee appointed to examine and report on the Petition of Patrick Cadden, contractor for building two chimneys in the Jail of Prince County, find, from the information received from the Superintendent of Public Works, that he, as well as the Petitioner, was under the impression that the chimneys were all of brick, except the bases in the cellars; but, instead of that, ten feet in height of each double chimney

proved to be of stone; consequently, the work took five and a-half thousand brick more than it would have otherwise taken. Under these circumstances, your Committee consider the Petitioner entitled to the favorable consideration of this House, and recommend, that when the House is in Committee of Supply, a sum be granted to remunerate Petitioner for his loss sustained, as specified above.

A motion being made that the report of the Committee be agreed to.

To His Excellency Sir Dominick Daly, Knight, Lieutenant Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over Her Majesty's Island Prince Edward, and the Territories thereunto belonging, Chancellor, Vice Admiral and Ordinary of the same, &c., &c., &c.

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR EXCELLENCY—

We, the House of Assembly, bring under your Excellency's consideration the unsettled state of the Tenantry, and that they are very desirous that the land question, which has been so long pending, should be now settled; but the inhabitants, in general, disapprove of purchasing the landholders' claims with borrowed money, without an investigation of the titles; for it is publicly reported and generally believed, that the grants of the Townships are forfeited, and for some Townships there are no grants on record; therefore to purchase lands under such circumstances, might lead to acts of great injustice, and involve the Colony in debt, to give sums of money for lands to persons who have no right to receive it.

May it therefore please Your Excellency to establish a Court of Escheats, to investigate the titles of the Townships, as the most just and expeditious method of ascertaining the rights of parties, and of bringing the long agitated land question to a settlement.

On motion of Mr. Cooper,

Your Committee to whom was referred the Petition of Daniel Scott, Contractor for the building of Southport Wharf, have to report :—

That on the 19th February, 1856, the Petitioner entered into a Contract, with the Government, to build the Southport Wharf, to be completed before the fifteenth July, a penal condition of the wharf being, that in the event of his not having completed the work within the time agreed upon, he should be liable in damages at the rate of 40s. per diem, for every day after the expiration of that time, until the final completion of the work.

That by the petition of the contractor it appears that whilst he was employed in building the

wharf, a heavy storm broke the boom by which the timber was secured, in consequence of which accident a great part of the timber was lost.

That the contractor failed to complete the wharf within the time specified for its completion, but his nonfulfilment of the contract with respect to time, he alleges arose from the breaking of the boom, and the large amount of extra work performed which was not specified in the original agreement, amounting to £264, being 50 per cent. over the first contract.

That from information which your Committee have received, it seems that the Government on finding that the contractor had not completed his engagement within the specified time, engaged parties to assist in its completion, to whom, for their assistance therein, was paid the sum of £349 4s 9d, and that this sum has been charged to the petitioner.

That the arbitrators, Mr. Benjamin Davies on behalf of the Government, and Mr. Colin McPhee on the part of the contractor, who were appointed to inspect the extra work, to value the same and report thereon, estimated the value thereof at £264.

That your Committee have examined the said Mr. Benjamin Davies and Mr. Colin McPhee touching the premises, who have stated, that the performance of the extra work inspected and valued by them, involved a considerable extension of the time specified in the original agreement, for the completion of the wharf.

That the account of the contractor with the Government, independently of the penalty, stands thus :—

The Committee remark that the amount of Light and Anchorage Duty collected at Georgetown is larger than that collected at all the Ports on the North side of the Island, and consider that, from the number of American vessels calling into these Ports being larger than the number calling at Three Rivers, the amount of Duty, if properly collected and accounted for, should exceed the amount at present paid in ; and recommend that the Government take such measures as will secure the prompt collection and correct return of Light and Anchorage Duties at these Ports, in future.

8. Your Committee have examined the Accounts of the Commissioner of Public Lands, from which they learn that of 84,254 acres of Public Lands purchased by the Government, 38,850 $\frac{1}{2}$ acres have been sold as follows:—

9. Your Committee beg to observe that in the Public Lands' Accounts the sale of 938 acres is credited, on which no deposit has yet been paid by the alleged purchasers, and in some other cases a trifling amount of deposit has only been paid. It also appears that the Commissioner of Public Lands has sold Crown Lands this year, principally in Georgetown and Royalty, to the amount of £710 10s, and has, together with the Surveyor General, transacted all the business connected with the sale and transfer of those Lands.

10. Your Committee would call attention to the discrepancy between the amount of Public Lands' Bonds, which, by the Commissioner's return, were last year valued at £1,400, which Bonds, by this year's accounts, appear to amount only to the sum of £775 7s 1d due, and £60 0s 5d paid; but they find, on enquiry, the rest of those Bonds were cancelled some time since under the provisions of the Act above named.

11. The Committee recommend that in future the Accounts for the purchase and sales of Public Lands be kept separate and distinct from the General Revenue Accounts of the Colony, and that the Debentures issued for the purchase of those Lands be a charge against them.

12. Your Committee recommend that all the accounts to them referred, be printed in the Appendix to the Journals.

Your Committee have minutely examined the Accounts of the Commissioner of Public Lands, from which they learn that there remains due upon securities and for Lands sold under the authority of the Act of 16th Victoria cap. 18, as under, viz :

Your Committee beg to observe that in the statement of sums due, under the last enumerated head, several instances occur in which no amount of deposit has been paid by the alleged purchasers; and in other cases a very trifling amount only has been so paid, bearing a very small proportion to the amount required to be paid by the 28th section of the Land Purchase Act.

The amount of Six Thousand Pounds, with Interest, is still claimed by the Vendors of the Worrell Estate, to be due to them, for the balance of the consideration money of their Deed of Sale to the Government, which, however, is retained until certain points in dispute shall be adjusted.

Your Committee would also call attention to the great discrepancy between the above amount of Bonds, and that in the return furnished by the late Commissioner of Public Lands, during the last Session, in which it was stated that there were then in the Prothonotary's Office, Judgment Bonds representing £3320 9s 3¼d, with £232 2s 8d costs, of which he considered that at least £1,400 would be recovered of them, besides interest and costs; yet, after payments on account of said Bonds, during the past year, of £60 0s 5d only, the balance due appears to be reduced to £775 7s 1d, by Bonds being cancelled prior to 1st May, 1857.

There appears to have been 84,254 acres of Public Land, of which 38,850¾ acres sold for the sum of £19,256 16s 6d, and there remain still unsold 45,403¼ acres.

The Committee remark that the amount of Light and Anchorage Duty collected at Georgetown is larger than that collected at all the Ports on the North side of the Island, and consider, that from the number of American vessels calling into these Ports being larger than the number calling at Three Rivers, the amount of Duty, if properly collected and accounted for, should exceed the amount at present paid in ; and recommend that the Government take such measures as will secure the prompt collection and correct return of Light and Anchorage Duties at these Ports, in future.

Your Committee observe that the sum of Two hundred and Seventy Pounds has been paid to the Clerk of the Executive and Legislative Councils, for his services for the past year, as also Twenty Pounds to an Assistant ; while the Act 14th Victoria, cap. 3, expressly declares that the salary to that Officer, of £120, shall be in lieu of all fees of office, allowances and emoluments.

It appears from the Warrant Book that the sum of £67 7s 6d has been paid to John Doirant for superintending the erection of Oyster Bed Bridge and other services, and a further sum of £115 5s, to the same person for superintending the erection of Prince Street Wharf in Charlottetown : your Committee are of opinion that the latter service should have been chiefly discharged by the Superintendent of Public Works.

Edward Whelan and John Ings, twenty-five pounds each, for publishing the debates of the House of Assembly in the <i>Examiner</i> and <i>Islander</i> newspapers, provided they complete the same to the satisfaction of the above Committee, and within eight weeks after the rising of the House of Assembly, - - - -	50 0 0
John Walsh, for printing the debates, the sum of thirty pounds,—the said amount to be paid when the debates shall be completed to the satisfaction of the above named Committee, - - - -	30 0 0

Your Committee recommend that the amount to be paid to George T. Haszard for printing the Journals of the House of Assembly for the present Session, be paid, one-half immediately, and the remainder when the said Journals shall have been delivered to the care of the Librarian and the Chief Clerk, according to contract, and when the work shall have been examined and approved of by the above named Committee, or any two of them.

Resolved, That the House do now resolve itself into a Committee of the whole House, to take into consideration the report of the Special Committee appointed to examine and report on the Petition of James Douglas, formerly of Bay Fortune.

The House accordingly resolved itself into the said Committee.

Mr. Macgill took the chair of the Committee; and after some time spent therein,

Mr. Speaker resumed the Chair;

And Mr. Macgill reported that the Committee had gone through the report of the Special Committee, without making any amendment thereto; and the report being again read at the Clerk's table, was agreed to by the House, and is as followeth:—

The Committee appointed by the House of Assembly, last Session, to report on the Petition of James Douglas, of Township No. 43, now lately deceased, in which great loss and hardship are represented to have been sustained by petitioner, from a variety of complicated legal proceedings touching certain real property claimed by him,—respectfully submit the following as the result of their deliberations:—

The facts set forth in the Petition, and referred to at considerable length in a report of the House of Assembly, agreed to when in Committee on the state of the Colony, in 1840, are briefly as follows: That petitioner bought the possession of a tract of land, leased to William Aitken by the late William Townsend, Esquire, said land being stated to consist of 150 acres, the lease of which was for a term of 40 years, at the rent of one shilling currency per acre, or £7 10s. for the whole. That for upwards of twenty years petitioner held this farm, and paid his rent regularly, up to 1829; that at the time of the death of the lessor, petitioner contracted with Mrs. Townsend for a lease of 999 years, at the same rent as expressed in the first lease, and in consideration of this extension of time petitioner paid her £35. That nine years after this transaction, it came to the knowledge of the petitioner that Mrs. Townsend had not power, under the will of her husband, to grant a lease for a longer period than the term of her own life, and on obtaining this knowledge petitioner was advised to discontinue paying rent. That about that time he obtained a survey of his farm, and found it to contain only 102 acres, instead of 150. That this deficiency in the quantity of land was a further motive for his discontinuing to pay the rent demanded, and he claimed a reduction in the rent in proportion to the amount he had overpaid, or some compensation, and was induced to believe by Mrs. Townsend's agent that satisfactory reparation would be made, but never was. That Mrs. Townsend then took summary proceedings against petitioner for the recovery of a year's rent; that before those proceedings were brought to a close, the farm was sold to the Rev. Mr. Wiggins, for twenty pounds, who took an action of ejectment against petitioner in 1833; that the case was brought into the Court of Chancery, and proceedings finally stopped by an injunction issued from that Court in 1839,

without petitioner being able to obtain any relief, but compelled to pay heavy costs on both sides. That further law proceedings were taken by Mr. Wiggins against petitioner, which resulted in further loss to the latter. That petitioner then covenanted with Mr. Wiggins for the absolute purchase of the land, and paid down £42 on account of the purchase. That after this, petitioner became aware of the fact that William Townsend had mortgaged his estate on Lot 43 to Messrs. Waters and Birnie, and that this mortgage was subsequently transferred to the late Charles Worrell, Esquire. That in virtue of this mortgage Mr. Worrell sent his agent to dispossess petitioner, who attorned to Mr. Worrell to prevent further harassing proceedings. That notwithstanding such attornment, Mr. Wiggins demanded a further instalment of the purchase money stipulated to be paid for said farm, and as Mr. Worrell would not indemnify petitioner against such demands, the latter made a further payment of £50. That shortly after, Mr. Worrell warned petitioner against paying any more money to Mr. Wiggins, and threatened to dispossess him by virtue of said mortgage, or compel him to re-purchase the land. That harassed by demands from both parties, the petitioner desisted from further efforts to fulfil his agreement with Mr. Wiggins, who then put in force against him an execution obtained on his judgment in ejectment, and to avoid the annoyance of a forcible expulsion, petitioner removed his family from the premises. That during his occupation of the farm in question, petitioner states that he expended a large sum of money in improvements of various kinds, erecting buildings, clearing land, &c., without taking into consideration the expenses incurred by him in harassing legal proceedings.

This Committee believes that, admitting the premises in the foregoing statement to be true, the case of the petitioner has been one of great hardship and injustice, and is worthy of the most favorable consideration of your Honorable House.

Your Committee find that the mortgage referred to by petitioner, executed by William Townsend and Flora his wife, for the benefit of Messrs. Waters and Birnie, bears date 25th of April, 1815, the consideration money being £335 currency, with interest at the rate of six per cent. per annum, and is on record in the office of

the Registrar of Deeds, Liber 23, page 655.

That subsequently the amount of the mortgage appears to have been reduced to £152 15s. 4d., and that this balance was assigned by George Birnie, Esquire, representative of Messrs. Watess and Birnie, to the late Charles Worrell, Esquire, as before stated, and was latterly conveyed to the Government as part of the estate of the said Charles Worrell. That the assignment by Mr. Birnie was executed on the 20th May, 1841, and is registered in the office of records, Liber 50, folio 42; and your Committee feel confident that the balance so assigned, together with the interest at six per cent. per annum, which has accrued and is accruing, is due to the Government from the vendors of the estate of the late Mr. Worrell.

Although the House of Assembly, in 1840, on the occasion hereinbefore referred to, recommended that the case of the petitioner should be maintained at the public expense until finally settled, yet your Committee has learned that no public money has been expended on that object, and that his wrongs still remain unredressed.

Your Committee therefore recommend that an Address be presented to His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, requesting that he will cause to be set apart for the benefit of the heirs of the said James Douglas, two hundred acres of the public land in this Island, and take the necessary proceedings to recover the balance of the mortgage stated to be due as aforesaid, or make enquiry into the merits of the case; and should the result of the enquiry be such as to entitle the heirs of the petitioner to pecuniary or other relief, in satisfaction of the wrongs endured by him, it is the opinion of your Committee that such relief should be afforded; and your Committee further recommend that the House of Assembly will give effect to the action of the Government on the subject.

Ordered, That the same Committee who prepared the report be a Committee to prepare an Address to His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, pursuant to the recommendations therein contained.

The Hon Mr. Whelan, from the last preceding Committee appointed, presented to the House the draft of an Address, as

prepared by the Committee, which Address being again read at the Clerk's table, was agreed to by the House, and is as followeth:—

To His Excellency Sir Dominick Daly, Knight Lieutenant Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over Her Majesty's Island Prince Edward, and the Territories thereunto belonging, Chancellor, Vice Admiral, and Ordinary of the same, &c., &c., &c.

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR EXCELLENCY—

The House of Assembly have had under their consideration a Petition of James Douglas, late of Bay Fortune, deceased, setting forth sundry grievances suffered by him on account of his occupation and claim to a certain tract of land on Township No. 43; and have agreed to a report on that subject, a copy of which is herewith respectfully transmitted. The House of Assembly request that Your Excellency will be pleased, at your earliest convenience, to give due consideration to the recommendation contained in this report.

Ordered, That the said Address be engrossed.

Ordered, That the same Committee who prepared the Address be a Committee to wait on His Excellency with the same.

Then the House adjourned for one hour;

And being met—

Mr. Cooper, from the Committee appointed to wait on His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor with the Address praying that His Excellency will be pleased to give due consideration to the recommendation contained in the report of the Special Committee on the Petition of James Douglas, formerly of Bay Fortune, reported the delivery of the said Address, and that His Excellency was pleased to say he would comply with the desire of the House.

The Hon. the Colonial Secretary, from the Committee appointed to wait on His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor with the joint Address praying that His Excellency will be pleased to transmit the joint Address of both Houses to Her Majesty the Queen, congratulating Her Majesty on the marriage of the Princess Royal with Prince Frederick William of Prussia, reported the delivery thereof, and that His Excellency was pleased to say he would forward the same, as desired.

The Hon. Mr. Whelan, from the Committee appointed to wait on His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor with the Address praying that His Excellency will be pleased to give effect to the recommendation contained in the report of the Special Committee on the Petition of the Indian Commissioners, respecting the claims of certain Indians to a tract of land on the Morell River, reported the delivery of the

said Address, and that His Excellency was pleased to say he would comply with the desire of the House.

A Message from His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, by Henry Palmer, Esquire, Usher of the Black Rod :—

Mr. Speaker ;

His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor commands the immediate attendance of this Honorable House at the Bar of the Council Chamber.

Accordingly, Mr. Speaker, with the House, went up to attend His Excellency in the Council Chamber, when His Excellency was pleased, in Her Majesty's name, to assent to the several Bills following, viz :—

An Act to continue the Act regulating the publishing of Notices and Advertisements relating to the Public Service.

An Act for the safe custody of Insane Persons charged with offences, and otherwise to amend the Law with respect to offenders convicted of crimes punishable with death.

An Act to confirm the appointment of Constables and Fence Viewers for King's County made at the last Term there of the Supreme Court.

An Act to make Bonds and other Securities to the Crown binding on the Real Estate of the Debtors.

An Act relating to the mode of summoning Grand and Petit Jurors to serve under special Commission of Oyer and Terminer and General Jail Delivery, also to make provisions to prevent the failure of justice on account of errors made in the return of Jury Panels, and for other purposes therein mentioned.

An Act subjecting the Militia to the Mutiny Act and Articles of War.

An Act relating to the Fishery Reserves in this Island.

An Act to provide for the hearing and determination of causes in the Supreme Court in certain cases where the Judges are interested or otherwise.

An Act to prevent the running at large of Swine in Summerside and vicinity.

After which, Mr. Speaker spake as followeth :

On behalf of Her Majesty's faithful Commons of Prince Edward Island, I have now to present the following Bills of Aid and Supply, voted to Her Majesty during the present Session, to which I have humbly to request Your Excellency's assent, viz :—

An Act to continue a certain Act therein mentioned relating to the Central Academy.

An Act to provide for the collection in this Island, of the Cape Race Light House Toll.

An Act to increase the rate of interest on Treasury Warrants.

An Act relative to Accidents by Fire in Summerside, and for the removal of Nuisances from the Streets thereof.

An Act to continue for certain purposes the Seduction Act, and to make other provisions in lieu thereof, as regards all future actions.

An Act for raising a Revenue.

An Act for appropriating certain Moneys therein mentioned, for the service of the year of Our Lord one thousand eight hundred and fifty-eight.

To each of which His Excellency was pleased, in Her Majesty's name, to give his assent.

And then His Excellency was pleased to make the following Speech to both Houses :—

Mr President and Honorable Gentlemen of the Legislative Council:

Mr. Speaker and Gentlemen of the House of Assembly:

In relieving you from further attendance in your Legislative capacity, I have much satisfaction in being again enabled to renew to you my acknowledgments of the assiduous and satisfactory manner in which your Legislative duties have been discharged, and for the effectual attention you have given to the various subjects which I recommended specially to your consideration.

Mr Speaker and Gentlemen of the House of Assembly:

I thank you in Her Majesty's name for the supplies which you have granted for the public service.

Mr. President and Honorable Gentlemen of the Legislative Council:

Mr. Speaker and Gentlemen of the House of Assembly:

The joyful event of the marriage of the Princess Royal with Prince Frederick William of Prussia, has afforded you an opportunity, of which you would not separate without availing yourselves, to renew to Her Majesty the assurance of those feelings of loyalty and devotion towards Her Majesty's person, which ever lead you warmly to sympathize in every event tending to promote her happiness.

It will be my pleasing duty to transmit your Address to be laid at the foot of the Throne.

The limit assigned by the Constitution to the duration of this Provincial Parliament being about to expire, I feel that I am justified in congratulating you on the share that the legislation in which you have been engaged, during its continuance, has had in producing the state of progressive improvement and perfect tranquility which happily prevails throughout the Island. It is my firm resolution to continue to administer the Government in conformity with the wishes of the people, as expressed through the local Legislature, believing that this course of proceeding, on my part, is best calculated to secure the contentment and peace, which, under Divine Providence, are the foundations of national prosperity.

I confidently hope that, when you return to your homes you will use your just influence in promoting in your several Districts, that habitual respect for the law, and those feelings of mutual kindness and good will, which are essential to the welfare and happiness of every community, and which it has been my endeavour to establish in this Island.

WHEREAS the Lieutenant Governor of Her Majesty’s Island of Prince Edward, with the Council and Assembly of the said Island, did in the month of April, 1857, pass two Acts, which have been transmitted, entitled as follows, viz:

No. 971.— An Act for Raising a Revenue.

APPENDIX (C.)

No. 990.—“ An Act to explain and amend the Act authorising the purchase of Lands by the Government, and to remove certain doubts as to the powers of the Commissioners of Public Lands th ereunder.

And whereas the said Acts have been laid before Her Majesty in Council, together with a letter from the Right Honorable Henry Labouchere, one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, to the Lord President of the Council,

recommending that the said Acts should be left to their operation : Her Majesty was thereupon this day pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to approve the said recommendation. Whereof the Governor, Lieutenant Governor, or Commander-in-Chief for the time being of Her Majesty's Island of Prince Edward, and all other persons whom it may concern, are to take notice and govern themselves accordingly.

Return of Public Lands.

TO THE HONORABLE THE HOUSE OF ASSEMBLY, in Session convened,
A. D. 1858. Victoria 21.

The Commissioner of Public Lands in laying before the House of Assembly a full statement in detail of the Accounts of the Office of Public Lands, desires to submit in report thereof :

That the proceeds from Sales and general receipts, (taking into consideration the great outlay almost universally required for the purchase of Flour and Meal the past summer, and the general depression of trade, with the reduced and uncertain Cash demand for produce this fall,) have been most satisfactory, and shews on the part of the Settlers a willingness and determination, wherever practicable, to avail themselves of the opportunity of becoming Freeholders. It may also be here remarked that from St. Peter's Bay this Fall, property in Shipping, Lumber, and produce estimated at £20,000, left for Newfoundland and other Ports, and (with few exceptions) no Sales have been effected.

That the Sale of Wilderness Land is steadily progressing : the survey thereof being now nearly complete, and the general aspect of the Land good : with the return of prosperity the demand for land will be great, numerous applications from settlers of other districts having lately been made, with a full determination to purchase.

That there now remains upwards of 45,000 acres to be disposed of, to meet a Balance due on purchase (as shewn by statement) of £5,400.

That great exertions have been made by the Surveyor General in opening up the Wilderness Lands throughout the Worrell Estate, and laying off projected roads for the better disposal of lands, as well as the obtaining of a direct and improved route from Charlottetown to the East Point.

That the lands on the projected roads have been in most instances divided into 50 acre Blocks, and only await the opening of the said roads to be immediately disposed of.

That with few exceptions the whole area may be settled, and the proportion of swamp and inferior land being small, a satisfactory result may be anticipated.

DOWNING STREET,
30th June, 1857.

SIR;

The Secretary of State for War has called my attention to the propriety of provision being made for subjecting the Militia of the Colony under your Government, to the Mutiny Act and Articles of War, when that force may be called out for service, either during war, or actual invasion, or rebellion; and I recommend this subject to your attention.

I annex copies of the 52d and 67th Sections of the Act to regulate the Militia of Canada, as being calculated to accomplish what is required.

Whereas a proposed line of Road was run out last year from the Wharf at Summerside to the Road leading from Saint Eleanor's to Travellers' Rest, and a Petition forwarded to the House of Assembly last Session, (accompanied by a plan of the same,) praying to have the Road opened; but all the parties through whose lands the proposed road would run, not being willing that the same should be opened, no further action was taken in the matter.

Now we, the undersigned, being the only persons interested in the lands through which the proposed road would run, hereby consent to surrender to the public a right of way, forty (40) feet wide, that is to say, on the line dividing Joseph Green's and the late Daniel Green's lands, from the wharf to a piece of land sold by the said late Daniel Green to Daniel Green, jun., thence following the line dividing Daniel Green, jun's., said land, and land formerly owned by the said late Daniel Green, but now by the said Joseph Green, to William Williams's land, thence across the last mentioned land to the said road, leading from Saint Eleanor's to Travellers' Rest.

Report of Mr Lawrence Peters, Commissioner of Highways, regarding the straightening of a road on the line between Mary MacEachren and Malcolm Morrison.

ROLLO BAY, Oct. 12th, 1857.

John Ball, Esquire.

Sir,— Agreeable to the instructions received from you, relative to the straightening of the road on the line between Widow McEachren and Morrison, I attended at the said place in June last in order to execute said order, but was opposed by Neil Morrison, who is interested in the land where the road is situated.

And the Widow McEachren having sold her right and interest in the land, since her application for the alteration; and her successor being absent at the time, I thought fit to defer the report until I would have an opportunity of making further enquiry.

Having since examined the matter closely, I have to report—That the road, in my opinion, is improperly situated, as it takes a westerly direction from McInnis's Mill, until it meets the Main Post Road, crossing the land formerly owned by the Widow McEachren at an angle in the direction in which it runs, and also a part of the land owned by Morrison.

To alter the road on the line between the farm formerly owned by the Widow McEachren and Morrison, will cost fully as much as it will to pass it on the line between the farms owned formerly by the Widow McEachren and Donald McCormack, where it would be much more advantageous to the public, as it would shorten the distance considerably, and would leave the road on a straight line from Souris to the Main post road on the North Side.

The probable cost to open that line of road will be about thirty-five pounds, exclusive of the right of way.

In order to shew the matter more clearly, I herewith enclose you a sketch, showing the present road and the different lines adjoining it.

Two letters from Mr. Joseph Robinson, regarding the
Revenue Service.

No. 1.

RUSTICO, P. E. I., January 25th, 1858.

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR EXCELLENCY;

When in the preventive service last autumn, on board the Revenue Schooner "Flirt," I visited several of the outports on the Northern shore of this Island; when in the port of New London, being called on by the Harbour Master to assist him in the discharge of his duty,—the Captain of the American Schooner "Onward" having refused to pay his harbour dues,—I directed our colours to be hoisted. On doing so, an American Schooner, anchored near the Cutter, hoisted a ragged cloth in derision. I regretted that I had not sufficient force at my disposal to resent this insult offered to our flag.

Many of the American Schooners which fish in the Gulf of St. Lawrence, and around the shores of this Island, are armed, the greater part of which, with small arms, and a few carry swivels or small cannon.

As a proof of this, one night the boat was on the lookout for a Schooner suspected of smuggling, when a number of American fishing schooners entered the port firing small arms, and one of which discharged a cannon several times. That same night a shot was fired from an American Schooner anchored near the Cutter; the shot passed very near us.

I consider it my duty to make Your Excellency acquainted with this, as it is generally supposed that the American fishing vessels resorting these waters are unarmed.

RUSTICO, P. E. I., January 25th, 1858.

To the Hon. George Coles.

Sir,—When employed in the Revenue Service, on the Northern shore of this Island, I ascertained that the greatest amount of smuggling was done to the Eastward. If all reports be true, the greater part of the importations of that County are not entered into the Custom House.

For the prevention of smuggling, a larger craft is required. A small craft will do in the summer months, but experience teaches me that the "Flirt" was too small to lay at sea on the North shore during the boisterous weather in autumn.

A good and sufficient articulated crew, subject to the control of the Master, is required for the management of the vessel;—the government might put on board one or two seizing officers. This would enable the vessel to put to sea occasionally when the officers might be required on shore.

A well armed craft would perform the required work, and also, act as a protection to our shores, assist in collecting the harbour dues, light money, &c. Small as our force was, it caused much uneasiness to those engaged in that traffic, and caused one, if not more, individuals, to abandon an intended smuggling voyage. Such, Sir, is my opinion in regard to the suppression of smuggling, which I now submit for your consideration.

TO HIS EXCELLENCY THE LIEUTENANT GOVERNOR IN COUNCIL.

May it please Your Excellency.

Having been directed by Your Excellency's Government, in September last, to go on a cruise for the prevention of smuggling, we beg leave to lay the following remarks before Your Excellency.

On the 2d October, we left Rustico on board the Schooner "Flirt," and anchored the same day in New London Harbour. About twenty sail of American fishing vessels, came into that Port the same evening. Next day we were run into by a large American Schooner; it happened through their carelessness; we thought they would carry our masts away, but we got clear without receiving much injury, although they appeared very careless about us.

On the night of the 6th October, about 9 o'clock, we were at the mouth of the Harbour in our boat, watching for a trading vessel which was hourly expected there from St. Pierre's; we saw a vessel standing in towards the Harbour, and at the same time we saw the discharge of a small cannon, from one of the American vessels near, us followed by the report of small guns through the fleet. This firing appeared to be a signal to the vessel outside, for she immediately stood off and we saw no more of her. About midnight there were two guns fired from the American Schooner Onward, of Gloucester; she laid close to us, the man on our deck heard one of the balls pass by his head. The conduct of the Americans appeared very bad that night, a large number of them being on shore until near daylight. Next day about 9 o'clock, we hoisted our ensign, which caused great hissing on board the Schooner Mary Hall, of Gloucester, United States; a few minutes after, they hoisted an old handkerchief to their main-top, out of contempt to our colours.

Some of the Inhabitants of New London complained very much of the conduct of many of the American fishermen; they represent them as being very mischievous when they are on shore, particularly when they get liquor. We were informed by James Pigeon, Esq. that a party of them in September last, at a late hour in the night attacked the house of a widow woman (Mrs. Cole) in that vicinity; they forced in the door, broke the windows, and done other damage in the house. Mrs. Cole and her daughters took refuge up stairs, where they defended themselves with an axe until they left. They also filled her well with sheaves of grain, and committed other depredations upon the premises.

We were informed upon good authority, that the American Schooner Identus, of Gloucester, kept with the fleet all summer, having on board a large quantity of liquor, which they sold to the fishermen when lying in Port, but we saw nothing of her.

We beg leave to direct Your Excellency's attention to the collection of the Anchorage duty at the several Out Ports. The American fishing vessels anchor in great numbers in our Harbours during summer, particularly on the North side of the Island, and it appears to us that but few of them pay the anchorage duty to which they are liable. This we believe to be partly owing to the want of vigilance in many of the Officers collecting those duties. For we saw an instance of it at New London. The Harbour Master applied to us for assistance, to enforce the payment of the anchorage duty from some of the vessels there, he told us that he offered to compromise with them, and take whatever amount they might choose to

pay, and he would give them receipts in full, but they gave him no satisfaction. We directed him to a Magistrate, to take legal proceedings against them and we would assist him to enforce the Law, but that he would not do; we therefore declined getting ourselves into a row with the Yankees on his account.

We were told by some of his neighbours, that he was in the habit of taking goods from the Americans in lieu of specie, as payment of the anchorage duty. But this we have no proof of, as nothing of the kind came under our notice. However such statements agree with the report made by some of the American fishermen a few years ago to their own Government; for we find in the Journals of the House of Assembly, for the year 1853, page 120, where the Lieutenant Governor in his speech at the prorogation of the Legislature, read a note which he received from Washington, respecting the anchorage duty, to which we refer Your Excellency.

In looking over the Public accounts, we find that for the last few years the Harbour and Coast expenditure, has been much greater than the Light and Anchorage duty collected, particularly along the North side of the Island. Take for instance, the Port of Cascumpec, where for the year ending January 1853, the Harbour expenditure was only £12 11s., and the Light and Anchorage duty amounted to £121 14s. 10d.; this we believe to be caused by Her Majesty's Steamers being cruising among the American fishermen during the summer of 1852. But since then, whilst free access to the fishing Coast, and sufficient Light Houses, have increased the recourse of the American fishing vessels, to that and other Ports, almost two-fold, the Light and Anchorage duty received has been inadequate to the expenditure.

From what observations we were able to make, it is our opinion that no less than Twelve Hundred sail of American fishermen visited our Harbours last summer, and take the fleet on an average, their Anchorage duty would amount to 40 shillings each, which if they all paid would make us a large increase of revenue. When a few of them are in a Harbour with a prevailing wind against them they may pay without much trouble. But when they get in, in large numbers as they often do, of from 30 to 300 sail, they set all authority at defiance, and we believe, that nothing but coercive measures will ever cause them all to pay the Port charges.

The Buoys and Beacons at Tracadie Harbour, were in a very inefficient state when we were there; we directed the attention of the Harbour Master to them. He complained of having received but very little anchorage duty for the season, the American fishermen in general giving him no satisfaction.

The laying up of the Schooner *Elirt*, at East Point, and the seizure of the Schooner *Challenge* at Souris, for a violation of the Revenue Laws, has already come under Your Excellency's notice, and we beg leave to acknowledge our thanks to Your Excellency for the manner in which that matter was settled.

It is our opinion that smuggling is carried on to a greater extent around the Island than Your Excellency can anticipate, particularly along the Eastern coast. There are a number of petty Merchants, who with many of the farmers, continue a regular trade to St. Pierre's and the United States; they always have vessels at their command, they generally find a good market at those Places for their cattle and produce, and they fetch back large quantities of liquor and other dutiable goods, which they land along the coast in the night, and if they apprehend any danger through landing it from their own vessels, they have the American fishing vessels, and the fishing boats belonging to the coast, to receive it from them, and they can always manage to land it without any suspicion—whilst the vessel that brought it runs away to a Harbour, and the Master reports at the Custom House, either in ballast, or having a trifle of merchandise on board,—and when they get

it landed they secrete, it in such a manner that it is impossible to detect it, for the people in general are inclined to support an illicit trade.

By carefully considering the many advantages they have of carrying on an illicit trade, it is our opinion that the only way to prevent violations of the Revenue Laws, is by fitting out a good vessel, of not less than sixty tons burden, well manned and equipped, with sufficient boats to board vessels at any time ; to cruise around the Island, and prevent all coasting, fishing and other vessels and boats, from illegally landing goods on the coast ; also, to assist the Harbour Masters at the several Out Ports, in enforcing the payment of the Anchorage duty, by the American fishing vessels.

This we submit for Your Excellency's consideration, and should Your Excellency not think fit, to put a larger vessel, on the coast service next spring, the Schooner Flirt, could be fitted out again ; she might be a check to smuggling in the summer season, but she is by far too small to accomplish the object desired.

SIR,—I have to acknowledge your Despatches of the numbers and dates specified in the margin [No. 8, 7th Feb., 1857; No. 11, 3d March, 1857; No. 12, 4th March, 1857; No. 13, 5th March, 1857.]

When Her Majesty's Government entered into the Convention with that of France, which has formed the occasion of that correspondence, they did so in the hope of bringing to a satisfactory arrangement the many complicated and difficult questions which have arisen between the two countries on the subject of the Newfoundland Fisheries. But they did so with the full intention of adhering to two principles which have guided them, and will continue to guide them; namely, that the rights at present enjoyed by the community of Newfoundland are not to be ceded or exchanged without their assent, and that the constitutional mode of submitting measures for that assent is by laying them before the Colonial Legislature. For this reason, they pursued the same form of proceeding which had been before pursued

in the case of the Reciprocity Convention with the United States, and which was, in that case, adopted and acted upon by the Newfoundland Legislatnre. It was in perfect uniformity with the same précédent that it appeared necessary in the present instance to add a condition respecting Parliamentary enactment, in order that, if necessary, any existing obstacles to the arrangement in the series of Imperial statutes might be subsequently removed.

The proposals contained in the Convention having been now unequivocally refused by the Colony, they will, of course,

fall to the ground. And you are authorized to give such assurance as you may think proper, that the consent of the community of Newfoundland is regarded by Her Majesty's Government as the essential preliminary to any modification of their territorial or maritime rights.

SIR, — Referring to your letter of the 21st May, transmitting Copy of a

Despatch from the Governor of Prince Edward Island, enclosing a Report of the Committee of the House of Assembly on the subject of collecting the tolls for the Lighthouse on Cape Race, and the erection of Lighthouses on North Cape and East Point, I am directed by the Lords of the Committee of Privy Council for Trade, to request that you will call the attention of Mr. Secretary Labouchere to that portion of the Report which proposes that the collection of the tolls for Cape Race Lighthouse, so far as the Trade of Prince Edward Island is concerned, both as regards outward and inward bound vessels, should be left with the Ports of the United Kingdom and Newfoundland respectively.

My Lords direct me to observe that it appears highly desirable that an uniform system should be adopted for the collection of the tolls for Cape Race Lighthouse; and that the Colony of Prince Edward Island should adopt the mode proposed for the other British North American Colonies, viz: that the tolls should be collected at the port of clearance before the ship clears on her outward voyage; and in case of ships arriving, that the toll should be demanded, unless a receipt is produced shewing that the toll for the voyage has been paid for at the port from which the ship had cleared.

A quarterly account should also be rendered to this Department from the Colony of Prince Edward Island of the

amount of tolls received in that Colony, with the particulars of the vessels which have paid the toll. A supply of forms for this purpose will be forwarded to the Colonial Office in a few days, for transmission to the Colony. Five per cent. will be allowed to defray the cost of collection; and the balance should be remitted as soon as possible after the expiration of the quarter, to Her Majesty's Paymaster General, to be placed to the credit of the Board of Trade.

As regards the proposed Lighthouses on North Cape and East Point of Prince Edward Island, my Lords direct me to observe that, until the views of the other British North American Colonies respecting the erection and maintenance of these Lighthouses have been ascertained, and the information relating to the sites, &c., furnished, as requested in the letter from this Department of the 4th of October last, their Lordships think it better to postpone the consideration of the subject.

My Lords request that you will move Mr. Labouchere to have the goodness to cause the Governor to be informed of the contents of this letter, and to be furnished with the Order in Council (copy of which is enclosed) authorizing the levying of the dues in question.

SIR,—Referring to your Despatch of the 31st August, No. 26, transmitting for my information and guidance copy of a letter from the Lords of the Committee of Privy Council for Trade, regarding the

collection of the tolls for Cape Race Light, I have the honor of informing you that further legislation will be necessary in order to comply with the desire of their Lordships that those dues may be collected at the ports of clearance in this Island, and that an Act will be introduced at the next Session of the local Legislature to accomplish that object.

With reference to the proposed Lighthouses on East Point and North Cape, if their Lordships should entertain the subject, I shall be prepared to furnish the particulars detailed in the memorandum concerning Lighthouses, which accompanied the Secretary of State's "Circular" Despatch of the 6th September, 1855, but I have been unable to ascertain the views of the other British North American Colonies respecting their erection and maintenance.

The opinion of Admiral Bayfield on this subject, in which I fully concur, I beg leave to quote for their Lordships' information, from a communication which I recently received from that officer: "Both of these proposed Lights would be extremely useful, the Light on East Point especially so, to the numerous vessels passing to and from the Gut of Canso, as well as to and from the ports in the Strait of Northumberland, including those of this Island.

"The Light on the North Point, besides warning vessels of their approach to the dangerous reef off it, would be of great service to vessels bound to and from Miramichi, and the other ports of New Brunswick within the Strait of Northumberland.

SIR;

The Draft Bill relating to the "Fishery Reserves," which I have the honor of transmitting to you herewith, accompanied by the Report of the Attorney General thereon, has been prepared with a view to meeting the most pressing source of discontent which this long-pending question has occasioned, and which has reached such a point as to render some action indispensable, in order to obviate the necessity of much vexatious litigation.

I am not aware that I can add anything to the Attorney General's Report, which would more clearly explain the objects of this measure.

I have readily assented to the desire of my Council that I would submit this Draft Bill for your consideration, rather than incur the risk of its being found to be objectionable at a later stage, when its discussion in the local Legislature, where it would doubtless be received with favor, would render the ultimate failure of the measure a source of increased discontent.

The measure which you have recently been pleased to sanction will, I trust, ensure the final extinction of the Land Question difficulties, and if the proposed Bill should be deemed to be unobjectionable in point of principle, another fruitful source of discontent would be removed,

and the general question of the "Fishery Reserves" would be deprived of its most injurious feature.

As the subject of the Bill cannot fail to engage the attention of the Legislative Assembly, in some shape, during the approaching Session, I venture to express a hope that you may find it convenient to honor me with an early intimation of your pleasure regarding it.

SIR;

The Draft Bill now enclosed, intituled "A Bill relating to the Fishery Reserves," has been prepared with the view, through Your Excellency, of submitting it to Her Majesty's Government for their consideration, previous to its introduction into the local Legislature of this Island.

APPENDIX (N.)

It appears to be unnecessary on the present occasion to enter into any lengthened statement respecting the "Fishery Reserves" of this Island, and the many disputes and discussions of which they have been the subject, from the date of the first grants of the Township Lands in this Island, (A.D. 1769), down to the present time. The Colonial Office in London is already in possession of the fullest information respecting them, and the modes in which they were reserved.

The present Bill recites the fact that, in the Original Grants of a large number of the Township Lands in this Island, certain parts of them fronting on the coast were reserved to the Crown; on reference to these Grants it will be found that the reservations referred to were made in the following words (after making a general grant of the whole Township):

"And further saving and reserving for the disposal of His Majesty, His Heirs and Successors, five hundred feet from Highwater mark on the coast of the Tract of Land hereby granted, to erect stages and other necessary buildings for carrying on the Fishery."

Sir Frederick Pollock and Sir William Follett, in 1843, gave it as their opinion that the Fee simple of the Land reserved were retained in the Crown, and I am not aware that the soundness of that opinion has ever been or can be impugned; notwithstanding the before mentioned reservations, it appears that the Proprietors and owners of Lands adjoining the Lands so reserved, have, in many instances, exercised ownership over, and occupied the "Reserves," as if they had been actually granted away by the Crown, together with the adjoining Lands; and in many instances, as the Bill states, Leases have been granted of portions of the "Reserves" along with the adjoining Lands, and Rent has been and still continues to be exacted for the "Reserves" under such Leases, although the right and title to

them is undoubtedly in the Crown, to whom alone any payments, in respect of use or occupation, ought of right to be made. Such being the case, and the Government now contemplating taking steps to recover possession of the "Reserves" so leased, it is urged that a measure, discharging tenants from the payment of so much of the Rent reserved by their Leases as arises and accrues in respect of "Fishery Reserves" Land, is just and expedient. Without such an Act there appears to be little doubt but that the strict and long-established rule of Law, that a tenant is estopped from controverting the title of the Landlord from whom he took his Lease or received possession, would operate; and thus, whether the Landlord was really entitled to the land or not, the tenant would be bound to pay the rent to him, until the Crown, by course of Law, should recover possession of the "Reserves," or the Landlord should voluntarily surrender them.

The observance of this rule would necessarily drive the Government to numerous actions to recover possession of the "Reserves," held in numerous subdivisions by different tenants; and it is thought that the passing of an Act allowing the tenant himself to claim discharge from payment of Rent for lands, being actually "Fishery Reserves," would expedite the settlement of the disputed rights respecting them, and also enable the Government, in the majority of cases in which they assert the right of the Crown to the "Reserve," to do so without damaging the material interests of the Tenant, so far as regards his liability to pay Rent, or to forfeit his holding on account of controverting the title of his Landlord.

The above appears to state, as nearly as possible, the object of the contemplated Bill, which accordingly prohibits any person, unless by license of the Government, from taking possession of or demanding Rent for the "Fishery Reserves," and discharges the Tenants from paying Rent

for such Lands, providing also that a Landlord shall only be entitled to recover Rent for so much of the Lands leased as do not come under the denomination of "Fishery Reserves." The Bill also ordains that nothing contained in it shall interfere with the existing right of the Crown to the "Reserves."

It is proposed to submit the Act to the Legislature, if it receives the approbation of the Imperial Government.

This Act is intended to apply to those Townships [see list marked A appended] where the soil of the Lands reserved is reserved to the Crown by similar words to those set forth in the First Page of this Letter.

Report of the Medical Superintendent Lunatic Asylum.

JANUARY 31st, 1858.

GENTLEMEN ;

I have the honor of submitting for your inspection my Eighth Annual Report, comprising the Medical Statistics of the Lunatic Asylum, with the admissions, discharges, and remedial results on the patients under treatment, during the last twelve months.

On examining the details of the accompanying statistical chart you will observe that the total number of Lunatics treated during the past year amounts to 31.

Of these 19 remained in the House at last Report, the greater number being chronic cases of long standing, and adjudged incurable.

Of the total number of cases admitted since Feb. 23d, 1856, amounting to 17, and which are comparatively recent cases, 9 have recovered, being nearly 60 per cent.—a large proportion, which many Asylums, with ampler endowment and more efficient appliances, have failed to exceed.

The total number of recoveries since last Report amount to 10 ; those much improved to 9 ; improved, 5 ; not improved, 7.

Among the Lunatics 2 deaths have occurred—one from Bronchitis, another apparently from old age ; and 11 have been discharged.

The number of Paupers remaining at last Report amounted to 10. Since which time 6 have been admitted, and three discharged ; one of whom absconded after recovery, and two have died—one from apoplexy, and the other from disease of the heart. Remaining, 16.

I again beg to direct the attention of your Board to the Heating of the Building. The brick-stoves have been found quite inadequate for diffusing the heat over more than one room ; the pipes even never exceed the blood heat, and the fuel is therefore unnecessarily expended without effecting the purpose required.

I trust that some more efficient means may be adopted before next winter, as I frequently had serious apprehensions for the safety of the patients confined in the solitary rooms during the late severe weather.

Despatches and Enclosures from the Lieutenant Governor of Prince Edward Island, to the Secretary of State, in relation to the Barracks and Arms, with the replies thereto.

MILITARY.

(COPY.)

GOVERNMENT HOUSE,
Prince Edward Island,
27th July, 1857.

SIR,—The whole of the Arms, Military Stores, and Barrack Furniture, having been removed from this station, with the exception of the small supply appropriated to the use of the Volunteer Militia Corps in progress of formation, I have the honor to submit that the time has arrived when the arrangement sanctioned by Sir George Grey's Despatch of the 14th November, 1854 [No. 11] may be carried into effect with mutual advantage to Imperial and Colonial interests, by placing the Barracks in the possession of the local Government.

They are at present in the charge of a retired non-commissioned officer, in the pay of the War Department, and they are occupied by the small provincial guard of Pensioners for Government House, commanded by a Sergeant, who is also in charge of the signal station within the Barrack enclosure.

I have had the Barracks inspected by the Superintendent of Public Works, and as some considerable outlay is necessary to their preservation, as appears from the Report of that officer, copy of which I have the honor to inclose, the local Gov-

ernment, in undertaking to keep the Buildings in repair, would naturally expect to receive them in good order.

The premises are necessary to the local Government for the purposes I have already named, as well as for the safe keeping of the Arms and Ammunition in its possession, for the exercise and training of the Volunteer Militia Corps, and for the reception of any portion of the Militia Force by which, on an emergency, it might be desirable that they should be occupied.

I may further add that the Powder Magazine on the premises, which is in a very dilapidated condition, is the only place in which importations of that article by the mercantile community can, according to law, be deposited, with due regard to the public safety.

As the season is rapidly passing in which repairs of the nature required can best be effected, I trust that I may be honored with an early intimation of the pleasure of Her Majesty's Government in reference to this matter.

EXTRACT FROM MINUTES OF
EXECUTIVE COUNCIL.

COUNCIL CHAMBER,
11th July, 1857.

At a Meeting of Council,

PRESENT :

His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor,
&c., &c., &c.

His Excellency having called the attention of the Council to a Despatch which had been received from Sir George Grey, dated 14th October, 1854, authorizing His Excellency to take possession of the Barracks for the use of the Government of Prince Edward Island; and the Superintendent of Public Works having been directed to make a survey, and report on the state of the Buildings and premises hitherto used and occupied by Her Majesty's Troops, he accordingly made a Survey, and reported as follows, viz :

“ That, having examined the different Buildings and apartments, he found the Officers' quarters habitable, and some parts of them, what might be termed comfortable; that they, however, require some repairs, and that, in his opinion, the sum of £150 would put these quarters in very good repair.

“ That the Soldiers' Barracks are very much dilapidated, and out of repair; the whole of the roof requires to be newly shingled, and that about £500, carefully expended, would put them in good permanent repair. That the Magazine is such only in name, and requires to be rebuilt throughout.

“ That the Ordnance Storehouses are in middling repair, but all require a little doing to them—about £50 would repair all of them; and about £50 would rebuild the Magazine out of the old materials. That the fences also require repairs in several places, and that it will cost at least twenty-five pounds (£25) to repair them thoroughly.”

The Board were of opinion that as the Stores have been removed, and only a retired non-commissioned Officer left in charge, His Excellency be requested to

communicate to Her Majesty's Government the readiness of this Government to take charge of the Barracks, Out-houses, Magazine and Grounds, in accordance with the Despatch from Sir George Grey; and that His Excellency be also requested to transmit a Copy of the Report of the Superintendent of Public Works to the Secretary of State.

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR EXCELLENCY,

In obedience to Your Excellency's directions, conveyed to me by the Colonial Secretary, requiring me to make a Survey, and report on the state of the Buildings and premises hitherto used and occupied by Her Majesty's Troops, commonly called the Garrison or Barracks.

I yesterday examined the different Buildings and apartments, and found them as follows:

The Officers' quarters are all habitable, and some parts of them are even what might be termed, comfortable; they require some repairs, however. The doors and door locks are generally out of order, the cellar kitchens also require to be repaired, and something should be done to the spouts or gutters and conductors. I am of opinion that £150 would put these quarters in very good repair.

The Soldiers' Barracks are very much dilapidated and out of repair; the whole of the roof requires to be newly shingled; they also require new sills and new lower joists, in fact, a new lower floor; besides the doors, &c., all of which require repairs more or less. About £500, carefully expended, would put them in good permanent repair.

The Magazine is such only in name, and requires to be rebuilt throughout.

The Ordnance Storehouses are in middling repair, but all require a little doing to them; about £50 would repair all of them, and about £50 would rebuild the

Magazine out of the old materials.

The fences also require repairs in several places, and it would cost at least £25 to repair them thoroughly.

SIR,—I have to acknowledge your Despatch of the 27th July last, in which you submit that the time has now arrived when the transfer of the barracks to the local Government, under Sir George Grey's despatch of the 14th October 1854, had better take place. You add a report from the Superintendent of Public Works, which appears to show that a considerable outlay (not less, as I infer, than seven or eight hundred pounds) is required to put them in repair, and you add, the local "Government will naturally expect to receive them in good order."

In answer, I must refer you to the correspondence which took place in 1854. In your Despatch of September 11th of that year, you stated that the barracks "were in fair habitable repair considering the materials of which they were constructed, and the deterioration which wooden buildings must undergo in fifty years, and that you did not imagine that there would be much difficulty in obtaining the sanction of the Legislature to an agreement with the Imperial authorities, by which the former would be bound to keep the barracks in repair, if the Colony should be permitted to have the use of them." You then gave no intimation of the necessity of first putting them into a state of repair. It was on receiving this intimation from yourself that Sir George

Grey authorized you to take possession of the Barracks, "on the understanding that the local Government would engage to keep them in repair."

Her Majesty's Government cannot now import a new condition into the agreement then made, or undertake a charge of which they had at that time no notice. They cannot therefore impose on the Treasury of this Country any expenditure for placing these buildings in repair before they are transferred to the Colonial Government.

SIR,—Having communicated your Despatch of the 17th Sept., No. 27, to my Council, with a view to obtaining some definite expression of their views in regard to the Barracks at this place, I regret to find that they do not consider that they would be sustained by the local Legislature in undertaking the repairs and maintenance of the Buildings under present circumstances.

I have the honor of transmitting herewith a Copy of the Council's Report to me on the subject, and unless Her Majesty's Government should see fit to transfer the premises to the Colony either permanently or for a term of years, subject only to the conditions that they shall not be sub-let, or applied to purposes unconnected with the defence of the Colony, I know not what other course to suggest.

It is evident that if left in their present condition the buildings must rapidly go to ruin, and I incline to the opinion that provision would be made for their repair

and maintenance if the interest of the local Government in them were defined, as the premises could be of value to the Colony only whilst kept in reasonable repair.

The very slow progress which the enrollment of Volunteer Corps has made here, and the apathy of this Community in regard to all that relates to the organization and training of a Militia force of any kind, lead me to apprehend that the letting of the Barracks as advertized by the Engineer Department in the Royal Gazette of this Island may occasion a total cessation of action in respect to the Volunteer Militia training which I have used my best exertions to promote, but hitherto, I regret to say, with very limited success.

Report of the Committee of the Executive Council, to whom was referred the Despatch of the Right Honorable H. Labouchere, on the subject of the Transfer of the Barracks to the Local Government—approved by His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, in Council, on the 19th November, 1857.

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR EXCELLENCY,

The Committee of the Executive Council to whom was referred the Despatch of the Right Honorable H. Labouchere, dated 17th September, 1857, in reply to your Excellency's Despatch of the 24th July last, on the subject of the transfer of the Barracks to the local Government, which pointed out that certain repairs were required in them, as shewn by the Report of the Superintendent of Public Works, and which report, Mr. Labouchere appears to deem inconsistent with the statement contained in your Excellency's previous Despatch of the 14th September,

1854, that the Barrack's "were in fair tenantable repair, considering the materials of which they were constructed, and the deterioration which wooden buildings must undergo in Fifty Years, and that you did not imagine there would be much difficulty in obtaining the sanction of the Legislature to an agreement with the Imperial Authorities, by which the former would be bound to keep the Barracks in repair, if the Colony should be permitted to have the use of them"—Have to report for your Excellency's information, that at the date of the Despatch last referred to, the Barracks were in fair tenantable repair, but during the three years which have since elapsed, no attention appears to have been paid to keeping them in repair by Her Majesty's Officer in charge; and the local Government having had no control over them, they are now, as all old wooden buildings must be, when not properly attended to, gone considerably to decay, as have also the fences and Buildings connected with them. In the estimate of repairs needed, the Superintendent of Public Works has included a sum to repair and rebuild the Magazine, which is unsafe, and besides, being improperly constructed, is now much injured by the frost. Even at the present time, an Officer is in charge of the Barracks and grounds, who is in no way responsible to the local Government.

Your Committee would further remark, that at the time the local Government was called upon to undertake the expense of their own protection, when Her Majesty's Government decided upon withdrawing the small force of Her Majesty's Troops then on this Island, they offered to take charge of the Barracks, with the understanding, as expressed in the minute of Council, dated 25th January, 1855, that the Arms and Stores were to be left as they then were for the use of the Colony, but nearly the whole of them have since been removed by the Military Authorities, to Halifax,—whilst the new Arms therein referred to, have been subsequently supplied. The Government being desirous of meeting the exigencies of the case, then recommended to the Legislature to pro-

vide sufficient means for an armed force, but were unable to carry out their views in that respect, as the Act submitted by them for that purpose did not meet with the approval of Her Majesty's Government.

Your Committee are therefore of opinion, looking at the removal of the Arms and Stores, as above mentioned, that the Barracks have never ceased to be in charge of Imperial Officers, and that the local Government are not in possession of sufficient funds, at present, applicable to such purposes; that unless the Grounds and old Barrack Buildings are made over absolutely to them, or for a term of years certain, they cannot advise the great expenditure required, under the circumstances proposed, whereby the Grounds and Barracks would be liable to be taken away at any time, after being put in repair.

Sir,—

I have received and laid before Lord Panmure your letter of the 30th ultimo, enclosing the copy of a correspondence with the Lieutenant Governor of Prince Edward Island, from which it appears that the local Government is unwilling to undertake the repair and maintenance of the Barracks in that Colony, "unless the Grounds and Buildings are made over absolutely or for a term of years certain."

Lord Panmure desires me to request that you will acquaint Mr. Secretary Labouchere that he cannot sanction any expenditure being incurred in the repair of Barracks, no longer in the occupation of Her Majesty's Troops; neither is he disposed to allow of their being unconditionally surrendered to the Colonial Government, as in the event of its being found necessary again to station Troops in Prince Edward Island, these Buildings will be required for their accommodation.

If, therefore, the local Government is unwilling to take over the property on the conditions originally proposed by the Governor, and agreed to by Lord Panmure, subject—namely, to the Buildings being maintained at the expense of the Colony "for the accommodation of such protective Force as may hereafter be established in it," they must be let on the best terms that can be obtained. His Lordship would suggest that the Lieutenant Governor should be so informed, and at the same time instructed to lose no time in acquainting the Major General Commanding with the final determination of the local Government respecting the Buildings in question, in order to avoid the injury which must be occasioned by longer delaying necessary repairs.

Lord Panmure regrets to observe from these papers that so little has yet been done towards the organization of an efficient Volunteer Force in Prince Edward Island. Lord Panmure is not aware of

the reasons which led to the disallowance of the Militia Act, to which the Council in their Minute refer. But Mr. Labouchere will remember that when the Troops were withdrawn from the Island, Her Majesty's Government, with a view to encouraging the formation of a Volunteer Force, allowed the local authorities to select any articles then in store which could be of use to them, and subsequently, at their request, sent out new arms and gave them entire use of the entire Barrack Furniture. It is not, therefore, from any want of liberality on the part of Her Majesty's Government that the progress of enrollment has been so slow; and His Lordship can only attribute it to the cause assigned by the Lieutenant Governor, namely, "the apathy of the community in all that relates to the organization of a Militia." If, however, there is no prospect of an efficient Force being speed-

ily raised, Lord Panmure conceives that the object with which the arms and stores were granted not having been attained, they should be returned to the Military authorities, with a view to their being brought away or sold. But before coming to any final decision on this matter, His Lordship would wish to be furnished with a report from the Lieutenant Governor, showing the numbers of which the Militia is at present composed, the state of discipline into which they have been brought, and whether any good grounds exist for supposing that active steps will be taken for increasing the efficiency of the Force.

Report of Theophilus Stewart, Indian Commissioner, regarding Indians.

CHARLOTTETOWN, 22d February, 1858.

SIR,—In compliance with the requisition of the law on the subject, I have now the honor to forward herewith to your Excellency my separate account, as Indian Commissioner, of Disbursements on behalf of certain sick and indigent Indians, for the past year. My brother Commissioner, Mr H. Palmer, choosing to render a separate account of his Disbursements instead of having them blended into one, as had been previously done; any inconvenience found resulting from this division of Accounts, will therefore not be laid to my charge; the account disclosing an excess of expenditure over that of the preceding year, will naturally require explanation. I may first observe that the result of the operations of the previous year on the ground obtained from the respective Officers of the Ordnance Department, being such as to encourage similar efforts the succeeding spring, the same families were furnished with the necessary seed by Mr. Palmer, who assumed this part of the business, while I assumed the part of seeing them supplied with provisions. As a preparatory step, in consequence of the owner of the adjoining Farm refusing permission to cross his fields, after a long and continued exercise of the privilege, it became necessary to provide a means of communication between the plantation and the high or public road in the vicinity; to effect this object, a pathway or road had to be opened up through nearly a quarter of a mile of the same farm lying in its wilderness condition. Notwithstanding the extra labor thus thrown upon individual Indians, it is gratifying to have to state that the members of the different families embarked in the enterprise (old and young) were so zealous and energetic throughout the planting season, that the greater portion of an area of 10 acres (the escheat of the reserve) was brought under cultivation, and the result has been equally, if not more encouraging than that of the preceding year,—the aggregate yield being estimated at from five to six hundred bushels, among eleven families; three of these have green-housed eighty bushels. The time occupied in the process of preparing the soil and putting in the Potatoes, having been from one cause or another very much protracted, will serve to account for the large draught made on the provisions, which will be found to have absorbed a considerable portion of the grant. When the total destitution of the Indian, when withdrawn from his accustomed pursuits is considered, this will cease to occasion any surprise; it must also be considered as a self-evident proposition, that unless they had been so assisted, the work of planting would have fallen through. The excess of expenditure is to be further accounted for, by the fact, that a greater number of families have been furnished with Blankets, articles of Clothing, and Provisions, than during any preceding year; this partly resulted from the appearance of several of these families for the first time from the Western parts of the Island, in circumstances of great destitution; they remain encamped in different positions favorable to enable them to take advantage of the City as a market

for their manufactures, until the opening of the spring, when they will probably return to the westward. The cases of the families last referred to, or such of them as applied to me, were such as to appeal in very forcible terms to one's sympathies; they were not only destitute of food and clothing, but required the intervention of medicine and medical aid to make the former of use. I therefore, after a very mature consideration of all the circumstances, did not consider it right that these poor people should be allowed to perish when it was in my power to provide means to guard against such a calamity; and thus was induced to administer to their relief, thereby exercising a discretion which may reasonably be assumed as attaching to the appointment of Indian Commissioner, until the ultimate design of the Government towards that part of its population is or shall be carried out. That your Excellency and the other branches of the Legislature will vindicate the course I have adopted, does not admit of a doubt on my mind, nor that the necessary appropriation will be made to provide for the excess of expenditure resulting from the different causes referred to.

Report of Henry Palmer, Indian Commissioner, regarding Indians.

CHARLOTTETOWN, 11th March, 1858.

SIR ;—As one of the Indian Commissioners, I beg leave to lay before your Excellency a report of my proceedings within the last year, with an account of the expenditure of one moiety of the grant of the Legislature for the relief of indigent Indians ; having unfortunately invariably differed in opinion with my brother Commissioner respecting the amount we were justified in expending, conceiving we were in duty bound to keep within the limit of the amount the Legislature considered it expedient to grant for that purpose, I was under the necessity of informing Mr. Stewart that I would receive and expend one moiety of the sum granted, and that he would have to hold himself individually responsible to the Legislature for any amount he might think proper to expend over his moiety, as I would not sanction it.

My object has been for some time past to endeavor in every possible way to convince the Indians, that if they turned their attention to planting, they could make a living in a much better way than depending wholly on the sale of the articles they usually manufacture; as these articles are now imported in such quantities from the United States, the poor Indians feel the consequence very severely. Some of them appeared very willing to cultivate, but complained that they had not a foot of land they could call their own. I was aware of ten acres of land belonging to the Ordnance situate, on the East side of Charlottetown Harbor; that it was always a favorite spot of the Indians, and then laying as a wilderness; and I corresponded with the Board of Ordnance on the subject and finally, succeeded in getting possession of it

until required by the Board; and having accompanied the Surveyor General to the spot, he laid off the land, and I immediately set the Indians to work. They soon chopped it down, burnt off the wood, and afterwards fenced it round. I then supplied them with seed Potatoes, hoes, &c., and very nearly the whole piece of land was planted with Potatoes; and I never saw a finer crop,—some of them have stored enough to last them until the next crop, provided they have not rotted during the winter, which I rather dread. I was much gratified to hear from the oldest Inhabitant in Charlottetown (Samuel Nelson, Esq.) he had bought some Potatoes from an Indian, for the first time in his life! and they were the finest he had ever eaten. In accomplishing the foregoing, together with some small sums, given from time to time to some of the elder Indians when in distress, my moiety of the grant has been expended,—after deducting £7 2s. 6d., forwarded to the Rev. Mr. Perry, at Miscouch by request of Government, as will appear by the account annexed.

I trust the Indians have made a beginning, that will ultimately be attended with good results, several of them being now most anxious to obtain more land to enable them to put in larger crops.

I observe the different encampment, of Indians feel a desire to continue in the different parts of the Island they have hitherto been accustomed to reside, and unless some plots of ground could be obtained in their respective neighborhoods, it would be difficult to induce them to plant; they also require to be near the water.

REPORT OF THE VISITER OF SCHOOLS,

FOR THE YEAR ENDING FEBRUARY 1858.

TO THE BOARD OF EDUCATION.

Five years have nearly elapsed since the establishment of the present system of Free Education in Prince Edward Island.

In two years the schools and scholars had doubled, and they are now nearly thrice as numerous as in the last year of the old School Act. A system of education, improved both as to quality and quantity, is being worked out with some energy and zeal, and although not yet of the highest order as regards the former, has taken firm hold of the public mind; its course is decidedly onward—animates our hopes in the future. Perfect and general plans of education must, like all other things of human contrivance, arise gradually, and cannot, in a country where opinion is much divided, be all at once introduced without some opposition and distrust; yet, after the experience of the last few years, I believe that few—if any—individuals in the Colony will now be found to express a desire for the abolition of the existing system and a return to the former one. The diffusion of the elements of intelligence, by the instrumentality of our free schools, is a great process; the apathy and ignorance yet existing will, ere long, by this process, be penetrated and dispelled, and the unmeasured power and wealth of the intelligence so diffused will be added to the resources of the Colony.

The prevailing sentiment, with regard to the free school system, is favourable. It is looked upon as a wise system of moral police, to support which the property of all is rightfully taxed; still there is nothing eleemosynary in the character of these schools; they are open to every child, without being in reality or in appearance charitable. As the burden of taxation falls on the rich, the children of the poor get their education, when they could not, under other circumstances, obtain it at all.

Having been familiar, for some time, with the practical working of these schools, in which the children of all denominations are educated together, I am satisfied that they interfere in no way with the religious tenets of any denomination of Christians. Parents in our mixed population do

not look to the District Schools for the religious instruction of their children; they look at most for that general religious influence which may result from the recognition of the Creator and of his Word in the daily prayer and in the reading of the Scriptures with which many of the schools are opened.

There is one good and obvious result of the general system, that it tends to produce a sympathy and a harmony among communities, when the children of all attend together the same schools; a man cannot but feel a life-long kindness of heart towards one with whom—when both were boys—he sat upon the same bench and learned the same lessons.

During the nine months that I have held my present office, I have been engaged—with little intermission—in the discharge of its duties. In that time, I have visited every district in the Island, and several of the schools a second time, when on my first tour I found them temporarily closed, or in time of harvest so thinly attended that no satisfactory estimate could be made of their condition.

The total number of free schools in operation, during the past year, is 254, attended by 11,210 scholars, being less by 1,010 pupils than the number reported as in attendance in the previous year. Several schools have been closed for want of the average attendance required by law; but the Act does not preclude the re-opening of these so soon as parents become alive to their true interests, by sending their children more regularly than heretofore, except in those districts where the requisite number of scholars are not to be found; and such cases only prove that, in the unreasonable desire of individuals to get districts subdivided for their own greater convenience, the Board have been imposed on by incorrect returns of numbers and ages; but a corrective to this imposition will be found in the strict enforcement of the provision relating to average attendance. So utterly selfish are some parties, and so indifferent to the burden entailed on the public funds by the unnecessary multiplication of schools, as to be regardless of every consideration but that of establishing a school at their own doors. Further reference to attendance will be found below.

Schools supported at an annual cost to the public funds of about £13,000; add to this the expense of the higher institutions—the Central Academy and the Normal School—together with the expense connected with the administration of the system and the total yearly amount paid out of a general revenue of £41,000, will closely approximate to £14,000. The majority of teachers receive besides £10 to £15 a year from parents, in aid of, or as an equivalent for their board; this gives £2500 in the shape of additional salaries. It may be assumed that £500 at least are annually contributed to private schools in and about Charlottetown; and it becomes certain that a sum amounting to seventeen thousand pounds was raised last year, from all sources, for the support of education, in a population of 72,000, in Prince Edward Island. Large as this expenditure is, the teachers are far from being overpaid. Many persons of all parties have expressed to me their readiness to submit to an increased general assessment, in order to augment salaries, and so abolish the practice of subscriptions for board, which now fall unequally and partially on individuals.

The fixing of a scale of salaries proportionate to success in teaching, combined with length of service, would be an improvement on the system. As the case now is, the veteran of forty years continuous service, who has taught with credit two or three generations, receives no more remuneration than the young person of seventeen who obtained his license yesterday. And above all, the time has arrived to commence the formation of a fund as a retiring provision for aged and infirm or disabled teachers, in some proportion to length of service in this Island. This scheme will have a tendency also to induce young men to adopt the business of teaching as a permanent profession, and will avert the harassing cares and anxiety which must naturally weigh down men of limited incomes, at the prospect of being overtaken—when their strength is exhausted and their faculties impaired—by poverty or disease, and leaving helpless families perhaps homeless and destitute.

Under the Education Act of Canada, such a provision, called the "superannuated common school teachers' fund," is established, the law providing "that no teacher shall be entitled to share therein who shall not contribute to such a fund at least at the rate of one pound per annum," and all doing so can avail themselves at a future time of its advantages. From a return made to the Education Office of that Province,

of numerous pensioners on the fund, I subjoin an extract of a few cases to illustrate the scheme, shewing the proportion paid out of the public funds to the sums paid in by individuals:

Attendance. Too much indifference exists, both in town and country, as to the early and regular attendance of children. The success of the instruction given depends on it; and the early formation of habits of punctuality is also of great importance. Irregular attendance may be traced to three different sources—the children, the parents and the teacher. The first are the party least to be blamed; a love of knowledge is inherent in them, and when they are careless about school, it is traceable to the repulsive mode of treatment in it, and undue severity on the part of the teacher. In the hours of opening and closing, as well as in all their arrangements, teachers must be exact themselves, or they cannot expect punctuality from their children. On the subject of school attendance, a recent writer observes—"I would at once say, in most cases, the fault must be in the school; it presents a new era in education, I am aware, to blame the teacher,—but it is one of the discoveries that modern education has made, and it is a true one."

This must be taken, with some qualification, as applied to this agricultural country, where the necessities of the parents too often keep the children at home in spring and harvest, and where the severity of an early winter finds them unprepared to go out, for want of suitable clothing. As many parents do not appreciate education, nor the teacher's labours and nature of his duties, it would be well for the latter to visit such frequently, to press upon them the necessity of co-operation, and invite them to visit the school. All this will not occupy much extra time; part of every alternate Saturday—which is a holiday—will suffice. All the parents of absentees might thus be seen once a fortnight, and the whole of the parents once a month; and I feel assured the best results would follow. Let parents, too, be once convinced that those who remain longest at school turn out the best, and fill, with most credit, the highest stations in society, they would not withdraw their children from school at so early an age as they now do. On a comparison of the school registers, the average for the year is found to be one-half the number on the roll, taking one school with another. It would appear, too, that the more remote the schools the higher the attendance; take, as an example, the school at North Cape or Nail Pond, Lot One, where every child on the roll was present on the day of examination, and the daily attendance appeared almost as good throughout.

A teacher at Lot No. 45 fell on a successful expedient to secure a good attendance, by obliging the parents, under a penal bond in a sum equal to his government salary, to keep up the daily standard of attendance,—an example worthy of imitation by all teachers, and a plan which in a free country

would be the best substitute for the system of coercion practised by certain of the governments of Europe, where a penalty is imposed on all parents withholding their children from school, and where none are allowed to marry unless able to read and write.

Schoolhouses. Several spacious and well finished framed buildings have been erected in the past year—one at Upper Tryon costing over one hundred pounds,—one of the good results of free education, which, by relieving inhabitants of the burden of supporting their teacher, as heretofore, leaves them greater means to improve the condition of their schoolhouses; still too many decayed and unfinished buildings, sadly deficient of accommodation and furniture, where little ones sit shivering in winter around a broken stove or before a dilapidated chimney, stand by many a way side, and on which they often encroach. The neglect of trustees and building committees is reprehensible in not providing suitable retreats where the shrinking delicacy of children may retire from the open thoroughfare. Several schools have no ground attached whereon to deposit their firewood even. Young teachers might agreeably and usefully employ themselves and scholars, for an afternoon or two, at the proper season, in planting a hedge of young trees around their seminaries, for the purpose of sheltering as well as ornamenting the premises. In my next, I shall make a presentment to the Board of all such schoolhouses as are indisputably "insufficient," in the meaning of the Act, and shall recommend the propriety of withholding the public money in every such case.

The small grant, under the Act, to aid new and poor settlements in the erection of schoolhouses, is a great boon. I have recommended this grant in four instances to this date, viz: to the Settlements of Tryon (rear), on Lot 27, Millvale, Surrey on Lot 58, and Toronto on Lot 64.

Ventilation is not properly attended to. It is a mistaken idea that ventilation is not required in cold as well as in warm weather. Were this sufficiently looked to, teachers would suffer less from headache and children from lassitude. Children breathe more quickly by about one-third than grown persons; a child under eight years of age will render impure nearly three cubic feet of air in a minute. Take, for example, a school-room 20 feet square by 9 feet high, containing forty children, it will give about 90 cubic feet of air for each child. Were there no ventilation, this stock would be exhausted in 30 minutes; but long before this limit is reached the air of the room becomes unwholesome, the oxygen or life supporting part of it being absorbed into the blood, and a deleterious gas—carbonic acid—returned in its stead. On entering many schools last summer, I experienced a sense of suffocation; the children were languid and dispirited, and the teacher verging on a state of torpor.

An opening near the top of the room, having a sliding lid, is a simple and sufficient mode of ventilation. The top sashes of the window should also be let down, to allow the heated air to escape as it ascends. A cheap and simple apparatus—the invention of the present head master—may be seen at the Central Academy, by which contrivance the heated air is let off at the junction of the stove-pipe with the chimney flue, and a wholesome circulation of air maintained all day long.

Careful teachers will see to this point, as well as to the important one of sweeping and dusting daily, as also to white-washing once a year, for the best teaching will not remove the unfavourable feeling excited by a dirty or littered school-room.

Fuel. Several schools were found so destitute of fuel as to render it necessary for the children to be dismissed long before the hour, to prevent suffering from the effects of cold. In other places a stick or two was lying at the door, appar-

ently just hauled in, in anticipation of my visit. Again, it is often left to the bigger boys in rotation to make the morning fires, and want of punctuality is the consequence. In some instances the teacher himself undertakes that duty. The only satisfactory plan is for trustees to agree with one certain person to provide firing, and attend to the making of fires at least an hour before the school opens; an immense saving of time, in the aggregate, would result, when children at entering could be instantly warmed, and begin their work, instead of shivering until eleven or twelve o'clock, as at present, before they can open a book. It is not uncommon to find in the register columns marked, "No school, no fuel this day." This state of matters is discreditable, and as a corrective, it would be advisable for the Board to resolve on suspending the registration of any school dismissed or closed a second time in the same winter, for want of the necessary fuel.

NORMAL SCHOOL.

The fifth session for students in training at this institution has just closed. The total number entered since the commencement is 61, as shewn on the annexed roll; of these 42 have received license to teach. Although time sufficient has not been afforded to test the results of the engrafting of the Normal system on our common schools, yet it must strike even a cursory observer that schools taught by these Normal Teachers present a degree of order and a systematic arrangement of classes and lessons not generally found elsewhere; a discipline effective, without being too stringent, and a consequent absence of that confusion so fatal to the welfare of a school, joined to an economy of time, itself invaluable. In such schools every thing goes on—in common parlance—with the regularity of clockwork, and the simultaneous plan of instruction whereby the attention of all is excited and sustained through the "sympathy of numbers," is one of the most pleasing features of the system, and these teachers are generally preferred throughout the country.

Before the close of the first term of the Normal School no little dissatisfaction was manifested, and which still continues, arising out of a mistaken idea, on the part of many of the students, that their attendance during the three months' session, as prescribed by law, should suffice to complete their apprenticeship, as well as supply the requisite amount of scholarship demanded. Others of them again entertained the belief that the greatest facilities would be afforded them in the Normal School to prosecute the study of such branches as they imperfectly understood, and, at the end of their term, that they might reasonably reckon on passing the Board. Not a few were, in consequence, doomed to disappointment, having found that the brief period referred to did not suffice for the acquisition of any thing like a thorough knowledge of the art of teaching any more than it did for the learning of the necessary branches, and in which they should have been well skilled before entering the class at all.

On this head, Mr. Monk's report is also subjoined, and the remedy suggested by him is worthy the consideration of the Board and of the Government.

The Model School, in connection with the above, was opened in October, 1856. Of its success hitherto, I am not prepared to express a decided opinion. The master, however, in the subjoined report, declares his satisfaction at the proficiency of the pupils thus far. Professional gentlemen from other Provinces, who have visited the institution, have recorded in the visitor's book their approval of the system pursued; yet I think that more frequent public examinations should be held, and parents and guardians might more decidedly manifest their interest in the school by occasional visits. This would have a salutary effect upon both teachers and taught.

In the exercise of my duties as acting Visiter of the Public Schools of this Island, I beg to submit to the Board of Education the following list of schools examined by me, to the present date. Compared with the extent of country travelled and the time occupied, the amount of work performed in the way of inspection may appear but small; but in the remote parts of Prince County which I have visited, the schools are but sparsely planted, with miles of unbroken forest intervening. Nor has my time been solely taken up in the mere examination of schools. I have held various conferences with school trustees and other inhabitants interested, deeming it my duty to afford such, at whatever inconvenience to myself, opportunities of consulting on questions affecting the interests of their respective schools. The time and attention occupied in such business I consider as well bestowed, in saving the Board the necessity and trouble of investigating grievances which can be so much more promptly settled on the spot where they have arisen, and where fuller evidence can be procured, at so little cost to parties concerned. In conferring with trustees, opportunities are also afforded of explaining or interpreting the School Act, in points where confusion or misapprehension is apt to arise, from overlooking repealed sections or amendments of the law.

When my first inspection of all the schools shall have been completed, I shall be enabled to submit a general or condensed view of the state of Education in our Free Schools; meanwhile, I shall furnish monthly a schedule of all schools as visited, reporting on any extraordinary or special cases which may call for the interposition of the Board.

I enclose herewith the School Register of Mount Pleasant District, Lot 7, having directed the teacher to continue his entries of attendance in a new roll during the remaining six weeks of his term. The very unsatisfactory and incomplete manner in which his record has been kept, merits a severe rebuke from the Board; and it affords, I have reason to believe, but too true an index of the disorderly condition of the school itself. During the last fortnight an average of six children daily has attended out of forty-five on the roll. Saturday, the 13th of June, was the date of my visit. This register, as filled in by the teacher, makes the week to end on the 10th; the last attendance marks appear under the 9th, leaving three days altogether unaccounted for. Neither pen, ink nor paper, was to be found in the school, yet it has been more than ten months open, under the present teacher. How or where he contrives to mark the attendance at all, is a mystery not yet solved. At the meeting held, the trustees, who at first expressed their determination to withhold their certificate for salary, finally agreed to sign the necessary papers, solely on the consideration that they had omitted the duty of reporting their dissatisfaction sooner to the Board.

SEPTEMBER 12, 1857.

In continuation of my report of the 24th June, I beg to enclose a list of schools visited up to the present date. I may express my gratification at witnessing so many schools in active operation, for the most part efficiently and zealously conducted, and the majority aiming at a higher standard of instruction than was deemed needful, or even attainable, a few years since, in the rural districts. I am happy to be enabled to add, that—save in one instance—the greatest harmony and best understanding appear to exist, among all denominations, in regard to the local management of the free schools. The spirit of the regulations of the Board are respected and acquiesced in by all classes. The exception referred to is that of the school at Fullarton's Marsh, Lot 48, of the state of which you are already cognizant, from the correspondence between the opposing parties submitted to you. Having found, on my recent visit, that nineteen children had been withdrawn, leaving the number remaining on the roll but 28, I interfered no further in the question in dispute—after an ineffectual attempt to bring the opposing parties to a better understanding—than to notify the teacher, in writing, of the positive requirements of the law in regard to daily average attendance, and of the necessity of his returning a true and exact statement of the ages of all in attendance as *bona fide* pupils at that school.

SIR;

Herewith I beg to hand you the quarterly abstract of the Registers of the Model School since its opening in October, 1856, and a list of the persons who have entered the Normal School, as students, since July, 1856.

The abstracts shew the average number of girls entered each quarter to be nearly 45, and the average number of boys nearly 50. When it is considered 50 of each sex is the number limited by law, the above result may be considered

indicative of a very fair attendance. When the King's Square Girls' School was annexed to the Model School, the females were in the majority, but subsequently their numbers have diminished.

The cause of this decrease is not apparent, unless it be that most of the senior girls have left from time to time, and their places have not been supplied by others. Many girls were temporarily withdrawn, for the last quarter, until the state of the weather should be more settled.

It is unnecessary to offer any remarks on the attendance of the boys, as it presents no important variation.

The progress of the pupils is, on the whole, good, in many cases strictly so; and, as far as ascertained, satisfactory to most of the parents.

The students' register shews that, including those of the current session, 61 persons have entered as candidates for training since the opening in July, 1856. It cannot justly be said that this department of the institution is as satisfactory as the Model School, nor is this to be wondered at. As the law at present stands, any person, with a certificate of moral character, and of being above sixteen years of age, no matter what his or her intellectual abilities or acquirements may be, cannot be refused admittance into the Normal School. The consequence is, the class of persons who present themselves for entrance, are entirely incapable of understanding, much less appreciating, the system of tuition carried on; and, moreover, it is expected by them that three months' attendance at the Normal School will qualify them to obtain licenses as teachers from the Board of Education, notwithstanding their ignorance of the commonest subjects. No stronger proof of this delusion need be adduced than that afforded by the repeated rejection by the Board of a large majority of those who have completed their terms as students in the Normal School. After incurring the expenses of a three months' residence in town, these persons consider themselves aggrieved, and attach the blame to the master, who, from his numerous duties in the Model School, is unable to teach them, unless before or after school hours, in which case the lessons are looked upon as works of supererogation, and especially if the extra time is *after* school, the hour drags listlessly along, with little or no profit to the class.

Two remedies for this evil present themselves. The one is to have a preparatory examination of those who come forward for admission, so that those who have previously gained a sufficient knowledge of the branches taught may be selected for enrolment. It may be said that passing the ordinary Board examination before registration would answer the same purpose; but experience shews that those who do so are more irregular in their attendance, and less attentive to their duties, than those examined by the Board *after* attendance at the Normal School. The second remedy is, to appoint a competent male assistant, who could take charge of the Model School whilst the Head Master was instructing the students. Many reasons commend this as by far the most feasible plan. Apart from the great benefit and satisfaction that would accrue to the student, the children would reap advantage; for, as the school is at present circumstanced, should the master be absent from sickness, the children must either be dismissed or the work carried on in a disorderly manner, worse than dismissal. An additional recommendation of this plan is, that should the present master, at any time, permanently leave the office, in the meantime another is coming forward who, from practice under him, might be competent to take his place.

The only objection seems to be the expense of an additional stipend; but this might be obviated by annexing a boy's school to the Model School, as was done with the girl's school already referred to, in which case the salary of the

master of *that* school could be appropriated to the second master of the Model School.

SIR,—I have the honor to transmit to you (herein inclosed) a copy of a Memorandum of the Executive Council, in Committee, of this Province, of which I have approved respecting the establishment of a system of steam communication between Canada, Nova Scotia, Prince Edward Island, and this Province.

To His Excellency the Hon. J. H. T. Manners Sutton, Lieut. Governor:

The Committee of Council are deeply

impressed with the importance of connecting this Province with Canada, Nova Scotia, and Prince Edward Island by steam communication, such communication to be weekly between Quebec, Shediac, and some Port in Nova Scotia, and twice or oftener per week between Shediac, Prince Edward Island, and Nova Scotia.

The expense of establishing such a system of communication may probably be estimated at £7,000 per annum, of which we should be prepared to recommend that this province should pay its fair share.

Fifteen hundred pounds have already been voted by the House of Assembly towards this object and we recommend that enquiry should be made whether the Governments of Canada, Nova Scotia, and Prince Edward Island will co-operate with the Government of this Province in the matter.

Dear Sir,—Your note of 6th instant I duly received, asking the number of extra trips by Macrae. I find that I cannot *vouch exactly* to the number; but in giving the matter a careful investigation, as “near as I can,” I find EIGHT trips extra—*possibly* I may be under the mark. I observe you notice THIRTY-SIX regular trips from Amherst. On referring to my letter of 18th to you, I find there named THIRTY-FOUR before that of the 19th—the last one, besides two expresses. This would give total THIRTY-SEVEN sent by me; and on reference to my book of *mails sent*, it agrees with this number, viz.: Dec. 4, Jan. 9, Feb. 8, March 8, April 6—all told, 35; adding the two express English mails, 37; and, *if I am correct* in the eight trips from the Island this way,—which I cannot be quite certain of,—it will give forty-five—*three* less only than you say Macrae has booked.

I wish I could make the matter more clear; but I believe you will fully appreciate the difficulty of doing so, when the mails arrive so irregular. Scarcely an hour out of the twenty-four that a mail from the Cape is not received during the winter. One mail I may say I am rather inclined to think was *extra*, that I have not included in the “eight.” I mean that received on 23d February (see my memorandum) and incline to the opinion it should be added; and, if correct, there would then only remain a difference of two, which two may *possibly* be correct *too*—yet I have some doubt of it.

I trust, sir, you will excuse my tedious manner of coming at the information

you require. I have made it as plain as I could under all the circumstances, and will be happy to afford anything further you may require, upon your asking it.

I take the liberty of enclosing a *one pound Bank Note*, Island currency, to ask if you will be kind enough to send me the worth of it in Nova Scotia or New Brunswick currency. I find I cannot pass it here. Please excuse this, and

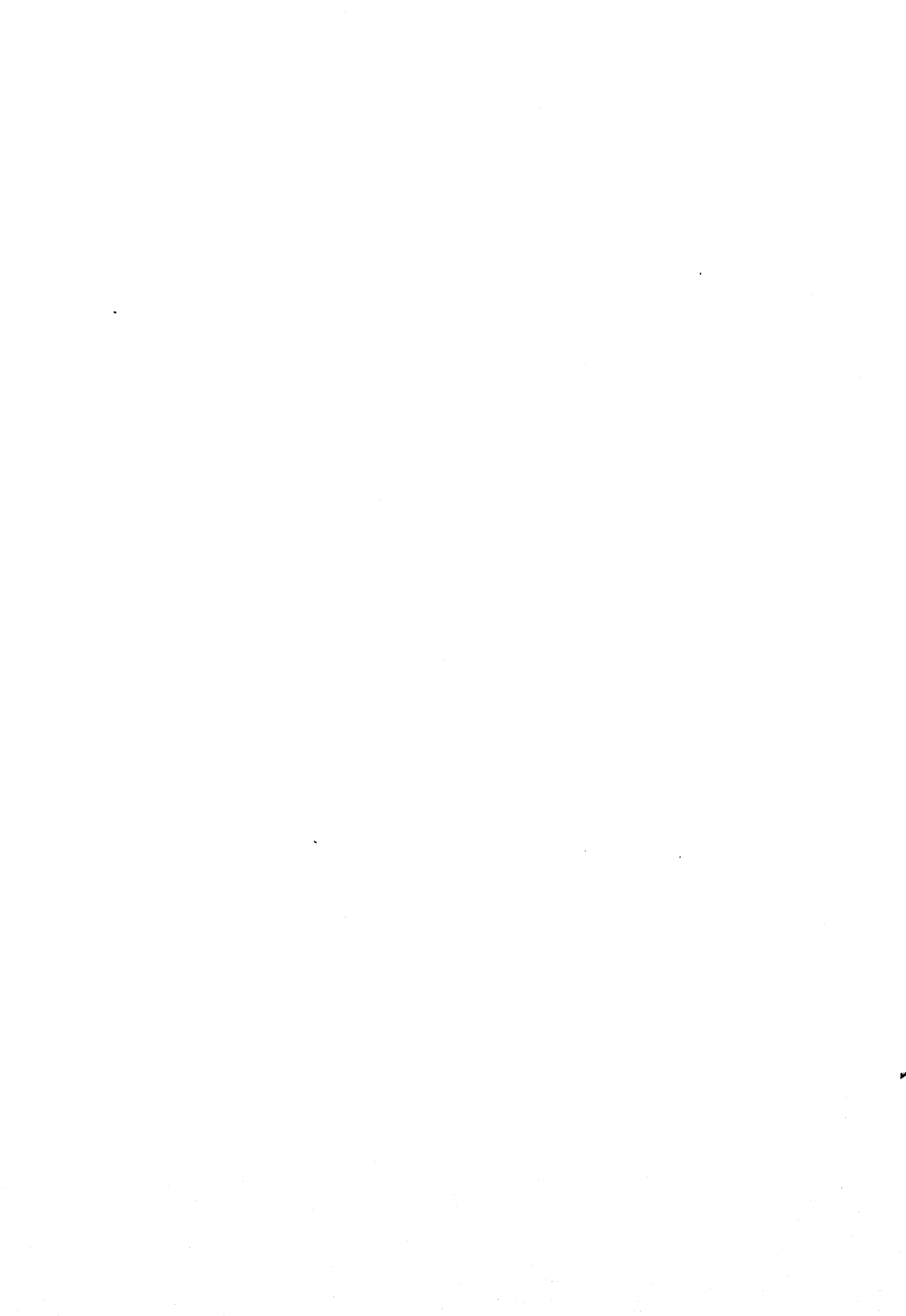
