

HON. MANNING DOHERTY VISITS BELLEVILLE FAIR

Labor Celebration and Address of Minister of Agriculture Features of the First Day—Rain Interfered With Programme

The 1920 exhibition of the Belleville Agricultural Society opened on Labor Day under auspicious, none too bright, rain poured in torrents on Monday morning and the result was damp grounds and a heavy track making racing impossible. The attendance was cut down by these untoward conditions. One of the big features of the day was the parade of the local labor unions. About five hundred men assembled at the market square and formed in procession under the following unions:

- The G.W.V.A. band headed the parade, the members belonging to the musicians' union. The Boy Scouts took part in the procession. The strength of the Steel Workers' Union No. 6, was an eye-opener to the public, as was also that of the American Federation of Labor Union No. 17374. A number of the unions carried banners. Mr. M. The Hon. Manning Doherty, Minister of Agriculture, was the guest of the president and directors of the fair and was an interested spectator about the grounds during the afternoon.

The G.W.V.A. band, under Sergeant Dobbs, rendered a fine program on the grounds, as did the Oshawa S. A. band, led by the Belleville S. A. band.

President H. K. Denyes, M.P.P. for East Hastings, officially opened the fair by welcoming the gathering. He expressed the regret that the speed events had to be called off on account of the condition of the track due to rain. The fair was highly favored in having as its guest the Hon. Manning Doherty, the Minister of Agriculture.

When I first received an invitation to attend the opening of Belleville fair, I was indeed glad that I was able to accept," said the Hon. Manning Doherty, the U.F.O. Minister of Agriculture, after a roving reception. "The district around Belleville for many years has been noted as one of the best agricultural districts we have in the province of Ontario. I know this because I have been in this district for a good many years buying cattle."

"This is one of the occasions when those who live in the city meet with those from the rural parts. What we want in this country is a unity of feeling among all classes of our people. While the interests of the city and the country may not be absolutely identical, they are not antagonistic."

The union of labor and agriculture in the government was possible because there was a conviction that the producer in the city and on the farm should receive adequate reward for his labor.

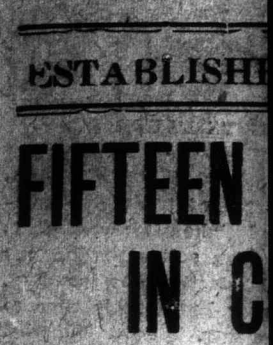
