PROGRESS OF THE WAR

[November 9 to November 15]

OSTILITIES were vigorously maintained on nearly all fronts during the week under review, and a number of important changes were effected, some favorable and some unfavorable to the Entente Allies, but with a net gain to their advantage.

In the Western campaign the Somme sector was again the scene of the greatest activity. The British made an important advance northeast of Thiepval and took the strongly fortified village of Beaucourt on the Ancre, securing over 3000 prisoners; and they made a further advance towards Bapaume from the position of the week, the fighting being mostly confined to artillery duels and aerial combats.

PATRIOTISM AND THE WAR

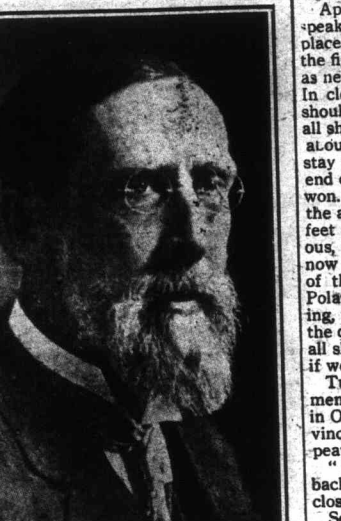

The Food Sale which the Women's Auxiliary of All Saints Church held last Saturday in Stinson's Café proved successful beyond the hopes of its organizers, and realized a total of \$21.25.

While winter may not have set in already, we have been given a foretaste of it. There was a little flurry of snow in the early hours of Monday morning, just sufficient to winter the ground; but after midnight on Monday a regular old-fashioned snow-storm set in that lasted well into Tuesday afternoon, the downfall of snow, which amounted to nearly six inches, being accompanied by quite a stiff wind. Wednesday and Thursday were very winter-like and quite cold, the thermometer indicating a temperature below zero on Thursday morning. It is said that such severe weather in November has not occurred before for eighteen years. But, surely, we must have our "Indian Summer" yet, before Winter takes his final grip.

Lieut. Oliver Jacks, a former student of Macdonald College, and for several years the Auxiliary of Gagetown, has been awarded the Military Cross for conspicuous bravery. He is the eldest son of Dr. Jacks, a leading professor at Oxford, and editor of Hibberts Journal, and he is a nephew of Mrs. T. E. Sharp, of Minister's Island. He has two brothers in the firing line, the elder, Maurice, had the unpleasant experience of being buried under an exploded mine, but was fortunately dug out in time. The second brother, Stopford, was recently sent forward as observing officer with some others to a German trench which was supposed to be British held capture. When they approached they found the Germans holding the trench in force. The others of the party were instantly killed but Stopford Jacks managed to crawl back unharmed. All three brothers enlisted in the earlier stages of the war, and have, up to the present, escaped the casualty list.

An English newspaper gives the following account of Lieut. Oliver Jacks: "The numerous friends of Dr. Jacks, Principal of Manchester College, and Mrs. Jacks, will be gratified to learn that Temp. Sec.-Lieut. Oliver L. Jacks, Oxford and Bucks, L. I., has been awarded the Military Cross for conspicuous gallantry in action."

It is officially recorded that Lieut. Jacks led the first line of attack with great dash and did fine work consolidating the position won under heavy fire. He is the eldest of three of Dr. Jacks' sons at the front, and is 25 years of age. Educated at Bradford College, Lieut. Jacks went to Canada, where he was engaged in farming up to the time of the outbreak of the war. His patriotic instinct was such that he enlisted as a trooper in King Edward's Horse, and took part in a great deal of the fighting in Flanders in 1915; he has been at the front altogether 18 months, and this is the second time he has led his platoon in the front line of the attack.

It has been ascertained from a private source that the gallantry for which the coveted medal has been conferred was that he led a shell crater for two hours under direct bombardment. Lieut. Jacks is a young man of very fine physique, standing 6 ft. 3 in. and of herculean strength. In a recent letter he jocularly remarked that "the Germans must be very bad shots."

The tablet was the generous gift of Mrs. G. H. Stickleby, and her thoughtfulness is indeed appreciated. Miss Emma Odell dropped the flag while the strains of the National Anthem filled the church. Placed as it is on the eastern wall of the church and underneath that coat of arms which commemorates the loyalty of the founders of St. Andrews, the tablet will keep fresh in the minds of many generations the ready response that greeted the call for men to guard the cause of Liberty.

RED CROSS SOCIETY

The annual meeting of the New Brunswick branch of the Canadian Red-Cross Society was held in St. John on Nov. 9. The officers elected for the forthcoming year were: President, Mayor Hayes; 1st Vice President, Philip Grannam; Treas., Lady Tilley; Sec., Miss Clements; Executive, Dr. Bourque; Monitors, Brigadier-General Hugh H. McLean; Mr. FitzRandolph; Lieut.-Col. E. T. Sturdee; Dr. J. H. Frink; H. A. Powell, K. C. A special vote of thanks was tendered to Lady Tilley by the executive, for her untiring efforts to promote the work of the Red Cross Society throughout New Brunswick and Canada. In her report Lady Tilley summarized the cash contributions sent forward for Red Cross purposes from the Province of New Brunswick, as follows: To Toronto, \$22,373.71; For Prisoners of War, 1,252.50; For Special purposes, 575.00; For British Red Cross, 4,117.65.

That Charlotte County did its part in bringing the totals up to such high figures, will be seen from this list of its donations:

St. Stephen Red Cross Society, \$700.20; St. Andrews, 55.00; St. George, 50.00; Millington, 100.00; Beaver Harbor Red Cross Society, 50.00; Seal Cove, 50.00; Fenfield, 35.00; Lord's Cove, 35.00; Girls' Branch W. A., Campobello, 5.00; Miss Clements, in her secretarial report, stated that very nearly one thousand boxes of supplies had been received at the provincial packing rooms during the year, and repacked and forwarded overseas. She gave a list of the various articles shipped which included 39,740 pairs of socks, 2,974 other knitted articles, 34,211 hospital garments, and many other supplies too numerous to mention. The latest shipment of the provincial branch of the Society consisted of 3,576 Christmas Stockings. Miss Clements closed her report with these words:

"Now looking forward, as we must, to another year of endeavour, it is with every confidence that we face our future work, for the records of the past year show us that the call which comes to us more clearly every day, to give and to labor, will be willingly and cheerfully answered by every patriotic worker in our province."

CHILDREN'S DAY

Children's Day was observed on Wednesday afternoon at the Charlotte County Grammar School by a very entertaining series of exercises which were, without exception, perfectly executed, and by the unveiling of a beautifully illuminated Roll of Honor, containing the names of over eighty men from St. Andrews and immediate vicinity, who have offered themselves for their country's service in the present war. Children's Day is primarily a day set aside for Belgian Relief work, and for this purpose a silver collection was taken at the door, and a candy basket by a very flourishing business; altogether the sum of \$53.50 was raised.

To the Editor of the BEACON, Sir: The following is a clipping from the St. John Daily Telegraph, of the 24th of Oct., ult.

COURTENAY BAY FLATS FINE FOR DRILL GROUND

"General McLean says whole Army Corps could be manoeuvred there."

"St. John has the best drill grounds within easy reach of any city I know of in Canada," said Brigadier-General McLean yesterday when interviewed by the Telegraph.

"Courtenay Bay flats is an admirable place. A brigade could be drilled there. Yes, for that matter, an army corps could be drilled there. It is far superior to the natural facilities of any other Canadian city I am acquainted with, and just as it

is in its natural state it is admirably suited for the work.

"The people of this city I feel certain do not realize what a splendid drill ground this is. I had the 16th Battalion out there at manoeuvres this afternoon and I was more forcibly impressed than on any previous occasion of its vast possibilities and its splendid appointment. It should prove a very great attraction to military units connected with their being quartered here."

This is the Harbor which the St. John Papers boasting declare is to become the great Winter Harbor of Canada, but in the above the cat is unwittingly let out of the bag.

Governments have spent millions of the people's money, dredging mud, sand and silt out of this creek, and blasting away the underlying ledges of rock; and governments will spend millions more before this thing is finally abandoned.

The same causes are at work to-day that during past ages, left this deposit at this place, and the conditions have not changed. That Charlotte County did its part and debris is carried down by the current of the St. John River, and is met at its mouth by an adverse tide twice in twenty four hours; and as long as there is a South wind to blow, and as long as there is mud or sand at the bottom of the Bay of Fundy, just so long will these conditions continue; and they can never be fully overcome by dredging.
