SITUATION STILL REMAINS IN DOUBT

Mexico and United States May be at War in Short Order.

Mexicans Do Not Appreciate Note of President Woodrow Wilson.

[Canadian Press Despatch] MEXICO CITY, Aug. 28.—The full text of the answer of Federico Gamboa, Mexican secretary of state for foreign affairs, to the note sent him by John Lind, President Wilson's confidential agent in Mexico, under date of August 25, characterized by Senor Gamboa, as Mr. Lind's second note, is made public here to-day.

It contains several interesting clauses. In one paragraph the Mexican diplomat quotes Mr. Lind's statement that President Wilson, if Mexico acts immediately and favorably upon the foregoing suggestions, would express to American bankers assurances that the government of the United States would look with favor upon any loan to Mexico.

In another part of his lengthy note referring to the insistence of President Wilson that Victoriano Huerta bind himself not to be a candidate for election to the presidency at the October elections, Senor Gamboa quotes from the constitutional articles of the Mexican republic...

WASHINGTON, Aug. 28.—Senor Gamboa's note of August 26 has not been received officially here early to-day, but upon a summary transmitted to Secretary Bryan to John Lind, administration officials declared the United States would not yield to his demand that Victoriano Huerta should not be a candidate for president of Mexico.

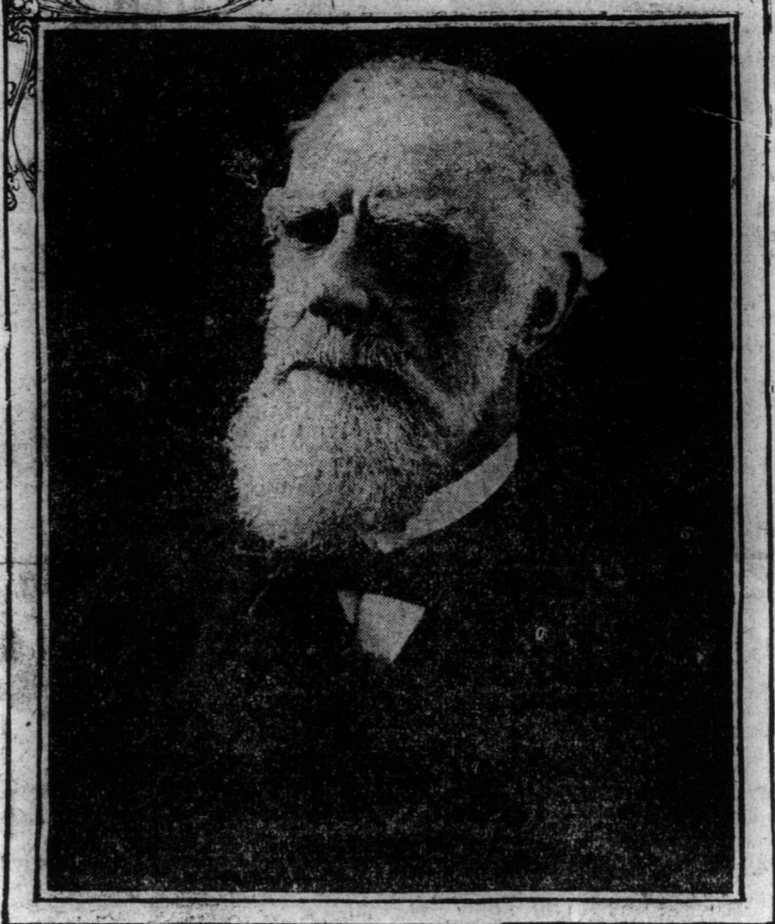
Senor Gamboa calls attention to a clause in the Mexican constitution, which prohibits a provisional president from succeeding himself and charges that the United States was over suspicious in thinking that Huerta would enter the race.

There is, in the view of administration officials here, no question of the fact that Huerta does not intend resigning in favor of General Treviño or some other, so that he might become a candidate.

Wilson's Message Good. PARIS, Aug. 28.—The Paris newspapers give much prominence to President Wilson's message, but the majority of them abstain from comment.

Hawker's Flight Ends: Tumbles Into The Sea

When Victory Appeared Almost Certain, English Airman Meets With Disaster off the Irish Coast.

LONDON, Aug. 28.—Just when victory appeared assured, Harry Hawker's brilliant attempt to win the £5,000 prize offered by The London Daily Mail for a flight around the British coast ended in disaster this afternoon, when he fell into the sea fifteen miles north of Dublin.

Yesterday's flight started ominously. Trouble began at Oban, where one of the floats on the machine was swamped, the repairs wasting precious minutes. Engine trouble brought him down at Kiells, Argyllshire.

Thomas Gilbert, the well-known barber, died this afternoon at the Brantford Hospital. As reported in yesterday's Courier, Mr. Gilbert was critically ill following an attack of blood-poisoning, which developed in his foot, following the removal of a corn which he himself performed with a razor.

THE IMPERATOR AFIRE IN NEW YORK TO-DAY

Big Leviathan Badly Damaged by Fire in the Hold—Over 1000 Passengers on Board—An Exciting Time—Help Had to be Summoned.

[Canadian Press Despatch] NEW YORK, Aug. 28.—The Steamship Imperator, the largest vessel afloat, was swept by fire early to-day as she lay at her dock in Hoboken with her crew and 1,131 steerage passengers aboard.

A fleet of fire fighting craft, augmented by apparatus on shore surrounded the ship and poured tons of water into her hold, when the fire was checked, at 8 o'clock, the great vessel has listed fifteen degrees.

Big Ship Was Dark. The big ship was dark with all on board asleep, save the officers on watch when smoke ascending from the provision rooms was discovered simultaneously by a seaman or dock watch, and a petty officer on the bridge.

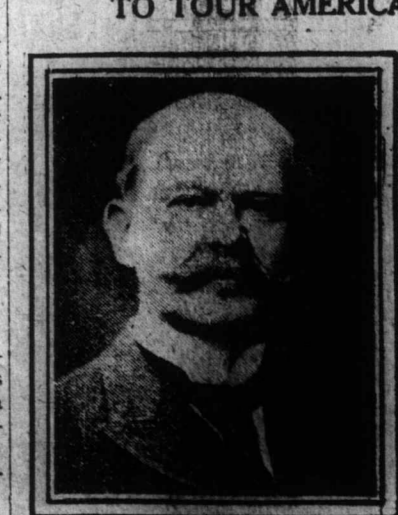

BORDEN GOVERNMENT'S BRILLIANT RECORD.

In less than two years of office the Borden Government has to its credit a magnificent record of national development. Incompetence and waste that goes with incompetence, characterized the Laurier administration from its beginning and had become a public scandal years before the party was turned out of office.

Upon that basis the Government has undertaken and is pressing forward a programme of development covering the whole of Canada. Important and long-needed harbor improvements are in progress on both oceans and upon the great lakes, the canal system of Canada is being extended and improved to meet the imperative demand for better facilities of water transportation.

A system of public-owned elevators is being established in Western Canada. A parcel post system will be in operation by the end of the year. The Atlantic steamship service has been improved and the cable service cheapened.

To this, but for the action of the Laurier partisans in the Senate, would have been added provision for the construction and maintenance of good roads in all the provinces of Canada.

These are some of the outstanding achievements of the Government. The list is by no means exhausted. Yet with all this, the abounding prosperity has made it necessary for the Government to place the resources of the Dominion under the slightest strain.

Another School Situation Brantford is facing another school situation. School problems in Brantford in recent years have not been uncommon. They recur at frequent intervals and as long as Brantford continues to grow school situations will arise.

The schools which Brantford possesses are not merely an asset to the city. They imply an abiding faith on the part of the ratepayers in the future of the municipality.

in Brantford to secure a public school education under proper conditions. All sorts of expedients have failed to relieve school congestion in Brantford. The situation has got past the expedient stage. It might be said that in view of reported financial stringency, it is a poor time to build a school. It cannot be a poor time if the school is needed. If a school is worth building it is worth building well.

NOTES AND COMMENTS.

Has the Liberal party a mission? Why, yes, it is to teach the British Admiralty how to run a navy.

The Winnipeg wheat prices still persist in staying some fifteen cents higher than the Minneapolis markets.

Sir Wilfrid Laurier announces that he is forcing the government to the country on the naval question. Certainly, if they won't go when he wants them, he'll make them go when they're ready. He will be obeyed.

The Liberal party is a party of principal right. It will do anything for office except abandon its policy of separation. If that isn't a sacrifice for principal Bill Pugsley will eat somebody else's shirt.

Ex-President Taft says that he has learned that the Canadian people are against political union with the United States. Sir Wilfrid Laurier had the advantages of the same lesson but failed to learn it.

New Zealand has built, in Great Britain, a dreadnought for the British navy, manned largely by a British crew, and yet the autonomy of the Dominion does not seem to have been noticeably impaired.

It turns out now that Sir Alan Aylesworth had prepared a Closure Bill in 1911 in comparison with which the Conservative measure is extraordinarily mild. All the Liberal protests were but the merest sham and mock heroics.

The big western harvest, the growing business and the general improvement in commercial conditions must be a sad blow to the Liberals who have been preaching blue-ruin, to the men who would like to see their country go to the dogs for the sake of political advantage.

Not only Sir Wilfrid Laurier but Hon. Rodolphe Lemieux attacked the closure at the recent St. Hyacinthe meeting and yet Lemieux just two years previously on the same platform had vigorously advocated closure and solemnly announced that if the Liberals were elected a closure measure would be introduced.

Hon. Rodolphe Lemieux, whose nasty attack on Commander Roper last session disgusted many of his own friends, has got his answer from Commander Roper. It is now up to Mr. Lemieux. His silence in the face of such a reply would be in keeping with the nature of his attack.

The British Admiralty has taken immediate steps to provide the three ships that the Liberals of Canada refused. Whereat Sir Wilfrid Laurier goes down to Quebec and tells the people at St. Hyacinthe that there is no emergency. The Laurier doctrine is that so long as Great Britain can be forced to bear the whole burden alone there is no emergency.

The contemptible attack of Hon. Rodolphe Lemieux on Commander Roper because he had criticized the futile Laurier naval scheme has resulted in a vigorous letter from the British sea-dog in which he absolutely and unequivocally denies the insults of the ex-Postmaster-General that he concocted his report and wrote it to obtain an increase in salary.

Famous Book Collector. BRIGHTON, Eng. Aug. 28.—Bernard Quaritch, the well known dealer in rare books, died here yesterday from the effects of an illness contracted during a recent visit to the United States. He was present at the Hoe sale in New York in January when he bought a number of rare volumes.

THE IMPERATOR AFIRE IN NEW YORK TO-DAY

(Continued from Page 1) Clouds of Smoke.

The whisp of smoke curling into the second cabin when the flames were first discovered, had by this time grown to a cloud. Through this cloud the Hoboken firemen rushed. The dining saloon of the second cabin suffered the greatest damage from smoke and the firemen's passage. The handsome appointments of the saloon were a wreck when the smoke cleared away.

With fifteen streams playing hundreds of tons of water on the fire, every minute the flames lost heart and the vessel began to list. At 8 o'clock there were only two streams on the blaze and it was practically extinguished.

The second cabin presented a dismal appearance when the smoke lifted. Its walls and gilded fittings were smudged and dark, its costly rugs and carpets, sodden, its furniture scattered, blackened and broken.

The damage to the second cabin, according to hasty estimates was greater than that to the provision room and hold, although only a cursory examination could reveal the extent to which the vessel had suffered. It was said that the Emperor's sailing to-morrow might have to be postponed. She arrived here yesterday.

One thousand longshoremen, employed by the Hamburg-American Line, the Emperor's owners, went on strike 48 hours before the vessel arrived. Their places were filled by men from Brooklyn docks and the strikers were told that they would not be taken back.

The Emperor has suffered several mishaps, more or less serious, since her launching, May 23, 1913. Her maiden trip was postponed from month to month, first because she ran aground while on her way to Hamburg and then because of trouble with her turbines. A benzine explosion occurred on board the vessel April 24, which caused the death of two men and serious injury to several others.

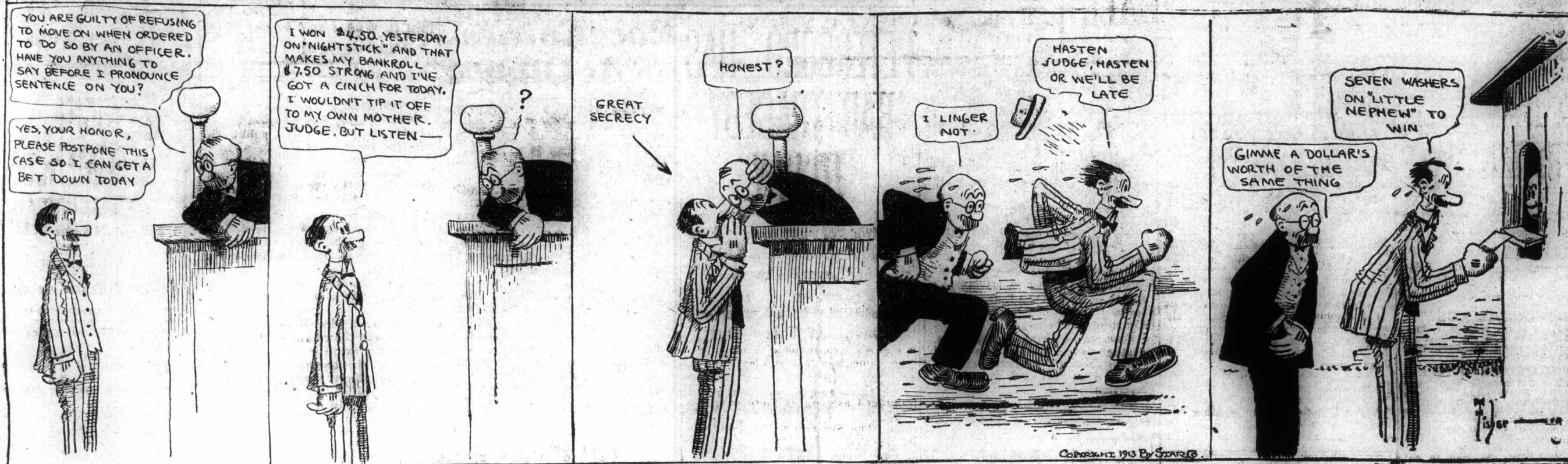
