**GUILTY OF CONSPIRACY.**  
M'GREVY AND CONNOLLY SENT TO PRISON FOR A YEAR.  
An Unexpected Verdict—Closing Scenes in the Famous Political Conspiracy Trial—Justice Ross's Words to the Prisoners—An Appeal to Be Taken.  
OTTAWA, Nov. 24.—The verdict in the conspiracy case was somewhat of a surprise to all concerned with it. It was generally expected that there would have been a disagreement or an acquittal, but as Justice Ross read from the piece of paper handed him by the clerk, "We find, by the evidence that conspiracy existed between Thomas M'Greedy and N. K. Connolly," the plea of guilty was entered and the verdict pronounced. Justice Ross—By that you mean a verdict of guilty?  
The jury replied that they did.  
Thomas M'Greedy and N. K. Connolly, who were charged with conspiracy, were sentenced to one year in the penitentiary. The judge said that he was not satisfied with the evidence, but that he was bound to follow the verdict of the jury. The wages for 6 months in the year are always good. In harvesting and threshing wages are about \$40 per month. Hoping this will not take up too much room.
