Dr. Elliot, on retiring from the presidency of Harvard, has relieved his mind of some thoughts that have been pressing on it for some years. One is to the effect that before long mankind will have a new religion; but when he goes on to describe what the religion will be, we find it identical with the old-time religion that has been practised by good men, and especially by good women, for a couple of thousand years.

Eastern men are taking the lead in college work in the new provinces. The Provincial University of Alberta has a Nova Scotia president, who reached Edmonton by way of a McGill chair. The provincial University at Saskatchewan, seeking its first president, went to Nova Scotia to get a New Brunswick and former professor of our own provincial university. There is at least one other Eastern man on the Alberta College staff, and a Nova Scotia Rhodes scholar takes a chair in the Saskatchewan school. Chester Martin, of St. John, another Rhodes scholar, is joining the staff of the University of Manitoba, and with him joins Professor Grimmer of this province, lately professor at Fredericton.—The Standard.

### More Fields to Conquer.

As yet only a small share of the British market for farm produce is supplied by Canada.

In the twelve months ending May of this year, Britain imported 20,000,000 cwt. of barley—none was supplied by Canada. Half was bought in Russia.

Britain imported 14,000,000 cwt. of oats—Canada supplied only 18,000,000. Russia sent 4,500,000.

Britain bought 86,000,000 cwt. of wheat. Canada sent 14,800,000 and the United States 13,000,000; Argentina 27,000,000.

Of wheat flour, Britain bought 11,000,000 hundred weight, Canada supplied 1,771,000, and the United States 7,759,000.

Of cured fish, Britain required 1,080,000 cwt. Canada sent 170,000; Norway 185,000, Portugal 132,000 and the United States 206,000.

The British people imported 4,000,000 cwt. of butter, only 50,000 from Canada, but 1,850,000 from Denmark; 550,000 from India; 400,000 from Germany and about 600,000 from Australia.

Canada is ahead in cheese, supplying Britain with 1,526,800 cwt. or two-thirds of the whole requirement.

British imports of bacon are 5,000,000 cwt. of which 890,000 go from Canada, 2,000,000 from Denmark, and a little more than that from the United States. The United States ships to Britain more than three times the quantity of hams that are sent by Canada.

There is much more business to be sought in Great Britain for the Canadian producers.—The Standard.

### An Interesting Relic.

Rev. Mr. Dykeman, of Springfield, Mass., spent a few days in Wolfville last week. He addressed the prayer meeting of St. Andrew's church on Wednesday evening, and made the acquaintance of those present. He is a very clever and interesting speaker and his address was most helpful. Though bearing a Dutch name his maternal ancestors were Scotch. McKenzies of Inverness, Scotland. Rev. Mr. Dykeman has in his possession a valued relic in the shape of a trunk formerly belonging to Prince Charlie. The battle of Culloden was fought in the year 1745. It was the last battle which the Stuarts fought in order to win back the throne of Great Britain. Just before the battle Bonnie Prince Charlie deposited this trunk in the home of the McKenzies. The loyalist troops were routed and the prince was obliged to flee, and for months he was a wanderer in Scotland. It is concerning this prince that so many of the beautiful Scotch songs have been written. The prince was never able to call for his trunk, and from France he sent a note to McKenzie making him a present of it and its contents. Inside the trunk there was found the remains of a leg of mutton, a brace of silver mounted pistols and some other things. The mutton went the way of all mutton, the trunk and pistols were brought to Canada. The pistols were presented to the present King when he was here as Prince of Wales. The trunk is in the possession of Rev. Mr. Dykeman, a prized heirloom of his Scotch ancestry.

# Odds and Ends.

The reason why the masses, the laboring-classes, the common people if you like, are led away from the church and its influences, and to seek God where he is to be found—in the fields, beside the brook, along the seashore, or in the woods—is because they see and behold why so many others are led to the churches, because ye did eat of the loaves and were filled.

As the great throng surged about Christ, having perceived the miracle of the feeding of the five thousand, they thought that Christ would use his divine power to confer upon them some great temporal benefits, multiply their apple crops, increase their industries, fill the nets of the fishermen and provide them with a "good bank account." Their actions betrayed their motives which were so apparent to Christ as to call forth his disapproval "ye seek me . . . because ye did eat of the loaves and were filled."

It is evident that one of the strongest motives which lie behind the restless striving of the great surging mass of humanity of the present day, is the insatiable desire for "the loaves and fishes," which ever leads to the secularizing of our religious exercises. A large church, well equipped, well filled plates, comfortable chairs, short sermons well delivered, is too prominent a consideration with many, and to them its attainment will justify the most worldly means. Did our Lord say of these, "ye seek me . . . because ye did eat of the loaves and were filled?"

The people are becoming disgusted with the styles so prominent in our modern church gatherings. They cannot participate in the luxury and hypocrisy so apparent, and give up in disgust. All these inordinate desires for novelty, excitement, entertainment, pleasure, are but the marks of that unquenchable thirst for pleasure and luxurious entertainment, which marked the decay of Rome. One of the prominent features of the twentieth century civilization, which dominates the religious life of church services, is this inordinate desire for excitement and pleasure, and is pointing to its decline and decay.

How many of our people go up to the "House of God" on the Sabbath to worship Him. If they had a poor preacher, no cultured choir, no goods to sell on the Monday, no place to preserve in the society life of even a small town like Wolfville, how many would attend? Is it a wonder that the masses go out into the clear and escape all this hypocrisy, big hats, flies and heat?

I wonder if our Lord should arrive at one of these sacred edifices, what would be his attitude. If upon the Sabbath he should take a back seat and try to look through the modern Sunday hat. If he would listen to one of these solo singers, with their unintelligible warbling of what is said to be a sacred song, to the duets, trios and quartets, with the rows thrown in. Those who go to be entertained get what they go for, and the poor soul who goes for the bread of life, is fed on husks. Is this for the glory of God and the building of his spiritual Kingdom? or for worldly popularity and "the loaves and fishes?"

Now examine the results. To truly Christian people, to thinking people, people of common sense and good judgment, religion becomes simply a farce, a joke, an empty show, when it must be bolstered up by modern cravings after entertainment in the church buildings, and kept alive in this manner, there can't be much in it, except it be "the loaves and fishes" for those directly interested, and froth for those who lend it patronage. It holds our religion up to ridicule and sneers, and takes from it the dignity and grandeur which rightfully belongs to it and lessens the influence of Christianity.

We should not license, we should prohibit wrong-doing.

We advocate Provincial Prohibition:—1st. Because with the legislation now in force we cannot suppress the unlicensed traffic.

The prohibition provisions of the Scott Act and Liquor License Act are very ineffective, and the enforcing authorities of many communities are so weak as to be almost useless. The long-continued illicit sale in every county in the Province, by men who have been repeatedly fined, is fairly good evidence that present legislation falls far short of what is necessary.

IV. EFFECT OF ENACTING PROVINCIAL PROHIBITION.

1st. In Liquor License Act Counties.

The Prohibition Act would immediately annul every license granted by the Province. It would remove the reproach that now rests upon the Christian people of the Province who pray "Thy Kingdom Come," and at the same time by virtue of the Liquor License Act are engaged in the liquor business.

2nd. In Scott Act Counties.

The Prohibition Act would not necessarily at once affect Scott Act counties, excepting in that the suppression of the licensed traffic in Halifax, Cape Breton and Richmond Counties would improve conditions in general. The Halifax trade, especially, is harmful to the whole Province, and its suppression by a Provincial Act would result in blessing to many a community, now being cursed by shipments from the Halifax dealers. Scott Act counties could remain under the Scott Act or come under the Prohibition Act by repealing the Scott Act.

When a Prohibition Act is placed upon the Statutes, and sufficiently enforced by the Government, Scott Act counties recognizing its superiority will likely decide, in a very short time, to come under its operation.

V. THE WORTH OF PROVINCIAL PROHIBITION.

While some Federal legislation may be required, to safeguard Provinces adopting Provincial Prohibition, in the matter of manufacture and importation, it should be understood that the Provincial legislature has power to make the possession and sale of liquor unprofitable, that the question of manufacture and importation into the Province, would not be so serious a problem.

The Provincial Legislature has power to enact such a law, with stringent penalties and adequate enforcement, as would destroy the whole provincial traffic—licensed and unlicensed.
