Select small or medium-sized, fully rise berries. After hulling, weigh out 2 lbs, berries Measure 7 level cups (3 lbs.) sugar into small separate pan. Spread about one-quarter of the berries on their sides in single layer on a platter and gently press each berry to a thickness of ¼ inch with bottom of Certo bottle. (This leaves skins nearly intact, but ruptures fruit inside and makes it hollow, allowing boiling sugar to saturate issues quiskly.) Transfer pressed berries to large kettle, and cover with layer of sugar.
