## WHY CONTRIBUTE TO A NURSES' HOME

I have been asked to write a short article, giving some reasons why the proposed extension of the Miramichi Hospital should receive public sympathy and support.

A brief visit to the hospital, where I was shown the present accommodations of the nurses and was given facts in regard to the needs and aims of the work of the hospital, make these reasons very evident and convincing.

The present accommodation for the nurses are inadequate and unsuitable. They are simply makeshifts, as the upper floor which was intended for their use was given up for a maternity ward. Two public wards were converted into nurses' quarters, which are not only unattractive and depressing in their influence, but also give no real privacy. There is no recreation room and no room for demonstration purposes. It is evident to all that the nature of the work of nurses makes it imperative that they should have pleasant and diverting surroundings when off duty. Further, the lack of a suitable room for demonstration purposes is a serious handicap to the work of training nurses.

The demands upon the hospital are constantly increasing. The room now used by the nurses is urgently needed for other purposes particularly a children's ward. At present, when children are taken into the hospital, they have to be placed in a ward with adults and for that reason the treatment of children has to be limited, both as to numbers and kind. No work of more importance than the saving of our children, and the information which mothers receive incidentally, while their children are being treated.

The hospital as it is, is a great blessing to the Town of Newcastle and the County of Northumberland. With more accommodation, it can be a greater blessing. Here is an opportunity for the people to help in the good work being done. Nurses with better accommodations will respond with greater capacity and with more room the work now being done can be largely increased.

## REDBANK SWEEP BY FIRE YESTERDAY

The thriving village of Red Bank on the northwest Miramichi River was practically wiped out by fire yesterday. Fanned by a strong westerly wind—the flames soon became out of control and nothing could prevent its spread. The fire is reported to have started about 3 o'clock p.m. in the residence of Mr. Isaac Blackmore in the section, known as the Indian Gardens. From here it swept through the woods, destroying everything in its path. By the time it reached Red Bank it was burning so fiercely that the residents soon realized that their village was doomed. The path of the fire included the right hand side of the roadway passing through Red Bank leading to Newcastle on the south side of the river. Practically everything from Harry Bryenton's house at the head of the road to the school house at the top of the Sullivan Hill, on the right hand side of the road was destroyed in a short time.

Up to 10 o'clock last evening very little damage was done to property on the north side of the road. Some of the properties destroyed are: Presbyterian Hall, Ensley Mullin, Archibald Ramsay, Fred White, Ritchie warehouses, Jos. Napke, Norman Sutherland Presbyterian Church, new and old Presbyterian manses, Murdoch Sutherland; from this point it jumped the brook and burned the old Sullivan house; it then jumped the school house, the Randolph Gillis and Robert Johnston properties and again ignited the following properties: John Johnstone, the old Thos. Johnston property, Frank Johnstone, Robt. Park's barn, Jas Gillis' house and barn, Wm. McKibbons and John Gillis' property on the north side of the road.

At this point the wind changed towards the east and the fire was halted, the wind blowing the flames back over the path it had already burned.

The residents were greatly handicapped because of no fire fighting apparatus, but they put up a heroic struggle to check the flames. Newcastle was asked to assist and a large number of people went to the doomed village in automobiles. Water was hauled and thrown on the fire by means of buckets but had very little effect in subduing the fire. Practically all furniture was lost in every house destroyed, the Rev. Mr. Girdwood saving his automobile but losing his horse. It was thought at one time that it would be impossible to save the Sullivan store and residences, but fortunately the wind changed and these properties were saved. The dense smoke from the fire enshrouded this whole section. The loss will run into many thousands of dollars and the insurance carried is reported to be negligible.

Many people are now homeless and the sympathy of the entire county is extended to the residents of the devastated village.

### BRITAIN HAS GIANT SUBMARINE

**'Mystery Ship' Which is Soon to be launched**

London, June 4—England will have the largest and most powerful submarine in the world when the "mystery ship" submarine X-1 is completed. This giant underwater craft, which will soon be launched at Chatham, will displace 2,170 tons when sailing at the surface of the water and 3,600 tons when submerged. This displacement is greater by more than a thousand tons than that of any American or German submarine now afloat.

The X-1 will mount a twelve inch gun. She will be able to bombard an object at long or short range and then slip quickly beneath the waves. With her great speed and gun-power, which will surpass anything in her class in the American Navy, she will be more than a match for most surface vessels.

The submarine was laid down only eighteen months ago, and the British Admiralty has congratulated her builders on the speed with which they have done their work.

### FOREST FIRES ARE UNDER CONTROL

Fredericton, June 7—A message received by the Department of Lands and Mines here at noon today stated that the forest fires which had been raging south and east of Kedgewick on the International Railway division of the C.N.R. were under control.

Kedgewick district, which was that most seriously menaced, is in the heart of some of the heaviest forests in New Brunswick, and hundreds of men are engaged in the fire fighting crews that are there. The situation in the Northern part of New Brunswick along virtually the entire Quebec border is still serious, however with no prospects of rain as yet. Officials of the Department of Lands and Mines intimated today that as a result of the persistency with which settlers had carried on imprudent slash burning in the northern part of the province this year, it was evident that a policy would have to be made operative preventing all spring burning and limiting slash burning to the fall only, and then under the closest supervision.

A report which was received from a fire ranger at Petit Rocher, Gloucester County, stated that a large blaze which was raging at Neuville on the Gaspé Coast northeastward across the Bay Chaleur in Quebec from Bathurst, was visible at Petit Rocher.

Advice received from Metapedia vicinity states that a fire which caused considerable consternation there had spread down from St. Alexis on the C.N.R. in Quebec a few miles beyond the provincial boundary. This blaze had jumped across the Restigouche River and had threatened the village of Metapedia.

been instituted for the arrest of a settler said to be responsible for a blaze which spread beyond control and covered 2,500 acres in the general vicinity of St. Quentin and Kedgewick. The maximum penalty for a conviction obtained under this section is 14 years imprisonment, while a maximum of 7 years is provided for a conviction for attempting to set fires.

Negligence only in burning has a maximum penalty of two years imprisonment.

Two charges, one of wilfully setting fires and one of burning slash without a permit will be pressed in this instance, it was said today.

### Amendment To The B.N.A. Act?

The redistribution committee have held a general session in camera, when the situation in all the provinces was reviewed. Opinion around the corridors is that little progress was made, and though there are hopes of getting a bill through at the present session, that result is by no means assured. A plea has been made for an amendment to the British North America Act to prevent a reduction in the representation of Nova Scotia but there is a disposition to regard such action as doubtful.

### Malcolm Bruce Freed Of Sedition Charge

Sydney, N.S., June 6 The charge of seditious utterances against Malcolm Bruce, editor of the Worker Toronto, was formally dismissed by Magistrate A.B. McGillivray, at Glace Bay Town Hall this afternoon. His Honor declared that after reading the testimony he was unable to find evidence sufficient to warrant committing the accused for trial by a higher court. Bruce was therefore discharged and released from his bail bonds of \$1,500.

### FIGHT THE FLY

The time has come to start war on the house fly, that most efficient carrier of disease germs which annually take a large toll of human life. Flies should be kept out of dwellings and away from human food, especially that which is to be eaten without further cooking. House flies are plentiful where there is carelessness in the proper disposal of refuse in which they breed. The very fact that flies are the product of the manure pile and the dirt heap, should impel constant, relentless warfare against them. One fly is a menace because capable of carrying infection. Science has so thoroughly established the true character of the house fly that householders everywhere should give hearty co-operation to the campaign of extermination, which is a campaign against the menace of dirty, if not positively dangerous food. The possibilities in the fight are cleaner and more appetizing food and greater freedom from sickness.

### DIRECTION FOR CAR OWNERS IN MAINE

The following information has been given the Houlton Times regarding regulations on all traffic coming into Maine from Canada by Deputy Collector Finnigan of the Houlton office.

**Procedure For American Cars**  
Before going to Canada go to the Custom House and get an automobile registration card.

Every time you return from Canada go to the Custom House and report your return, which will be checked on the card. It will not be necessary to go to the Custom House every time you go to Canada. If you have a registration card which is good for 30 days.

But you must report to Customs every time you return to the United States from Canada or be liable to a fine of \$100 for failure to report, also to forfeiture of a car if merchandise of any sort is brought back.

**Procedure for Canadian Cars**  
On entering the United States from Canada go to the United States Custom House and report your arrival.

A blue card or automobile touring permit will be issued to you good for 30 days.

When you return to Canada it is not necessary to report to the Custom House again.

But you must report to United States Custom every time you arrive from Canada or be liable to a fine of \$100. Also in case of Canadian cars, the car itself is liable to forfeiture.

These regulations apply to teams and vehicles of every sort as well as to automobiles.

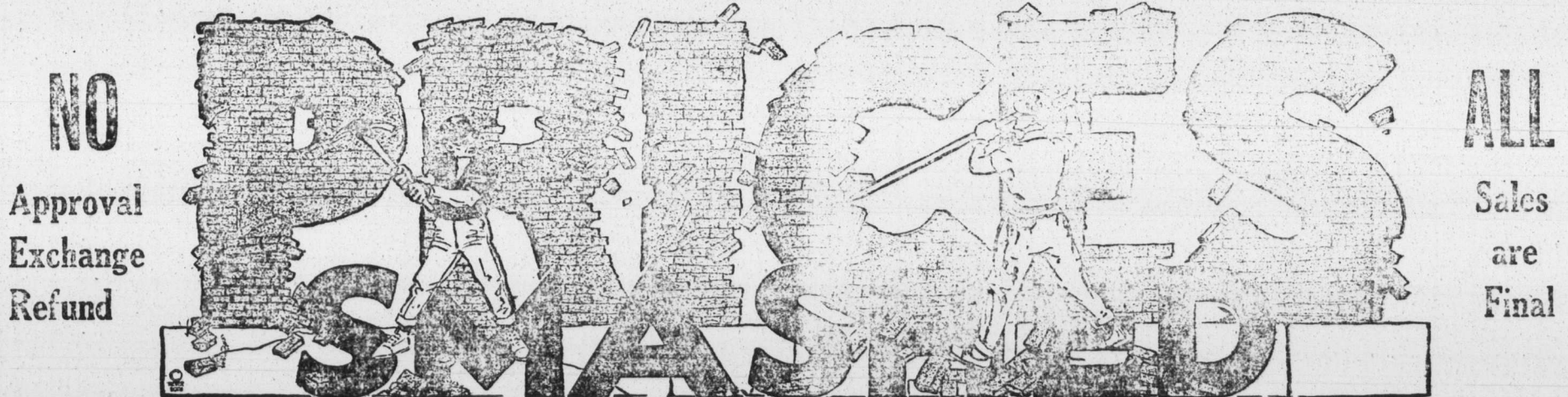

### Two Amendments In Banking Act Adopted

Ottawa, June 7—Two amendments to the interest and discount section of the Bank Act proposed by the Western Progressive group were adopted by the Commons' Banking and Commerce Committee today. The first prohibits a bank from making any charge for keeping a customer's account without an agreement with the customer; and the second requires the rate of interest and discount charged by the bank to be stated in the face of the note.

The second amendment was carried over, the objection of the secretary of the Canadian Bankers' Association.

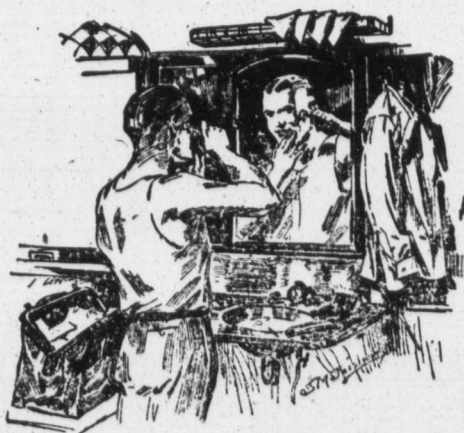

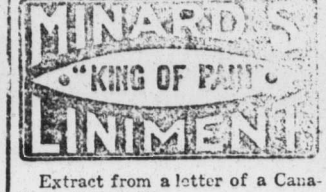

**TAXES COME FIRST, RULING OF COURT**

Vancouver—Denjion and provincial taxes owing by the South Store Lumber Co. Ltd. must be paid prior to a claim of the Royal Bank of Canada for money advanced to the company subsequent to the taxes becoming due, according to a judgment of Justice Murphy. Denjion's issued by the lumber company under a trust deed to the Royal Bank of Canada had been assigned to the bank to secure advances made from time to time when the Montreal Trust Company refused to have the deed assigned to it. The bank's claim was for \$22,000. The court found that the taxes did not exceed the proceeds of the deed, and that the bank should be paid before the taxes.

The Dominion Government represented by A.R. Cross, claimed \$70,000 for business profit taxes; and the Provincial Government, represented by M. Cecil Kilham, claimed about \$5,000 for personal property taxes. Justice Murphy ordered advances made by the bank after the taxes became due to rank after the taxes. **FREE TREATMENT OF INSULIN PROPOSED IN N.B.**

The first Canadian provincial government to administer insulin to free patients through the department of health will probably be that of New Brunswick, says the Toronto Star. A visit for this purpose has just been made to Toronto by Hon. Wm. F. Koberts, the enterprising Minister of Health of the New Brunswick government. Accompanied by Dr. Donnelly, Dr. Roberts made a thorough investigation of the treatment of diabetes by the famous insulin extract and its manufacture in Toronto. A whole morning was spent by Dr. Roberts, with Dr. F.G. Banting, inspecting the diabetes clinic at the Toronto general hospital and going into the details of the administration of the extract. At Dr. Banting's own office some remarkable cases, treated by Dr. Banting and his assistant, Dr. F. W.W. Hippwell, were shown to Dr. Roberts.

At the Connaught laboratories later on Dr. Roberts was assured that he could be supplied with insulin by Dr. Duffries. The only insulin centre in New Brunswick at present is the general hospital at St. John. But a widening out from this centre is part of Dr. Robert's plan.

**Banking Proposals Are Turned Down**

Ottawa, June 6—Two proposals to fix a maximum rate of interest on bank loans at seven per cent were voted down in the Commons Banking and Commerce Committee this evening after being under debate all day. Two other motions related to the same subject were left over until tomorrow. The two proposals voted down were those of T.D. Shaw of Calgary and A.M. Carmichael of Kindersley. Mr. Shaw proposed to make the maximum rate effective by enabling the borrower to recover twice the amount of interest paid in excess and by declaring the interest on the whole loan forfeited while Mr. Carmichael advocated doing it by authorizing the courts to reopen the whole transaction between the banker and the borrower. The proposals laid over came from Mr. Coats of MacLeod and attacked the question through the rate of discount.

**TERMINAL ELEVATOR SCREENINGS**

Dominion Seed Commissioner Clark Advises Purchasers to Specify "Standard Recleaned Screenings" or "Oats Scalpings"

Students of screenings from the terminal elevators at the head of the wheat now carry grain inspector certificates of character. Mr. Clark, Dominion Seed Commissioner, explains that this measure came into effect two years ago under the Feeding Stuffs Act. The standard of screenings was fixed to "Standard Recleaned Screenings" covering shipments to contain not more than one per cent of the impurities. Since that classification has been put into force, it has been found that screenings as graded now contain more than one per cent of the objectionable material. Last year more than sixty thousand tons of "Standard Recleaned Screenings" were sold for feed purposes and no report has been received of any injury to the health of the stock. These screenings are proved to contain on the average about 18 per cent of brood and shrunken wheat and 11 per cent of wild buckwheat. This condition varies with the season and with the source of origin. Recleaned screenings from wheat grown in north-east Saskatchewan and Manitoba normally contain a higher per cent of wild buckwheat than do screenings from wheat grown in drier areas. Wild buckwheat approximates cultivated buckwheat in feeding value, but its black seed coat imparts a dark appearance to ground screenings and on that account is liable to meet with objections at first from feeders. Mr. Clark states that "Standard Recleaned Screenings" should always be very finely ground and while a comparatively inexpensive and wholesome feed for mature stock, when the mustard seed content is not more than one per cent should never be fed to young pigs or calves. There is also separated at the terminal elevators a screenings product known as "Oat Scalpings," composed chiefly of wild oats, with a small per cent of cultivated oats, wheat and other coarse grains which is practically free from fine weed seeds, and which is shipped out bearing the grain inspector's certificate under that title. As only "Standard Recleaned Screenings" and "Oats Scalpings" have been given a commercial status, Mr. Clark says purchasers should always specify which they require, in order to avoid getting material only endorsed "Elevator Screenings" and which actually contains an excess of the fine black weed seeds.

**More Armed Men  
In Europe Than  
Before The War**  
In the first speech he made since  
he became a member of the  
British Cabinet, Lord Robert Cecil

**Ramsay MacDonald  
Dubs Baldwin An  
"Enfant Terrible"**  
Ramsay MacDonald, Labor  
leader in the British House of  
Commons, in an article in the  
New Leader, the weekly organ of

new government is an old one  
with a patch or two stuck on it.  
He says the great change in
