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CROWWELL REFUTES THE SCANDAL CHARGES

New York Solicitor Gives the Lie to the Two United States Editors Who Made Charges Relating to Purchase of Panama Canal by United States.

New York, Dec. 14.—William Nelson Crowwell, today authorized the following statement: "My attention had been called to a statement issued by the editor of the Indianapolis News in which he attempts to reply to the charge made by President Roosevelt that certain statements in the Indianapolis News and relating to the purchase of the Panama Canal by the United States were false and untrue.

"The editor of the News in his reply stated that the other men such as Cromwell and Morgan, who were believed to have full knowledge in regard to the business, said nothing and he attempted to justify the publication of the statements appearing in his paper by stating that they were based largely on statements which were made over and over again during the campaign and were utterly ignored until today.

"The reply of the editor of the News furnishes another proof of the justice of the president's characterizations for in the very journal under whose sheets it now takes refuge, namely, the New York World of October 2nd, 1908, appears an explicit and unqualified denial by Haytian soldiers' Commander Shipley of the charges made in the Indianapolis News.

"Neither I nor anyone allied with me bought or sold, dealt in or made a penny profit out of any stocks, bonds or other securities of the old Panama canal company.

"Neither did I make a single dollar out of the \$40,000,000 paid for the same.

"Not one dollar of it ever came to me and it is alleged that he made an improper entry in connection with the sale of a building in Chicago, Anderson is in Chicago completing negotiations to sell the Pan Handle smelters in Idaho to the American Smelting and Refining Company. With Anderson is Mr. MacLeod, a partner of Anderson, who has had a long interest in forming a packing company in Canada to oppose Swift & Company.
