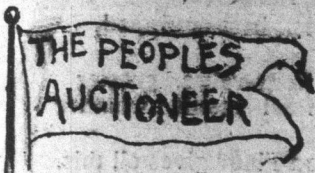

Fads and Fashions.

The fichu drapery is quite evident on the majority of gowns. It can be snowy net on colored linen or batiste. It is frequently tied in a butterfly bow at the back and a bolero effect is given in the draping of the folds at the front.

The tunic is still draped over our dresses. It is a feature of the spring styles and will be carried into the summer. Usually it is of contrasting color and material, and the newest shape is longer at the back than in front.

The rosette or cockade of loops with two pointed ends is revolutionary and is used on a wide number of gowns and hats. It is converted into a finish for girdle, placed in the back or front, or it is used on a hat in a more elaborate manner.

The many shell combs and pins which have been so fashionable in the past are not seen now. Bands are, of course, the newest hat ornaments, but they are much narrower, and, when becoming, are placed well to the front and close to the head.

Streets suits of fine French dark blue serge are having a tremendous vogue, all more or less trimmed with fancy narrow and wide braids, soutache and rat-tail, not to mention button loops, as well as quillings and pipings of satin.

One variety of small hat has a low round crown and a rolling brim shorter toward the front, where it curves rather abruptly. The popular trimming for this style is a scarf design in cloth or embroidery or the two Mercury wings posed either in the back or in the front.

One of the latest parasols seen in the shops was of Parisian silk with strongly marked designs and colorings. The shape was rather odd and interesting; it was gathered between the ribs to an elastic band. It was untrimmed and had an extra long handle of imitation ivory.

Parasol handles are long (about 42 inches from tip to end), whose lengths are finished with tassels and rosettes of heavy cord or ribbon, and are of most elaborate workmanship. Some are hand-carved wood or hand-wrought metal. Others are of cut jet in elaborate designs, and again we see the handsome Toledo work used with decorative effect on the more pretentious parasols for dress occasions.

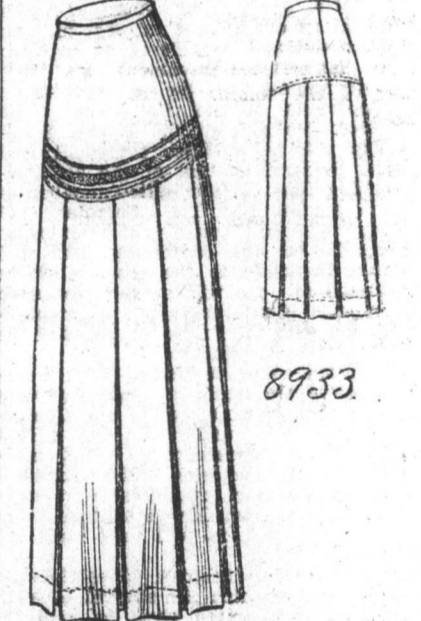

Items of Interest

London, May 12.—Queen Mother Alexandra, who returned a week ago from a cruise on the Mediterranean, has taken up residence at Sandringham Palace, where she will remain until after the Coronation. During the cruise and since her return the Queen Mother has enjoyed good general health. She reached here just in time to be present at the memorial service on the anniversary of the death of King Edward, and her distress during the service was marked. As yet she has scarcely recovered from the strain, but otherwise the Royal Widow is in excellent health.

Philadelphia, May 12.—What are declared to be world's records for Gurnsey cattle was obtained yesterday at a sale on the farm of Frederick Phillips at Villanova. Mortimer P. Plant, of New London, Conn., paid \$2,300 for "Billy France of the Hague," a three year old bull that was awarded first prize at a Canadian exhibition last year. The same bidder paid \$2,600 for a choice of one of nine cows, and selected "Billy Frances Lady Gazelle," a 4 year old cow bred by Yves Lance, of the Isle of Guernsey. Seventy-eight animals were sold for a total of \$37,275, which is also said to be a world's record for cattle of this strain.

Kansas City, Mo., May 10.—Hobble skirt gowns to be used as funeral shrouds are now on exhibition here this week at the Convention of the

Missouri Funeral Directors' Association. The fashions in ready-made burial garment should keep pace with the fashions in Petticoat Lane, they say. Frocks of silk and tailored suits of broadcloth, as well as more simpler things in challies and the like, are shown in the latest styles in the showrooms of the agents who are here to attend the convention. The men are not neglected in funeral garb, either, for the undertakers are also showing a line of frock and evening dress for the grave.

The story of a cow's extraordinary appetite comes from County Mayo. The other day a farmer in Manulla, who deals in aged cows, bought one which became unwell immediately, and died soon after. 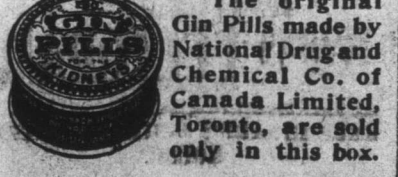

Baird, Ltd., and after getting supplies and an advance, instead of going with his master went out to work on the Trepassey Branch Railway. A warrant was sworn out for his arrest Saturday and the police arrested him and brought him to the city. Each season about this time planters are given much trouble by men who ship with them and then desert their service.

Imperial Conference.

To-day the Imperial Conference assembles in London. The object of the Empire to take counsel together for the common weal of the Empire. At the last conference a number of resolutions were passed. First and foremost amongst them was one which dealt with the constitution and objects of future conferences. The conference which meets to-day is the first under that arrangement. The resolution runs as follows:

"That it will be to the advantage of the Empire if the Conference, to be called the Imperial Conference, is held every four years, at which questions of common interest may be discussed and considered as between His Majesty's Government and his Governments of the self-governing Dominions beyond the Seas. The Prime Minister of the United Kingdom will be ex-officio President, and the Prime Ministers of the self-governing Dominions ex-officio members of the conference. The Secretary of State for the Colonies will be ex-officio member of the conference, and will take the chair in the absence of the President. He will arrange for such Imperial Conferences after communication with the Prime Ministers of the respective Dominions.

"Such other Ministers as the respective Governments may appoint will also be members of the Conference, if being understood that, except by special permission of the Conference, each discussion will be conducted by not more than two representatives from each Government and that each Government will have only one vote.

"That it is desirable to establish a system by which the several Governments represented should be kept informed during the periods between the Conferences in regard to matters which have been or may be subjects for discussion, by means of a permanent secretarial staff, charged, under the direction of the Secretary of State for the Colonies, with the duty of obtaining information for the use of the Conference, of attending to its resolutions, and of conducting correspondence on matters relating to its affairs.

"That upon matters of importance, or more Governments which cannot conveniently be postponed until the next Conference, or involving subjects of a minor character or such as call for detailed consideration, subsidiary Conferences should be held between representatives of the Governments concerned specially chosen for the purpose."

REPLACES THE CARDENIA.—Capt. Wm. Carroll goes to Hr. Breton by the train to-morrow to take charge of the schr. Emma White of 70 tons, which he has purchased to replace the lost Cardenia. He will trade between Halifax, Sydney and the West Coast in the vessel.

EXTERMINATING WILD GESE.—We learn from people who recently arrived from the northward in schooners that wild geese are being exterminated at Gambo, Alexander Bay and Port Blandford. Men have been going to their haunts up country, kill the young and mother birds, steal and destroy the eggs taken from the nests and will soon kill these fine birds out altogether. Another feature of this work is that it is a cloak for the illicit killing of deer. The authorities should look into this matter.

FISH AT PETTY HARBOR.—Daniel Chafe caught 12 fine codfish at Petty Harbour this morning with a jigger.

IN HOSPITAL.—Mr. M. O'Mara, Inspector of Weights and Measures, is now in Hospital undergoing an operation.

Mr. Moses Sacrey, came passenger by the Corinthian. Mr. Sacrey was formerly 2nd officer of the ill-fated Regulus. He was called to Philadelphia on special business.

NO DECISION.—The Commanding Officers of the four brigades met again to-day but no decision as to the Coronation celebration was arrived at. They meet again to, if possible, come to a determination during the week.

COD, SALMON AND LOBSTERS.—Cod, salmon and lobsters were sold in the city to-day by Portugal Cove men. Cod fetched from 10 to 15 cents each; salmon, 30 cents lb.; lobsters from 15 to 40 cents each.

TO GREENLAND HALIBUTTING.—The American schooner Oregon, of Gloucester, called into Bay Bulls this morning for a supply of fresh water. She is bound down to Greenland to prosecute the halibut fishery there.

TWENTY-THREE SAILORS.—Twenty-three men sailed by the Corinthian yesterday to bring out the new ship Stephano. These include Capt. J. Vine, 2nd mate Duder and assistant steward Snow. The rest are seamen, firemen and engineers.

CHILD ASTRAY.—Little Willie Mallard went astray from his home at McFarlane Street yesterday. He was found at Waterford Bridge by two boys who brought him to the West End Firehall where his mother found him at 8 o'clock at night.

PATIENTS FOR HOSPITAL.—A woman from Hant's Harbor is coming in by to-night's train to go to Hospital, also a man and a child from Harbor Grace. By this morning's train Fred Rove who is suffering from a bad knee came in and was taken to the Hospital by Mr. E. Whiteaway.

DIPHThERIA AT CAPE FREEL.—Saturday the Health Authorities were advised that diphtheria had developed at Cape Island, a small island near Cape Freeland. Five cases were reported in three houses, which are under quarantine. Two deaths have occurred and the magistrate and doctor of the place are doing their best to cope with the situation.

MORE DIPHThERIA REPORTED.—A boy 13 years old, a resident of Hamilton Avenue, developed diphtheria Saturday evening and is being nursed at home. Dr. Brehm returned from Petty Harbour Saturday. There was one death in the Chafe family of diphtheria, and the other patient, a little girl, is very much better and will be around again after a couple of days.

FOGOTA ARRIVED.—The S. S. Fogota returned from the North at 4 a.m. yesterday. The saloon passenger list is: Mrs. Barbour, J. B. White, Mr. F. F. Abbott, W. J. Duder, J. Turner, J. Brocklehurst, W. Harris and 12 in second cabin. Last Wednesday the ship met a heavy snow storm while crossing Bonavista Bay while going down. The return trip was favourable. She brought a small freight.

FISHERY NEWS.—During the past week several schooners have left Twillingate for the French Shore to prosecute the fishery. A King's Cove trawler is a good sign of fish. Brown's trap secured 9 qts. in two hauls to-day. No line men are yet on the grounds. Conception Harbor reports a good sign of cod to-day at Bacon Cove. Salmon are also plentiful. There was a good sign of cod at Trinity Saturday.

Reciprocity From the Patriotic Standpoint.

Editor Evening Telegram:
Dear Sir,—Hitherto, in your columns, the question of Reciprocity with the U. S. A. appears to have been treated solely in reference to its connection with Trade. If that were the only position in which it could be considered, I—not being a business man—would have nothing to say upon this subject.

But I take a wider outlook than that, for I am of opinion that this Reciprocity if we have it will eventually to some extent affect the whole British Empire.

It is a question of such magnitude as places it altogether beyond the region of mere party politics, and to discuss it in that light is to degrade it.

I am glad to find that both the Hon. John Harvey and W. A. Munn, Esq., in their able and interesting letters have viewed it as standing altogether apart from party politics, and solely in reference to what they consider to be its merits in connection with our Trade.

As a loyal British subject I should like an answer to two or three questions which I now venture to put to your readers.

How far will trade union tend towards promoting political union? Are we Newfoundlanders convinced that the unity of the British Empire is worth cementing? If so, to what extent will that union be affected by Reciprocity, if we have it?

Do we, Newfoundlanders, consider ourselves justified in sacrificing Empire interests in the effort to further our own? If we do this are we, or are we not, likely in the near future to discover that we have thereby adopted a penny wise, pound foolish policy in regard to our own best interests?

We front the Atlantic and guard the main portal of entrance to the British possessions in North America. If our best is taken will not the safety of the citadel itself be endangered?

I am certain that no matter how carefully for their own political ends American statesmen may at the present time try to hide it from our view, yet nevertheless, the Monroe doctrine which in its full outcome means all of America for the Great American Republic, is still a live factor in United States politics, and if opportunity offers ready to become very active indeed.

The late President Taft offers, no doubt, tempting, but I fear that underneath it lies a powerful steel trap in which to snare the unwary Canadian Beaver, and a strong and sharp pointed hook on which to impale the simple Newfoundland Cod.

Like the Scythians of old I distrust the Greeks when they come bearing gifts.

An Important Matter.

At Last Mass at St. Patrick's Church yesterday Rev. Fr. Kelly spoke from the pulpit of a matter which is of much importance not alone to their people but to those of other denominations. Through ignorance or carelessness on both, when the census enumerators go to houses they find people who don't give them correct answers as to the number of children in their families, there being many instances on record where in large families the number was lessened in answer to the queries of the census officials. People act very foolishly in giving incorrect details in such cases and do themselves an injustice. The educational grants are calculated on a per capita basis in their distribution amongst the various denominations, and this being so, incorrect information should not be given by heads of families or others called on to furnish it. Father Kelly also spoke of the necessity of parents seeing to it that their children attend the Sunday Catechism Classes to be instructed in Christian Doctrine. A staff of devoted teachers are present each Sunday and it is the intention of the clergy of St. Patrick's to see to it that the children will attend to receive religious instruction.

A Famous Wrestler.

Bob Berry, the celebrated middle-weight champion wrestler of England, arrived here by Saturday's express and will try conclusions with Young Olson on Monday night next. Berry won out in the All-England tournament last year at London and received the belt which he now wears. He is now on his way home to England from the domain of Uncle Sam, where he spent some months. He had thirteen matches in the States, 10 wins, 2 a draw and one a loss. His record is a splendid one and he has defeated the best men in his class both in England and America. The belt which he wears is a beauty and will be exhibited during the week. He is a clean wrestler and the match with Olson will be one of the most interesting ever witnessed in St. John's.

Can't Get Men.

The planters of the south side of St. John's, who have fishing stations there, find it as difficult as their fellows of the northern bays to get help adequate to the success of the coming season's fishery, and they view the situation with no slight concern. Last season the same difficulty presented itself but not to the same extent as now apparent. The difficulty was eventually bridged over, but it is greatly feared that the industry must be undertaken this year minus much necessary assistance. Masters of vessels are trying everywhere to secure fishery servants but with indifferent success. The best inducements are being held out—large increases of wages and liberal shares in terms are being offered, but men seem inclined to fight shy of the fishery. So many other avenues of employment are open with a certainty of a good weekly wage that men will not go into an industry in which they must wait until the season ends for the wages which must come to them. Last year in some cases planters had to work with two and three men short of the regular staff.

Body by Train.

Mrs. Rodgers, sister of Mr. Frank Walsh, of this city, died in hospital at Boston Friday last. The body will be brought here by the next incoming express and will be interred at Belvidere. Deceased was wife of the late Mr. Rodgers, the gunmaker, who had a large store on Duckworth Street where gunsmith business was carried on by him on a large scale 30 years ago near the site where the Royal Hotel now stands.

B.I.S. Meeting.

The quarterly meeting of the Benevolent Irish Society took place yesterday at noon. Mr. J. M. Kent occupied the chair. Four new members were admitted. The reports of the officers were read, showing that the affairs of the Society were in a prosperous condition. It was decided to hold an excursion to the country during the coming summer. The committee appointed will make all arrangements.

The Sultan rose in alarm, and fell back fainting. The commander of the escort spurred his horse and cut off the approach of the advancing Kurds, who were arrested.

LONDON, May 21.
It is understood that the existing cable rates, which are still considered to be excessive, will come up for consideration at the Imperial Conference. Premier Fisher of Australia, and Premier Woodhouse of New Zealand are both eager to have the subject brought up. Heniker Beaton, the veteran postal reformer, who up till the present Parliament, was member for Canterbury, describes the present rates as insane, from the Imperial point of view.

French Minister Killed by Monoplane.

PARIS, To-Day.
France yesterday paid another toll to death in her endeavour to gain supremacy in the art of aviation. A monoplane of which the driver had lost control plunged into a group of members of the cabinet, gathered to witness the start of the Felite Parisienne race from Paris to Madrid. The Minister of War, M. Bertheux, was killed. Premier Monis, his son, and M. de la Mewnach, an aged sportsman, were injured badly. Nineteen others narrowly escaped. The accident occurred at the aviation field of Issey, Les Molleaux. The accident was witnessed by 200,000 people. The machine was wrecked.

Archbishop Preaches.

His Grace Archbishop Howley preached at Vespers last evening at the Cathedral, taking his text from the 19th chap. St. Matthew, 3rd to 6th verses. The Pharisees who were always trying to entrap our Divine Saviour with their questions, asked Him if it was lawful for a man to put away his wife for any cause. The answer given by Our Saviour, summed up in a few words for all time to come the law of the church relating to marriage: "What, therefore, God hath joined together let no man put asunder." His Grace explained at great length that the Catholic Church had always regarded matrimony as a great Sacrament and had set her face against divorce in an uncompromising manner. At the present time, especially in the United States, the evil of divorce was threatening to undermine society. The increase in divorce cases and the ease with which the marriage tie was cut and become appalling to the leaders of States and Churches, except to the Catholic Church which had always been the bulwark of defence in regard to marriage. The sovereigns, princes and rulers of the world were now looking to the Catholic Church to save society from the on-rushing tide of divorce. They realize this to be the only hope. It was in pursuance of the Church's doctrine as laid down at the Council of Trent that His Holiness Pope Pius X had about a year ago issued an encyclical relating to the Sacrament of Marriage. It taught no new doctrine but rather confirmed, amplified and extended the teaching of the Council of Trent on Matrimony. This letter of His Holiness is known by the first two words contained in it, viz., "Ne Temere." The papers and magazines of America and England have abounded with articles on the "Ne Temere" the past six months. Most of the writers knew not what they were talking about. However, being against the Pope and affording a chance to have a fling at Rome, it was regarded by the enemies of the Church who control newspapers as "good copy." In the North of Ireland it was used as a timely weapon to kill Home Rule sentiment, but when a specific case was brought before the House of Commons and all the evidence heard it came to nothing. The next storm against the "Ne Temere" arose in Canada where a number of writers and declaimers set themselves up to denounce the "Roman Tyranny." His Holiness in the "Ne Temere" is simply confirming rules and regulations for the members of the Catholic Church in regard to the Sacrament of Marriage, viz., that unless the marriage is solemnized by a priest of the church it is no marriage but is null and void in the eyes of the church. Quebec has the exercises of her religion, the conduct of her education and marriage ceremonies, etc., fully guaranteed by the North American Act as well as by the terms of surrender when the French people of Lower Canada agreed to accept the British Rule. The Catholic Religion is the State religion of Quebec and no power can interfere with the exercise of the rights and privileges that were guaranteed by the Treaty made when the French came under British Rule.
