

"I have already got to the point of considering that there is no more respectable character on this earth than an unmarried woman who makes her own way through life, quietly, perseveringly, without support of husband or brother, and who, having attained the age of forty or upwards, retains a well regulated mind, a disposition to enjoy simple pleasures, and fortitude to support inevitable pains sympathy with the suffering of others and willingness to relieve want as far as means allow."—Charlotte Brontë.

A western minister has recently got ten all the notoriety he could possibly have desired by saying that bachelors and old maids should be exiled to a desert island there to reflect on their state as a waste of humanity.

Yesterday I recalled that brilliant statement and wished with all my heart that its author could have sat beside me on the trolley car.

I was riding in town on one of the morning cars. It was the hour at which most of the passengers are workers in shops and offices on their way to the day's imprisonment, but there was one woman with a little child in her arms. I did not happen to see the child because she was so placed as to be put off my direct line of vision, but I saw her reflected in the faces of three women opposite me. These three women were evidently going to work in shops or offices, they were middle-aged and apparently of that criminal class against which the minister preached. And yet as I say, without being able to see that baby myself, I knew there must be a baby somewhere by the strange, sweet look which came over those three faces and the absorbed way in which they gazed across the aisle.

If that minister could have sat be-

side me, I don't think even the desire for notoriety could have persuaded him to talk about old maids that way again.

If there is any more ridiculous idea than this notion that the average old maid dislikes children and deliberately chooses a single existence because she has a pickle like temperament, in spite of eager protests on the part of desirable males, I have yet to meet it. And yet it seems to be a favorite theory both with men and with safely married females.

Stuff and nonsense! To be sure here aren't many women who never had a chance. But there are plenty of women who haven't had a chance to marry a man whom they could respect and like and trust—to say nothing of love. And is a woman to be blamed or not snapping up anything at all in preference to remaining single? Poor bachelors, show unfairly we treat them, alternately we make fun of them for being ready to snatch at a straw, and preach against them or not being ready to.

This western minister's statement was more widely quoted than it would otherwise have been because a good and wise bachelor girl, widely known and as widely loved, has rebuked him. "If I had found a suitable helpmate I might have spent money in a different way which might not have done so much good as it does now," says Helen Gould. "Please think this over before preaching on this subject again make up your mind that there is some good in living a single life."

The sanity and dignity of that quiet statement is as soothing after that foolish tirade as silence after a tumult.

To be sure there may be some silly, cold-headed, child-hating old maids, but I don't believe they are any more common than silly, cold-hearted child-hating married women, nor half so common as splendid brave-hearted, self-sacrificing old maids.





**The Premier's Recklessness.**

The Government organs fall utterly to meet our charge of financial recklessness on the part of Sir Edward Morris and his administration. They cannot meet it, because it is absolutely true, and proved up to the hilt by Morris's own words and deeds.

In no way did he intimate to the electorate that his first railway extension contract would let the people in for the gigantic debt which is being piled up.

Even when he was dealing in the House of Assembly with the branch railway extensions he made out that the burden of the first loan would cover entirely the cost of the branch lines contracted for. There is no doubt about this, for we have his own words to prove it.

Here are some extracts from his remarks in the House of Assembly on this matter: "In other words, when all these lines are built, the interest on the cost, which we shall have to pay, will be \$140,000 a year."

"It may be asked, can the Colony afford \$140,000 a year for five branch railways . . . ? Is it worth it?" "The whole of the branches will then (meaning 1915) be completed, and the question must naturally arise, what will the revenue be in 1915? Will it be sufficient to meet this interest charge of \$140,000, and pay for all the other services on their increased."

These extracts prove conclusively his recklessness in dealing with financial matters. Either he knew what he was talking about or he did not. If he knew what he was talking about he was intentionally deceiving the country. If he did not know what he was talking about, it was his business to understand the case, before he entered on a contract involving such vast sums. It is no answer to a charge of reckless expenditures of public money to say that Mr. Somebody attempted to get Mr. Downey to change sides and break the deadlock. We have heard similar stories of approaches being made to Mr. Roberts and Mr. Miller to leave the Liberal party. However slyly, they afford no justification for the recklessness of the Morris administration, nor for the willful waste of public money mainly to influence the voting of districts.

## How to Walk

I read an article by a prominent actress in a Pittsburg newspaper in which she advised placing the ball of the foot on the ground first, and claimed that any other way of walking was wrong and would give the walker flat feet. This accords with the notion of the average person. I may be in good taste to tiptoe across the stage, but it is decidedly incorrect.

A mile walk will convince one that it is a difficult way of locomotion, and unnatural. This absurd mode of walking is exemplified in the extreme high French heels worn by some women. In tiptoe or ball-of-foot walking, the base upon which the body rests is too small, and occasions the turning of the foot, thereby causing sprains. High heels are responsible for ball-of-foot sprains.

A great many women writers, and some teachers of physical training, advocate this method of walking, and they either have a very limited experience in walking, or they have not given the subject much study.

The correct way to walk is place the heel on the ground first, with the feet pointing straight ahead.

Some authorities give considerable credit to the bent knee-walk, but this method is confined principally to the army, and will never become general with the people.

In addition to placing the heel on the ground first, and pointing the feet front, step out as if you meant it; swing the arms and hold the chest high. The posture of the body is an important consideration in the walk.

Lie back on the floor, chin in towards the chest. Try and assume the same posture while standing, lean forward a little from the hips and you are ready for your walk.

## The Archbishop's Visit North.

On Friday evening last His Grace Archbishop Howley accompanied by Very Rev. J. J. St. John, P.P. Torbay, Chancellor of the Archdiocese, returned by the S. S. Prospero, from Bay de Verde. The following day the place was en fête, a triumphal arch had been erected and a grand display of bunting everywhere met the eye. The Holy Sacrifice of the Mass was celebrated at the church of Bay de Verde. This church is very beautiful and being artistically decorated looked its best. A whole article could be given to a description of this magnificent edifice which is a credit to both pastor and people.

On Thursday the Archbishop and Bishop March accompanied by the Clergy went to Grates Cove. The people from all the surrounding settlements flocked to be present at the Dedication and to hear for the first time the eloquence of the renowned Archbishop of St. John's. The ceremony of Dedication was most solemn and imposing. The Archbishop and Clergy, Cross-bearer and Acolytes followed by a long procession of boys and school girls daintily attired, proceeded round the exterior of the church, the Archbishop blessing and sprinkling it with holy water as he went; the Clergy chanting the appropriate psalms. His Grace and Clergy then entered the church and performed the same ceremony round the interior.

Having recited the Dedication Prayer, His Grace ascended the Predella and preached a magnificent sermon suitable to the occasion, (a full account of which will be given later). He explained the nature of the Dedication of a church to God and during his discourse made an allusion to the great edification given by the unity which exists between all denominations in the settlement.

In the evening there was Benediction of the Most Holy Sacrament with Oration from the Bishop of Harbor Grace on the Assumption. The church is dedicated to Our Lady of the Assumption and His Lordship discoursed most eloquently and learnedly on that subject. After Benediction the Clergy and people repaired to the Parish Hall to enjoy a lantern entertainment with views of scenery in Ireland, the Eucharistic Congress of Montreal and other interesting views; His Grace explained the views and told many a witty story in connection with the scenes. During their stay the visiting Prelates and Clergy were entertained by the Very Rev. Fr. Donnelly in regal style altogether worthy of his distinguished guests, who will long remember with pleasure the Dedication of the Church of Grates Cove and their visit to Bay de Verde.

Ghosts of  
The Ocean.

Phantom Ships That Reappear in  
Times of Great Storms.

The number of phantom ships is legion, says the London Standard. Several of the vessels which were wrecked in close proximity to the scene of the Titanic disaster are even said to reappear in the same spot on certain occasions. The Packet Light is one of these and the story runs that whenever a storm is threatened a ball of fire emerges from the spot

where the ship sank, which presumably forms itself into the shape of a vessel and then sinks and disappears.

King George V. and his brother, the late Duke of Clarence, when on their cruise in the Bacchante from 1879 to 1882, are stated to have seen the phantom of the Flying Dutchman and the Duke mentioned the fact in his diary under the date of July 11, 1881.

A three-masted frigate is said to haunt the English Channel in the vicinity of Ower Lightship whenever a gale or snowstorm is threatened. Hundreds of people have declared they have seen the apparition and heard the cries of the ghostly passengers. It is sometimes said to be the phantom of the training ship Eurydice which went down off the Isle of Wight on March 24, 1878, involving the loss of about 200 lives. There are a host of vessels which have not been heard of since they sailed, but one of the most marvellous stories concerns the Mari Celeste, a French passenger sailing ship. She was sighted by the British ship Highlander on October 4, 1871, and in reply to the signals gave the answer "All's well." Two days later when sighted, she did not reply. She was boarded, but not a living or dead person was found on board.

Everything was in perfect order; luncheon was laid in the saloon, the personal belongings of the passenger and crew were intact, and a bottle of medicine was found upright in the captain's locker. The log had been kept down to the previous day, but there was no entry to account for the mysterious disappearance of all or board. Nothing was heard afterwards of any of the passengers and crew.

Largest Battle-  
ship Afloat.


Although authorities differ as to the dimensions of the recently launched British battle cruiser, "Queen Mary," there seems little reason to doubt that she is the largest warship afloat at the present time. Some authorities give her dimensions as follows: Length over all, 725 feet, beam 87 feet, and displacement, 29,000 tons. She will probably make over 30 knots on trial, and to do this her turbines will have to develop not far short of 100,000 horse-power. The "Moltke," of 23,500 tons approximately displacement, required 30,000 horse-power to drive her at from 29 to 29½ knots.


