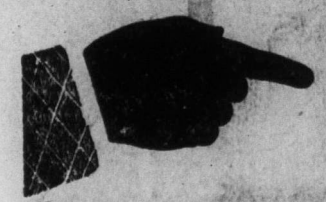

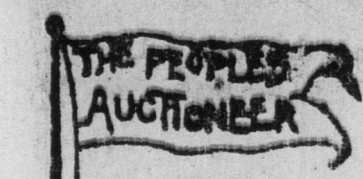

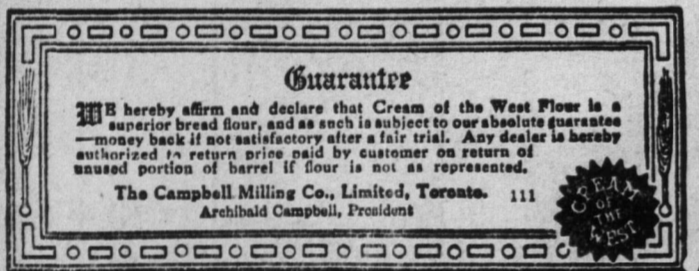

U. S. TARIFF

In the issue of April 12 The Fishing Gazette published the proposed schedule of tariff duties on fish as reported by the Way and Means Committee and since then the Democratic caucus has adopted the committee's report, showing that the latter will pass the House. What the Senate will do can't be foretold so clearly, but if the Senate's action is influenced by the action or non-action of the industries affected, and if the attitude of New York merchants is to be taken as typical of fishing interests elsewhere, it is safe to say that no strong protest against the practical free trade basis of the new duties will be made.

The 'Fishing Gazette' has made a pretty general canvass of New York dealers, and while some object to one feature of the schedule or another, in the main they say they think the change in duties will have little or no effect, so far as the duties go. There is a general opinion that the period of readjustment will be bad for the trade; but this would be the case without regard to schedules. In fact, the effect of the uncertainty already is apparent, and by uncertainty is not meant doubt as to what the new duties will be, but the mere fact of impending change, and the upset conditions incident thereto.

The prevailing dullness in almost all lines already is attributed to this very thing. Naturally, with lower duties likely or no duties at all on stock now carrying a tariff, importers will not bring in any more goods than they can dispose of at once, and wholesalers and jobbers won't take more than they can quickly sell. Buying by all hands thus becomes of a hand-to-mouth character, and this is true of business of all kinds where tariff duties are to be lowered. The business dullness, therefore, may be expected to be general and dullness in one line has a sympathetic effect on another line, and so the effect becomes general.

If dealers have any complaint, it generally concerns the ad valorem instead of specific character of the rates on some of the items. Merchants say this method is troublesome, leads to unintentional undervaluations, with consequent penalties, litigation and no end of trouble.

So far as concerns a lower cost to consumer of goods on a free trade basis, dealers generally say the difference is so small that when apportioned out it will be too slight for retailers to take cognizance of in dealing with their customers. Fluctuations in price, due to the conditions of supply and demand, are known to be far greater than the differences in tariff rates can account for. For example, in 1911 herrings sold at an average of \$10 per barrel, and in 1912 at \$14. Yet in the latter year more stock was imported and used than in the former, according to a dealer here. This was due to conditions entirely apart from price considerations.

Some exporters who were seen this week were inclined to think that their business would be injured, but others strongly dissented. One leading exporter, whose business is with the West Indies, said he thought free fish would result in so much larger sales in this country that the Nova Scotia supply would be drawn on to such an extent as to cause an advance in the producing market. This would mean a higher purchase price to the exporter, who, getting his stock through in bond, has done business on a free trade basis. Others, however, point out that this argument is not well taken, since the present duties on fish are not large enough appreciably to influence the quantities imported, and so really no effect at primary points is to be anticipated. The aggregate of duties on large amounts of stock handled by an importer, jobber, or even retailer, of course, makes an item which he must take care of, and which influences his business transactions; but it is the ultimate consumer whose buying determines all these transactions, and as long as the price to the ultimate consumer is not materially changed, they say, no material change in the volume of business, or in its general directions, is likely. Just as if, were the case reversed and the duties going on, instead of coming off, the increase of duties would be too small to check consumption, just so the decrease as now scheduled is too slight to cause any sensibly wider consumptive demand, or upset any existing trade conditions.

Producing interests, of course, may not look with such equanimity on the projected changes. Producers generally do not take kindly to such. A Gloucester despatch says "a storm of protest" has arisen there, and plans are on foot to hold a meeting of master fishermen to protest to Washington. Fred. L. Davis, a local merchant, is quoted as saying:

"The proposed change would mean the death of the fishing industry, not only to this place, but to all other seaport towns, because we will not be able to cope with such competition as Nova Scotia will give us."

Dealers here say the Gloucester folks are unduly alarmed, and say producers always look at such mat-

School Boy Equals

World's Record for 100 Yards and Lowers 290 Yards Record—World's Record by School Boy. State College, Pa., May 3.—World's sprinting records were smashed here yesterday by Robinson, the speedy schoolboy from Mercersburg Academy. In the first heat of the 100 yard dash his time was 9 3-5 seconds, equalling the world's record for the distance in any kind of competition. In the final heat he ran in 9 4-5, equalling the scholastic record for the distance. His most remarkable performance, however, was in the 220 yards dash, when the stop-watches caught his time at 20 4-5 seconds, two-fifths of a second faster than any previous record.

The track was carefully surveyed after the race and found to be full length.

Fifty Miles an Hour.

Cable News.

Special to Evening Telegram. LONDON, May 9. The arson squad destroyed by fire a large untenanted mansion near Barrow-in-Furness. Usual accompaniments.

CHICAGO, May 9. Fifty-six electric automobiles were consumed this morning in a fire which destroyed a garage and storage warehouse.

PORTLAND, Maine, May 9. Four men were drowned and two others injured when a lighter owned by Randall and McAllister, coal dealers, was overturned by a heavy sea in Casco Bay.

KOENIGSBERG, Germany, May 9. A balloon, which ascended from this city on Wednesday, is missing with its passengers. It was last seen in the neighborhood of Pillan in a storm, and was under command of Capt. Von Wobeser.

VIENNA, May 9. Fire broke out at a bazaar in Scutari this morning. Fanned by a high wind, it rapidly assumed large proportions. It is reported here that the Montegrins started the blaze when leaving the city, in revenge for being compelled to evacuate it.

ST. JOHN, May 9. Arthur P. Hazen, Manager of the Montreal office of the Bank of British North America, died here this morning. Hazen came to his native city with the body of his wife who had died in Montreal a few days ago, after the birth of their second child.

WASHINGTON, May 9. Japan's formal protest against California's Allen Land Bill was submitted to Secretary of State Bryan at the State Department to-day by Viscount Chinda in person. The protest will be placed before president Wilson at a cabinet meeting, by Mr. Bryan, today, in order that an answer may be promptly returned to the Japanese Embassy.

LONDON, May 9. Sir Charles Tupper has arrived at Liverpool on the Empress of Ireland. Speaking of Canada's future, he said that during his long life he had seen great and wonderful developments, but after considering all the essentials which go to make up a great nation, he believed that Canada's growth in the past will prove nothing to the glory of her future. He spoke, with qualification, of President Wilson's tariff changes.

LONDON, May 9. Amongst the documents seized at the Suffragette headquarters was a bundle which proved to be not bombs but letters containing the outpourings of an overflowing heart. They were notes from a love-sick Socialist member of Parliament to a lady, who for some time has taken a prominent part in the movement. It is reported in newspaper circles that the Socialist is Keir Hardie and the lady Mrs. (General) Drummond.

TORONTO, May 9. The proposed Canadian Northern Railway Pacific fleet, will be plying to the Orient by the end of the year. Sir William McKenzie says that it will necessitate the expenditure of a million dollars. The line will run in opposition to both the C.P.R. and Grand Trunk Pacific boats. This means that the C.N.R. will have vessels sailing not only to Japan and the East, but also coasters running to Seattle and the northern sections of British Columbia and Alaska.

VANCOUVER, May 9. The location of the water boundary between British Columbia and the United States, from a point in Hecate Straits to the entrance of Portland Canal, will be undertaken this season by a Dominion Government Survey party, as named by the Treaty of London, which settled the Alaska Boundary dispute over three years ago. The southern extremity of the boundary starts from a point opposite Cape Luzon, Alaska, and traverses the waters at the Dixon east entrance of the Portland Canal, and thence follows through the centre of that Arm of the Sea to the first made boundary in British Columbia.

LONDON, May 9. Anxiety over the Suffragettes' acts of destruction was displayed this morning when Premier Asquith and Winston Churchill, accompanied by their wives, left Waterloo Station to proceed to the coast to join the Admiralty yacht Enchantress, in which they are to make an extended cruise in the Mediterranean. A large number of naval aides-de-camp, secretaries and railway officials surrounded the party, which included cabinet Ministers and others who had come to bid them farewell. Beyond these were outer circles of detectives. So great was the force that any demonstration would have been impossible. Asquith and Churchill intend to inspect the British garrisons and naval stations in the Mediterranean.

It was a ceremony unique in the annals of Canadian church history and a tinge of more than ordinary interest was added to it by the principals, Mr. Charles Stewart Richmond, son of Rev. J. R. Richmond of Gaspe Bay, Quebec, and Miss Sophia Mackenzie, a beautiful Indian girl who is claimed by her relatives to be a descendant of Sir Alexander Mackenzie the discoverer of the Mackenzie River.

It was about eleven years ago that Mr. Richmond, then being a lad, attracted by the call to the wild and the lure of the mining life, was one of the first whites to break a trail east of Hurricanaw, Blazing trails through the bush he found on a little unknown island a little Indian girl—deserted by stepmother and left alone to face starvation and perhaps death. The child as she was then, could not tell the tale of her sufferings, but Mr. Richmond later learned that she had been on the island for four days without food and shelter and had subsisted on the wild berries she gathered.

Taking the child back to his little camp he tenderly nursed her back to health and between them there grew a love which without benefit of clergy took its natural course.

In the years that rolled away the father and stepmother found out the child and claimed her. Well supplied with all the necessities of life, Mr. Richmond's generosity to the natives soon cemented their friendship though, and the father gave his daughter in marriage to him.

The only ceremony attendant on the first union was a solemn promise exacted by the girl's father that as soon as they could get out of the bush to a point of civilization where there was a clergyman that the marriage would be performed in the legal way.

When Mr. Richmond finally found that he could have the marriage performed according to his belief, he held his promise as sacred and with their children the pair set out for Cochrane.

From Keewagama Lake, Que., Mr. and Mrs. Richmond started over the trail for Cochrane. The father took the boy who was a year old in December, and the mother carried the infant girl who was born to them last December. They packed it over an unbroken trail with their children's comfort and health their first thought to the steel at Hurricanaw. There for the first time the little mother heard the clang of a train; from Hurricanaw she enjoyed the first journey that had not been made on foot.

At the conclusion of the marriage Rev. Mr. Bythell baptized the children and the boy was called George Nolan and the girl, Mariel Emma. Mrs. Richmond would gladly pass for a white, but she prefers to be known as a squaw and is proud of her Indian blood.

Mr. Richmond has great expectations for the future of his wife and family. Highly educated himself, fairly well to do and of good family, it is his intention to send their children to his mother to be educated under her supervision. He has five brothers

Cable News.

Special Evening Telegram. WASHINGTON, To-day. Col. Sir Wm. Dunn, Lord Mayor elect of London, and Sir Wm. Treloar former Lord Mayor of London, were guests of Speaker Clark to-day and viewed the proceedings in the House from the Speaker's gallery. Later they were received by President Wilson.

LONDON, To-day. The British steamer Denis, from New York on April 15th, for Para and Manaoas, is aground 120 miles from Para. The British steamer Alden from Liverpool for Manaoas, is assisting the stranded steamer in an effort to haul her off.

At the City Hall.

The weekly session of the Municipal Council took place yesterday afternoon.

Councillor Martin spoke of street cleaning work being charged to road grant and thought such work should come under the sanitary work which was ordered.

Councillor Mullaly objected to money spent on Victoria Park. Councillor Martin represented the Park Committee. The Mayor said Councillor Martin acted perfectly right, and Councillor Mullaly replied he never heard of one man comprising a committee; the vacancy of a deceased Councillor not being filled. The Colonial Secretary acknowledged receipt of Council's letter re C. C. C. grant for land on Parade Grounds. The matter will be brought before the Executive Government.

The Government will pay expenses of 400 feet of fencing on Allandale Road to complete the fencing of Parade Grounds.

J. J. Pike asked for water connection to St. Mary's Rectory, Southside. Granted.

A letter from P. J. Grace, Secretary of the Baseball League, stated that the club was not prepared to shoulder any financial obligations unless they got the exclusive right of the site given them on the Parade Grounds. The matter was left over.

R. J. Green complained of the unsanitary condition of affairs on Pennywell Road; also to the unsatisfactory lighting of same. Will be attended to. Councillor Coaker asked that "clean up" day be fixed for Tuesday, May 13.

J. Ledingham, Secretary of St. Andrew's Church, complained of bad wall near that place. Engineer will visit it and report.

W. N. Gray drew Council's attention to flooding of C. E. Cemetery caused by flooding of sewer. Referred to Engineer.

Applications received for the position of Caretaker of the Quiddi Vidi Swimming Pool were filed.

Thomas Delahunty, Council employee, who was on the sick list, asked for remuneration while he was laid off.

Permission was given N. A. Outerbridge to build motor house; R. K. Holloway to repair house on Gower Street and W. Mackey to repair house on Barnes Road.

Plan of G. Thoren's house, South Side, was submitted and approved.

Councillor Ryan asked if any of the \$90,000 overdue taxes were collected. The Mayor—Yes, about \$14,000.

Councillor Martin asked that band concerts be given weekly in Victoria Park. Councillor Myrick asked for a similar request for Bannerman Park; also that a new fence be erected there. Here Councillor Mullaly interrupted. He objected to such requests as band concerts until the work of collecting the outstanding taxes was done. Some cross firing then ensued between Councillors Martin and Mullaly.

After this Councillors Mullaly and Myrick, the Office Committee, moved that a new system of office work be introduced so that any member of the Council wishing to obtain information off hand as to arrears, etc., could get it as well as details as to amounts collected daily, etc. This was approved by the Board and the work of arranging for the new system will commence immediately.

Were Well Fixed.

Yesterday evening, the police picked up two men who were intoxicated and who were well furnished with money. One, a city chap, had in his pockets \$50, two valuable watches and a well filled valise, as he was leaving the city. The other who was a Harbor Gracian, had no less than \$90 in his pockets when searched by the guard in the lockup. These men would have been a good "find" for some of the crooked ones around the city.

People Interfered.

During the week a number of men who were cutting a right way from Come by Chance were forced to quit operations owing to the opposition of the people of that section. The men worked under the supervision of Mr. Leadwell, who could not induce the people to allow them to proceed with their task.

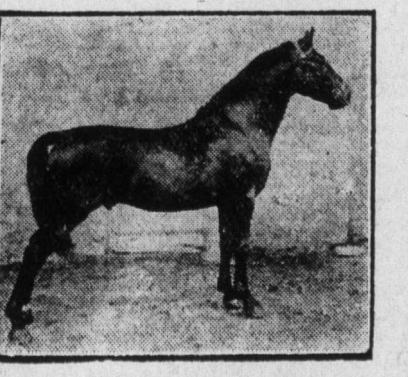

Stonewall Jackson

BY H. L. RANN.



This is the 50th anniversary of the death of Stonewall Jackson, Confederate general. General Jackson was not named Stonewall by his parents, who preferred Thomas Jonathan, but by the entire Union army, after it had run up against Jackson in the performance of his duty. The only fact that Stonewall Jackson ever turned his back to were liquor, profanity, backbiting and other similar pursuits.

General Jackson was born in the mountains of Western Virginia when a mere child, and soon after was made an orphan without any action on his part. After attending country school and learning how to throw the damp paper with unerring accuracy, young Jackson worked his passage into West Point and took the full course, including the 32d degree in plain and fancy hazing. When the Mexican war broke out, Stonewall broke out with it and returned home with a collection of shoulder straps which caused him so much embarrassment that he had to cover it with a heavy undergrowth of whiskers.

At the opening of the Civil war Jackson offered his sword to his state, which commissioned him to attack, defeat, scatter, separate, segregate and decimate the Union army whenever he felt in the mood for doing so. As Jackson was in this mood about nine-

months of the time, his methods of doing business became very annoying to the Union generals, who never were able to whip him with any success except in the press dispatches to the northern papers.

General Jackson had the disagreeable habit of running around the Union army in circles, and then penetrating a neat surprise by piercing it in the left flank with great vivacity. It was while engaged in one of these movements that Jackson encountered the fire of some of his own men and fell. His death stilled a valiant, chivalrous heart and deprived the Confederate army of its most successful general.

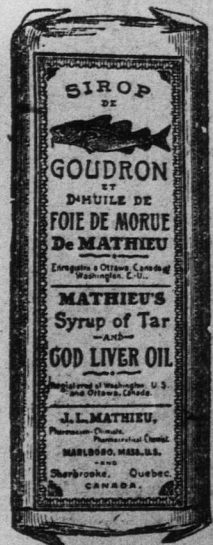
