



The United States is the world's greatest manufacturer of motion picture films, probably threerths of the entire films of the world being manufactured in this cuntry, both as blank or unexposed film, and as finished films ready for

use in the stereopticon. The rapid increase in this branch of he export trade of the United States esulted in the establishment by the Bureau of Foreign and Domestic Com-

merce, Department of Commerce, of

detailed record which shows the quantity, measured by feet, and the value of films exported from the country: the plain film and those ready for use, separately stated; the countries of destination; and the ports through which this distribution is made.

This record shows a total exportaion in the nine months ended with September of 651/2 million feet of unexposed or plain films to be used in other parts of the world in taking motion pictures, and 231/2 million feet of exposed or finished films ready for use in the stereopticon, making a tota! of 89 million feet during the period For the single month of September, however, the total was 141/2 million feet, and should the remaining months of the year make a similar record, the total exports of the year which ends with nevt month would be 133 million feet, or slightly more than 25,000 miles. 



against the absolute indissolubility of marriage. She thought that the system worked badly because wives were less anxious to please their husband when their position was "invulner able." "All self-sacrifice is good," she said, upon reading "Jane Eyre," "but one would like it to be in somewhat nobler cause than that c diabolical law which chains a mar body and soul to a putrefying carcas." So spoke her intellect. Bu another voice spoke out of her concience. "Marriage is a sacred tie which should not be broken lightly o easily." "Those who yield to temptation shall be punished by remorse. The two voices argued in George Eliot's soul; sometimes she listene to shout to her. Yet George Eliot's conscience was always haunted by a sense of guilt, ner mind always brooded with a deep and pervading melancholy over the knowledge that in her own life she had fallen short of the ideals of selfsacrifice, resistance to temptation, and obedience to the sanctity of the marriage bond which she upheld in her books.

"Consequences," she wrote, "are anpitying. Our deeds carry their errible consequences- consequences that are hardly ever confined to our selves. And it is best to fix our minds on that certainty, instead of considering what may be the elements of excuse for us.'

She sternly upheld the doctrine of bedience to the ordinary duties o ife. The words which she put into the mouth of Savonarola came from her owe heart:-



They started experiments in breeding, and carried on their work very quietly for several years at a handsome profit. Others were ultimately attracted by their success, and as years went by fox farms sprang up all over the place.

£7,000 For a Pair of Foxes.

The pelts of the black and silver fox fetch an extraordinary price in London and on the Continent, and you cannot buy one in the fur shops un der £60, while the best quality fetch as much as £500. As an illustration of the value of pure-bred foxes for breeding purposes, it might be mentioned that the two hunters who founded the industry years ago have sold a pair of rare animals for as much as £4,000. And yet so little was the value and beauty of the pelt of the silver fox appreciated before the fox-breeding industry was startfor £10.

One of the pioneers of the industry was the Hon. Charles Dalton, of the Dalton Company already referred to which paid a dividend of 40 per cent. on a capital of £125,000 this year In 1887 Mr., Dalton bought a pair of silvers. 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

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


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
