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



The marquis stood for a second appalled by what he had done, not by the injustice of it, but the effect would have upon her.



Battle of the Guns.

The Famous Deport Gun and the Clever Ruse Which Fooled the Germans.

Modern battles have ceased to be bodily combats and have become artillery duels. The French were the first to perceive it as soon as smokeless powder and repetition rifles made their appearance. It is obvious to them that these inventions were bound to "empty" the battlefields and do away with close formations. Hence the attacks were to be deivered by loosely formed lines, now leaping like grasshoppers and then seeking shelter or throwing themselves down on the ground until they advanced sufficiently to make a bayonet assault. This necessitated change also in artillery tactics. The target having practically disappeared, all artillery could do now was to sweep the battlefield with fire and shower upon its various zones a whirlwind of shrapnel so as to make it untenable. For this a quick-firing artillery gun was required, and to the invention of it the French turned their attention from the very beginning of the nineties of the last cen-

The result of the long labors was the famous gun of 1897, the so-called 75 milli-metre or simple 75 gun, the pride of the French army. Its inventor was Major Deport, at that time director of the construction works at Puteaux and now director of a private armaments firm, and it remains to this day the most superb field gun in existence, with the exception of the improved Deport mode, now adopted by the Italian army.





LONDON, To-day. A summary of the war situation in the London Times states that Namur has fallen. This in the words of the official communication necessitates the withdrawal of a portion of the allied troops from the line of the Sombre to their original defensive positions on the French frontier. Namur is a strongly fortified city at the junction of Meuse and Sombre. It was confidently expected to present a formidable obstacle to German advance. There is as yet no explanation of its sudden fall. No doubt the Germans have attacked the allies in this part of Belgium with all their available forces. The battle, now raging from Mons to Cere, will last several days and it will be necessary to await the definite result before a sound conclusion can be reached, as to the full effect of this first real engagement.



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
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
