

# **Messages** Received

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War News.

**Previous to 9 A.M.** ST. PIERRE BULLETIN. PARIS, via St. Pierre, March 27. Rain storms prevailed all day yes-terday, and the situation was rather quiet on the greatest part of the front. The Germans attacked between the Meuse and the Moselle, but were easily rpulsed. The enemy made two attacks in Coures and Consenvoye Woods, three at Eparges and two in Lepetre Wood. In the region of Nieuport, artillery duels took place. Further south w captured St. George's farm, opposite our lines. In Champagne, cannonading occurred, but no infantry attacks. In Lorraine, north of Badonviller. we strongly fortified the ground gained since last Monday. In Alsace at Reichsacherkopf, the Germans threw some burning liquid on our trenches but without any result. Six of our aviators bombarded the airshed of Frascaty, and the Metz railway station, dropping about a dozen shells which caused panic. Although fiercely shelled, the aviators returned safe and sound. Barracks situated to the east of Strassburg were also bombarded by us. Petrograd .-- On the front lying be Petrograd.—On the front lying be-tween Bartfeld and Aujak, we are still advancing, although the enemy still advancing, although the enemy has been reinforced. On 24th March we captured 1,700 prisoners and two cannon. In direction of Mankaes Hay and Ustbalcna, the Germans reattacked our positions, but without success. Paris.—According to instructions received from the Minister of Public Schools, the National Serbian holiday was celebrated in all the public schools throughout France.
