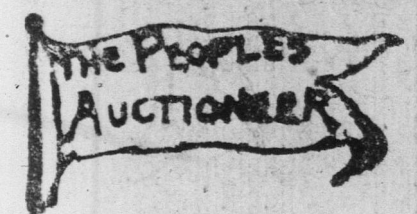

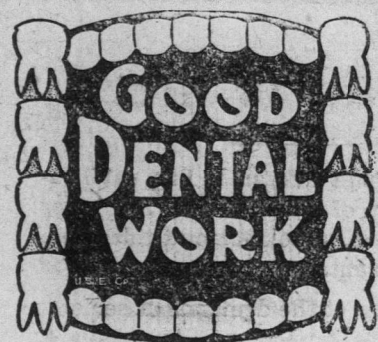

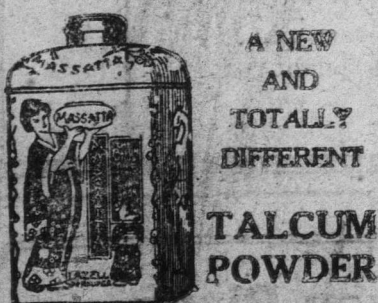

For the Foot Bath—A teaspoonful of fluid added to the water will be found most beneficial to those troubled with tender feet.  
Laundrymen and Others will find that for foul and dirty linen an admixture of fluid sufficient to make the water milky will prevent any noxious vapour arising therefrom.

War News.

Messages Received Previous to 9 A.M.

OFFICIAL. LONDON, Nov. 30. The Governor, Newfoundland: Lord Kitchener has returned from his mission in the Eastern Mediterranean. In Mesopotamia, in the Cretean battle, the enemy's strength was estimated at four divisions. One was practically wiped out. General Fozzard, after removing wounded and prisoners, has withdrawn to a position lower down the river. In France the situation has been driven from a crater near the Labyrinth, which he had occupied on the previous day. In Russia near Dvinsk the enemy has been driven from the Kazimir, and from wood. Near the Pinsk front the 82nd German division was surprised; two generals, one commanding the division, were taken prisoners. In Italy the offensive continues at Monte Nero, Gorizia and Carso. Over 100 prisoners were captured. BONAIR LAW.

SIR JOHN FRENCH IN LONDON.

LONDON, Nov. 30. General French was in London yesterday and confers with Asquith. So far as the public knows General French has not been in London before since he paid his secret visit to the capital in January. Kitchener has in Paris yesterday, there have been reports that a movement is on foot to place General Joffre in command of the Franco-British troops on the western front, but London has denied there was any foundation for them.

VIOLET ASQUITH MARRIED.

LONDON, Nov. 30. Violet Asquith, daughter of the British Premier, and Maurice Bonham Carter, the Premier's secretary, were married to-day at St. Margaret's, Westminster. A distinguished assemblage was present.

SIR JOHN SIMON AFTER NORTH.

LONDON, Nov. 30. Sir John Simon, Secretary of State for Home Affairs, served notice on Lord Northcliffe in the Commons to-day that if the latter were to refuse to induce his newspapers to stop the continual flogging of his own nest, did not prove effective, it was possible to take stronger measures. "I do not know Lord Northcliffe," said the Home Secretary, "but he appears to be a gentleman with curious habits, always itching to destroy the things he has made. Like the prophet of Baal, he leaps on the altar."

he has made. We in this country know how to estimate the value of these jaundiced prints, but they are a disappointment to our Allies, and a source of disgust to neutrals. The subject arose over an attack by the Northcliffe papers on Sir John Simon, in consequence of the reply of the latter recently which he made to a question in the Commons, in which the Home Secretary stated that the utterances of the Times were quoted gleefully by the newspapers of hostile countries, and were proving harmful to national interests. The Times intimated that the whole matter was a conspiracy to injure that paper. To-day Sir John made a personal explanation in the Commons, setting forth instances to show how the "Harmsworth" papers had put out a constant stream of material of a depressing tendency, which was eagerly seized upon by Germany. In one week in October, he added, the Cologne Gazette for four days made use of this material to show that the British people were a dispirited people.

STILL QUIET.

PARIS, Nov. 30. There is nothing of importance to add to the communication of last night, the War Office announced this afternoon.

CLASS OF 1917 CALLED.

NEW YORK, Nov. 30. A News Agency despatch from Paris, says that the Class of 1917 has been called to the colors by a vote which passed the Chamber of Deputies to-day. Calling the Class of 1917 sends all boys of 18 into the trenches, and means the addition of 250,000 men to the French fighting force. Specialists in the Chamber put up a desperate fight against the bill.

ROUMANIA.

PARIS, Nov. 30. I have good ground for announcing that even though the past 48 hours have strongly increased the probability of an early intervention by Roumania on behalf of the Allies. In confirmation of my information comes a despatch from the Temps correspondent at Bucharest stating definitely that the Government has decided to act. The only difference between Premier Bratianu and Messrs. Jonesen and Fillipeac being one of date and method, which difference may be expected to disappear shortly. A Petrograd telegram states that a Roumanian commission sent to Petrograd to arrange with the Russian Government for the transportation of munitions and goods across Russia to Roumania has been telegraphed to the Roumanian Government that Russia has accorded all facilities. Instructions have been given for the enlarging of Kola, a port where munitions will begin to arrive in great bulk at the end of December.

GREECE.

LONDON, Nov. 30. Martin H. Donohue telegraphs to the Daily Chronicle from Athens: The Government's reply to the Allied note accepts all their propositions. These have been submitted to a military commission who will determine the best method for rendering them effective, while at the same time maintaining the integrity of Greece's sovereign and national rights. The operations in Macedonia are being watched keenly by the Cabinet and King who are in hourly consultation. Events there in the end will have a deciding influence on Greece's final attitude towards the Quadruple Entente.

AVIATOR'S WORK.

LONDON, Nov. 30. The Admiralty this evening gave out additional details concerning the sinking of a German submarine off Middlekerke on Sunday by a bomb dropped from an aeroplane. It also made the announcement that a German seaplane had been brought down off Ostend. The Admiralty says that on Nov. 28th Flight Sub-Lieut. Viney,

accompanied by a French officer, Lieut. Le Comte Sincay, while patrolling off the Belgian coast, dropped bombs on a German submarine. The submarine was observed to have had her back broken. She sank in a few minutes. During the same day, Flight Lieut. Fegrand, with mechanic Oldfield, in a seaplane, shot down a German Albatross seaplane off Ostend. The Albatross dived, nose first into the sea and sank.

GREECE--TURKEY.

ZURICH, Nov. 30. A telegram from Bucharest asserts that negotiations are pending between Turkey and Greece for the formation of a union similar to that between Greece and Roumania.

NEGOTIATIONS DELAYED.

ATHENS, Nov. 30. The final solution of the negotiations of the Entente Powers with the Greek Government has been further delayed, it is reported, pending a reply of the Allies to the Greek proposals to permit the respective staffs to define the military features of the Allies' requirements in Macedonia.

ROMANIA NEUTRAL.

LONDON, Nov. 30. According to a telegram from Bucharest, Roumania has notified Russia of her earnest desire to remain neutral, says a Copenhagen despatch to the Exchange Telegraph Co., consequently Russian ships will not be permitted to enter the Danube, which, it is said, has been mined.

FORBIDDEN USE OF DANUBE.

BUDAPEST, Nov. 30. A press despatch from Bucharest says that the Roumanian Government has forbidden the use of the Danube by the Russian Government, and that in a note has made a demand on Russia to respect her neutrality. The note says that Roumania will defend her neutrality, if necessary.

WEATHER INTERFERE WITH OPERATIONS.

PARIS, Nov. 30. Bad weather conditions on the French front in Serbia, making operations impossible, says a despatch from Salonika, dated Monday, Nov. 29. The question of supplying troops with provisions has been occupying the belligerents for the past few days. A French reconnoitering party has brought back word that the Bulgarians have reached Morzan Kio-seal, on the right bank of the Cerna River. No attack on Monastir was made by the Bulgarians yesterday. News from a reliable source says that twenty thousand Turkish troops have been sent to the Bulgarian Black Sea coast. The Austrians have shipped some three hundred mortars to Bulgaria for defence of districts where the Germans have installed hydro-aeroplane hangars.

ANOTHER EXPLOSION.

FAYETVILLE, Nov. 30. An explosion occurred at noon to-day in mine No. 2 of the Boomer Coal Co., at Boomer, W.V. Three hundred men were said to have been in the mine when the accident happened. It is not known here whether they escaped. Telephone advices reported that all but 25 miners have come out of the mine. The company's officials say that indications are that these 25 are alive, and will be brought up as soon as the smoke clears away.

SERBIANS IN ALBANIA.

LONDON, Nov. 30. The number of Serbians who have taken refuge in Albania is estimated by an Athens correspondent as 250,000, including soldiers and civilians. The army is said to have retained for the Allies the mountain batteries and some field guns. A large number of Serbian boys, between the ages of 15 and 17, accompanied the army to be trained to fill up gaps.

THE CABINET OF PORTUGAL.

LONDON, Nov. 30. Bernardino Machado, President of the Portuguese Republic, to-day received the new cabinet, composed of members of the Democratic party.

KILLED AND INJURED BY EXPLOSION.

WILMINGTON, Nov. 30. Ten are reported dead and many others injured by an explosion this afternoon in the Dupont Powder Co's Works, about three miles north of this city. Thirty workmen were killed and several fatally injured to-day in the terrific explosion of about four tons of black powder in the Upper Works.

HOW TO BE TALLER. Added height is not obtained by stretching the bones to a greater length, for bones do not grow much during and past middle life, but stretching pulls the bones apart and allows a greater growth of cartilage to accumulate between, and in this manner your height may be increased from one to three inches. There are mechanical means for stretching, but one can afford a nominal cost construct such an affair that will answer the purpose just as well. To do so, secure a pulley to the ceiling or top of a door casing, about ten feet of heavy cotton clothes line and two iron staples. Form from the rope two loops sufficiently large to allow the feet to enter; fasten these loops to the floor with the staples directly under the pulley overhead. The long rope is passed through the pulley and one end of it is tied to muslin bands or towels, which have previously been made to fit over the arms. Slip the feet through the loops, the arms in the bands and proceed to stretch by pulling down on the rope. Let someone else do the pulling and allow your arms to hang if it is convenient to have someone assist you. Each individual must determine how long to continue this treatment. Take your measurement of height before you begin, and after each treatment straighten up and take your measurement again, and you will find you can work your measurement to even a greater height by persistence. Slouching is not practiced only when standing or walking, but when sitting one should select a chair that fits them, and if repose is not intended, the trunk should be held in a natural, easy, upright position and slightly leaned forward. It should be known that slouching, in addition to a bad carriage, also crowds the digestive organs together so that they are unable to act properly.

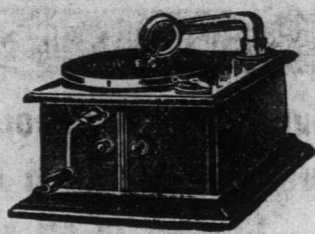

### The Recount.

Yesterday we announced that an order for a recount of all the votes in all the electoral districts in the Island, cast at the Prohibition Plebiscite Election had been made by Mr. Justice Johnson. The application was made by Mr. Martin Furlong, K. C. Last night the Order was published in the Royal Gazette, and it is as follows:—

**IN THE SUPREME COURT OF NEWFOUNDLAND.**  
In the Prohibition Plebiscite Act, 1915; and in the Election which took place thereunder on the 4th day of November, 1915.

It having been made to appear to me on this 27th day of November, 1915, on the Affidavit of a credible witness that he believes that the Returning Officer when counting the votes of the Electors polled at the said Election improperly counted ballot-papers and improperly summed up the votes; and the sum of \$1800.00 having been deposited with the Deputy Registrar of the Supreme Court by or on behalf of the applicant who submitted such affidavit, as security for the costs of the recount and summing up, I appoint Thursday, the 2nd day of December next, at three o'clock in the afternoon, in the Second Court Room in the Court House in St. John's at the time and place when and where I shall proceed to recount the said votes and make final addition thereof.

And I hereby summon, and command the Colonial Secretary, or a Clerk in his Office, to attend at the said time and place with the parcels containing the Ballots used at the said Election, that is to say: (1) the used ballot-papers which were counted; (2) the rejected ballot-papers; (3) the spoilt ballot-papers;

Judge.

We understand that steps have been taken by the Prohibition Committee to retain counsel to represent the electors who voted for Prohibition, and that the recount will be watched closely on their behalf.

The recount will in all probability extend over some weeks as there are eighteen districts to be counted, and there will be parts of the day when the Judge will be occupied with other business of the Supreme Court. Most of the types of disputed ballots will be found within the first few days, arguments will be heard and rulings obtained, which will settle points in dispute, and permit the quicker counting of the remainder of the ballots.

**HERRING IN ABUNDANCE.**—The Portia brings encouraging news of the West Coast herring fishery and a number of American and Canadian vessels are there loading. Yesterday four thousand barrels of herring were taken.

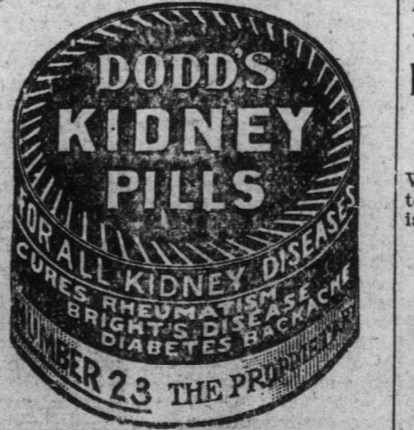
"The crew and passengers of the Swallow were saved and landed at Stornoway by the Norwegian steamer Hercules. Please circulate information."

She was driven out to sea a fortnight ago yesterday in the great storm, and at the end of the week the Cabot and other steamers made search for her without avail. She must have been driven out into the ocean. The vessel was abandoned and the crew taken off. Stornoway, where the men were landed, is a port on Lewis, the north island of the Hebrides in North West Scotland. John Bowering is the master of the Swallow.

The following persons were aboard: Beatrice Batten, Chas. Batten and Henry Batten of Barened; Abram Smith and Rebecca Menchions of Bishop's Cove; John Jones of Upper Island Cove; Wm. Dawe, Frost (girl), and a boy named Snow of Clark's Beach; a boy of South River; Ambrose Fagan of Kelligrews; John Bowering (Master) Samuel Kinsella, Wm. Russell, Arthur Greenland and Wm. Russell, jr., of Coley's Point, and Clara King of Country Road. All will be thankful at the good news of their safety.

## Sagona Back From Labrador.

The s.s. Sagona, Capt. W. Parsons, arrived in port from Labrador at 10 a.m. to-day, having been at far north as Holton. The ship left here on Thursday, the 11th inst., and encountered stormy weather on the way north. She spent one day at Greenspond, and during the big storm which lasted three days was at Herring Neck. From Battle Harbor north fair weather was met all the way to Holton. At the latter place the hills are covered with snow but there has been very little frost on that coast to date. Capt. Parsons informs us that the storm was felt considerably on the Labrador coast but no damage was done, as all shipping had left and stages and all movable houses had been taken up some weeks previous. All the livers have left their summer quarters and gone inland for the winter. Capt. Parsons says that he has heard of no destruction on the coast, and that as far as he can learn the people are well stocked with supplies for the winter. The Sagona brought 1200 packages of freight, including 400 cases of whale oil and 400 sacks guano from the Hawke's Harbor whaling station. The remainder of the cargo is made up principally of trout, salmon and other products of the fishery from the Hudson Bay Co.'s station at Cartwright. All the lightkeepers and Marconi operators from the Labrador coast came along by the ship, and most of them were landed at Harbor Grace. The passengers to this port were Mr. J. J. Collins, Supt. of Marconi stations, Mr. Max Pike, operator at American Tickle, and Mr. Hodder, operator at Smokey. The Sagona will not go north again this season, but as soon as her freight is discharged she will be put in readiness for the Cabot Strait service.

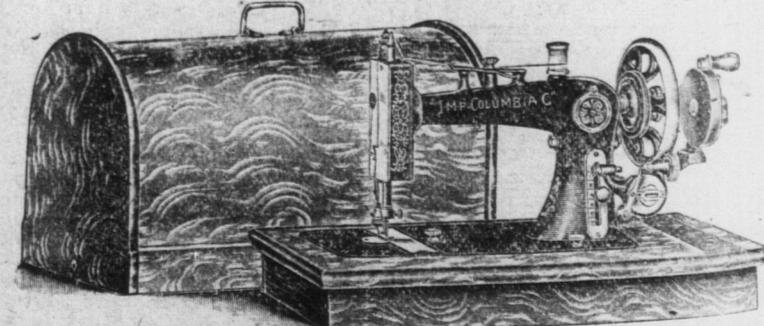

**THE FIGHT FOR MONASTIR.**  
PARIS, To-day.  
The Bulgarians continued to advance yesterday, a correspondent says: Fighting occurred on the heights near Monastir. Col Vassitch, Commander of the Serb forces at Monastir, who once captured the city from the Turks, is said to have announced his purpose to carry the fighting even in the streets of the town; the Serb forces there consist only of three thousand men.

**BONAR LAW DECLARES WE SHALL FIGHT THROUGH DIFFICULTIES TO VICTORY.**  
LONDON, To-day.  
Andrew Bonar Law, Secretary for the Colonies, presiding last night at a St. Andrew's Day banquet, declared he felt more hopeful as to the outcome of the war than he had for months past. In reply to the statement of German newspapers which had said Britain was on the point of bankruptcy, Law said the country was a long way from it, but that he did not pretend we could go on indefinitely, on the present scale, but the wealth of Britain, he added, had not been touched as yet. She could bear the strain for a longer period than her enemies. Speaking of the great armies which Britain has raised, Law said, the number of men killed or wounded up to the present was three fold greater than the entire expeditionary force at the outbreak of the war. Referring to the conditions of affairs in the Near East, the Colonial Secretary said it was no better than could be gathered from the newspapers. I go further, he continued, and say that I look for no specially good news for many months to come, and we may have had news long before we have good, but that does not alter my opinion. This war is not going to

Stanley on the Labrador in September last, was brought along to the city last night by that officer. The defendant comes up at 3 o'clock this afternoon.

**The Pallium**

His Grace the Archbishop of St. John's within the past week received from Rome the Pallium which is the symbol of the Archiepiscopal Office and represents according to the discipline of the Catholic Church the fullness of Pastoral jurisdiction. It is the Pallium which really confers Archiepiscopal rank and brings with it the privileges attached to the office of Metropolitan of the Province.

There is a special ritual prescribed for the imposition of the Pallium and this important ceremony will take place in the Cathedral on Sunday, December 12th. The ceremony will be preceded by the celebration of Solemn High Mass which will be sung by the Right Rev. Mgr. Sears, V. G., representing the Diocese of St. George's. The Pallium will be imposed by His Lordship Bishop March, of Harbour Grace, the senior suffragan of the Province. There will be also a sermon special to the occasion which will be delivered by the Very Rev. J. J. McDermott, Administrator of the Cathedral.

It is expected that there will be a large gathering of the Priests of the Archdiocese present on the occasion.

**We Ought to Have Fought Germany.**

Says Grand Duchess of Luxemburg.  
"They have stolen my country. Like so many thieves, they sneaked into my beautiful land, and overnight they turned my flower gardens into open-air stables for their cavalry horses."

So spoke the fair ruler of Luxemburg when I recently saw her in her palace.  
She is only twenty-one years of age, this beautiful girl-ruler of Luxemburg; slender, handsome, unmarried, and with five younger sisters to take care of; the youngest, Sophie, is only thirteen years old; next, Elizabeth, fourteen; Antoinette, sixteen; Hilda, eighteen; and Charlotte, nineteen.  
It was not easy for me to interview this Grand Duchess.

**Faced by Men With Bayonets.**  
Facing the handsome entrance to the Palace there stand two Prussian guards. Whenever anyone approaches this entrance, unless one can produce a satisfactory parchment, he or she, faces two sharp-edged bayonets. "You must give me sufficient reason for your seeking an interview with her Highness." A pair of blades were levelled at my breast.

"But I have been her tutor. I—"  
Then a slender girl rushed out of the gate towards me, totally ignoring the presence of the two unwanted guards, and holding out her arms cried:—

"My dear old teacher! Do not allow these horrible creatures to frighten you!"

Saying this she took my arm, and between the two bayonets we passed on into the Palace, where in previous years I had the honour of teaching her little Highness her first French lessons.

I had scarcely seated myself beside her when she broke out, with tears running down her cheeks, now crying, now sobbing, saying:—  
"Not satisfied with destroying our beautiful scenery, they have also stolen our public buildings, our local government, our post, our educational establishments, and they have forcibly taken charge of our railroad, for which we have spent more than 15,000,000 francs."

**"We Feel We Were Robbed."**  
"They seized our telegraph system, and whenever my people protested too strongly, they arrested them and sent them to remote Prussian military prisons; more than 200 of my leading citizens have been sent out of their country to Germany."

"My people, my once happy and prosperous people, are to-day poor and at the verge of starvation."

"Even I have to receive a permit from a Prussian officer before I can drive my own car on my own roads, in my own land. I must even get a permit from a Prussian officer before I can use the telephone which was established by our own funds."

"This is annexation; not annexation through conquest, but annexation through stealing."

"The people of Belgium have reason to be proud of their great achievements in fighting the arrogant conqueror, but we feel we were robbed in the small hours of the night."

"Had we suspected the treaty-breaking intentions of the Prussians we would have rushed to arms."

"If we had had forty-eight hours' notice we would have put at least 25,000 men on our eastern frontier."

"We are as big as Montenegro, and our country is as mountainous, but we had implicit faith in international law, and we thought we were immune."

"For all practical purposes, my country is annexed, and the misery of my people is deeper than that of the Belgians; in addition, we hang our heads in shame before the world for not having fought the stealers of our country."

**"I Envy the Queen of the Belgians."**  
"I sincerely envy the Queen of the Belgians in her present position; for my present plight is more bitter than hers."

"They were cowards. For many years these Prussians have been plotting against my country in accordance with that general German plan."

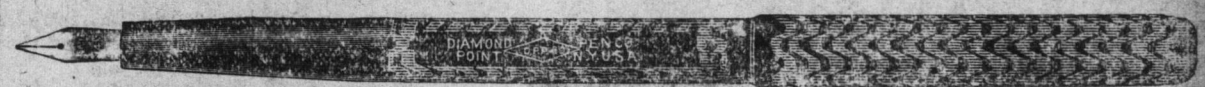
"My country, with its 300,000 population, has been harboring hundreds of German spies, and when the appointed hour came these men turned out to be officers in the Imperial German armies. Even my two German drivers were disguised officers; and when that fateful first of August night had arrived they appeared in German uniforms."

"The Germans had their outposts established everywhere in my country, and my unsuspecting people had always treated these treacherous spies with the utmost consideration."

"They have published broadcast that I have received the Iron Cross from the German Emperor. It is not true. I have received a medal from the Red Cross officials."

age they have done to my beautiful land. That is also false. They cannot compensate for the damage the 800,000 Germans have done to the scenery of my land with money; and even then, they have only paid the paltry sum of £20,000 for destroying hundreds of buildings for military reasons." They never mention the fact that we have spent more than £60,000 for our Red Cross in taking care of their wounded soldiers.

"And now my own people are starving, and they must beg their daily bread from the hands of their robbers."

The Luxemburgers are, indeed, starving.

The working-men who were formerly employed in the tanneries, distilleries, breweries and wine groves are now working for the invaders of their country, and instead of the wages they used to receive they now receive meal tickets, entitling them to "KK" bread, and, in rare instances, to "KK" bread, which is commonly known as the "war bread."

The "K" bread consists of fifty per cent. of rye, thirty per cent. of potatoes, and twenty per cent. of barley, oats and rice; while the "KK" bread is made of thirty per cent. rye, thirty per cent. chaff, and forty per cent. pig's blood.

Alas! poor Luxemburg! And the little Grand Duchess, bereft of her liberty and her beloved country.—Pearson's Weekly.

How about that Christmas shopping? I hope you have already done it, but if you haven't, may I make a few suggestions in regard to it? In the first place, go dressed as simply and lightly as possible. My method has been to wear a medium weight suit and a long coat, and to check the coat when I reached the shopping district. Of course if I have to walk any distance between shops I put it on again, but when the shops are close together I find I can slip from one to another without catching cold, as I am not over-heated. Of course this saves you the burden of carrying about heavy clothing. Wear a small, light hat, don't carry a muff and be sure to have a bag that will hold your small parcels, so that you won't have the mental strain of trying to keep track of five or six little bundles. These seem like small things, but every little thing helps or hinders at a time like this.

#### Plan Your Campaign.

Of course you'll make out a list before you start. Don't simply jot down the things you have to get, but plan your campaign. Decide what shops you want to visit for various gifts, make out a route and put against the name of each shop all the things you want to look for there. Go in the morning if you possibly can, the earlier the better, not only for the sake of the shop girl but for your own sake. The ratio of accomplishment between morning and afternoon I have always found to be about two to one. One woman whom

I know gets her list, her clothes and everything absolutely ready the night before, so that she can go in town when her husband goes. Yes, her dishes have to wait, but her kitchen isn't crowded in the afternoon and the shops are. Don't shop for so long a time at a stretch that you get faint. Stop and eat something hot. You can afford to spend the time and the money better than you can afford to save them. You'll get both your money's and your time's worth in efficiency. A "Thank You" Costs Nothing. Look pleasant. Thank the shop girl who waits on you. Smile at the crowd instead of glaring at them. ## Where We Landed in Greece.

Facts About Salonika, The Famous Old Greek Seaport.

Salonika, the Greek port where the allied troops landed, is a remarkable town in a number of ways. It was at that town that St. Paul addressed his two epistles to the Thessalonians, and even in his time the town was over three hundred years old and famous. The town is quite the most important of the Balkan ports, and the terminus of several of the chief Balkan railways, a fact of great importance in the landing and movement of troops.

It possesses the finest harbour of any of the Balkan seaports, for not only is it naturally a fine anchoring place for big ships, but in the last few years a breakwater six hundred yards long, with two piers each a third of that length have been built. The people who live in Salonika—pronounced, by the way, as though spelt Sal-o-ne-ka—are of all nationalities—Greeks, Turks, Bulgarians, British, French, Americans, Jews and others. The representatives of each race always wear their own national costume. Another great advantage it has for troops landing there is the fact that it is defended on the land side from attack by a great chain of lakes, making it extremely difficult to capture. The Greeks, in the last Balkan War captured it because they managed to get in the town a few hours before the Bulgarians, and they have held on to it ever since.
