SCHOONER FISHING.

The schooner fishery is one of the nost romantic and arduour of seafaring occupations. The pursuit of the humble cod contains material which is of the very warp and woof of romance, and the strenuous toil of the industry has no parallel in any other branch of Canadian commercial ef-

The schooners engaging in the cod fishery are strongly built fast sailing craft of from 95 to 125 tons, carrying rom fifteen to twenty-five men. The fishing is done from the vessel itself by hand-lines equipped with two baited hooks, or from dories by handlines or long lines. The dory is a flatbottomed boat about 20 feet long fitted with removable thwarts. From eight to twelve of these boats are carried on each schoner and when the thwarts are removed they can be nest-
