Reason, Then Vote.

The above caption is as suggestive, and as good advice as it is possible to act on at the present time. People may be swayed by sentiment and passion into voting for one of the parties appealing for his suffrage, but if the voting is to be governed by the emotions alone, then we are likely to be sadly left. A man's franchise is one of the most potent privileges given to man, for by the exercise of this franchise the state is ruled. Therefore since our national progress or otherwise, is dependent upon the exercise of our franchise, it behooves us to reason clearly and seriously before we determine to cast our vote. In no hypocritical sense we say then, reason, think for yourselves. Do not be led by the opinions of any one man. Give both sides an intelligent hearing, but allow no prejudices to blind you to the real issues at stake. Two weeks from to-day you will be called upon to give the result of your many cogitations during the past few weeks. Two distinct parties are appealing to you, to choose between them as to who will represent you, and legislate for you during the next four years. However much you may cloak the possible difference between the two parties by such expressions as "they are all alike," nothing can alter the fact that the parties are different in character, as judged by their past records, and different in their attitude on the questions facing us to-day. The principal men of the Opposition are Squires and Coaker, while the Government leader is Cashin. As the premier of a country is the head of his party, it is the manifestoes of the leaders, and their records that it is necessary and essential to future prosperity that we should study.

Writers every day are telling of the virtues and vices of their respective leaders. Their manifestoes have been placed before you and analyzed, and you who read and ponder are moulding your opinions on your past and present knowledge. Reasoning first as to the ability of the leaders, we see that Sir M. P. Cashin, the Government leader, has had a very lengthy public career, and has played a most important part in our history, being our Finance Minister for several years, and it is due to his ability as a financier that we are to-day experiencing such unparalleled prosperity. Both Squires and Coaker have been in public life, and have been in our legislative halls, but have they done or given promise of doing as great things for our country as Sir M. P. Cashin has done? Cashin has made promises, and Coaker and Squires have done the same. Who has kept these promises, in as far as they were possible of fulfilment? Reasoning from their past records, who are the men, more worthy of our trust and confidence. Report, unadvised by Mr. Squires, accuses him of many grave and questionable transactions, and no explanation has been offered in support or refutation of the same. Coaker's record is so well known that there is no need

to portray to you here his treachery to his past associates, his mad ambition, and his double dealing in the past, and, we venture to say, in the present. Looking at the attitude as expressed by the different leaders on the vital questions of to-day, who can fail to see the contrast between the two parties?

The writings of a man are indicative of his inner being. In Sir M. P. Cashin's manifesto we have nothing superfluous; no long harangue of words, but clear, lucid expressions. In the Opposition manifesto there is much flow of words but little of wisdom or hope of fulfilment. It is up to the electorate, up to you, voters, to discern between the sham and the real. It is your own future and that of your children's, that you have to decide on. The actions of the state during the next four years are as you make them by your voting. Truly, in the exercise of your franchise, "The pen is mightier than the sword." There is no need to dilate upon personalities. You have the facts already before you. Vote then according as your reason and your conscience dictates, and if you vote thus we have no hesitation whatever in saying that you will vote for the Liberal Progressive Party.

Purify the Press.

A very strong feeling is present to-day against the abusive tone of the press in this political campaign. It is to our discredit and shame that we have as a press fallen low enough to evoke public condemnation. In a political campaign, of course, it is conceded that there must be somewhat of personalities, for it is impossible to deal with a manifesto, in some cases, without dealing with the writer, and this is especially so of those whose public records are so questionable. There are, necessarily, different conceptions of the applicability of the term abuse. We take it that "truth is no abuse," but we admit at once that many truths (actions or sayings, especially the latter, spoken in the heat of argument, should not be laid bare to public gaze.) Since the truth is no abuse, it is right that the public should know the truth, especially the truth about those appealing for the suffrages of the electorate. "Ignorance is not always bliss," and although we readily and heartily endorse the plea of purifying and uplifting the tone of the press, we think it right and proper to term a slacker as a slacker, publicly, etc. It is conceded by all who read that the most abusive are those who live most in cowardly fear of being beaten, but "abuse" is no argument, and therefore voters, you have to consider this also on the 3rd of November. The Telegram has asked many questions of the Opposition, and especially of Hon. R. A. Squires and his Reid transactions, but, as was expected, has not been answered. Such questioning is not abuse, but refusal to answer such questions is strong, if not sufficient provocation to term the Hon. R. A. Squires or others in like position, as unfit to rule this country, and unworthy of the people's confidence. We say then, purify the press, and cut out such disgusting headlines as appeared in a recent issue of the Morning Post, but at the same time, do not forget that "a spade's a spade." Disgusting personalities are a deteriorating factor. True facts are necessary for the right exercise of the franchise. If you voters will the press to be purged, it will be speedily done, but in any case, reason, do not vote because of the abuse in the press; reason intelligently, and vote for the best party, and the slogan will be verified:

We have no doubt that Mr. Penney will deny this as well, but, as we remarked on Friday, nobody will suppose for a moment that Sir John Crosbie was fool enough to make the declaration ascribed to him regarding the Pope and the Archbishop, unless he received some provocation, and we think that 99 out of every 100 citizens will agree with us in this view.
As for the statement that our article was written in the "Herald" Office, and that some Government employee who came out of the "Herald" Office in the afternoon before our paper was on the street told a friend of Mr. Penney's the statement attributed to him, our answer is—and we think our readers will have sufficient confidence in us to believe it—that the article was not written in the "Herald" Office, but was written by a member of our own staff; and if anybody told Mr. Penney what he says he was told, we invite him to give the name of his informant, and no doubt it will be very easy to find out from what source that gentleman really got his information.

No New War.

CANADIAN.

Must Now Have Efficiency.

A sign of the times is the growing demand in the most progressive cities for what is termed "expert" administration.

Experience has shown that the Manager plan and the Commission form of government have been largely successful because they gave increased efficiency.

Both systems have been found to unify and simplify executive work.

It is freely admitted now that the supreme need in the management of a great city is that each department shall have an expert at its head; and that the "administration" shall be composed of men of well-known business and technical ability.

Those who have been fighting so stubbornly for better government in Montreal will be interested in knowing that there are a great many cities in Europe where corps of men take up civic administration as a life vocation.

These men begin in one of the smaller cities. If successful they are called to a larger plane, and then to one still larger, until they reach the greatest cities whose internal reorganization they promptly take up.

In the true sense of the word, there are not many cities on this continent which are really governed by experts. Men are placed in important civic positions largely through "pull," and little or no heed is given to their qualifications. In Montreal this system has always been very much in evidence. This lamentable condition of affairs is happily being largely remedied by the Administrative Commission. As to the future efficient government of our city there are many problems to be faced of a trying nature, at the same time none of the difficulties should be in any way insurmountable. toiled that Germany, Russia, and Japan would make a triple alliance too strong for any other combination of nations to withstand.

Once there is such talk we have to take it up for no other reason than to explode it. Germany of to-day, squarely beaten and disorganized, with the remnants of the army disgusted and demoralized, is not fit for any great undertaking, nor will she be in condition to do it during the next fifteen years while under the control of the allied army and being forced to pay the great indemnity to her victors. Indeed, the hour of German strength and greatness is forever gone. The world has no use for German politics, morals, and Kultur. This is a settled question. Hence the Germany of the future can never be so formidable as the Germany of the past, before Aug. 1, 1914.

The Russia of to-day is no Russia at all, but some disjointed and impoverished provinces of the former great empire. Certainly the Bolshevik terrorism and anarchy cannot last long, but, once resurrected and united, Russia will be her own master and not a slave to Germany as to-day while terrorized by the German agents. Though illiterate, the Russian people are fully conscious of the fact that their greatest efforts were directed to help the Allies and to smash Germany. How, then, would it be possible that in the near future the Russians would give up their soul and body in order to support German insane plans? And nobody has the right to suspect patriotism and misjudgment of intelligence of leaders of the new Russia.

Japan is called the Prussia of the East. Be it so; then are the Japanese blind to see what the Prussianism has just accomplished? And again, how could the Japanese armies, millions strong, be transported to Germany to fight her battles on the Rhine? But the main point is that Germany could not give to Japan more than she can get to-day without any fight.

No, the new combination of nations is improbable and the scare of a new great war is untenable.—New York Times.

Monkey Topics.

Expert knowledge of monkeys may not be particularly necessary to the average citizen, but to a man who knows them as thoroughly as does Professor Robert L. Garner, popular vagueness of knowledge is naturally a matter of amused comment. So, the other day, when the professor went to a motion picture show and saw a family of monkeys, display on the screen, he saw, as probably nobody else did, that the members of the "family" were of three different and distinct species; and when an inscription jocularly announced, "Here's the baby," his experienced eye made an even more amusing discovery. The song of the yellowhammer is described by a set form of words. To the Midlander the bird appeals for "a little bit of bread and no cheese," with strong accent on the "no" and a long-drawn-out "che-e-se"; but the North-countryman only hears him calling spitefully, "the de'il tak' yer all an' lea-v-e me."

THE TAXPAYER.



Great Britain Leads in Aviation.

Conditions Bad in Vienna--Fiume Question Left for Italy and Jugoslava--Profiteers Being Rounded Up--Loan Under Subscribed.

LACK OF FUEL AND FOOD IN VIENNA.

PARIS, Oct. 18. Reports reaching the Peace Conference from Vienna indicate distressing financial conditions there. The consequent lack of food and fuel, which is threatening the existence of the Government, is causing much unhappiness in Paris.

PETROGRAD CLOSELY INVESTED.

LONDON, Oct. 18. Petrograd to-night was so closely

invested by the anti-Bolshevik forces according to the latest official advice that military experts express belief that little short of a miracle could save the pressed Bolsheviks. Indeed one newspaper despatch reported General Yudenitch's Scavenger in the capital. But there is no confirmation of this. Neither had British official confirmation been received of the surrender of Kronstadt although the War Office states that the Estonians on Friday operating in conjunction with Yudenitch got within four miles of

the Krasnaya Corca facing Kronstadt. Thus Kronstadt would be in a dangerous position as with the capture of Petrograd it would be cut off.

MAY SIT ON COMMITTEE.

PARIS, Oct. 18. The Supreme Council to-day adopted a resolution that delegates of the great powers may sit on various committees created under the German Peace Treaty and may vote on questions before these commissions, whether or not their Governments have ratified the Treaty. If the United States Senate does not object it is stated to be possible that American delegates will take the places assigned to the United States on such commissions.

UNDER SUBSCRIBED.

LONDON, Oct. 18. (Reuter's Despatch).—Wellingtons ten million pound victory loan is under-subscribed, and compulsion will be resorted to secure the balance.

GREAT BRITAIN LEADS THE WAY.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 18. Great Britain is making more headway than any other nation promoting

aviation. Secretary of War Crowell yesterday told the Senate Military Committee, in supporting a new bill for the establishment of a separate department of aeronautics.

ONE IN SPIRIT, AMEN.

LONDON, Oct. 18. (Reuter's Despatch).—In conclusion with the church congress at Leicester which has just closed, a Christian reunion meeting was held, at which three thousand were present of Anglicans and Non-Conformists. The leading speaker, acknowledged the helpfulness of the Non-Conformists to the congress just held and prayed that the day may come when they will be one in spirit. Christians in this country he said had wholly changed lately; instead of the will to differ was now the will to agree. Rev. Cartegis Simpson offered a prayer for the reunion of the Presbyterians and declared that if some practical steps towards reunion were not taken within a reasonable time, reaction might arise in the Non-Conformist churches.

AFTER THE PROFITEERS.

LONDON, Oct. 18. (Reuter's Despatch).—Mr. McCurdy, M. P. of the Food Ministry, states that 1600 profiteering tribunals are already working since the Profiteering Act was passed. The Food Ministry has instituted 1350 prosecutions and secured fees totalling \$35,000.

AUSTRIAN CABINET RESIGNS.

VIENNA, Oct. 18. The Austrian cabinet, headed by Dr. Karl Renner, resigned to-night but was reconstituted immediately under Dr. Renner as Premier, with few important changes.

DECISION LEFT TO INTERESTED PARTIES.

PARIS, Oct. 18. A decision to leave the settlement of the Fiume question to direct negotiations between Italy and Jugoslava has been reached by the Peace Conference, according to Excelsior.

SHIPWRECKED MEN REACH PORT.

NEW YORK, Oct. 18. Bringing two hundred fifty-five passengers and crew of the French steamer Venezia, which burned at sea last Monday off the Newfoundland fishing banks, the steamer Chicago arrived this morning and told the story of the rescue of the entire ship's company from "snaky" lifeboats. Lifeboats after the Venezia had been abandoned, it took the Chicago's crew one hour and ten minutes after it had reached the scene to effect the rescue of the Venezia's passengers from lifeboats in which they had taken refuge after the flames had enveloped their ship. By noon all the survivors had been comfortably quartered and given dinner on the Chicago and that vessel had resumed her voyage to New York. The Chicago first heard the Venezia's wireless call for help when eighty miles away. Fire started in her forward hold where the cargo consisted of rum and sugar. It spread over the entire vessel from there and she was ablaze all over when abandoned. Capt. Bonafato was the last man to leave the ship.

STEAMER ABANDONED.

BOSTON, Oct. 18. The wooden steamer Ammonoosac, which has been in distress at sea for the past week, has been abandoned in sinking condition, radiograms announced later. The crew was saved and the coast guard cutter and steamer Isseque are bringing them to port.

MILITARY FORCES PLACED.

PARIS, Oct. 18. The Supreme Council to-day drew up a scheme of distribution of the Allied Military forces which will be used to occupy upper Silesia, Schlesweg and Memel according to the terms of

the treaty. The Council further approved the military measure necessary for the evacuation of these territories by the Germans and the immediate occupation by these of the Allies.

RAILWAY JUNCTION CAPTURED.

LONDON, Oct. 18. A Bolshevik wireless communication claims the capture of Esary railway junction forty miles south west of Kiev on the road to Odessa.

SINN FEIN OFFICERS.

DUBLIN, Oct. 18. The secret convention of Sinn Fein, held this week, besides re-electing H. DeValera president of the organization, chose the other officers: vice-presidents, Arthur Griffith and F. O'Flanagan; honorary secretaries, Austin Stock and Harry Boland; honorary treasurers, Mrs. W. Power and E. W. Dugan.

BERLIN STRIKE SETTLED.

BERLIN, Oct. 18. The strike of metal workers in this city has been settled, according to announcement.





The Churches Denounce Local Press.

A number of the city churches yesterday the preachers took occasion to denounce the press in connection with the present political campaign, in the sincerest sound. We regret that we cannot do justice to any one of them. We should have liked to be able to report verbatim the able sermons delivered in all cases, but we were unable to arrange for same. At Wesley, Rev. Mr. Bugden, the pastor, preached in the evening from the text found in Isaiah, chap. 26, verse 2. His subject was, "Righteousness exalteth a nation." He instanced three great factors in the life of a nation that should tend to uplift it and make it righteous, as they were three great pillars of public opinion, viz., the Home, the Pulpit and the Press. He dwelt principally on the latter, and thought that no man in the city should say the Press of St. John's was what it should be. On the contrary, during the past few days, uttering what he had witnessed in its columns. The Press should not be used for any small, mean or immoral purpose. One very apt quotation used was, "that bad money always drives good money out of circulation." That might happen with the Press of St. John's if we were not very careful. The preacher elaborated on this with very great acceptance. He thought that in the political warfare as it appertains to politicians and the press, the rule should be to play the game, and not the man. The reverse, he thought was the rule in some cases. The Press played the man and not the game. He had no hesitation in saying that the papers printed in St. John's lately were unfit for children to read, and not decent enough to come into respectable people's homes. He called upon all to be worthy of our heritage, and to see to it that the three great agencies named be kept clean and good. It was a eloquent and timely sermon, and aptly delivered, considering the reverend gentleman is suffering from a severe cold.

At St. Thomas's, we understand, the Rev. Dr. Jones, preached from the subject, "The Flaming Eyes of Job," and also denounced the unclean press of the city, and asked that it be suppressed.

At the Congregational Church, Rev. D. B. Ashford read the letter from the Council of the Board of Trade as published by us on Saturday, and commented strongly on the same. He was glad that such a body as the Board of Trade had taken the matter up, and said that no country that he had visited or knew, would such writings be tolerated as those which have been appearing during the present election campaign, and he called upon his people to turn it down.—News.

From King's Point.
The Liberal Progressive members, MacKay, Moore and Short, arrived here 6.30 p.m. Tuesday. They held a most successful meeting in the Orange Hall. Mr. John Gillard acted as chairman and also made a strong address. The speeches from members were heard with great enthusiasm. Nova Scotia Apple Crop

Estimates of the apple crop in the Annapolis Valley have varied greatly and it is very difficult to arrive at even an approximate figure. It seems, however, that our September figure of 1,250,000 barrels for export is now too low and that the total crop will about equal that produced in 1911. Allowing for local consumption and for fruit used by evaporators, canning factories and cider mills, there is probably sufficient fruit on the trees to warrant our estimating the surplus available for shipment out of the Province at almost 1,500,000 barrels. This increase during the past few weeks has been due to the remarkable growth of the fruit, encouraged by favorable weather conditions. Gravensteins are badly spotted and few orchards have more than 50 per cent of No. 1 grade of this variety. Ben Davis are also badly spotted, but of good size and color. Ribston, King, Russet, Baldwin, and Nonpareil all have heavy crops; Stark, Blenheim, and Gravenstein are lighter. The heavy purchases of the lower grades for evaporating and cider-making purposes have been of the greatest help in raising the standard of packed fruit, and have also done much to relieve the threatened scarcity of barrels. The fruit is coloring well and with the exception above noted is of fair quality. In all cases, however, where thorough spraying has not been done the effects of apple scab are much in evidence.—From Fruit and Vegetable Crop Report for October.

**Princesses Who
Have Taken the Veil.**

If the rumour regarding the Grand Duchess of Luxembourg has any foundation, she will only be following the footsteps of many other ladies of royal birth who have forsaken royal for the quiet of a convent.

The Russian Empress Eudoxia spent twenty years in the nunnery of the "Intercession of the Blessed Virgin," thankful to scrub floors, and to fare as poorly as the meanest of her sister nuns, to escape from the brutalities of her husband, Peter the Great.

Many another princess of Russia followed Eudoxia "behind the veil" before the Grand Duchess Elizabeth entered a Moscow nunnery a few years ago, after the assassination of her husband, the Grand Duke Sergius.

Princess as Porter.

The widow of the former King Miguel, who reigned six years over Portugal, became a Benedictine nun at Solesmes a score of years ago; and when the community was banished from France she went with the rest of the sisters to a convent in the Isle of Wight, where, among other royal companions, she has one of her sisters, a princess of the House of Lowenstein-Wertheim-Rosenberg.

It is said there are in various European convents more than thirty princesses, members of many of the great ruling houses of Europe, who are wearing the veils of nuns, and are spending their lives in prayer and fasting and good works.

In the very heart of the Black Forest, in an environment of mountains and woods, far remote from the haunts of men, is the Abbey of Seckau, every inmate of which is of royal or noble birth. Among them are the Princesses Philip and Constantine of Hohenlohe, who a few years ago were cutting splendid figures at the Courts of Europe. Men of brilliant gifts and achievements, they seemed to be the spoiled children of fortune, when, to the amazement of the world, they vanished mysteriously to the seclusion of the Black Forest, one to act as cook and the other as porter to the monks of Seckau.

Sacrificed Riches and Luxury.

Among others who are engaged in the most menial offices of the brotherhood are Prince Edward Schenburg-Hartenstein, once noted as soldier and courtier; Count de Memptinne; Baron Von Oer, one of the chief ornaments of the wealthiest and most high-born of Baden nobles; and many other noblemen and princes who have sacrificed rank and riches and luxury to lead Spartan lives, completely shut off from the world.




