the Director of Graves Registration and Enquiries Nfid. Contingent. the Prime Minister of Nfid. sir.-In accordance with your teleram of May 25th, I herewith submit he following report on the Newfoundland Plot, Wandsworth Cemetery.

### Recapitulation.

The Newfoundland Plot at Wandsworth was purchased by the Newundland War Contingent Associat tion in October, 1916. In this plot were buried the men who died in Wandsworth Military Hospital. Contrary to military orders' they were buried four in a grave. The N.W.C.A. aclosed this plot with a Portland stone border, and in the centre erected a Portland cross, on which was painted an inscription.

Some time last year they had the plot reconstructed, having the bodies exhumed and re-interred in separate graves, shortly after which I took over the duties of looking after our soldiers' graves.

I tried to get in touch with the N. W.C.A., and asked to attend their committee meeting, and try to work in unison with them, but I did not succeed, their idea being that this plot was theirs and they could carry out their own ideas irrespective of the Imperial War Graves' Commission or any other military organization, if

they got the permission of the then Colonial Secretary. Their intention was to erect a me morial in the centre costing about £400, the memorial taking the form
