Wild Enthusiasm In the West End

Young Voters Rally to Monroe Banner.

An enthusiastic meeting of young voters of the District of St. John's West was held in the Committee Rooms, Star Hall, on Friday night. Long before the hour of starting a large crowd of young men gathered together with the one ambition of fight for "clean" government. The meeting opened at 8.30 o'clock with Mr. Larry Delahanty occupying the chair. When the three candidates, viz: Sir John C. Crosbie, William Linegar and W. Browne, B.L., arrived and were seated on the platform, the audience rose to a man and gave three ringing cheers and a tiger for the West End trio.

The first speaker of the evening was Sir J. C. Crosbie, and when he arose if was again the signal for prolonged cheering. Sir John was glad to see that such a large number of young voters had turned out. He dwelt on the fact that it was up to the young men of the rising generation to see to it that the country they were born in is one worth living in, and that it was up to the 21-year-old voter to take an important part in the fight and save their native land from blue ruin. The greatest menace and cursed thing that ever struck this country to ruin it is Sir Wm. F. Coaker. His boast that he would make the grass grow on Water Street was one that should force every St. John's boy in the field against him, he had almost accomplished that boast. Look along Water Street today. Why, business is at a standstill. "You won't find the men of a few years ago leaving the wharves to go home to partake of breakfast," said Sir John, "and rush back again" to complete a good day's work" neither will you find the trucks loaded up moving along the main street to be delivered for shipment. Coopers, mechanics, truckmen, longshoremen feel the effect of Coakerism, and the destitution which has accompanied it. Everything has gone wrong and a blight has been put over the country. To-day Coaker with his minions at his heels come before the voters of Newfoundland to receive their endorsement of his past deeds, at the polls and he to-night had his noble friend A. E. Hickman, a man of whom only a year ago he had denounced, the very man who to-day is proclaimed by the Advocate as the man who must lead Newfoundland out of the present crisis. He scored the actions of the Government with Coaker the controlling factor. The young voters must put a stop to this or he felt sure that on his next visit to America he would meet many of his hearers down in Broadway Park. "If you don't get out and do your right by Polling Day it will be a sorrowful

day for us all." In reference to the Advocate's attack on him, Sir John had taken steps to settle that matter in the course of a day or two. Already the Advocate was squealing and Coaker knew that he would have to explain pit props and pit prop accounts when the Monroe campaign began. That was why Coaker was fighting tooth and nail to defeat Monroe, but he knew that the young men of St. John's West would take off their coats and fight to preserve their homes from the ruin that threatened them, and to retain the independence of their native land. As Sir John had to attend another meeting he finished his remarks by stating that personal votes would not do. The straight ticket vote is the only way out of it. Sir John received a splendid reception at the close of his address.

MR. LINEGAR ADDRESSES GATHERING.

The next speaker was Mr. W. F. Linegar, and during the course of his remarks he made an earnest appeal to the young voters to rally round the party and assist them in their undertakings. Every man must take an active interest. The campaign opens up on Monday next, and he wanted all to show that they were behind the cause. He called upon the older voters who were on the list last year and who have not signed the roll for the forthcoming campaign to come forward and arrange for the selection of captains, etc., for the various wards.

EXCELLENT ADDRESS BY BROWNE.

Mr. W. Browne, the third candidate on the ticket for "clean" government, received a roaring reception from the audience when he stepped forward to speak. Mr. Browne opened his address very forcefully and for upwards of thirty minutes he laid bare the wrong-doings of the past administration. In the last election he supported Sir Richard Squires, but at that time he had not the conception of the man who was the guiding spirit of that regime, as he had now. That man was Coaker. He very intelligently pointed out to all his young hearers that Newfoundland to-day is in a critical condition. The verge of warfare, a warfare such as had been so nobly carried on from 1914 to 1919 on the fields of Gallipoli and France. When the call came in 1914 the young men turned out in their thousands, many of whom lost their lives, others came home wounded and maimed for life. To-day we are faced with similar conditions. The country has been desolated by the graft and plunder of its self-styled patriots, and now the time has come when they must decide whether they should banish oppression from control, or not. Mr. Brown stated he was not taking part in the struggle for personal gain. He was with Mr. Monroe, and not for any personal advantage. He stands as a man fighting for the welfare of his country and felt sure that the young men would take the same attitude. The party that he opposed was one that was ruining that country and which would complete its dastardly work if returned to power again. The party was composed of men totally incompetent to serve the country, but rather to hasten its ruin. On the other hand the party which was led by Monroe was composed of men earnest in their fight to cleanse the public life of the Colony, if returned to power. Mr. Monroe is himself a patriot, a man with a business in a sound financial position. He comes from the good old stock. A wise man, and a man fitted for the position to place Newfoundland on a solid foundation. Mr. Browne scorned the appointment made under the Coaker-Hickman executive. Only one of St. John's is on that executive, out of 12. Three Bonavita Bay men so there decorated, two with departmental offices. Is not that favoritism? He paid particular mention of the three and a half millions which had been thrown away on pit props, and not a cent of this money had been put in help along the fishery. He asked his hearers to reason out these things, see if they are not trying to gull us. He was convinced that Mr. Coaker was running the party. The issue was squarely placed before them and now is the one and only opportunity for all the young men to stand square shouldered and fight for clean government. When marking the ballots do so for the welfare of the country and its people. Mr. Browne was followed with the utmost attention throughout and when he took his seat a splendid reception was accorded the young candidate.

Before the close upwards of 500 young men came forward and signed on as members of the Committee. The young voters were very enthusiastic and are out to assist the West End candidates in every possible way.

Baron and Wife Shot

FORTUNES LOST IN FRANC SPECULATION.

Baron Rudolf Fiedler, 24, son of Field-Marshal Baron Fiedler, and his beautiful 22-years-old wife were found shot recently in their Vienna flat. The woman was dead, the husband is gravely injured.

The young Baron, who was married only 16 months ago, was in a bank till Christmas, when he resigned. It is alleged that he had lost all his own money and that of his wife and of other relatives in franc gambling.

The couple, it is stated, agreed to die together. They rose early and after dressing themselves wrote letters to the field-marshal and other relatives.

On receiving a letter a brother of the Baroness, an officer of high rank employed at the Ministry of War, hurriedly motored to the flat. He found his sister lying dead and flowers covering her breast and face. Her husband was crouching beside her unconscious. One hand clasped a revolver, the other arm was around his wife's body.

The police think the wife killed herself.

A live wire he has fought consistently for the benefit of the fishermen and laborer. He has also taken a deep interest in war work, and no doubt Harbor Grace district will have in Mr. Russell a member who will put forth his best efforts in the interests of his constituents and the country generally. The third member of the Harbor Grace team carrying the Monroe Standard is Mr. E. Simmonds. He is well known in the district having been elected to represent the constituency under a previous administration. He is Secretary of the Marine Railway Dock, Harbor Grace and is a man who can be depended upon to look after the interests of his native District. That Harbor Grace will roll up a big majority for the Monroe policy of Clean Government is a foregone conclusion.

LAST MESSAGE FROM ILL FATED DIXMUDE.

AJACCI, CORSICA May 19.
"Gasoline given out we are adrift, and like tempest, Dixmude, crew, dien and vive la France" this scrawled message found in a bottle washed up on the Corsican coast at Propriano is believed to be the last message from the ill fated airship Dixmude, lost in the Mediterranean last December. The French super zeppelin Dixmude at the time of her destruction was attempting a distance and endurance test. She disappeared with 52 men aboard. The finding on December 28, of the body of commander lieutenant Du Fosselle de Grandan off the coast of southern Sicily led the Ministry to declare formally that the ship had met disaster, later the charred parts of the airship were picked up and a board of inquiry reported that the Dixmude had been struck by lightning.

The Prostitution of the Public Utilities

When it comes down to placing the public service at the disposal of Government candidates, it is time that a HALT was called to such unseemly tactics. On Saturday night the Kyle was to sail for Port aux Basques, and requests that she should call at Grand Bank on the way up were met with prompt refusal, as it was stated that the boat could not deviate from her course. At 7 o'clock she sailed with the Government candidates for Burnin, and although the Opposition team made every possible enquiry to find out if there was any possibility of travelling by her, they were put off with evasive answers. Fair Play is Bonny Play even in an election campaign. That is one side of the matter, but we do not imagine that kind of sporting sentiment appeals very strongly to the Hickman-Coaker faction. The prostitution of the Government Service is the other side, but that causes them no concern either, for their actions during the campaign so far show that they have as little regard for the rights of the public as they had while they were formerly in office. Public Utilities are merely something to divert to their own purposes. Public Funds are oil to the wheels of their machinery, and the dissipation of Public Funds is a game in which they are adepts. **THE PUBLIC CAN GO TO JERICHO!** We feel certain that the South Coast Districts will show what they think of the gang who have no regard for their responsibilities, no respect for public decency, and no concern for anyone or anything but their own ulterior purposes. This instance of the manner in which the Hickman-Coaker clique intend to control matters to suit themselves will strike home to the public far more forcibly than a volume of words, and they can easily foresee what would happen after the elections should they by any chance be returned to power.

Coaker's Hypocrisy

Bitter and scurrilous attacks on members of the Opposition party and others have filled the past few issues of the Advocate. Written by some despicable hackwriter, who appears to be blind to all that is decent and honourable, these attacks are aimed chiefly at Sir John Crosbie, Sir Michael Cashin and Mr. W. J. Higgins. On Saturday, the Hickman-Coaker organ contained an open letter in which serious charges were preferred against Sir Michael Cashin, based on their report on the Department of the Controller, made in January last by Messrs. Read, Son & Watson. With the indecency of attacking a man who is dangerously ill, one who is no longer in politics, and who is not even in the country, we shall have something to say at a later date. For a moment we ask the indulgence of our readers, while we perform a brief exercise in deduction.

The Advocate is the organ and mouthpiece of Sir William Coaker and the F.P.U. Party, which dominates the present Government. Sir William Coaker, as a member of the Warren Executive, saw the Auditor's report on the Controller's Department some months ago.

In spite of his knowledge of the contents of this report, Sir William wished, only a few weeks ago, to associate himself with a political party of which Sir Michael Cashin, Mr. Higgins and Sir John Crosbie were members.

How then, does the Advocate explain the position of Sir William Coaker, who now permits his paper to attack men with whom he was willing to form a Government, although he was then fully aware of the facts upon which these attacks are based. We think it will require all the ingenuity which the editor of the Advocate is known to possess, to make Coaker's position good. Finally, may we remind the Advocate that from his place in the House of Assembly, on many occasions, the last one being April 24th, of the present year, Sir Michael Cashin emphatically requested a thorough enquiry into the Department of the Controller.

Libel Actions Instituted Erection of Spur Siding

The vile campaign which is being conducted in the Coaker-Hickman organ, has already resulted in no less than four libel suits being entered—two against each of the papers, the Daily Journal and the Evening Advocate, and it is probable that others will follow.

On Saturday last, Sir John Crosbie caused libel action to be taken against H. M. Mosdell, and the Union Publishing Company, Ltd., for allegations concerning the Prohibition Act, which appeared in the Advocate, claiming \$20,000; and against Lemuel Bartlett, H. M. Mosdell, and the Union Publishing Company, Ltd., for the same amount, and for the same allegations appearing in the Daily Journal.

Writs were issued to-day against Lemuel Bartlett and H. M. Mosdell, or libela, in connection with allegations appearing in that paper re Sir John Crosbie's connection with the S.S. Escanlon. Writs were also served against H. Mosdell and the Union Publishing Co., for libel, in connection with the Advocate. In both instances damages to the extent of \$20,000 were claimed.

Hickman's Corruption

In 1920 A. E. Hickman Was Found Guilty of Bribery and Corruption—Newfoundland Has Had Enough of Corruption. VOTE FOR MONROE AND CLEAN GOVERNMENT.

Sidetracking the Issue

Coaker Attacks Former Associates—Advocate's Charges Discredit Executive

In the "Daily Journal," a campaign sheet published for the Coaker party on Saturday was published an open letter, so-called, said to be written by H. M. Mosdell, though his name was not attached thereto. The proprietor of the "Journal" (according to his affidavit) is one Lemuel Bartlett, a clerk in the office of the A. E. Hickman Co., Ltd. It is not too much to suppose that Hickman's money pays for the publication.

The gist of the letter is an attack upon Sir Michael Cashin, his son-in-law, his friends, and his political connections to the remotest degree, and the object of the attack is to distract attention from the political partnership between Coaker and Hickman, a recognition of which is doing harm throughout the Colony to that political conspiracy.

It is made to appear that auditors investigating accounts in the Liquor Controller's office have reported that at various times in 1921, 1922 and 1923, quantities of rum were bought at excessive prices, and that some of the cheques in payment passed at some time through the hands of Sir Michael Cashin and his son, Larry Cashin, though not made payable to them in the first place. The insinuation behind these allegations is, of course, that there was wrongdoing in the matter by the Cashins, though this is not said in so many words. It is worth noting here that the name of the man who sold the rum is not given. Why is this suppressed; is it because he is a supporter of Hickman-Coaker?

Upon this basis of part assertion and part insinuation, about rum and cheques is based a chain of further defamatory insinuations upon Mr. Fox, because he is Sir Michael's son-in-law, upon Mr. Higgins, because he is Sir Michael's lawyer, upon Mr. P. J. Moore and Mr. W. J. Walsh, because they are his friends, and, finally, upon Mr. Walter Monroe, because Fox, Higgins, Moore and Walsh are his supporters. A more infamous attack was never made in a political campaign, and it reflects gross discredit upon it.

The Minister of Justice is the first man whom it discredits. The auditors' report came from his office. It is part of the material collected for a promised investigation. It is such matter as should not be published except upon oath before a proper tribunal, with the privilege of cross-examination by the men it concerns. Such publication as it is now receiving is revivifying to one's sense of British justice and is scandalous in the extreme.

It discredits Albert E. Hickman. Years ago he was a trusted colleague of Sir Michael Cashin. They have been friends for years. Not a month ago, Mr. Hickman was ready to enter a Government with Sir Michael. It is through no act of Hickman's that they are not colleagues at this minute. The "Journal" is Mr. Hickman's personal organ, paid for by him, and its alleged proprietor is his servant.

It discredits Sir William Coaker. Not more than two weeks ago, he sat in Sir Michael Cashin's house, ready to patch up a coalition Government which would include Sir Mich-

**Double Fatality
at Humber Canal**

TWO WORKMEN SMOTHERED.

Word comes from the Humber of a double fatality, which occurred at the Humber Canal, near Deer Lake, on Friday last, when two men, named Henry Horan and Patrick Brien, were buried alive under an avalanche of sand. The particulars of the appalling accident are as follows:—"Previous to the accident the men were engaged working at the foot of an embankment and on top of which was a track used for the purpose of running flat cars loaded with sand. One of these cars, it appears, was passing over where the men were working, when it suddenly left the track and the whole load of sand went over the men, completely covering them. A number of men, working alongside, quickly rushed to their aid, but by the time the men had been uncovered they were found dead. The bodies of the unfortunate victims were confined and came through by Saturday's express to be forwarded to their homes. The body of Patrick Brien arrived in the city yesterday and was taken in charge by Undertaker Martin, at whose Mortuary Rooms it rested all day. This morning the body was forwarded to his late home, Cape Broyle, by the Trepassey train, which went out at 11.30. Brien was a young man of 25 years and unmarried. The body of Henry Horan was sent to Argentina to be forwarded to his home by the Glencoe at Belleoram. The case of Horan is a particularly sad one, as he leaves to mourn a wife and nine children. To the sorrowing relatives of the deceased, widespread sympathy will be extended.



The whole parade was under the personal command of Lt.-Col. Walter F. Rendell, C.B.E., and was one of the largest in C.L.B. history. The Regimental and Bugle Band was also on duty. Their music was up to standard. We congratulate Sergt. Major Bursell on the progress of his Bugle Band. All ranks were pleased to see Honourary Captain N. Snow, the Brigade's first own Bandmaster, marching at the head of the column with Lt.-Col. Rendell yesterday. Captain Snow organized the first Brass Band and was in charge when the organization went to Ottawa many years ago and competed for the Governor General's prize against all Canada. It revives old traditions to have the genial veteran Bandmaster with us occasionally. Sergeant Tom Rickette, V.C., the youngest winner of the Victoria Cross, was also on duty as Sergt. Major of Field College Company. Full size decorations were worn. The sermon was preached by the Rector of St. Thomas's, Rev. John Elliott, from the text, "Jesus increased in wisdom and stature, and in favour with God and man." It was illustrated by a drawing chart and explanation of the word "Tutor." The Rector stated that some 1500 boys of St. John's did not go to school. He advocated many plain rules for every day life, to cut out coffin nails (cigarettes), read the best books, play the games for exercise and thus fit the body for life's duties; every boy should have a hobby, fight the good fight against sin's grip, help your parents, do your duty to God, never minding outsiders' opinions, whether the duty is popular or not, put religion into life, remembering the motto of the University student, "I come to study—God first, my pal second and self last. All ranks listened carefully to a most practical discourse preached directly to the hearts of all present. The hymns used were "Fight the Good Fight," "Stand Up, Stand Up For Jesus," and "Ask the Saviour to Help You." The National Anthem concluded the second Church Parade for the year. On dismissing the parade at the Armoury Lt.-Col. Rendell expressed his appreciation to the Old Comrades for such loyal support in turning out and to the Girl Guide Companies for joining the parade, and extended an invitation to all and sundry to be with him at the Pedlar's Parade in the Armoury on Wednesday.

Induction of Rev. Daniel L. Nichol

NEW MINISTER CONGREGATIONAL CHURCH.

There was a large congregational present yesterday morning when Rev. Dr. Darby inducted the Rev. Daniel L. Nichol as Minister of Queen's Road Congregational Church. Rev. Dr. Darby in well chosen words introduced the new pastor to his people, following which Rev. Mr. Nichol made a reply, as follows:—"God helping me I shall strive to be a faithful minister and pastor to this church and congregation. It is not of my own seeking that I am here, for I had no thought or intention of leaving England. But when the directors of the Colonial Missionary Society and the Moderator of the Southern Province of the Congregational Union of England approached me and pointed out such a man as myself was needed at Queen's Road, St. John's, it seemed as though a distinct call to service had come. My wife and I both felt that this was the will of God for us, and so we were led to accept the invitation.

To-day we enter upon this new relationship with you. It is a very solemn and serious moment for me, and I feel confident it is for you also.

This induction service partakes of the nature of a covenant between you and me. With God's help I pledge myself to be a true minister and friend to you, and I feel that you also, as a congregation and people, pledge yourselves to fellowship and loyalty, so that in worship and work we may be united, and in Church life one of happy comradeship and friendship and as a Christian Church be rich in influence for the sake of that Kingdom of God, which is greater than any church, and greater than all the churches. My prayer is that the Grace of God, and the love of Jesus Christ, and the fellowship of the Holy Spirit may ever abide among us."

The Rev. gentleman then took for his first text the 34th Chapter of the Book of Psalm, 5th Verse. "They looked unto Him and were lightened and their faces were not ashamed."

The subject of the sermon was Christianity as an everyday religion, and the preacher stressed the power of the Gospel to meet all the needs of men and women in the complex life of the world to-day. It was this wide gospel for the ordinary man in all his moods that he would preach as minister in that church.

The sermon was an able one and there is no doubt that the new minister struck a responsive chord in his appeal for the loyalty and co-operation of every member of the congregation.

The Evening Service.

The arrival of a new pastor is always an interesting, as well as an important event in Church life, and so was it yesterday at the Congregational Church, when the induction of the Rev. D. L. Nichol took place.

As our readers are aware, since the departure of the Rev. Mr. Holden,

the Church has been supplied by the Rev. Dr. Darby, Chaplain of the Methodist College. Hence it was that Dr. Darby in concluding his work yesterday morning, also introduced the new pastor to the people—over whose spiritual interests, and general welfare, he is to preside. We are pleased to say that Mr. Nichol made a good impression upon his people, and that the spirit of the Induction service was helpful. In the afternoon Mr. Nichol visited the Sunday School and addressed the children, from whom he received a warm welcome.

It was of course at the evening service that an opportunity was afforded of hearing the new pastor properly, and of judging his merits as a minister in holy things. There was a nice congregation present, amongst whom were several visitors from other city churches. The singing was hearty, and the service was such as must have impressed the good man, as well as being edifying to the congregation. In modern Church worship, the sermon seems to occupy the principal place, hence special interest was centered in the preacher for the moment. The text was two-fold, and was taken from the Book of Psalms, and Book of Revelations. One text asked the question "Where is now their God?" and the other answered it where in it states, "The Tabernacle of God is with men," or to interpret it more plainly, "the dwelling place of God with men."


In beginning his discourse the preacher at once took up the great central thought contained in these portions of Scripture—the thought of God, of His reality, and of His being and existence. Amidst the rest and unrest of the age such a thought is timely and necessary, and men still ask the question, "Where is God?" The answer is everywhere to be seen; for God is everywhere. He is about us, church, and greater than all the churches. My prayer is that the Grace of God, and the love of Jesus Christ, and the fellowship of the Holy Spirit may ever abide among us."

Treating the question more directly from a New Testament view, the preacher dealt with it from an experimental and personal standpoint; and showed that in the manifestation which the Redeemer gave of life, there is a closer relationship whereby men become the sons of God. They become His children; hence the words of the Lord's Prayer, "Our Father." The entire thought of the sermon was spiritual, and if the discourse may be taken as a criterion of Mr. Nichol's ministry, it will be safe to expect a continuance of scriptural and religious preaching which should certainly tell upon the spiritual life of the Church.

The Rev. D. L. Nichol impressed us as being a man of profound thought, and calm dignity, and one who seems to see beneath the surface of things, and who, we think will prove a worthy successor to the good men who have presided here. Such names as Ward, Scudford, Hall, Beattie, Hodgkinson, Thackeray, and Thomas, are still fresh in the memories of some people. These good men made a worthy record, and it is gratifying to know that Mr. Nichol gives promise of worthily sustaining their ministry.

We extend to Mr. Nichol and his good lady a cordial welcome to Newfoundland, and we feel assured that in St. John's their efforts will be appreciated. Perhaps, like others they may have had a misconception of Newfoundland and its people; but yesterday's beautiful sunshine, and

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
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
