



Solicitor Fenelon, on behalf of one of the property owners, stated that as soon as the necessary authority is received arrangments will be made to carry out the wishes of the Council in this re-

Mr. W. J. Kent applied for permission to build addition to the rear of his residence, Gower Street. Permit will be issued for same, subject to the approval of the City Engineer. A discussion took place as regards the suggested diverting of the street railway route. It was pointed out that some of 'the Company's consulting engineers, following transfer of the property from the Reid Company, looked upon such an alteration as an impossibility owing to the steep grades which would have to be taken into consideration. The change in question was the elimination of Holloway Street and substitution of the Hill of Chips.

Attention was called to the fact that the lights at the National Memorial, King's Beach, have been out, on several occasions recently. The Executive of the G.W.V.A. will be written regarding same.

With regard to the claims made by the St. John's Gaslight Company, Water Street West, and Branscombe's Estate, Waldegrave Street, for damages to their respective properties, the City Engineer informed the Board that at the time in question all the City sewers were overcharged, particularly those on the lower levels. A copy of his report on the matter is to be forwarded the City Solicitor for his opinion as to the position of the Council.

The application of Robinson & Co., for surface drain, Duckworth Street, was granted and the Engineer's Detment instructed accordingly The following matters were refer-

ed to the Engineering Department: (1) Placing of a plank platform at East End Cabstand, for the convenience of cabmen and taxi drivers. (2) Repairing of steps in the Lane West of the Telegram building.

They found that there were 5,000 square miles of land in this country, suitable for agriculture. There has not been another estimate made since. As to the cost of clearing land the Thorburn Government offered a bonus to any ne-clearing land, of \$20.00 an acre. 






#### Grandpa's Bones as Radio Weather Prophets

One of the mysterious things about the human body, says Dr. E. E. Free, Science Editor of The Forum, in the current issue of that magazine, is the remarkable "weather sense" exhibited by some people. Many an old rentleman who carries around a eumatic joint or an old and longealed wound can really predict some features of the weather, hours or even days in advance. Grandpa's rheumatism really seems to do quite as well as the official weather prophets with all their laboratories and observatories. There are too many instances of this sort for the matter to be entirely imaginary, even when one takes into account the proneness of the human mind to exaggerate a

general law. There are some scientific possibilities, Dr. Free declares, which may lie at the bottom of this mysterious advance knowledge of coming storms. One is the existence of electromagnetic waves quite like radio waves. If a storm is electric in nature, if it is accompanied, for example, by thunder and lightning, it really sends out signals in advance in the form of hese radio-like waves. One of the larger electric power companies in New York City has devised an instrument which will detect these storm waves in advance and ring a bell in the power house, so that the engineer knows that a storm is coming up. This information is valuable because storms darken the city, more artificial light is needed and the power house It may be that some similar detec the body lies at the root of the effect







**Nordics Only** 

"America must be kept American," said President Coolidge in his message to Congress in connection with the Immigration Bill. This, says Madison Grant, writing in The Forum, is the guiding principle of the new Immigration Act.

Our form of government is based on the Constitution of the United States and not on the Declaration of Independence. It was fixed and settled more than a hundred years ago, and the principles formulated at the time of its foundation are far older, extending back throughout English history. Our institutions are Anglo-Saxon and can only be maintained by Anglo-Saxons and by other Nordic peoples in sympathy with our culture. In spite of the common belief to the contrary the population of the colonies was not a mixture of races. The census of 1790 shows

that the purely English inhabitants comprised 83.5 per cent. of the white population and that more than 93.8 per cent. were Nordic. The founders of this country were familiar with the dangers from free immigration. "It would be a miracle." wrote Thomas Jefferson, "were they (immigrants) to stop at the

point of temperate liberty. In proportion to their numbers they will share with us in legislation. They will infuse into it their spirit, warp Price: 100 and inter- and bias its direction, and render it a heterogeneous, incoherent, diswith patience for the attainment of any degree of population? May not our government become more homogeneous, more peaceable, more dur-

How wise these ferebodings of Jefferson proved is shown in the increasing lawlessness of our mixed population. Fereigners are obtaining places on the judicial bench, are serving on our juries, and above all are practising in our courts in ever increasing numbers. The result is that our criminal law has virtually broken down, and the United States s known all over the world as the most lawless of civilized countries and a paradise for malefactors of every race. As an example, New York is probably the only city in the world where registered mail is de-

ivered in armored cars. Having secured a numerical limitation of immigration, our next duty is to see that such immigrants as do arrive are drawn from those countries and races which took part in the formulation and development of our system of government. A word of warning may well be given to the opponents of the present relatively liberal law, by pointing out that there is in Congress and in the country a very large and growing element which demands the suspension of all imimgration. If the present law is made unworkable by its enemies, such an alternative may easily

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
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
