WELLINGTON GREY AND BRUCE RAILWAY.

(Special Despatch to the Evening Mercury)

WALKERTON, June 30th, 1868.

At the meeting last night a resolution expressive of sympathy culoigizing the energy of the Toronto men and endorsing the action of the County Council, was passed. On all these points public opinion here has undoubtedly reached a settled conclusion, and the people now listen, with ill disguised weariness, to arguments proving what nineteen men out of twenty do not need to have proved to them any more. The situation in Bruce has become an exceedingly simple one, and easy to undeastand. The people are overwhelminly in favor of the broad gauge line to Guelph, but will take a narrow gauge railway to Toronto rather than no railway at all:

Another point is, they want a railway immediately, and are looking with the very intensity of impatience to see something actually done at the eastern end. This latte. circumstance, once made apparent, a large and liberal bonus from the county, in a lump, may be depended on for a certainty.


