Arriving at Leruka, on the west coast of Africa, he parted with the captain—who, no doubt, was not of sufficiently sanguinary disposition for the work—and appointed the mate, whose name is Armstrong, to be captain in his stead.

But Dr. Murray was not a man to shrink before the puny efforts for freedom which were being made by a lot of naked savages whom he had stowed away in the hold of his ship. He just raised the hatch and fired a few volleys into the crowd of human beings, and having in this fashion bid them "Good night," he shut them up till morning, to sleep, die, according to the circumstances of each individual "emigrant's" case.

Unfortunately, Dr. Murray's crime is not a solitary instance. He is, indeed, probably the only sounder in the South Seas who carries on a trade of which murder is a daily incident.

The Suspension Bridge.

It is now some twenty years since the cables on which the railroad and carriage bridge near Buffalo, were supported in the rock. In the meantime, the question of a railroad bridge across the Niagara river, near Buffalo, has been agitated, a company formed, and a bridge at Black Rock is in process of building. This is well enough if the Buffalo people did not seek to gain capital for their work by deceiving ours, claiming that it was dangerous. So much has been said and written, that Superintendent Swan informs us, the Directors and Chief Engineer of the Great Western Railway Company have made a critical examination of the work. The cables on the towers covering the cable have been removed, and the cables found to be as perfect in every respect as ever they were. But, most important of all, the anchorage of the cables were thoroughly inspected. The masonry over one of these was removed for about 13 feet, or below where the wires are attached to the anchor chains. A portion of the cable is imbedded in water lime cement. For twenty years this has been there, yet, on removing it and rubbing paint off the wires, the latter were found as bright and perfect as when placed there. The cement having preserved the wire and anchor chains intact. The examination was made in the presence of competent engineers, who have expressed themselves as above to the directors of the bridge company. There is, therefore, no doubt but that the bridge is just as sound as it was the day the first train crossed it. Its durability has been practically proved. It has stood the test of time and heavy weights, and sustained the wisdom and skill of its builders. So says the Suspension Bridge Journal.

COPYRIGHT.—The Toronto Mail says: Some enterprising, but not over fastidious American, has been making free with the Toronto corporation, and has taken upon himself to issue certain debentures, some of the coupons of which have been sent here for collection. One of them was forwarded to the bank of Montreal and others through the Express Company. They bear the signature of "S. E.
