ALASKA SHIP ARRIVES.

Shooting Said to Have Occurred on the St. Paul.

St. Paul. Bellingham, Oct. 13.—The hulk Daven-port, in tow of the Philip F. Kelly, has reached this port with 41,000 cases of salm-on from Chatham, Alaska. The Daven-port is the last of the salmon fleet from the north bound for Bellingham. A story has leaked out of a shooting affray among Italian fishermen on board the shito St. Paul, which arrived here Sun-day from Chignik with 68,000 cases of salmon. The story is that Statto, the Italian foreman, against whom threats had been made by his crew, met Joseph Canavell, one of the disturbers, on deck and shot him in the arm. Later Stiatto is said to have paid his victim \$500 to sup-press the story and refrain from prosecu-tion.
