About 3 o'clock the enemy's infantry advanced in open order upon our left, bringing up several guns, which they placed at short distances from each other and presently showed several pieces of artillery on our right. Our guns opened fire and our turned out to face the attack. THE LOSS BY TWO BROKEN WHEELS OF A

The accident on the Grand Trunk railway at Highland Creek is one which should teach the railway authorities an important lesson, whether they heed it or not. It appears that there was no mismanagement by the employes in charge of the train, but that the accident, with its suffering and loss, arose from the breaking of two wheels. The loss, it is reported, will be about \$10,000, which might have been avoided had proper care been taken the inspection and choics of wheels known or warranted to run for a given period without breaking. It is well known that wheels have run upon the Northern milroad for ten years, and are yet good, while others fail often in a few months. In the manufacture of wheels two objects have to be kept in view. The iron forming the body of the wheel must be of great tenacity, and in its construction the circumference, which hears the tear and wear of the rails, must be hardened artificially by what is called the chilling process. This sential feature in wheels can be clearly seen by ordinary examination, as inferior ron will not secure the depth of chill secured by the best class of iron. 
