Deacon Norman McDonald, our Senior and Honoraty Deacon, fell asleep in Jesus, Aug. 31st., ult., aged 73 years, 8 months. Converted when a lad, he waited for a marvellous experience. Nov., 1856, he was baptized by Rev. David Freeman into the Granville Street Church, 3 years after his good wife had cast in her lot with the Baptists. In 1869, he joined the North Baptist Church by letter, having worshipped for some years with us. For more than 25 years he faithfully served as Deacon, and about 2 years ago he was by vote of the churcl, made Honorary Deacon. For many years he taught in the Sunday School and some of his pupils were at his funeral. He was one of the few older members of the church, actively interested in the young people's work. He kept young and attended regularly their meetings. He belonged to the Young Men's Class. The Church, the Young Men's Class, as well as others, sent beautiful flowers. Deacon Mc. Donald had genuine Christian character. He was faithful to his friend, his Church, his Master. We keenly feel our loss, but thank God for giving us this stalwart, in Christian Life. We may not see his like again, but we are stronger from having seen him. The church is loudly calling for young men to serve as faithfully as did Deacon McDonald.
