THE Bristol Iron mines are to be energetically worked. The proprietors have now secured milway connections and the taking out of ore will be pushed.



S/ MPLES NOW READY FOR SPRING TRADE 1889



Owing to the scarcity of feed, farmers in the nighbourhood of Kingston and Ottawa are parting with their stock at unprecedentedly low prices, young horses going for \$6 and \$7 each.

A Tononto despatch denies the silly report that the Bank of Commerce had demanded the payment of all outstanding call loans in order to supply the city with the \$1,000,000 contracted for.

MRS. P. GAGNE, general storekeeper, of North Ham, Que, has assigned. Her husband kept a small store there, but unfortunately he died last summer, and the widow has not been able to make the business a success.

Mn. Wm. Ross, Deputy-Postmaster, of Guelph, has been appointed Manager of the Guelph and Ontario Investment and Savings Society vice Somerville, resigned to accept the managership of the Huron & Erie Loan

A Dominion charter will be sought for the railway from Portage du Fort to Quio, and for the bridging of the Ottawa River to connect with Pembroke. Quebec will give a bonus of \$6,000 a mile. The company already have a Quebec.

CANADA exported to Australia last year about \$271,000 worth of merchandise, and brought thence some \$120,000' worth, mostly wool. In the previous year the United States sent to that continent \$11,000,000 worth and imported \$9,660,000 worth.

EUGENIE BOURGET, wife of F. X. Toussaint, doing business as Toussaint & Co., grocers, of Quebec, has assigned. Toussaint was formerly of the firm of Toussaint Freres who failed in 1883. Since then he has done business in his wife's name and, as usual, unsuccessfully.

THE death is announced of John Cunningham Stewart, Financial Comptroller of the Post Office Department in Ottawa, Mr. Stewart received his appointment in the service over thirty years ago through his uncle, the late Sir Francis Hincks, and was a most efficient officer.

THE Post Office department is taking steps to correct abuses of the franking privilege according the civil service, and in future greater care will be exercised to prevent abuse. It is stated that not long ago a bag of wheat, weighing sixty pounds, was franked as a parcel at Ottawa.

E. M. TROWERN, jeweller, of Toronto, whose difficulties have already been, fully discussed in these columns, has succeeded in obtaining a settlement from his creditors at 331 cents in the dollar, spread over fifteen months, and secured. This leaves him a surplus and a lengthened credit to get clear in.

The want of snow has prevented the usual activity in bainess at Guelph, and Christmas goods have been dull of sale in comparison with some former years. Grain also has been held back in hopes of speculative prices, and farmers are now waiting for the brisker markets and higher prices to return.

W. W. SAUNDERS, general storekeeper, of Bridgetown, N. S., has assigned. He was formerly a school teacher and commenced storekeeping in 1883. In 1886 he failed, but succeeded in obtaining a settlement with his creditors. Since then he has not done well and he now assigns owing \$3,500.

THE Manchester Chamber of Commerce, by an overwhelming majority, has passed a resolution holding that all foreign goods similar to those produced in England should pay the same proportion of the Imperial and local taxation which they would have paid had they been manufactured in Great Britain.

THE position of lobster is decidedly stronger the stock being greatly reduced. In Boston the total available quantity in first hands does not exceed 500 cases. The demand momentarily is only moderate, but with a revival of interest which is expected to follow the opening of the year, a hardening of values is considered probable.

H. E. PELLETIER, general storekeeper, St. Louis, Que., has assigned. His liabilities will reach \$12,000, due principally in Quebec, and he claims assets nominally equal in value. He seems to have been trying to do too large a business for his means, and in order to push goods has cut prices so low as to leave too narrow a margin for profit.

THE U. S. Commissioner of Agriculture comes vigorously to the defense of the American butter trade. He declares that the use use of annatto dissolved in cottonseed oil is not an adulteration of butter within the

meaning of the oleomargarine law, and he expresses the belief that no fraudulent adulteration is practiced by dairymen.

M. H. FAUTEUX, dry-goods merchant of this city, has assigned. This business really belonged to E. Fauteaux, but as he had been unsuccessful before, he ran it in the name of his daughter. Naturally under these circumstances his credit was anything but strong, but, nevertheless, he has managed to accumulate liabilities to the extent of \$19,000

The same terms of contract between the Moneton Gas and Water Company and the town has been finally agreed upon, and the mayor has been authorized by the town council to execute it. A considerable amount of money will be expended by the company in extending their electric lighting lines, also in improving the condition of the water supply.

AT a recent meeting of the New York State Dalrymen's Association, Commissioner Brown reported that after visiting 1,163 factories the past season, his assistants find from the statistics collected that the average vield of the cows whose milk is delivered at these factories is only 3.034 pounds per season. This means a return from each cow not exceeding \$25 per year.

Nova Scoria, which owns a ton of shipping for every inhabitant, is jubilant over the increased rates of freight earned by Nova Scotia ships, which have increased at least 50 per cent, in value in the last year, and great activity is i visible in the Province's shipyards Freights are still on the rise, and \$16 a thousand is offered in New York for lumber to South American ports

Gent. Manager, TORONTO

CLARA L. MORENCY, milliner, of Sherbrooke, Que., has assigned. She had very little capital but was a practical milliner, and, therefore, should have got on. She was formerly a partner in the firm of U. L. & W. W. Morency, who dissolved in 1885.-J. A. Brunet, a small tailor of Valleyfield, Que, has assigned. He did a fair living business, but not sufficient to render it remunerative.

S. H. FRIGON, general storekeeper of St. Tite. Que., has assigned. He was formerly a farmer, and began as a storekeeper only two years ago with very little capital and no experience in business. From the first caution was advised in crediting him.-R. H. Peters, general store, of Enterprise, Ont., has assigned. He is said to be a poor man of business, and has been slow in payments for some time

ABOUT eighteen months since three men, who had long been working as journeymen saddlers in Guelph, each started on his own! account, and ran down prices of harness somewhat to secure business. One was Mr. R. Black, who recently made an assignment. and whose stock was sold last week to Mr. J. Lovell at 791c in the dollar. The other two men are supposed to be still doing a healthy business. Condition of Africa

W. H. Borbbiog, harness maker, of St. Thomas, Ont., has assigned. He owes some \$2,000. He has done only a small business, just making a living and no more.-Thomas

A CORRESPONDENT Writes:—Yarmouth, N.S., hitherto supposed to be one of the most progressing towns in Nova Scotia, has voted against incorporation and still continues under the sway of magistrates. Not unlikely the good people of Yarmouth were to a great extent influenced in their opposition to a mayor and town council from the spectacle afforded by the City Council of Halifax, whose meetings have not been of a character to excite a desire on the part of other towns to be ruled over by similar bodies.

FREDERIOTON, Moneton and Halifax are taking steps to insist on the building of the link in the Short Line Railway between Fredericton and Moneton. The link is said to be indispensable to proper communication between Montreal and Halifax, and without it

to have the flower town the Administration and the department of t

the journey to Halifax will not be shortened one hour. If this link is part of the agreement upon which the subsidy was given, it should be built, and the three eastern provinces seem determined to insist on the carrying out of the agreement to the letter.

At the present sitting of the Supreme Court of Nova Scotia a test case was to have been argued as to the rights of the Provincial Legislature of Nova Scotia to pass an act requiring licenses to be taken out by wholesale liquor dealers and brewers and affixing conditions to such issue of licenses, but the majority of the court refused to hear the argument. It is said the liquor license iaw is a total failure in the City of Halifax, as the provisions are being openly violated under the very noses of the officials whose duty it is to enforce them.

THE new steamship, "Stanley," for winter service between Prince Edward Island and the Mainland, has arrived at Pictou. She proved herself to be a very fast boat and her speed surpassed that of any steamer which has hitherto run through the Straits of Canso. It is intended to run the "Stanley" between Summerside and Shediac, then between Picton and Charlottetown, and as the ice forms eastwardly, she will operate between Pictou and Georgetown. If the "Stanley" cannot keep up the service with moderate success, nothing remains but the tunnel or balloon.

MR. CHARLES DONEY, of Ottawa, Ont., has recently won and received a very handsome, silver salver, the prize for the best essay on advertising given by the Boston Boot and Shoe. Recorder and open to all subscribers. The salver is a very handsome one of solid silver, some 20 inches long by 12 wide. strong protests that were made to the prices current during the heighth of the season Eleven vessels have cleared from San Francisco from July 13 to December 10, and the total quantities of these shipments have reached the satisfactory aggregate of 330,000 cases. oldest oil region in the world, though it is only within a comparatively few years that the gift of nature has been traned to practical advantage.

A company is about being formed at Gaspe with a capital of \$500.000 to carry on the fishery trade of Labrador. They intend to construct special steam vessels for the work. Mr. Tetu, a Quebec civil engineer, thinks that with a subsidy of \$50,000 from the Dominion Government he would be able to navigate the St. Lawrence from Tadousac to Liverpool via Cape Ray and Newfoundland, which would reduce the distance by thirty-six hours as from Hallfax to day. His idea is to form a company and build a vessel for the enterprise.

"To our already formidable list of poisons," says an English journal, "may be added, as a source of occasional danger, the fragrant nutmeg. It is not likely that dults will ever die of eating nutmegs; but the inquisitive fingers of children find their way to the spicebox, and thence convey many things to their curious palates. A TRAIN consisting of twenty cars loaded with dressed turkeys left Smith's Falls recently for Boston. The turkeys were purchased at Perth, Irish Creek, Smith's Falls. Carleton Place and other points in Lanark and Leeds, and the value of the consignment was \$45,000. The Customs duty amounted to \$4,500. Considerable poultry has also gone from Canada for the New York holiday market. The Bulletin of that city says :- Three carloads of live poultry arrived, one from Canada and two from Iowa. Canada chickens and turkeys were not very good, and sold down to 9c, with a few turkeys at 10c. Western fowls, chickens and turkeys sold readily at 16c per lb. Ducks and geese show no material change; the Canada geese were of extra quality and sold at good prices:

Unfortunately Ward, although an excellent man behind the counter, gave far too much credit. and having to face keen competition without the necessary capital, found the load he carried far too heavy, and, in consequence, is now in difficulties. The other assets consist of book debts to the extent of \$4,000; but the greater part of these are uncollectable and it is feared that outside creditors to the extent of \$2,000 get nothing. His old partner, McEwan, has built a large block and is running his grocery successfully; thus invalidating the old rule that when one man has the experience and the other the money the positions will be reversed before very long.

continent, and, too often, with an astounding ignorance of the real wants and requirements of the country. Under these
circumstances we have naturally come to
gradually ignore all criticism except that
coming from our own political economists
and to look upon the opinions of those of
other countries as of very little value to
us.

But, now and then, we come upon a writer whose eminence and knowledge of the subject entitle his deductions to a respectful hearing, and such a one is Sir. Lyon Playfair, whose recent article upon the Presidential election in the columns of the Nineteenth Century, [Leonard-Scott Publishing Cc. of Phila.] gives a clear and succinct account of that great contest over the proper method of tailff reform that is well worth our consideration. Of course we cannot accept all Sir Lyon's comments upon the subject of protection in their entirety, since a bias in favor of free trade is clearly apparent all through, but his comparison of the rival methods proposed by each of the political parties is both concise and impartial, and, as such, will bear repetition.

The Democratic platform was based on the Mills Bill which, in its turn, was based on the famous classification of commodities made by Joseph Hume in 1840, dividing them into the five following classes:—

- I. Articles of food and animals.
- Articles in a crude condition which enter into the various processes of manufacture.
- III. Articles wholly or partially manufactured for use as materials for completed manufactures or for the mechanical arts.
- Manufactured articles ready for consumption.
 - V. Articles of voluntary use or luxuries.

In the Mills Bill the duties upon the first three of these classes are either abolished or modified, while those of the last two are maintained. The bill reduces

the average of the tariff from 47 per cent. to 42 per cent but, in our opinion, makes a mistake in converting all duties to an advalorem scale, since we have found that this method of calculation increases the volume of fraud by undervaluation, and is thus distinctly inferior to the system of specific duties.

The Republican platform has been considerably modified since the election, when the principal plank recommended free whiskey and tobacco rather than any tampering with the protective tariff. The new platform, as indicated by the Senate Bill, frees whiskey when used in the arts but maintains the tax when it is used for potations. It frees manufactured tobacco and reduces the duty on sugar by onehalf; but on the other hand it increases the obnoxious duty on raw wool, as well as upon all manufactures of that staple. The motto of General Harrison was "Free traders are students of maxims, not markets;" while that of Mr. Cleveland declared that "Unnecessary taxation is unjust taxation." Upon these two divergent aphorisms the Presidential contest was really fought out, and it is upon these two lines of argument that the rival measures for the reduction of the surplus were respectively based.

Naturally Sir Lyon Play fair gives his verdict in favor of the Mills Bill; and if in some respects his antagonism to the protective principle leads. him to go a little too far in some of his deductions, his reasoning on the whole is cogent and well balanced. He points out that while experience has proved that protection is perfectly compatible with high wages, the Republicans are in error in asserting that it is the cause of them; and enforces this argument by the fact that industries protected by duties of 100 per cent pay no higher wages than those which have only 25 per cent. of protection, and further that wages have not been equalized by the tariff but vary now as much between the various States of the Union as they do between Great Britain and America. The average wage of Maine is \$285, while the average of California is \$480; and yet both States have precisely the same measure of protection. While a still more striking fact, is that workmen in unprotected industries win higher wages than those who labor at protected ones, and appear to suffer less in hard times.

Whether it is safe-to prophesy that no future election will be fought under the undisguised banner of protection we very much doubt. The education of the people in the principles of fiscal reform has been too, short, and too hampered, by, false assertions and deductions, to warrant so sweeping a departure. But the leaven is evidently, working, and it is, safe to assert that, both, parties, now acknowledge the

necessity of some reform in the tariff, although they differ materially as to its extent and direction. The verdict at the last election was a distinct endorsation of the principle of protection; but there were many indications that a change was coming over popular opinion as to the measure of protection necessary to the advancement of the material interests of the country. The votes of some highly protected centres were very significant, and although the upholders of free raw materials may be discouraged by the check they have received, they have no reason to be disheartened as to the future.

THE BANK STATEMENT.

Contrary to expectations, the statement of the chartered banks for the month of November last shows that the volume of trade during that month remained practically only the same as during October, and even displayed some signs of falling off. Circulation shows a trifling decrease of \$185,842, instead of the usual increase at this period; an indication that the volume of agricultural products going forward has undergone no expansion, and that farmers have been largely holding on to their crops in hopes of the return of high prices.

Deposits on demand show a small advance of \$20,726; but in those after notice we find a substantial growth of \$1,459,309. If this increase consist of genuine deposits by the public, it indicates an expansion in the loanable funds of the banks by that amount; but we must not forget that this heading is sometimes, a, misleading one, since loans on deposit receipt from one bank to another are, often entered under this caption when they should really be described as loans to other, banks unsecured. No doubt a good deal of money is now being placed with the banks, pending a fall in the value of some of the leading investment stocks; but probably the in crease in these deposits is due as largely to the reception of lump sums of railway funds as to any deposits on the part of the

The balances due to agencies in the United Kingdom continue to show a steady reduction; the decrease during the month amounting to \$724,764. This must of course be ascribed to the high rates of interest now ruling in Great Britain; since it is the custom, there to charge one, per cent, over the bank rate on all these, balances. Naturally a Canadian bank does not care to pay six per cent, on its English balance when call money here will only command 31 to 4 per cent, and so we may look to see this item still further reduced. The increase in discounts and loans to business corporations is a some-

what disappointing one. It was known that very heavy advances had been made to lumbering firms during the month, and it was consequently expected that loans and discounts would display a marked advance. Instead, we find merely a growth of \$886,841, and naturally we can only draw the conclusion that the general demand for business purposes must have fallen off sufficiently to offset the heavy payments to the lumbermen.

The amount due from American agencies has fallen to \$21,176,469. however, is quite a sufficiently large sum to have at stake in a foreign country. Prohably two-thirds of this sum are lent in Chicago on wheat and pork; a somewhat risky business at the best of times, and especially so at the present moment when the future course of prices must be looked upon as uncertain. The item of "other assets" shows a decrease of \$258,245. This is a heading which we have frequently shown is responsible for a far larger sum than apparently belongs to it. The headings now existing should certainly be sufficiently comprehensive to cover any ordinary assets that a bank may hold. No doubt there are some securities (such as insurance policies for instance) which could not be classified under any of the present headings, but we can hardly believe their value will reach \$5,165,596. It is evident, then, that a further column or columns are necessary in order that the public may understand of what so important a balance as this really consists, and to remove the impression that much of it is really made up of losses not yet written off.

We regret to notice an increase in the loans to firms whose members are directors of banks. It is an indication that the long expected improvement in payments has not yet developed, since these are the very firms that would be the first to curtail their lines of discount if money came in better. It shows that, with the exception of a few fortunate districts, trade throughout the Dominion has fallen below expectations, and that consequently the retailer has had to claim the indulgence of the wholesaler who, in his turn, falls back upon his bankers for assistance. This is the only logical inference that we can draw from the figures, and we fear that there is little hope that the statement for the present month will show any improvement. The holiday trade, however, has been good. We shall soon have good winter roads in this province, and, although the weather in the West still keeps mild, the roads there are improving. Under these circumstances we can look forward hopefully to the turn of the year and trust that 1889 will prove a better year in every respect than the one to which we are now bidding farewell :-- .

OUR RANCHING SYSTEM.

It is a frequent subject of complaint upon the part of North-Western communities that, in spite of the railroad communication now existing from sea to sea, the bulk of their fellow country men in the older provinces have no more idea of their peculiar surroundings, needs, or grievances, than they have of the internal policy of the Japanese. No doubt this complaint is largely correct. Our knowledge of the real position of affairs in the North-Western territories is certainly both limited and incorrect; but it must be remembered that this arises from no lack of interest upon our part, but simply because all news from that portion of the

Dominion comes from interested sources, and is so garbled and sifted before it reaches us that we have come to regard it with considerable suspicion. It is for this reason solely that so little interest is now taken in even the most stirring topics in the North-West, and not because we are in any way indifferent to their welfare or careless of their future.

The leasing system now in vogue throughout the territories is a case in point. We find the two parties to the question contradicting each other flatly, and, consequently, must remain doubtful as to which side to believe. The ranching companies uphold the present system as the only means by which their industry

is rendered possible, and insist that it is a boon to the whole country. The settlers on the other hand maintain that the effect of the system has been to prevent the growth and settlement of the country, and that it has resulted simply in creating a monopoly for certain favored individuals by rendering competition impossible. Each side had its advocates, and for some time it was difficult to decide upon the merits of the case: but, of late, we have had a very significant piece of evidence in favor of the settlers side of the question in the shape of an order-in council cancelling no less than twenty-seven grazing leases in the Northwest, covering nearly seven hundred thousand acres, owing to the failure of the lease holders to comply with the Government regulations. This is a strong indication that the contention that a large portion of these leases were held only for speculative purposes and had never had, or were likely to have, a head of stock on the range they covered was substantially correct. The Government are proverbially slow to interfere with vested interests or political friends, and, therefore, the grievance must have been a glaring one before it attracted official reprobation. Finding then that the settlers are sustained by the facts in one of their statements, we must naturally give them the benefit of the doubt also in their contention that the present quarantine against Montana cattle was not instituted by any desire to prevent disease but simply to prevent competition by hindering new comers who might be desirous of stocking ranches from obtaining cattle wherewith to do so, and thus to assist in retaining the monopoly of the ranching business in the hands of the existing parties.

The argument of the cattle men is that this quarantine of 90 days against Montana cattle is necessary to retain the privilege granted by Great Britain allowing Canadian cattle to be transported in that country alive instead of being killed on arrival as American cattle are. They state that it is their intention to build up a profitable ex_ port cattle trade with England; that this privilege is necessary to their success; and that unless the entry of Montana cattle were prohibited this privilege would be denied them. The settlers on their part state that the ranchmen have no intention of fostering an export cattle trade. that they desire simply to retain the monopoly of supplying the Government police and Indians with beef at high prices; that the only cattle they export are the surplus over the amount requisite to fill this demand; and that the result of the quarantine has simply been to prevent intending ranchers from securing cattle to stock their ranges (by prohibiting their importation from the only point where they can be secured) and thus to maintain the pre-

sent holders of contracts in a comfortable and profitable monopoly.

These are the two sides of the case; and so far as we can at present judge from the evidence adduced, the settlers appear to have substantiated most of their assertions. There is no more epidemic disease in Montana than there is in Canada, and by the territorial system of quarantine there is practically as little chance of its ever being introduced. The cry of disease therefore must be abandoned; and, consequently, we find that the cattlemen are changing their ground and are now upholding the quarantine on the ground that it is necessary to guard against the danger of the country being overcrowded by ranches, (or in other words the danger of free competition) and that to secure this end it is necessary to shut Jout Montana cattle and to retain the use of immense tracts of the public domain, either unleased, or if leased, unstocked, and to turn away annually settlers and cattlemen of this very class who would do most to build up the country and who would bring with them a fair amount of property and capital to begin on. This assertion they make in spite of the fact that the leasing system was adopted to guard against the very danger of overcrowding; in spite of the order-in-Council in regard to sheep; and in spite of a 20 per cent. tariff in their favor. The weakness of this argument is clearly apparent; and the danger of retarding the progress of the country abundantly palpable. It now rests with the Government to thoroughly investigate the whole matter; and since the appointment of the Hon. Mr. Dewdney to the portfolio of the Interior there is little doubt that they will do so. The cancelling of twenty seven leases for non-fulfilment of the stipulations is a step in the right direction, and one that must have discomfited the cattle ring as much as it pleased the settlers. Let them now take another step in advance and abolish the quarantine; and within a few years the country will be covered with ranches, and the exportation of beef cattle to England will be a genuine and flourishing trade instead of, as at present, the exportation of a narrow surplus in order to maintain prices in the home market.

CUSTOMS SEIZURES.

If the official figures promulgated as to the amount of seizures made by the Customs Department for evasion of the tariff during the year 1887, and the ultimate destination of the money thus secured, have been properly reported, we must recast our moral stories, and instead of advising the young man about entering the arena of business to be guided by the principles of honesty, sobriety, and industry in order to ensure success, we must

counsel him to strain every effort to secure a snug position in the Customs, since he can thus make his fortune speedily and safely by pocketing a comfortable share of the pickings derived from offenders against the regulations of the tariff. In the Customs department it appears an officer is paid a stipulated salary for doing a certain duty, and is then heavily rewarded for doing the duty he is paid to perform. This alone should recommend this branch, of the civil service to the aspiring youth. But this is not all; the government assist him by every means in their power to secure this reward, and as he has nothing to lose and everything to gain by his vigilance it is his own fault if he do not retire soon with a handsome competency.

During the fiscal year of 1886-7 the total receipts for Customs seizures amounted to \$133,028. Of this sum \$30,000 was refunded to the importers, \$20,000 reached, the public treasury, and \$80,000 was paid to Customs officials and informers. It is only necessary then to compare the amount of advantage that accrues from these seizures to the Canadian taxpayer, who pays the Custom house officer's salary, with the amount that that fortunate ind. vidual receives for doing his duty, to see whom the present Customs policy banefits the most. We do not desire to make any invidious remarks upon individuals; but perhaps it may be well to indicate the amounts received by some of the officers and compare them with the salaries they receive in order to carry out our contention that a snug berth in the Custom House is the true royal road to wealth.

We find that one official of the department has a salary of \$1,800, and we further find that he received \$6,040 during the year for performing the duties he is paid for by the public. We find another official on a salary of \$1,600 who secured no less than \$7,881; and below we give a table showing the amounts paid to other fortunate individuals who have been lucky enough to secure a share of the spoils. The salaries compare as follows:—

This table indicates a condition of affairs which may well be looked upon as anomalous in a civilized country. Either these men are adequately paid to perform a certain duty or they are not. If they are, why should it be necessary to grant them such overwhelming inducements to earn their salary?

Of the iniquity of the system we have already spoken. Its faults are open and patent, and so thoroughly are the evils of

the spy system understood, that the custom has been abandoned in most civilized countries. It has been found that the system of offering rewards for seizures has led to equivocation, if not to downright perjury, and that it fosters the practice of blackmail. Were Customs seizures conducted on the ordinary principles of justice their hardship would be much mitigated; but it is well known that they are not. In ordinary law the defendant is held to be innocent until such time as the prosecution have proved him guilty. In customs law the seized firm is held to be guilty until they have proved their innocence before a necessarily prejudiced tribunal. With this fact before him is it any wonder that the customs official feels that the merchant is practically in his power, or that he uses that power for his own emolument? Of the invidious position of the importer we have already spoken at length, and to go over the old arguments would be both wearisome and useless. But we must, at the risk of re-iteration, again impress upon the public the injustice and iniquity of our present Customs policy and the necessity of the abolition of the division of the spoil between the informer, the officer, and the Treasury. It is a system that has proved injurious to official morals wherever it has been tried, and its presence in this country is an anachronism at the latter end of the nineteenth contury.

THE CENTRAL BANK DISCLOSURES.

The investigation into the affairs of the Central Bank, at Toronto, is not yet concluded, and a postponement for the holidays has been ordered until January 3rd. Roland G. I. Barnett has been fully conmitted for trial at the assizes on the charges of appropriating to his own use a promissory note for \$285, belonging to C. F. Bunbury, and converting and appropriating two drafts of \$5,250 each, the property of the bank. Evidence implicating Barnett was given by Mr. James Baxter of this city. It appears that on November 7th. 1885, the witness paid Barnett \$10,200 for two acceptances of the Central bank for \$5,250 each, Barnett being charged \$300 for brokerage. Baxter paid Barnett in money and diamonds, the latter being valued at \$4,100 and he held Barnett's ring as collateral for \$1,000. As Mr. Baxter's name has been mixed considerably with the banks affairs we may state that we are speaking with knowledge when we say that he has not been enriched at the expense of the bank. It has been made plain and was openly stated in the court by counsel that "Barnett and Allen were in together to perpetrate a fraud on the bank." It is probably true, however, that

gested itself to the keen intellect of the Montreal broker. The testimony of Accountant Orde shows that Barnett owed the bank over \$100,000 when it collapsed, and when he got the acceptances, his account was overdrawn \$2,000. The question as to the Central Bank's liability for the unauthorized issue of fifty dollar bills has yet to be decided. In this connection some injustice has been done by the press to the former liquidator, Mr. Archibald Campbell. It has not been charged that Mr. Campbell was implicated in the fraudulent issue. The nimost that is contended is that the bills were fraudulently issued, and that Mr. Campbell subsequently became aware of the fraud connected with their issue, and being so aware, he should not, whilst acting as interim liquidator and under the order of the court, have redeemed any portion of them. Mr. Campbell has under oath expressly denied any such notice, and has explained why and the circumstances under which the bills were redeemed. The Master-in-Ordinary has held that whether Mr. Campbell acted discreetly or indiscreetly in redeeming the notes, there was some warrant for his action in redeeming them. The public will watch with no little degree of interest the course of this remarkable case.

SILK THREAD MAKING.

The comparisons made from time to time as to strength, evenness and brightness with our home-made sewing silks. in face of the untiring efforts of the manufacturers bere, although gradually diminishing, has led all along to the importation of a considerable quantity of these goods from abroad, It is to be regretted, perhaps, that the object of the Government in granting special protection to this industry in Canada-placing the raw material on the free list and a duty of 30 per cent on the manufactured article-has not been better understood or borne in view. It is to be hoped that the efforts of the manufacturers have not been directed to quantity rather than to quality, and although this doubtless has not been wholly ignored, the improvement appears generally to come somewhat late-after samples of American or English goods left with or bought by leading retailers had attracted the attention of shoppers by their brightness of color and evenness of make. Any one who has ever attempted to use these silks where strength is needed, will understand what we mean. It is true, some difficulty was experienced from the outset in training native laboras alluded to formerly in these columnsbut this difficulty has had upwards of ten years to mend itself, and although it cannot be denied that the manufacture has

it has not been keeping pace with the improvements going on in the same class of goods in the United States. With such a high protection in their favor, it is not surprising that the manufacturers have made great strides in shutting out foreign competition, a progress on the other hand praiseworthy enough, considering the disadvantage referred to. Looked at from the money making standpoint, they have met with a success equalled or even approached by but very few industries in Canada. As a leading retailer said: "They have made a mint of money in that silk thread business and so they ought." Whatever the desire for concealment, this rapid accumulation of means has in some way become known to manufacturers across the lines, and the result was a determination about a year ago on the part of the Nonotuck Company, of Florence, Mass., known also as the Corticelli, to begin the manufacture of their goods in Canada-leading retailers having repeatedly expressed a preference for them, owing chiefly to their brightness of color,-and we learn that the company are now under way in the neighboring city of St. John's. Although the Nonotuck goods were still in request in Canada, the manufacturers found it almost impossible to realize any profits with a 30 per cent duty and a vastly cheaper labor market against them. Judging from the samples shown us at Carsley's, Morgan's and other leading shops, the goods are fully up to those hitherto imported from the firm's factory in Florence. It is to be hoped that our old friends, the Beldings, will bestir themselves with some of their wonted old-time energy and continue to hold a share of "The earth," which they have worked to such advantage for themselves during the past ten years in Canada. Despising a competitor is not the best way to keep We have little abreast of the times. doubt that with the great progress which this country is experiencing in population and wealth—a progress likely to increase in four-fold ratio during the next decade through the discouragement of emigration by the people of the United States-there will soon be ample room for even a third silk thread factory in Canada where the cheapness of labor is worth to the manufacturer more than the amount of protection. afforded by the tariff.

DAIRY PRODUCE.

The strong position of cheese and the general state of the market have already been alluded to in these columns. It is noticeable that the 'bears' are far from being aggressive, and the 'bulls' are apparently having things their own way.

upon a prominent Liverpool firm, which last year issued a 'bear' circular, speaking of vast quantities of cheese in the hands of operators and predicting a collapse which never came. Whether the firm in question was misled by its correspondents or deliberately attempted to depress the market, we do not know. The effect, however, was not to wreck the fortunes of rival houses on the other side of the deal, but to injure a number of large English buyers, who delayed their purchases in expectation of lower prices and then found themselves on the wrong tack and compelled to pay 9s@10s per cwt. more than better informed dealers had secured their supplies for. Unfortunately this is not the only instance where unwary victims have suffered from the warlike factions in the cheese trade. jured up statistics and distorted facts are weapons which there is too much reason to fear have been employed on more than one occasion. In the cheese trade, perhaps, more than many other lines, there is room for great diversity of opinion, but this coes not absolve would-be authorities from using the greatest exactness and caution in making positive assertions and publishing statistics. There is now no doubt that the storage supplies of summer stock last fall were not unusually excessive, and that the late make did not cover up the deficiency. The estimated stock in Canada at the present time is variously stated at 110,000 to 125,000 boxes. In the United States no large supplies are available for export, and the stock in England is light. Prices have advanced to 60s@61s on the other side, while 12c is being paid here for finest September.

As the 'bulls' have shown little consideration over their victory, the firm which has been chiefly attacked is to be commended on its late effort in the circular writing line, in which it says among other things:-Referring to our last circular on the 9th October, we must admit that the situation of the cheese market has altered considerably to the advantage of the large holders. The October make in the States and Canada this season is 30@40 per cent. of an average, which means a reduction of 300,000 boxes cheese in round numbers; of which total there will be 150,000 boxes less for export. Furthermore, our advices from New Zealand by cable, estimate the quantity to be shipped this winter and next spring as only 200 tons, the extreme drought in Australia having caused a large demand for New Zealand cheese, Australian buyers paying 5d@6d per lb. readily. We think it only right to place the above facts before you, and whilst confessing that the 'bulls! have gained their point, yet, it is more by good luck than good manage-

ment. Totally unforeseen circumstances have arisen since their operations, which have placed them in a much stronger position."

A few shipping orders for good dairy butter have recently been filled at paying prices, but no hopes are held out of a continued demand, as English shippers claim that Canadian quotations are too high and continental supplies are more accessible.

"WILL NOT BE COMFORTED."

It is truly pitiable to witness the manner in which an otherwise respectable contemporary in a sister city occasionally gives utterance to his feelings of dislike towards this journal. In a recent issue this spirit is more manifest than usual. The unparalleled success which the Journal of Commerce has met with in headquarters abandoned in disgust many years ago by the numerous progenitors of our western friend, has naturally provoked some feeling of jealousy within him. Wise people usually keep such feelings within themselves -when they can. We regret that, our contemporary should be overcome so far as to have recourse to perversions of facts whenever he alludes to this journal. Papers devoted to economic subjects should aim at and promote consistency, exactness and fair play. For ourselves, we shall be delighted to see our contemporary's efforts crowned with success, always excepting in his attempts to asperse the character of his contemporaries, for we believe there is room for both in this grand inheritance of ours. But we challenge him or any other to specify any instance in which the JOURNAL OF COMMERCE has not faithfully carried out its contracts; and we can point to the long array of leading merchants, manufacturers and financial institutions who, during the last thirteen or fourteen years, have continued to favor it with their patronage. Its steadily increasing circulation attests its value to the city, town, village and country merchants throughout the Dominion. Leading merchants and manufacturers have examined our lists, and can testify to the fact of its extensive circulation; and we have the spoken and written testimonials of leading manufacturers east and west as to its value as an advertising medium. A considerable growth in the flour trade with the Maritime Provinces resulted from the special efforts in curi advertising pages two years ago, on the part of leading Western millers to extend their business in that direction to the exclusion of brands from the Atlantic States of the Union. Indeed, so great has the pressure upon our columns become that we have determined to enlarge the size of the Journal by a slight alteration in its shape, assimilating it more closely in this respect to the London Economist, the Spectator, and the Saturday Review, and the Commercial and Financial Chronicle of

New York. This increase will begin with the new year, and, as imitation is said to be "the sincerest form of flattery," we hope our contemporary will not over-fret himself in the matter, but rather study to follow a good example inwardly as well as in outward form. The increasing size of the tables of the monthly bank statements led us to contemplate this literal "change of front," some time ago, but we hesitated for obvious reasons. The crowded condition of the double-page table of Bank Statements in the present issue—in which the captions are omitted, and in some cases so condensed as to be difficult to understand-will furnish a ready explanation in this respect. In closing these remarks about ourselves, we wish our readers, far and near, the cheerfulness and compliments of the season, and in this we unhesitatingly include our western contemporary, who "will not be comforted, because they are not." In the language of our greatest writer, the editor of the JOURNAL of COMMERCE CAN say, "I earn that I get, get that I wear, owe "no man hate, envy no man's happiness; glad " of other men's good."

THE TELEGRAPH CASE.

Mr. Wiman is evidently fully determined on hostilities should the shareholders of the Montreal Telegraph Company refuse to accept the reduction of two per cent per annum in their dividend. He stated in an interview that the object of his hurried visit to this city was two-fold: First, to confer with his lawyers as to the shape a suit should take for the reduction of rental heretofore paid by the Great North Western Telegraph Company to the Montreal Company, on the ground that the latter company had not maintained the leasing company a peaceable and exclusive possession of the property, privileges and contracts, for which rental had been regularly paid. The second was to examine premises for new telegraph offices in this city, so that in case the suit for reduction should not succeed, the Great North Western Company would be prepared within 30 days of default of payment of rental to have their own business confined to the Dominion and the new Canada Mutual under their own control:

Mr. Wiman claims that the revenue derived from the leased company has steadily declined during the past three years, and corretainly, if the figures he gives are correct, it is impossible to deny that fact. Taking the three banner months of the year, July, August and September, we find that they compare as follows:—

On the other hand, Mr. Andrew Allan, President of the Montreal Telegraph Company, denies Mr. Wiman's statements in toto, and has issued the following circular to the shareholders:—

On no account should shareholders allow themselves to be imposed upon by Mr. Erastus Wiman's misrepresentations of the position of the affairs bit this company in connection with its contract with the Great North Western Telegraph company and the guarantee of the Western Union Telegraph company; or by his present misleading actions and statements.

It seems certain from this that the struggle has commenced; and, as a consequence, Tele graph stock is weak and depressed, and some 1,300 shares changed hands as low as 86.

Tux recent animation and fluctuation in the London sugar market is reviewed by the Grocer as follows: " Cane descriptions being quite in the background at present, beet sugars rule the raw market more than any other kinds, and the least adverse reports that are received, come from whatever source they may, suffice to lash the market into a state of excitement, from which the speculators alone seem to emerge successfully, while the trade often find themselves in a worse position than they were before. Considerable sales were reported at stiffening rates, till German manufacture of 88 per cent, analysis fetched 14s 3d to 14s 6d f.o.b. for December to March deliveries; but subsequently the the buoyancy subsided, and, as holders manifested a desire to realize, the value of the article went back to !4s and 14s 3d. The market for cane sugars has moved in sympathy; at first it was decidedly active, and the parcels of grocery West India offered by auction were readily taken at prices 3d to 6d higher than of late, viz, brown and greyish crystalized Demerara at 16s to 17s 6d, middling to fine yellow at 17s 9d to 19s, with superior bright up to 20s, syrups at 13s to 14s, colory do. at 15s to 16s 6d, and common grainy Trinidad at 17s 6d per cwt. Some inquiry has existed for cargoes affont, and several of Java of the new crop are reported sold at relatively full rates, viz : Fine quality at 16s 10ld to 17s per cwt. for the United

Kingdom and No. 12 at 16s to 16s 3d for the Continent."

Advices to hand from the Pacific coast report the stock of salmon as almost exhausted. Some recant liberal sales of Alaska and outside river fish have been made for shipment to En ope, and these, it is said, have relieved the hands of those who have been carrying the culk of the stock and who have shown a disposition of late to urge the market. With the coming of the 1st prox., it is stated that freight rates upon Eastern shipments will be advanced twenty cents per 100 lbs., and this is looked upon as likely to strengthen the market for supplies held here after the new year has started in. The demand, as we have recently reported, is exhibiting some signs of improvement, but February will probably be reached before the movement sets in with spirit, that period being usually counted upon to develop increased activity for the spring and Lenten season.

SPEAKING Of Canadian lumber, Messrs, Simson & Mason, of London, Eng., in their last circular point out that the dock stock of that city of pine deals is 780,000 pieces, against 1,400,000 in 1887, excluding those not yet piled. Demand good, with continued upward tendency in prices. The pine deal market is now in a sounder condition than for a long time past, and the small stock is well held. The rise in spruce prices has been continuous for some months with no probability of an early reduction, as other large spruce centres are in the same condition as London, with small stocks and good demand. Exceptionally small stocks of every description of timber are held with a corresponding advance in values. F.o.b. prices for timber will doubtless be very high for 1889 import, as the outport demend is likely to remain good.

Ir is not often that we are led to place any reliance upon press despatches from Montreal or Ottawa. When we read a fortnight ago that the Loan societies were applying to the Finance Department for permission to reckon certain fire insurance policies as assets, we hesitated and wrote for information to the department. We now learn that the Loan companies are simply applying to the Government to have their debentures accepted as deposits on behalf of insurance companies who, as is well known, are required from time to time to make deposits with the Receiver-This is quite unother matter, and General. we regret that our rule not to accept as reliable anything sent as " press despatches " was transgressed in this instance. The debentures, of sound loan societies are not likely to prove very objectionable for such a purpose.

The position of the current market abroad does not improve, the price during the past week having further declined, as offers to sell stock for December shipment have been made

at 10s 6d c.& f. By last mail advices, dated 27th ult, it was said that the shipments to the United States from the opening of the season had been 11,098 tous, against 7,736 tous to same time last year, and to Canada 1,615 tous, against 1,072 tous during corresponding period 1887. The total shipments to all ports aggregated 92,214 tous, against 91,534 tous for 1887. The stock of Vostizza, Gulf and Patras was said by the same advices to be reduced to 7,000 tous.

EMBEZZLEMENT.-A wholesale dry goods firm of this city-not one of the oldest-having their suspicion lately aroused that all was not going on well with their accounts, engaged one of our ablest accountants to make an investigation. Mr. Henry Collins, the accountant referred to, proceeded to work with his usual acumen-this being his ninth case of the kind in this city-and shortly obtained a clue which, being followed, resulted in the discovery of a defalcation of about \$3,000. It would seem that the cashier and bookkeeper were in collusion, and their plan of operation was as follows :- The firm was accustomed to sign cheques payable to "endorsation or bearer," endorsed on the cheques being the several names of customers who were not meeting their notes in full. In endorsing said names, the bookkeeper also included one or more without allowing the three days' grace. At the end of the three days, in preparing another series of endorsations, he would include the name or names a second time; while the firm, relying on his integrity, did not make a close scrutiny, and signed the cheques as being correct. Other methods, such as the altering of the cash-book, to make it appear that certain sums were applied to pay duties were also discovered. As soon as it became known that Mr. Collins was called in to investigate, the bookkeeper and cashier took leg bail, and we learn that both are now in the States, one of them in New York City. The matter has been placed in the hands of Messrs. Lacoste & Co, and we shall hear further of it in the law courts before long.

THE work on the Panama canal continues, although on some sections the labor has been reduced. Altogether some 2,000 men have been discharged during the past two months, owing to disputes between the canal company and the contractors. It is not expected that more labor will be dispensed with, and the highest authorities consider a total suspension of work as very improbable. Such suspension could only be occasioned by the complete failure of the organization scheme now under consideration in Paris. There are now about nine thousand laborers actually engaged on the works. There is no foundation for the report recently circulated that 75 per cent. of the personnel would be discharged at the end of the year.

In the keenness of the race for preferment how frequently does it happen that men drop by the way without notice. It is not many days since there died in a taproom in this city a young man whose prematurely aged and decrepid appearance recently in our streets was a safe disguise against recognition by many of those who had known him in better days. As a business man he had never succeeded, not through lack of energy, but because in nearly all his dealings the desire to over-reach as an element was too apparent. He owed little beyond his life to one who ignored his very existence as he did his death. He was interred at the expense of the tapster.

The representatives of the banks held another meeting on the the 24th ulto. at the Merchants Bank, in connection with the proposed clearing house which it was decided should go into operation on January 7. General rules, which have been framed, will be distributed among the banking community The following were appointed a managing committee: John Gault, Merchants Bank; T. V. Macdonald, Bank of Nova Scotia; Thos. McDougall, Quebec Bank; Jeffrey Penfold, Bank of British North America; H. J. Pipon, Bank of Montreal; W. W. Chipman, Ontario Bank; and J. Garand, Banque Ville Marie.

MR. VAN HORNE says the Canadian Pacific Railway Company is willing to stock and run a railway that shall te built from Cobourg through the townships of Hamilton, Haldimand, Alnwick, Percy and Feymour to some point on the Canadian Pacific line. If the road is built the Canadian Pacific Railway Company will run it, and in addition will pay forty per cent. Of the gross yearly receipts to the company that constructs it. This seems like a very fair offer and one that the municipalities will likely take up. They are moving in the matter.

A SHIPMENT. from Halifax of 1221 barrels of refined sugars was made for Toronto, London and Hamilton a day or two ago by the steamer "Carroll" via Boston. Surely there must be something astray in the management of the Intercolonial Railway to permit freight to be cheaper over such a round about way as from Halifax via Boston and American railways. It is time the Short Line Railway was in operation.

A Halifax man has patented a new process for treating codfish. By his treatment the fish are cooked, boned, shredded and compressed into a very small space, and turned into a handy article of food, free from smell, and ready for use at a moment's notice. The demand is already in excess of the supply, and the process is patented in Canade, the United States, France and Newfoundland. The new process is expected to completely revolutionize the fish business.

The Ideath is announced of the Hon William Badgely at the advanced age of 88 years. The late judge was called to the oar in 1823. In 1840 he was appointed Commissioner of Bankruptcy; in 1844 a circuit judge; and in 1847 was Attorney General for Lower Canada. In 1855 he was raised to the Bench. The late judge was also prominent in the Masonic Order and was for , ears Grand Master of those lodges who elected to remain on the English register.

CAPITALISTS at Levis believe that a first-class hotel in the centre of the town near the Intercolonial Railway station would pay well and they are preparing to call a meeting to sound the views of the people. If it is feasible the corporation will be asked to become a stockholder. The promoters of the new shoe industry at Levis, which is subsidized by the town corporation, will likely purchase or lease the Victoria Hotel for that purpose.

American consuls in the Maritime Provinces have been instructed to attend to the shipment of crews in American vessels without reference to the shipping offices in Canada. It is claimed by Canadian shipping masters that this course of action will lead to no end of trouble, as there will be no way by which the shipping masters can keep proper records of deserters.

It was the intention of the owners of the steamship Chateau Leoville, of Halifax, to have her name changed to the Connemara, and she was entered at the Customs under the new name; but as it was found that no such change would be legal without permission from the British Board of Trade the ship had to retain her old name until the permission was obtained.

The gypsum trade of Windsor this year has been larger than for some years, and had it not been for the extremely wet season interfering not only with the mining of the plaster, but also the hauling to shipping points, the exports would have exceeded that of 1883, one of the largest ever known. The total shipped in 1888 was about 125,000 tons.

A cause appears to be imminent in the Bolton cotton trade. Numbers of employees are already on strike and refuse to return to work until their demands are complied with.

The masters complain of bad work and

threaten to order a general lock-out unless the work is improved and the strikers return to work. The operatives are amply supplied with funds and defy the masters. A prolonged struggle is feared.

The Halifax detective, Power, is suing the Saco Bank for the amount of the reward offered for the capture of McNeally, the defaulter. Power claims \$2,000 for the arrest and \$5,000 for the return of the bonds. As both parties are willing to settle the claim, it is likely a much smaller amount than that demanded will finally be accepted.

MINING schools are about being, opened by the Nova Scotia Mining department at the principal coal mines of that Province, the object being to educate the miners in the higher branches of their calling and to fit them for the positions of overmen, underground managers and put them on the road to be mining superintendents and managers.

The Nova Scotia Government has appointed a Commission to revise legal costs in that Province. As the Commission represents every branch of the legal profession, they may be relied on to do justice to themselves, if not to the public. The intention, however, we believe, is to reduce exorbitant costs in small cases.

UPWARDS of 20,000 sheep have been shipped from Summerside, P.E.I., this season. The total exports from Summerside since the opening of navigation this year were in value horses, \$107,167; sheep, \$10,789; eggs, \$55,120; oysters, \$32,667; total, \$264,752.

It is said that at a meeting of the Quebec Harbor Commissioners it was resolved to seek an early interview with Sir Hector Langevin on the subject of constructing grain elevators on the Louise embankment.

WE notice that, on and after the 1st proximo, the style of the old established firm of Evans, Sons & Mason, wholesale druggists and manufacturing chemists, of this city, will be changed to Evans & Sons, Limited.

W. E. Elliort, the insolvent oil merchant, who has spent the last four months in jail on a capias, has been released on account of illhealth.

J. Correct, grocer, of this city, has assigned. Liabilities will reach \$11,000. A meeting of creditors has been called for the 9th proximo.

THE BUSINESS COLLEGE—On the occasion of the closing of the Montreal Business College for the Christmas holidays, the students presented Messrs. Davis and Bule with very complimentary addresses, expressing their appreciation of the college, its teachers, and its method of instruction. The addresses were beautifully illuminated by some of the students of the penmanship department, and

were signed by Messrs. C. B. Pye, H. B. Cassils, E. Mereau and C. Robertson, on behalf of about 250 gentlemen and 50 lady students. Mr. Davis was also presented with a beautiful ebony gold-headed cane, and Mr. Bule with a handsome English leather silver mounted dressing case. Speeches were made by several of the students, and were happily responded to by the teachers. Mr. Davis says this is reversing the order, for in his case it is the teacher who gets caned and not the pupils.

Money in London continues firm, and the street rate is quoted at 41 per cent. Locally, we have little change to chronicle. Call loans still rule at 31 to 4 per cent., but commercial money is slightly dearer, and we advance the range of: discounts to from 5 to 71 per cent., with 6 to 7 per cent. the ruling figure. Sterling exchange is firmet, and we quote sixties at 8 15-16@9 1-16 between banks, and 91@1 over the counter. Demand bills are at 01015-16 and 1001. Cables 101. Posted in New York 4 85 and 4.891. Actual rates 4.841 @ and 4.881@1. Cables 4891. New York funds are at par to 1-32 premium between banks, and 101 over the counter .- Naturally very little has been done upon the Stock Exchange, as the week has been only a half one. But still both Telegraph and Gas have broken heavily; the last losing over eight points. In the case of Telegraph, the fall is due to the belief that no more than a six per cent. dividend can be looked for in the future, and that, if a rupture with Wiman should ensue,

it is doubtful whether even that could be earned. In the case of Gas, it is due to the large sales of investment stock and the consequent panic among speculative holders. It is now certain that the contract for street lighting will be given to an electric light company, and, in addition to this, the wretched quality of the gas recently furnished to the public has irritated consumers and caused a corresponding demand for incandescent lighting:—

MONTREAL WHOLE SALE MARKETS. MONTREAL, Thursday Evg., Dec 27, 1888.

Half of the week under review has been a blank so far as wholesale trade is concerned, and the other half has seen business men come down town to their offices to do little or nothing. Quite a number of well-known commercial people are still out of the city visiting friends and relations. The retail trade has been brisk, and was greatly assisted by the short spell of cold, seasonable weather. Unfortunately this did not last, and we again suffer from a mild temperature and muddy streets. The holiday spirit is still prevalent, and we do not expect to see business, matters in good shape again until after the new year has been ushered in.

OANNED Goops,-In round lots corn has

sold at \$1 and under. The situation has not been improved by the failure of a Hamilton company. There has been some talk of a combination to sustain prices, but so far buyers seem to have no trouble in getting hold of supplies at pretty much their own figures.

DAIRY PRODUCE AND PROVISIONS -There has been a good call for fine dairy and creamery and rolls for local use, and prices are steady, as suitable supplies are not too plentiful, Shipments of 675 pkgs. have been made by way of New York. Cheese is steady but dull. Exports of Canadian cheese last week were 6,688 boxes via New York and 12,800 via Portland. Of this quantity Montreal furnished 8,164 boxes. The feeling in New York is firm, and the cheap lots have been taken up to such an extent that the market for the balance has improved. It is said that the supplies offered show an improved average quality, but really nothing will be done this week. In local provisions a small jobbing trade has been done at our present prices for pork and lard, which are lower than a week ngo. The market is now steady. Dressed hogs quiet at \$7@\$7.20 per 100 lbs. in jobbing lots. Ordinary case eggs sold at 201c@211c for fresh, and 19c@20c for limed. Receipts of poultry were heavy and business brisk. Turkeys, 8c@104c; geese, 6c@8c; ducks, 8c@10c: chickens, 5c@7c. Partridges in good demand at 50c@55c per brace. Venison scarce at 10c@12c per lb. for saddles. Western roll butter has sold at 17c@184c in case and tubs, and Morrisburg at 19c@20c in baskets.

DRUGS AND CHEMICALS.—In this market business has ruled quiet and there is no particular change. At New York, country orders for quinine have been filled at 30c@31c for large bulk. For forward delivery business is re-ported to the extent of 25,000 ounces at 30c for best brands, January-March shipment. These operations, and the willingness of manufacturers abroad to consider orders upon this basis, do not tend to strengthen a belief in higher values after the turn of the year. For opium there has been further enquiry, and sales of about 25 cases at \$2 85@\$2 90. At the close to-day there were buyers of small lots at \$2 90, but in most instances \$2.95 was required. The jobbing price has been advanced to \$3@\$3.10, and powdered is now quoted \$4.10 as inside.

DRY GOODS.—Up to Christmas Eve the retail trade in this city was fully up to the average, and in the suburbs it is reported as in excess of that of last year. It is now evident that no man, who really wants to work in this city need be idle, and with the boom in the building trade all through the summer, and the steady work at the factories, there is more money about among the artisan class this winter than there has been for some years past. Travellers are nearly all in, since but few country merchants will look at samples during the holiday week, but a fair amount of orders are coming along, and wholesalers speak hopefully of the coming year. Prices of Canadian woollens are firmly he'd, and we note a disposition on the part of makers to await orders before manufacturing, instead of making the goods first and trying to sell them afterward. FISH AND OILS.—As might be expected the demand was almost nil and the wholesale trade look for no improvement until after the New Year, In our reference to business in herrings at this port and Quebec last week we meant to say that sales amounted to two or three thousand barrels, instead of as many hundreds.

FLOUR AND GRAIN.—The market for flour has been excessively dull with an easy tone. In grain a few car lots were sold at about quotations and the market is a featureless one. Owing to the holidays cable advices have been meagre. In Olicago wheat has been demoralized and since the holidays has made a break of 3½c@3½c. Corn was easy. The visible supply of wheat shows an increase of 79½000 bushels and is now 38,035,894 bushels Chicago prices are: wheat, 9½ January, 1.03 May. Corn, 34 Jan, 34½ Yeb, 37 May. A Chicago special says that wheat was quite panicky and some of the supposed clique were heavy sellers. Upward market is now getting on a natural level but there may be some more liquidation. Corn shows strength in view of weakness in wheat. The country is not inclined to ship at present prices. Provisions were duil, but railled again, and an improvement is looked for after the turn of the year.

Green Frotzs, Ern.—Valencia oranges are scarce owing to the short supply and good demand, and prices have gone up in consequence. The demand absorbed a large proportion of the offerings some days ago, creating a scarcity, and dealers promptly took advantage of the improvement and claimed the advance. The holiday trade has been brisk during the past week or ten days, and prices attained a fair paying basis. There was quite an activity in nuts, which are sold largely by dealers in wholesale fruits. Bag figs have sold at 51c@6c. The Canadian apples "ex-Oregon" sold in England at 186ml8 per brl., as to condition and quality. Those "ex-Oregon" sold at 85cml8 9d. Some of the "Lake Superior" cargo, described as slack and wet, sold as low as 3scm. The best lot brought 11s 9d. We quote:—Apples, \$1.25cm\(\frac{1}{2}\). To it car lots, as to quality. Retail prices \$1.75cm\(\frac{1}{2}\). New figs selling 91ccml40 lb. Oranberries, \$300cm\(\frac{1}{2}\) foranges, \$4.50 brl; oranges in boxes, \$3.1aya oranges, in boxes, \$4.00. Florida oranges, \$4.50cm\(\frac{1}{2}\), and a condition and quality. Retail prices \$1.75cm\(\frac{1}{2}\). Valencia oranges, \$4.75cm\(\frac{1}{2}\). Lemons, new, Messina, \$3.25cm\(\frac{1}{2}\). Jamajes, 50cm\(\frac{1}{2}\), and conditions, \$5.0cm\(\frac{1}{2}\). Fresh coconnuts, \$5.50cm\(\frac{1}{2}\). Grapes, Cataw bas, in small baskets, 45ccm\(\frac{1}{2}\). Fres

GROCKHES — Very few buyers have visited the wholesale stores within the past few days, and there is nothing of any consequence to add to former reports. Valencias, rain damaged, have sold at low prices, but may be still lower after the turn of the year, as arrivals may be expected from the other side where the stock will not keep so well as in Canada. Sound, Valencias, might, be bought in round lots at 50, and in jobbing lots as low as 510. Malaya fruit has been in very good

demand, and is not plentiful. Some houses did not get their supplies forward, and had to buy in this market to supply their customers. Nuts, as usual at this season, have met with a fair call, and we quote filberts at 91c@10c, and Brazils at 91c@10c. Coffees are firm with a fairly active enquiry, and the position is practically the same as before outlined. Teas are going out moderately, but holders are confident in tone and the outlook is full of promise. Sugars firm and unchanged. Peels steady but the demand is falling off. Molasses and syrups are unchanged. The market will not recover from its present quiet tone for some time, especially in view of the change to mild weather and the breaking up of the snow roads.

IRON AND HARDWARE.—A small steady trade is doing for immediate requirements but no large transactions are reported. Pig iron remains firm at previous quo ations, but very little is doing, and until the holidays are over we do not expect the market to wake up. Most of the larger houses are taking stock and have their travellers all in, and thus are not pushing trade just now. Tin is easier in England but for small lots is unchanged liere, Some round lots have been sold at 23½ cents, but for ordinary lots 25 to 26 cents is still asked. The nail market continues doubtful; we do not alter the "card" prices given in our prices current, but would notify our customers that, for the present, at all events, they can obtain their nails at 5 cents per keg under these figures. Another large nail making concern has announced its intention to roll bar iron for the publics othat in the coming spring Montreal will have three makers of merchant fron competing for her trade.

LEATHER, HIDES AND TALLOW.—In these lines no detailed report can be furnished this week, as there is really nothing to say. Prices are steady and unchanged. The usual holidays have been given to boot and shoe operatives. The spring trade is expected to be active and satisfactory.

Live Stook.—British cables report trade slow and dull. Reccipts were not heavy but dealers were fully supplied ahead. Prime stears in Liverpool 11½c, good to choice 11¢, poor to medium 10¢ and inferior and bulls 7½c@9¢. The following statistics are interesting. Since May 1st and up to December 22nd the Grand Trunk has carried to this 20½ following a large live stock business; and 13,976 hogs. The Canadian Pacific is also doing a large live stock business; and since April 1 to December 22nd the receipts have been 40,389 cattle, 41,617 sheep, and 9,916 hogs. Business is dull as the holiday demand has been supplied and butchers will not want to buy for some time. We quote good to choice 3½c@4½c and medium at 3c@3 3½c. Sheep, 3c@4¢; Live hoge, 5c@5½c; Lambs, \$2.50@\$3 50; Calves, \$4@\$8 cach.

Wook.—We have to report a very fair business for the season. The demand has slackened for the moment, but the undertone is strong and outside reports are satisfactory. Boston, Dec. 21.—There has been a quiet market for wools; sales of all kinds have been only 2,782,000 lbs. Foreign and domestic prices have ruled very strong, and pochange in prices can be reported. California wool has been dull. Pulled wools active and strong, supers selling at 3360386; extras at 2560280. Australian wool has sold at 3860390. Somo, consignments of North-West fleece have, been received in Montreal, with sales at 14260166. Buyers continue to look
