Mayon Rochos, of Hull, has recoived sey oral lottors from fimancial houses in Montreal, offoritg to purchase the civle debontures, amounting to $\$ 140,000$ at $\&$ per cent. per napum.


Owno to the scarcity of feed, tarmers in the nighbourhood of Kingston and Ottawa aro parting with their stock at unprecedentedly low prices, young horses going. for $\$ 6$ and $\$ 7$ each.

Mns.: P. : Ganc, general storekeeper, $\therefore$ of North Ham, Que., has nssigned. Hor husband kept a small storo there, but unfortunatcly he died last eummer, and the widow: has not been alle to make the business a success.

Mr. Wm. Ross, Deputy-Postmaster, of Guclph, has' been appointed Manager of tho" Guelph and Ontario Investment and Savings Socioty vice Somervillo, resigned to accept the managership of the Huron $t \cdot$ Erie Loan Society.
A Doniniox charter will bu sought for the railway from Portage du Fort to Quio, and for the bridging of the Ottawa River to connect with Pombroke. Quebec will give abonis of $\$ 6,000$ a milo. The company already have a Quebec.

Not unlikely the good people of Yarmouth were to a great extent influenced in their opposition to a mayor and town council from the spectacle nfforded by the City Oouncil of Halifax, whose mecting have not been of a character to excite a dosire on the part of other towns to be ruled over by similar bodics.

Frederioron, Moncton and Halifax are taking steps to insist on the building of the link in the Short Line Railway betweon Fredericton and Moncton. The link is baid to bo indispensable to proper communication between Montreal and Halifix, and without it
the journey to Halifax will not be shortened one hour. If this link is part of the agreemont upon which the subsidy'was given, it should be built, and the three castern provinces seem determined to insist on the carrying out of the sgreement to the letter.
As the present sitting of the Supreme Court of Nova. Scotia a test cabe was to have been argued as to the rights of the Provincial Legislnture of Nova Scotia to pass an act requiring licunses to be taken out by wholesale liquor dealers and brewers and affixiug conditions to such issue of licenses, but the majority of the court refused to hear tho argu. ment. It is said the liquor license iaw is a total failure in the City of Halifax, as the provisions are being openly yiolated under the very noses of the officials whose duty it is to enforce them.

THs new steamship, "stanley" for winter Bervice between Prince Edward Island and the Mainland, has artved at Plctou. She
proved herself to be a vory fast boat and her speed surpaseed that of any steamer which bas hitherto run through the Straits of Canso. TARIEF REFORM IN THE UNITED STATES.

It is but rarely that we find in the English press a writer whose views upon American trade methods or conditions bear evidence of a thorough knowledge of the subject English critics are usually biassed to a greater or less extent by the necessity of conforming to the ueual acceptance of free trade theories in that couniry. They write always with a-certain hastility, more or less marked, to the protective-principles: which the voice of

continent, and, tno often, with an astounding ignorance of the real wants and requirements of the country. Under these circumstances we have naturally come to gradually ignore all criticism except that coming from our own political economista and to look upon the npinions of those of other countries as of very little value to us.

But, now and then, we come upon a writer whose eminence and knowledge of the subject entitle his deductions to a respectful bearing, and such a one is Sir Lyon Playfair, whose recent article upon the Presidential election in the columns of the Nineteenth Céntury, [Leonard-Scott Pub-, lishing Co. of Pbila.] gives a clear and succinct account of that great contest over the proper method of taiff reform that is well worth our consideration. Of couree. we cannot accept all Sir Lyon's comments upon the subject of protection in their en. tirety, since a bias in favor of free trade is clearly apparent all througb, but his comparison of the rival methods proposed by: each of the political parties is both concise and impartial, and; as such, will bear repetition.
The Democratic platform was based on the Mills Bill which, in its turn; was bueed on the famous classification of commodities made by Joseph Hume in 1840, dividing them into the five following classes:-
I. Articles of food and animals.
II. Artfcles in a crude condition which enter into the various processes of manufacture.
III, Articles wholly or partially manufactured for use as materials for completed manufactures or for the mechanical arte.
IV. Nanufactured articles ready for consumption.
V. Articles of voluntary use or lusurieg.

In the Dills Bill the duties upon the first three of these classes are either abolisted or modified, while, those of the last tro are maintained. The,bill reduces
the avarage of the tariff from 47 per cent. to 42 per cent but, in our opiniom, makes a mistake in converting all dutirs to an ad valorem scale, since we have fonnd that this method of calculation increases the volume of fraud by undervaluation, and is thus distinctly inferior to the system of specific duties.

The Republican platform has been considerably modified since the election, when the principal plank recommended free whiskey and tobacco rather than any tampering with the protective tarif. The new platforim, as indicated: by the Senate Bill, frees whiskey when used in the arte but maintains the tax when it is used for potations. It frees manufactured tobacco and reduces the duty on sugar by onehalf; but on the other hand it increases the obnoxious duty on raw wool; as well as upon all manufactures of that staple. The motto of General Harrison was "Free traders are students of maxims, not markets;" while tbat of Mr. Cleveland declared that " Unnecessary taxation is unjust taxation." Upon these two divergent aphorisios the Presidential contest was really fought out, and it is upon these two lines of argument that the rival measures for the reduction of the surplus were respectively jased.

Naturally Sir Lyon Playfair gives his verdict in favor of the Mills Bill', and if in some respects his, antagonism to the protective principle leads him to go a little too far in some of his deductions, his reasoning on the whole is cogent and well balanced. He points out that while experience hasproved that protection isiperfectly compatible with high wages; the Republicansare in error in asbertipg that it is the cause of them; and evforces this argument by the fact that industries protected by duties of 100 per cent pay no higber wages than those which haye only 25 per cent, of protection, and further that wages have not been equalized by the tariff but vary now as much between the various States of the Union as they do, between Great Britain and America: The average wage of Maine is $\mathbf{E} 285$, while the ayerage of: California, is $\$ 480$; and yet both States have precisely the same meneure of protection. While a still more striking fact is that, workmen in unprotected industries win higher wages than those, wholabor at protected ones; and appear to suffor lebs in hard timés.

Whether it is safe- to prophesy, that, no future election will be : fought under the undisguised banner of prolection wo very much doubt. The education of the penple in the principles of fiscal reform has, been too short and too hampered, by false aseertions and deductions, to wariant ao sheeping \& departure: Buttholeaven is evidently working and it is, safa: 10 assert that both, parties now acknowledge the
necessity of some reform in the tariff, although they differ materially as to its extent and direction: The verdict at the last election was a distinct ondorsation of the principle of protection; but there were many, indications that a change was coming over popular opinion as to the measure of protection necessary to the advancement of the material interests of the country: The votes of some highly protected centres were very significant, and althnugh the upholders of free raw materials may be discouraged by the check they have received, they have no reason to be disheartened as to the future.

THE BANK STATEMENT.
Contrary to expectations, the statement of the chartered banks for the month of November last shows that the volume of trade during that month remained practically only the same as during October, and eren displayed somo signs of falling off. Circulatlon shows a trifịing decrease of $\$ 185,842$, instead of the usual increase at this period; an indication that the volume of agricultural products going forward has undergone no expansion, and that farmers have been: largely holding on to their crops in hopes of the returnofhigh prices.
Deposits on demand show a small adyance of $\$ 20,726$; but in those after notice we ind a substantial growth of $\$ 1,450,309$. If this fncrease, consist of genuine deposits by the public, it indicates an expanaion in the loanable funds of the banks by that amount; but we must not forget that this heading io sometimes a misleading one, since loans on deposit receipt from one bank to another are often entered under this caption when they should really be described as loans to other banks unsecured. No doubt a good deal of money is now being placed with the banks, pending a fall in the value of some of the leading investment stocks; but probably the in crease in these deposits is due as largely to the reception of lump sums of railway funds as to any deposits on the part of the public.

The balances due to agencies in the United Kingdom continue to show a sieady reduction; the decrease during the month amou iting to $\$ 724,764$. This must of course be ascribed to the high rates of interest now ruling in Great Britain; :since it is the custom there to charge one per cent over the bank rale on all these balances. Naturally a Canadian bank does not care to pay six per cent. on its English balapce when call money here will only command 32 to 4 per cent., and so we may look; to see this item still further noduced. The increase, in aiscounts and loans to buginess corporations is! a, somo.
what disappointing one. It was known that very heavy advances had been made to lumbering firms during the month, and it was consequently expected that loans and discounts would display a marked advance. Inatead, we find merely a growth of : $\$ 880,841$, and naturally we can only draw the conclusion that the general demand for business purposes must bave fallen off sufliciontly to offset the heavy payments to the lunbermen.
The amount due from American agencies lats fallen to $\$ 21,176,460$. This, however, is quite a sufficiently large sum to have at atake in a foreign country. Probably two-thirde of this sum are lent in Chimago on wheat and pork; a somewhat risky business at the best of times, and especially so at the present moment when the future course of prices must be looked uponas uncertain. The item of "other assats " ahows a decrease of $\$ 258,245$. This is a hoaling which we have frequently shown is repponsible for a far larger sum than apparently belonge to it. The headinus now existing should certainly be bulliciently comprehensive to cover any ordinary aseete that a bank may hold. No doubt there are some securities (such as insurance policies for instance) which could not be classified under any of the presont headings, but we can hardly believe their value will reach $\$ 5,165,590$. It is ovident, thon, that a further column or columns are necessary in order that the public may understand of what so important a balance as this really consiste, and to removo the impression that much of it is really made up of losses not yet written off.
We regrel to noticean increase in the loans to firms whose members are directors of banks. It is an indication that the long expected improvement in payments hus not yot doveloped, since these are the very tirms that would be the first to curtail their lines of discount if money came in better. Ih shows that, with the excention of a fow fortamate districts, trade throughout the Dominion has fallen below expectations, and that consequently the retailer has had to claim the indulgence of the wholesuler who, in his turn, falls back upon his bankers for assistance. 'This is the only logical inference that we can draw from the figurea; and wo fear that there is little hope that the statement for the prosent month will show any amprovement. The holiday trade, however, has been goud. We shall soon have good winter roads in this province, and, alhough the weather in tho West still keops mild, the roads there are improving. Duder these circumstances we can look forward hopefully to the turn of the yoar and trust that 1889 will prove a better yeirin overy respect than the one to which we are now bidding farewoll:-~

## OUR RANCHING SYSTIEM.

It is a frequent subject of complaint upon the part of North-Western communities that, in spite of the railroad com. munication now existing from sea to sea, the bulk of their fellow country men in the older provinces have no more idea of their peculiar surroundings, needs, or grievances, than they have of the internal policy of the Japanese. No doubt this complant is Jargely correct. Our knowledge of the renl position of affairs in the North-Western tervitories is certainly both limited and incorrect; but it mast be remembered that this arises from no lack of interest upon our part, but simply bocause all news from that portion of tho

Dominion comes from interested sources, and is so garbled and sifted before it reaches us that we have come to regard it with considerable suspicion. Jy is for this reason solely that so little iuterest is now taken in even the most stirring topics in the North-West, and not because We are in any way indifierent to their wolfare or careless of their future.
The leasing system now in vogue throughout the territories is a case in point. We find the two parties to the question contradicting ench other fatly, and, consequently, must remain donbiful as to which side to believe. The ranching companies uphold the present system ns the only means by which their industry
is rendered possible, and insist that it is a boon to the whole country. l'he settlers on the other hand maintain that the effect of the system has been to preyent the growth and settloment of the country, and that it has resulted simply in creating a monopoly for certain favored individuals by rendering competition impossible. Each side had its adyocates, and for some time it was difficult to decide upon the merits of the case: but, of late, we have had a very significant piece of evidence in favor of the settlers side of the question in the shape of an order-in council cancelling no less than twenty-seven grazing leases in the Northwest, covering nearly seven hundred thousand acres, owing to the failure of the lease holders to comply with the Government regulations. This is a strong indication that the contention that a large portion of these leases were held only for speculative purposes and had never had, or were likely to have, a head of stock on the range they covered was substantially correct The Government are proverbialiy slow to interfere with vested interests or political friends, and, therefore, the grievance must have been, a glaring one before it attracted oflicial reprobation. Finding then that the settlers are sustained by the facts in one of their statements, we must naturally give them the beriefit of the doubt also in their contention that the present quarautine against Montana cattle was not instituted by any desire to prevent disease but simply to prevent competition by hindering new comers who might be desirous of stocking ranches from obtaining cattle wherewith to do so, and thus to assist in retaining the monopoly of the ranching business in the hands of the existing parties.

The argument of the cattle men is that this quarantine of 90 days against Montana cattle is nacessary to retain the privilegegranted by Great Britain allowing Canadian cattlo to be transported in that country alive instead of beong killed on arrival as American cattle are. They state that it is their intention to build up a profitable ex. port cattle trade with England; that this privilege is necessary to their success; and that unless the entry of Montana cattle were prohibited this privilege would be denied them. The settlers on their part state that the ranchmen have no intention of fostering an export cattle trade; that they desire simply to rotain the monopoly of supplying the Government police and Indians with beef at high prices; that the only catile they export are the surplus. over the amount requisite to fill this demand; and that the result of the quarantine has simply been to prevent intending ranchers from securing, cattlo to stock their ranges (by prohibiting their importation from the only point where they can be secured) and thus to maintain the pre?
sent holders of contracts in a comfortable and profitable monopoly.
These are the two sides of the case; and so far as we cau at present judge from the evidence adduced, the settlers appear to have substantiated most of their assertions. There is no more epidemic disease in Montana than there is in Canada, and by the territorial system of quarantine there is practically as little chance of its ever being introduced. The cry of disease therefore must be abandoned; and, consequently, we find that the cattlemen are changing their ground and are now upholding the quarantine on the ground that it is necessary to guard against-the dangen of the country being overcrowded by ranches, (or in other words the danger of free competition) and that to secure this end it is necessary to shutjout Montana cattie and to retain the use of immense tracts of the public domain, either unleased, or if leased, unstocked, and to turn away annually settlers and cattlomen of this very; class who would do most to build up the country and who would bring with them a fair amount of property and capital to begin on This assertion they make in spite of the fact that the leasing system. was adopted to guard against the very danger of overcrowding; in spite of the order-in-Council in regard to sheep; and in spite of a 20 per cent. tarif in their favor. The weakness of this argument is clearly apparent; and the danger of retarding the progrese of the country abundantly palpable It now rests with the Government to thoroughly investigate the whole matter; and since the appointment of the Hon. Mr. Dewdney to the porifolio of the Interior there is little doubt that they will do so. The cancolling of twenty seven leases for noi-fulfilment of the stipulations is a step in the right direction, and one that must have discomfited the cattle ring as much as it pleased the settlers. Let them now take another stepin advance and abolish the quarantine ; and within a fow years the country will becovered with ranches, and the exportation of beef cattle. to England will be iigenuine and flourishing trade instead of, as at present, the exportation of a narrow surplus in order to maintain prices in the homo market.

## CUSTOMS SEIZURES.

It the official figures promulgated as to the amonnt of seizires made by the customs Department for evasion of the tariff during the year 1887 , and the ultimate destination of the money thus secured, have been properly reported, we must recast our moral stories, and instoad of ad. vising the young mau about entering, the arena of buainess to be gaided by the principles of honesty, sobriety, and industry in order to ensure succesp wo must
counsel him to strain overy effort to secure a snug position in the Customs, since bo can thus make hie fortune speedily and safely by pocketing a comfortable share of the pickings derived from offenders against the regulations of the tarif: In the Cus: toms department it appears an officer is paid a stipulated salary for doing a certain duty, and is then heavily rowarded for doing the duty he is paid to perlorm. This alone should recommend this branch, of the civil service to the aspiring youth. But this is not all; the government agsist him by overy moans in their power to secure this reward, and as he has nothing to lose and everything to gain by his yjgil. ance it is his own fault if he do not retire soon with a handsome competency.

During the fiscal year of $1886-7$ the total recempts for Customs seizures amounted to $\$ 133,02 s$. Of this sum $\$ 30,000$ was refunded to the importers, $\$ 20$, , 00 reached, the public treasury, and $\$ 80,000$ was paid to Customs officials and infrrmers. It is only necessary then to compare tio amount of advantage that accrues from these seizures to the Canadian taxpayer, who pays the Custom house officer's salary, with the awount that that fortunate ind vidual receives for doing his ducy, to see whom the present Customs policy banefits the most. We do not desire to make any invidious remarks upon individuals; but perhaps it may be well to indicate the amounte received by some of the oflicers and compare them with the salaries they receive in order to carry out our contevtion that a snug borth in the Custom House is the true royal road to wealth.
We find that one oflicial of the dopartment has a sulary of $\$ 1,800$, and we further find that he received $\$ 6,040$ during the year for performing the duties he is paid for by the pablic. We find another official on a salary of $\$ 1,600$ who secured no less than $\$ 7,881$; and below we give a table showing the amounts paid to other fortunate individuals who have been lucky enough to secure a ghare of the spoils. The salaries compare as follows:-


This table indicater a condition of affairs which may well be looked upon as anoma-lous in a civilized country. Either these men are adoquately paid to perform a certain duty or they are not. If they are, why sbould it be necessary to grant them. such overwhelming inducements to earn their salary?

Of the iniquity of the syytem wo have already spoken. Its faults are oper and patent, and so thoroughly are the evils of
the apy system understood, that the custom has been abaindoned in most civilized countries. It has been found that the system of offering rewards for seizures has led to equivocation, if not to dowaright perjury, and that it fosters the practice of blackmail. Were Customs sóizures conducted on the ordinary principles of justice their hardship would be much initigated; but it is well known that they are not. lo ordinary law the defendant is bold to bo limocent until such time as the prosectition have proved him guilty. In custome law the seized firm is teeld to be guilty until they have pioved theif innocence before a necessarily prejudiced tribunal. With this fact before hiin is it any Honder that the customs oflicial feels that we merchant is practically in his power, or that he uses that powor for has own emolument? of the invidious pasition of the importer we have alroady nooken at length, and togo over the old arguments would bo both wearisome and ueieless. But we miast, at the riak of re-jteration, again imprese upon the public thie injustice and iniquity of our prèsent Custöms policy and the neceesity of the abolition of the division of the spoil betiweent thie informer, the oflicer, and the Treasury. It is a sisys tem that has proved injurious to official morals wherever it has been tried, and its presence in this country is an anachronisin at the latter end of the nineteenth centùry.

THE CENTRAL BANK DISCLOSURES.
The investigation into the afrairs of the Central Bank, at Toronto, is not yet coucluded, and a positponement for the holidays has been ordered until January 3rd. Roland G. I. Barnett hins been filly conimitted for trial at the desizos on the charges of apprepriatiog to his own use a promissory note for $\$ 285$, belonging to C. F. Bünbury, aud converting and appropriating two drafts of $\boldsymbol{p}_{5,250}$ ench, the property of the bank. Evidence inplicating Barnett was given by Mr. James Baxter of this city. It appoard that on November 7 th , 1885, the witness paid Barnett $\$ 10,200$ for two acceptances of the Central bank for $\$ 5,250$ each, Barnett being charged $\$ 300$ for brokeraye. Buxter paid Barnett in money and diamonds, the latier being valued at $\$ 4,100$ and he hold Barnott's ring as collateral for $\$ 1,600$. As Mr. Bax. tar's name has been mixed considerably with the banks affairs we may state that we are speaking with knowledge when we: say that he has not been enriched at the expense of the bank. It has been made plain and was openly stated in the court by counsel that "Barnett and" Allen were" in together to perpetrate a fraud on tha bank." It is probably true, however, thit
gested itself to the keen intellect of the Montreal broker. The téstimony of Accountañ' Orde gliows that Barnett owed the bank over $\$ 100,000$ when it collapsed, and when he got the acteptances, his account was overdrawil $\$ 2,000$. Thio questhon as to the Contral Bank's liability for the unauthorized issue of fift dotlar bills has yet to be decided. In this connection some injüstice has bèen done by tise presis to the former liquidator, Mr. Archibald Campbell. It has not been charged that Mr. Campbell was implicated in the fraüdulentisgue. The un most that is contended is that the bills were fraudulently isbued, and that Mr. Campbell subbequently became aware of the frand connected with their issioù, and being ó a ciwaté, he shóald not, whilst ácting as interim liquidátor and under the oriler of the courth liave redeermed any portion of them: Mr. Campo bell has under oath oxpresely denied any such notice, and has explainèd why and the circumstances under which the bills were redeemed. The Master-in-Ordinary has held that whether Mr. Canópbell acted discreetly or indiècreetly in rédèening the notes, there was some warran't fur his action in redeming them. The public will watch with no little degree of interést the course of this remarkable case.

## SILK THREAÖ MAKING.

The comparisons made from time to time as to atrongth, evenness and brightness with our home-made sewing sillis, in face of the untiring eflorts of the manufacturers bere, although gradually diminishing, has led all along to the importation of a considerable quantity of these goods from abroad, It is to be regretted. perhaps, that the olject of the Government in granting special protection to his induatry in Canada-placing the raw matejial on the free list and a duty of 30 per cent on the manafactured article-has not been better understood or borne in view. It is to be hoped that the efforts of the manufacurers have not been directed to quantily raller than to qualits, and although this doubtlese has not been wholly ignored, the improvement appears generally to come somewhat late-after samples of American or English goods left with or bought by: leading retailers had attracted the attention of shoppers by their brightiness of color and evénees of make. Any one tho has ever attompted to use these silks where strength is needed, will understand what we mean. It is true, some difficulty was experienced from the oulset in training native laboras alluded to formerly in theso columnsbut this difficulty bas had upwards of ten years to mend itself, and alihough it cannot be denied that the manufacture has
it has not been keeping pace with the improventents going on in the same clase of goods in the United States. With such a high protection in their favor, it is not surprising that the manufacturere liave made great strides in shutting oult foréign competition, a progress on the other hand praisevorthy enough, considering the disadvantage referred to Looked at from the money making standpoint; they have met nith a success equalled or even approached by but very few industries in Canada. As a léading retailer said: "They have made a mint of money in that silk thread businebs and so liey ought." Whatever the desire for concealment, thisz rapid acocumulation of means hats in some way become known to manuactures across the lines, and the result was a determination about a year ago on the part of the Nonotuck Compariy, of Florence, Mass.; know allso as tho Corticelli, tô begin the manufacture of their goods in Canad--leading retallers having repeatedly expressed a prefereńce for them, owing chiefly to their. brightness of color,- and we learn that the company are now under way in the neigliboring city of St. John's. Although the Nonotuck noods were still in request in Canada, the manufacturers found it almost inoosible to realize any profits wih a 30 per cént duty and a vastly cheaper labor markel against them. Judging from the samples shown us at Carsley's, Morgan's and other leading shops, the goods are fully up to those hitherto imported from the firm's factory in Floreace. It is to be hoped that our old friends, the Beldings, will bestir themselves with some of their wonted old-time energy and continue to hold a share of "The earth," which they have worked to such advantage for theniselves during the past ten jears in Cangda. Despising a competitor is not the best way to keep abreast of the times. We liave litlo doubt that with the great progress which this country is experiencing in population and wealth-a progress likely to increde in four fold ratio duting the next decade throdigh the discouragement of emigration by the people of the United States-Lhere will soon be ample room for even a third sillk thrend factöry in Canadn where the cheapness of labor is worth to the mani:facturer more than théanount of protection. afforded by the tariff.

## DAIRY PRODUCE.

The atrong position of cheese and the general state of the market have already been alluded to in these columns... It is nuticeable that the 'bears' are far from being aggressive, and the bulls are apparently having things their own way.
dina viniant attacks have been made
upon a prominent Liverpool firm, which last year issued a 'bear' circular, speating of vast quantitites of cheese in the hands of operators and predicting a collapise which never came. Whether the firm in question was misled by its correspondents or deliberately attempted to depress the market, we do not know. The effect, however, was not to wreck the fortunes of rival houses on the other side of the deal, but to injure a number of large English buyers, who delayed their purchases in expectation of lower prices and then found themselves on the wrong tack and compelled to pay $9 \mathrm{~s} @ 10 \mathrm{~s}$ per cwt. more than better informed dealers had secured their papplies for. Unfortunately this is not the only instance where unwary victims have suffered from the warlike factions in the cheese trade. Conjured up statistics and distorted facts are weapons which there is too much reason to fear have been employed on more than one occasion. In the cheese trade, perhaps, more than many other lines, there is room for great diversity of opinion, but this coes not absolve would-be authorities from using the greatest exactness and caution in making positive assertions and publishing statistics. There is now no doubt that the storage supplies of summer stock last fall were not unusually excessive, and that the late make did not cover up the deficiency. The estimated stock in Canada at the present time is variously stated at $110,000^{\circ}$ to $" 125,000$ boxes. In the United States no Jarge supplies are available for export, and the stock in England is light. Prices have advanced to $608 @ 61 \mathrm{~s}$ on the other side, while 12c is being paid here for finest Soptembēr.

As the "bulls' have shown little consideration over their victory, the firm which bas been chiefly attacked is to be commended on its late effort in the circular writing line, in which it says among other thinge:-Referring to our last circular on the 8th October, we must admit that the situation of the cheese market has altered considerably to the advantage of the large bolders. The October make in the States and Canada this season is $30 @ 40$ per cent. of an average, which meang a reduction of 300,000 boxes cheese in round numbers; of which total there will be: 150,000 boxes less for export. Furthermore, our advices from New Zesland by cable, estimate the quantity to be shipped this winter and next spring as only 200 tons, the extreme drought in Australia having cansed a large demand: for New Zealand cheese, Australian buyers paying 5d@6d.per lb; readily. We think it only right to place the above facts before you, and whilst confessing that the ' bulls's have gained their point, yet, it is more by good luck than good manage-
ment. Totally unforeseen circumstances have arisen since their operations, wibich have placed them' in a much stronger position."
A few shipping orders for good dairy butter have recently been filled at paying prices, but no hopes are held out of a continued demand, as Engiish shippers' claim that Canadian quotations are too high and continental supplies are more accessible.

## "WILL NOT BE COMFORTED."

It is truly pitiable to witness the manner in Which an otherwise respectable contemporary in a sister city occasionally gives utterance to his feelings of dislike towards this journal. In a recentisesue this spirit is more manifesi than usual. The unparalleled success which the Joonnal of Coymerce has met with in headquarters abandoned in diggust many years ago by the numerous progenitors of our western friend, has naturally provoked some feeling of jealousy within him. Wise people usually keep such feelings within themselves - When they can. We regret that our contemporary should be overcome so far as to have recourse to perversions of facts whenever he alludes to this journal. Papers devoted to economic subjects should aim at and promote congistency, exnctness and fair play. For ourselves, we shall be delighted to see our contemporary's efforts crowned with succese, always excepting in his attempts to asperse the character of his contemporaries, for we beliove there is room for both in this grand inheritance of ours. - But we chal. lenge him or any other to specify any instance in which the Jounssl of Comargos has not faithfally carried out its contracts; and we can point to the long, array of leading morchants, manufacturers and financial institutions who, during the last thirteen or fourteen years, have continued to favor it with their patronage. Ite steadily increasing circulation atteate its valuo to the city, town, village and country merchants throughout the Dominion, Leading merchants and manufacturers have examined our lists, and can testify to the fact of its extensive circula. tion; and we have the spoken and written testimonials of Jeading manufacturers enst and west as to its value as an adverticing medium. A considerable growth in the flour trade with the Maritime Provinces resulted from the special efforts in curi advertising pages two years ago, on the part of leading Western millers to extend their business in that direction to the exclusion of brands from the Atlantic Statos of the Union: Indeed, so, great has the i prebsure upon ourcolumns become, that we have determined to enlarge the size of the Jobavili by a blight alteration in Its shape, assimilating it more closely in this reabect to the London Economist, the Spectator, and the Salurday Review, and the Commercial and Financial' Chronicle of

Now York. This incrense will begin with the new year, and, as initation is said to be "the sincerest form of Gattery," we hope our contemporary will not over-fret himself in the matter, but rather study to follow a good examplein wardly as well as in out ward form. The increasing size of the tables of the montaly ba.sk statements led us to contemplate this literal "change of front," some time ago, but wo hesitated for obvious reasons. The crowded condition of the double-page table of Bank Statemunts in the present issue-in which the captions are omitted, and in some cases so condensed as to be dififult to understand-will furnibh a ready explanation in this respect. In closing these remarks about ourselves, wo wish our readers, far and near, the cheerfulness and compliments of the seanon, and in this we unhesitatingly include our western contemporary, who " will not bo comforted, becauso they are not." In the ladgage of our grentest writer, the editor of the Jounsal of Comaisios can saj, "I earn that I get, get Hiat I wear, owe "no man hate, envy no man's happiness; glad "of other men's good."

## THE TELEGRAPH CASE.

Mr. Wimnn is evidently fully determined on hostilities should the sbareholders of the Montreal Telegraph Company refuse to accept the reduction of two per cent per annum in: their dividend. He stated in an intervlew that the object of his hurried visit to this city was two-fold: First, to confer with his lawyers as to the shape a suit should take for the reduction of rental heretofore paid by the Great North Western Telegraph Company to the Montreal Company; on the ground that the latter company had not maintained the leasing company a peaceable and exclusive possession of the property, privileges and contracts, for which rental had been regularly paid. The second was to examine premises for new telegraph offices in this city, so that in case the suit for reduotion should not succeed, the Great: North Western Company would be prepared within 30 days of default of payment of rental to have their own buisiness conined to the Dominion and the new Canada Mutual ander their own control:
Mre Wiman claims that the revenue de rived from the leazed company has steadily declined during the past three yearg, and cori tainly, if the figures he gives are correct, it is impossible to deny that fact: Taking the three banner months of the year; July, Auguêt: and September, we find that thoy compare as: follows :-

Undur these circumstances, Mr. Wiman Lolds that he is perfectly justifled in reducing thu dividend to 6 por cent., aud has little doubt that the Courts will uphold him in this decision, especially as he claims that the Mont. real 'Culegraph Company seems to havo permitted, without protest or even action on its part, the forfuiture of every privilege it pos. sessed on every railroad in the country, except those owned and controlled by the Grand 'Trank, as well as the orection of potes and use of its rights of way for purposes of competition with its own lines.

On the other hand, Mr. Androw Allan, President of the Montreal 'Ielegraph Company, deaics Mr. Wiman's statumunts in loto, and has issued the following circular to the shmreholderd:-

On no account should shareholders allow themselves to be imposed upoin by Mr. Erastus Wiman's misreprusetutations of the position of the amiars bi this company in connection with ite contract with the Great North Western 'lulegraph company and the guarantee of the Western Union Telegraph company; or by his present misleadng actions and staterichits.

It ecems certain from this that the struggle has commenced; aud, as a consequence, Tele griph stoek is weak and depressed, and some 1,300 bhares chaged hunds us low an 86.

I'us recent nuimation aud fluctuation in tho London sugar market is reviewed by the Grocer as follows: "Cano descriptions buing quito in the background at present, beet sugarif rule the raw markit more than any other kinds, and the least adverse reports that are received, come from whatever source they may, nutlice to lash tho market into a stato of excitement, from which the speculators alone beem to emerge successfully, while the trade often find themselves in a worse position than thoy veru before. Considerable sules wore reported at stiflening rates, till German manufacture of 88 per cent, nualysis fetched I4s 3d to 14s od f.o.b. for December to March deliveries; but subsequently the the buoyancy subsided, and, as holders manifested a desire to realize, the value of the articla went baok to 148 and 148 3d. The market for cane sugars has moved in sympathy; at first it was decidedly active, and the parcels of grocery West ladia offered by uuction were roadily taken at prices $3 d$ to $6 d$ higher than of late, viz, brown and groyish crystatized Dumerara at 16 s to 17 s 6d, middliag to the yellow at 17 s 9 d to 196 , with superior bright up to 208 , syrups at 13 s to 14 s , colory do. at $15 s$ to $1686 d$, and commou grainy Trinidud at 17 g Gd per ewt. Some inquiry has existed for cargoes nflont, and soveral of Java of the new crop aro reported sold at relatively full zates, viz: Flae quality at 16s 102 d to 17 s per cwt. for the United

Kingdom and No. 12 at $16 s$ to 16 s 3d for the Continent:"

Advars to hand from the Pacific const report the stock of salmon ásalmost exbunsted. Some rec.nt liberal sales of Alaska und outside river fish have been mado for shjpment to En ope, and thest, it is said, have relieved the hande of those who have been carrying tho iult of the stock and who luve shown a disposition of late to urge the market. With the coming of the let prox., it is stated that freight rates upon Eastern shipments will $\mathrm{b} e$ advanced twenty cents per 100 lbs, and this is looked upon as likely to strengthen tho market for supplies held leere ater the new year has started in. The demand, as we have recently reported, is exhibiting some signs of improvement, but Fubruary will probably be reached before the movement sets in with spirit, that period being usually counted upon to develop increased nctivity for the spring and Lenten serson.

Sipeaking of Cuaadian lumber, Messris. Simbou \& Mason, of London, Eng., in their last circular point out that the dook stock of that city of pine deals is 780,000 pieces, against $1,400,000$ in 1887 , excluding those not yet piled. Demand good, with continued upward tendency in prices. The pine deal markot is now in a sounder condition than for a long time past, and the small stock is well held. The rise in spruce prices has been continuous for some months with no probability of an early reduction, as other large spruce cuntres are in the same condition ats loudon, with small stocks and good demand. Liscep. tiomally small stocks of overy description of timber are held with a corresponding advance in values. F.o.b. prices for timber will doubt. lesta ba very high for 1889 iniport, as the outport demend is likely to remain good.

It is not ofton that we are led to place any reliance upon press despatches from Duntreal or Ottawh, When we read a fortnight ago that the Luan societies were applyiag to the Finance Department for permission to reckon certain fire insurance policius .. B ansets, we hesitated and wrote for information to the department. We now learn that the Lonu com. panies are simply applying to the Government to have their debentures accepted as deposits ou behalf of insurance compauies who, as is well known, are required from time to time to mako deposits with tho lieceiverGenernl. This is quite another matter, and we regret that our rulu not to accept as reliable anythiag sont as "pross despatches" was trauggressed in this instance. The debentures, of sound loan societies are not likely to prove very objectionable for such a purpose.

Tus position of the currant market abrond does not improve, the price during the past week having further declined, as offers to sell stock for December shipment have been made
at 10 s Gd c .8 f. By last mail ndvices, dated 27 th ult, it- was said that the shipments to the Duited Statesircm the opening of the season Ind beal 11,098 tous, against 7,736 tons to same time last year, and to Canada 1,016 . tons, against 1,072 tons during corresponding period 1887. The total shipments to all ports aggregated 92,214 tous, against 91,534 tons for is87. The stock of Vostizza, Gulf and Patras was said by the same advices to be reduced to 7,000 tons.

Eubezzement.-A wholegale dry goods firm of this city-not one of the oldest-having their suspicion lately aroused that all was not going on well with their accounts, engaged one of our ablest accountants to make an inveatigation. Mr. Heary Colling, the account. aut referred to, proceeded to work with his usual acumen-this being his ninth case of the kind in this city-and shortly obtained a clue which, being followed, resulted in the discovery of a defalcation of about $\$ 3,000$. It would seem that the cashier and bookkeeper were in collusion, and their plan of operation was as follows:-The firm was accustomed to sign cheques payable to "endorsation or bearer," endorsed on the cheques being the several yames of customers who were not meeting their notes in full. In ondorsing said names, the bookkeeper also included one or moro without allowing the three days' grace. At the end of the three days, in preparing another series of endorsations, he would include the name or names a second time; while the finm, relying on bis integrity, did not make a close scratiny, and signed the cheques us being. correct. Other methods, such as the altering of the cash-book, to make it appear that certain sums were applied to pay duties were also discovered. As soon as it became known that Mt . Colline was called in to investigate, the bookkeepor and cashier took leg bail, and we learn that both are now in the States, one of them in Now York City. The matter has been placed in the hauds of Messrs. Lacoste © Co, and we shall hear further of it in the law courts before long.

Tee work on the Panama canal continues, although on some sections the labor has been reduced. Altogether some . 2,000 men have been discharged during the past two monthe, owing to disputes between the canal company and the contractors. It is not expactud that more labor will be dispensed with; and the highest authorities cousider a total suspension of work as very fmprobable. Such suspension could only be occasioned by the complete failure of the organization scheme now under consideration in Paris. There are now about nine thousand Jaborers actually engaged on tho works. There is no foundation for the report recently circulated that 75 per cent. of the perionnel would be discharged at the end of the jear.

In the keenness of the race for preferment how frequently does it happen that men drop by the way without notice. It is not many days since there died in $a$ taproom in this city a young man whose prematurely aged and decropid appearance recently in our strects Was a safo disguise against recognition by many of those who had known him in better days. As a business man he had never succeeded, not through lack of energy, but because in nearly all his dealings the desire to over-reach as an element was too apparent, He owed little begond his life to one who ignored his very existence as he did his death. He was interred at the expense of the tapster.

Ine representatives of the bauks held saother meetiag on the the 24th ulto. at the Merchants Bank, in connection wlth the proposed clearing house which it was decided should go into operation on January 7 . This seems like a very fair offer and ope that the municipalites will likely take up. They are moving in the matter.

A surnast from Halifax of 1231 barrels of refined sugars was made for Toronto, Londou and Hamilton e day or two ogo by the steamer " Oarroll! vin Buston. Surely there must be something astray in the management of the Intercolonial lailway to permit freight to be cheaper over such a round.aboutway as from Halifax via Boston and American railwass. It is'time the Shori Line Railway was in oporation.

A Halifax man has patented a new process for treating codfish. By his treatment the fish are cooked, boned, bhredded and compressed into a very small space; and turned into a handy article of food, free from 8 mell, and ready for ure at a moment's notice. The demand is already in excess or the supply, and the process is patented in Canadc, the United States, France and Newfoundland. The new process in expected to completely revolutionize the fish business.

The ydeath is announced of the Hon William Badgely at the advanced age of 88 years. The late judgo was called to tho war in 1823. In 1840 he was appointed Oommissioner of Bankruptcy; in 1844 a circuit Jndge; and in 1847 was attorney General for Lower Canada. In 1855 he was ralsed to the Bench. Tho late judge was also prominent in the Masonic Order and was for s ears Grand Master of those lodges who elected to remain on the English register.

Capiratiats at Levis believe that a first. class botel in the centre of the town near the Intercolonial Hailway station would pay well and they aro preparing to call a meeting to sound the views of the people. If it is feasible the corporation will be asked to become a stockholder. The promoters of tho new shoe industry at Levis which is subsidized by the town corporation, will likely purchase orgease the Victoria Hotel for that purpubes

Ayehican consuls in the Maritime Provinces bave been instructed to attend to the shipment of crews in American veseels without reference to the shipping offices in Canada. It is claimed by Canadian shipping masters that this course of action will lead to uo end of troúble, as there will be no way by which the shippiug masters can keep proper records of doserters.

Ir was the intention of the owners of the steamship Chateau Leoville; of Balfax, to bave Ler name changed to the Connemari, aud she was entered at the Customs ubder the new unme; but as it was tound that no such chango would be legal without permission from the British Board of Trade the slip had to retain ber old name until the permission was obtained.

The gypsum, trade of Windsor thls year has betn larger than for somo years, and had it nut been for the extremely wet scason interfering pot only with the mining of the plaster, but alno the hauling to shipping pointa, the exports would bave exceeded that of 1883, one of the largest ever known. The total shipped in 1888 万Was about 125,000 tons.

A anisis appears to le mminedt in the Bolton cotton trade, Numbers of emplojees are alteady on btrike and refuse to return to work until their demands are complied with. The masters complain of bad work and
threaten to order a genernal lock-out unless the work is improved and the strikers return to work. The operatives aro anply siupplied with funds and defy the masters. A prolonged struggle is feared.

Tue Halifax detective, Power, is suing the Saco Bank for the amount of the reward offered for the capture of McNeally, the defaulter. Power claims $\$ 2,000$ for the arrest and $\$ 5,000$ for the retinn of the bonds, as both parties are willing to settle tho claim, it is likely a much smaller amount than that demanded will finally be accepted.

Minina schools are about being, opened by the Nova Scotia Mining department at the principal conl mines of ihat Province, the olsject being to educate the miners in the higher brauches of their calling and to fit them for the positions of ovarmon, uuderground mauagers and put them on the rond to be mining superintendents and managers.

Tus Nova Scotia Government has appointed a Commission to revise legal costs in that Province. As the Commission represents every branch of the legal profession, they may be rolied on to do justice to themselves; if not to the public. The intention, however, we believe, is to reduce exorbltant costs in small cases.

UPWands of 20,000 sheep have been shipped from Summerside, P.E.I., this scason. The total exports from Summerside bince the opening of navigation this yenr were in value horses, \$107,167; sheep, \$10,789; egge, $\$ 86,120$; oysters, $\$ 32,667$; total, $\$ 264,752$.

Ir is said that at a meeting of the Quebed Harbor Commissioners it was rasolved to seek an carly interview with Sir Hector Langevin on the fubject of constructiag grain olevntors on the Louise embankinent.

## MONTREAL WHOLEBALE MARKETS.

Montrkal, Thurbday Evg, Dec 27, $1888^{\circ}$.
Half of the week under review has been a blank so far as wholesale trade is concerned, and the other half has seen business men come down town to their offices to do little or nothing. Quite a number of well-known commercial people are still out of the city-visitlng friends and relations. The retail trade has beon brisk, and was greatly assisted' by the short spell of cold, seasonable weather. Unfortunately this did not last, and we again suffer from a mild tomperature and muddy streets. The holiday spirit is, still provalent, nad we do not expect to soe businesg matters In good shape again until after the naw year has bean ushored in.

Oannmd Goops,-In, round lota, corn has
sold at $\$ 1$ and under. The gituation bas not been improved by the failure of a Hamilton company. There has been some talk of a combination to sustain prices, but so far buyers seem to have no troublo in getting hold of supplies at pretty much their own figures.
Dairy Proddoe and Provigiong-There has been a good call for fine dairy and creamery and rolls for local use, and prices are steady, as suitable supplies are not too plentiful. Shipments of 675 pkgg. hive been made by way of New York. Ohecse is steady but dull. Exports of Canadian cheese last week were 6,688 boxes via New York and 12,800 via Portland. Of this quantity Montreal furnished 8,164" boxes. The feeling in New York is firm, and the cheap lots have been taken up to such an extent that the market for the balance has improved. It is said that the supplies offered show an improved average quality, but really nothing will be done this week: In local provibions a small jobbing trade has been done at our present prices for polk and lard, which are lower than a week gig. The market is now steady. Dregsed bogs quiet ät $\$ 7 \Omega \$ 7.30$ per 100 lbs. in jobbing lota. Ordinary case egge sold at $201 \mathrm{c} \omega 21 \mathrm{tc}$ for fresh, and $19 \mathrm{c} @ 20 \mathrm{c}$ for limed. Buceipts of poultry were heav̌y and business brisk, Turkeys, 8c®ionc; geese, 6c¡8c; duckg, 8coloc: chickens, bc $/ \overline{0} 7 \mathrm{c}$. Partridges in goud demand at $50 \mathrm{c} \dot{0} 55 \mathrm{c}$ per brace. Venison scarce at-10c/a12c per lb. for saddles. Western roll butter bas sold at $170 @ 18 \frac{1}{2}$ in case and tubs, and Morrisburg at $19 \mathrm{c} \sqrt{2} 2 \mathrm{c}$ in baskets.

Drods and Curmicals In this market business has ruled quiet and there is no particular change. At New York, country orders for quinine have been filled at 30 cos 31 c for large bulk. For forward delivery busipess is reported to the extent of 25,000 ounces at 30 c for best brands, January-March shipment. These operations, and the willingness of manufacturers abrogd to consider orders upon tbis basis, do not tond to strenglhen a belief in higlier values after the turn of the year. For opium there has been further enquiry, and sales of about 25 cases at $\$ 285 \dot{\omega} \$ 290$. At the close to-day there, were buyers of small lots nt $\$ 290$, but in most instances $\$ 2.95$ was required. The jobbing price bas be. n advanced to $\$ 3 \sqrt{a} \$ 3.10$, and powdered is now quoted $\$ 4,10$ as inside.

Dry Goods.-Up to Christmas Eve the retail trade in this city was fully up to the average, and in the suburbs it is reported as in excess of that of last year. It is now evident that no man, who really wants, to work in this city need be idle, and with the boom in the building trade all through the summer, nud the steady work at the factories, there is more money about among the artisan class this winter than there has been for some years past. Travellers are nearly all in, since but few country merchants will look at samples during the holiday week, but a fair amount of orders are coming along, and : wholesalers speak hopefully of the coming year. Prices of Canadian woollens are firmly he'd, and wo note a disposition on tho part of makers to aryait ordars before manufacturiag, instuad of making the goods first and trying to sell them afterward. Wool is now advanoing, in England, whence our supplies of cape are necesearily derived from Hence repeat orders would have to be made from new" purchases of raw material at ligher prices, and thus the: notice that orders not placed before the 24th ultimo would be sub-

Cotin 34 Jan, 342 Heb., 37 May: A Chicago special says that wheat was quite panicky and some of the supposed cilque. Were heavy sellers. Upward margins also forcéd out large boldiags. The murket is ' now getiong on a naturial level but there may be some more liquidation. Corn shows strength in view of weakness in wheat. The country is not inclined to ship at present prices. Provisions were dull, but rallied. again, and an improvemerit is looked for ater the turn of the year.

Gimbs Fuoits, Etc- Valencih oránges até ecarce owing to the short supply and good demand, and prices liave gone up in consequence. The demànd absorbed a latge proportion of the offuring some days, ago, creating á scarcity, and dealers promptly took advantage of the in provenerit and claimed the advance.
