





J. F. BROWN GIVES UP FURNITURE BUSINESS

Saw Retail Enterprise Grow From Small Beginning to Magnificent Proportions.

With 25 years of successful merchandising to his credit, J. F. Brown, head of the company of that name, has announced his intention to retire from the household furniture trade in order to devote his entire time to the Ontario Copper and Brass Rolling Mills at New Toronto.

In Mr. Brown's retirement a dominant spirit in the retail business of Toronto will disappear. He came from Saginaw, Michigan, in 1885, with patent rights on some American novelties, and in 1887 went into the furniture business in a small way.

HAMILTON HAPPENINGS

HAMILTON CONFERENCE VOTES FOR CHURCH UNION

Amendment Voted Down—End of Ironworkers' Strike Not in Sight Yet.

HAMILTON, May 19.—(Special).—The Hamilton Methodist conference this afternoon at its annual meeting went on record by a vote of 80 to 11 in favor of the union of all the Protestant churches on the basis laid down by the general conference of the Methodist Church. Cyrus A. Birge brought the matter up by offering a resolution that the basis formulated by the general conference be approved. Rev. E. B. Lancelotti introduced an amendment embodying the argument that the mission of Methodism has not yet been fulfilled, and that therefore the time has not yet arrived for the church to surrender its name, identity and special endowments.

Rev. Mr. Lancelotti's resolution to the effect that the union of all the Protestant churches on the basis laid down by the general conference of the Methodist Church, was carried. It was to the effect that as the Ne Temere decree had gone beyond the civil status and the limits of the rights of British citizenship, the district meeting protest against the recognition of the decree by the civil authorities, and it was the professed business of the Roman parliament to preserve the sanctity of marriage, that that body be memorialized to pass legislation making it a criminal offence for any person or organization to reflect on the validity of any marriage performed by an authorized official in the state.

Strike Will Continue.

A conference was held this afternoon between Mayor Lees and Ald. Clark on the one hand and Col. Hendrie and Messrs. Greenfield, Champ and Roy of the Hamilton Bridge Works on the other in an effort to bring about a settlement of the strike. While none of these gentlemen would disclose the result of the conference, the World learned to-night that the bridge workers would not agree to any concessions whatever, but agreed to take back former employees at the old wage of 35 cents an hour, as places can be found for them without discharging the present strikebreakers. The men have not announced what action they will take in the event that the bridge works do not accept the offer. The deferred promotions in the police department were made by the police commissioners at a special meeting this afternoon. Detective Dave Coulter becomes inspector. John Cruickshanks and William Hawkins, sergeants, and Constables Tuck, C. Gibbs, Thomas Bettles and Ernest May, patrol sergeants.

Chief Smith's division of the city into two districts was also approved by the commissioners. Inspector Coulter will be in charge of the district east of Wellington-street, while Deputy Chief Whitley will run things in the west end. The resignations of two constables were accepted.

Dr. Cookburn to-day obtained judgment against the city for \$5, which he claimed to be due him as witness' fees in an inquest. The decision was given in his favor.

GOVERNMENT REPORT ON THE PORCUPINE

Bureau of Mines Issue New Official Report to Accompany Map

The Bureau of Mines has issued a new and up-to-date map of the Porcupine gold area, which is to accompany the 20th report of the bureau soon to be sent out. The map is based on the geological work performed by the survey party sent north by the government and is a revised and enlarged edition of the map published last July. It is accompanied by a geological report by Mr. Willett G. Miller of the bureau of mines. This report says in part: History of Discoveries. Until the last two or three years the Porcupine area was difficult of access and little prospecting was done in it. The information concerning it was practically all contained in the reports published by the geologists, who accompanied O. L. S. Niven in his base-line work and the township survey in the years 1894, 1898, 1899, 1904 and 1905. In 1896, Mr. E. M. Burwash accompanied Mr. Niven as geologist in the survey of the Nipissing-Algonia boundary line, which it may be added, now forms the boundary between the districts of Nipissing and Sudbury. Mr. Burwash's description is published in Volume 6 of the Report of the Bureau of Mines. He points out that the district gives promise as a gold field.


In 1898 Mr. W. A. Parks reported on the geology of the district for the bureau of mines. His paper is published in Volume 8. Mr. Parks noted the occurrence of gold in traces in some of the quartz veins and said: "I regard the possibility of the occurrence of gold in the district as somewhat doubtful, but the occurrence of reward to the prospector." The first prospecting in the area appears to have been done in 1906, when the general and the bank owned claim adjacent to what is now known as the Hollinger mine. The next work in the area was done by Mr. A. G. Hunter on the northeastern shore of Porcupine lake. The vein uncovered here shows gold in hand specimens. In 1909, interest was revived in the district by the discovery of Mr. J. S. Wilson and others.

Topography. Much of the surface of the area is low and wet, although it can scarcely be said to be swampy. The lower flat surface is occupied by well-banded clay, together with some sand and gravel. Overlying the clay is a layer of vegetable mould from a few inches to a foot or more in thickness. This layer holds water, the underlying clay being impervious, and presents a surface somewhat difficult to traverse. Outcrops of compact rock occur irregularly over the surface covering. Since some of them are small, they are not all located. In some sections of the area the rocks rise into ridges, which extend across parts of several townships. In most cases their height above the general level is not more than 20 feet. Occasionally it is 100 to 150 feet. The area lying between the mouth of Porcupine river and Porcupine lake is in the southern part of the township of Cobden, and is about 500 feet. The southwestern part of Tisdale is considerably higher, the hill behind the Hollinger office, for instance, reaching an elevation of 115 feet above sea level. The lakes are shallow, Night Hawk lake having a depth of only 6 feet in many parts, and a maximum depth of 12 feet in so far as is known. The greatest depth of water found in Porcupine lake was 20 feet.

The legend of this map gives the age groups of the rocks, which have been recognized in the field. Keewatin—The oldest series, the Keewatin, is similar in character to rocks of this age found in various parts of northern Ontario, from the ship of Manitoba on the east to that of Ontario on the west. It consists of various volcanic rocks with their schistose representatives. The series is here much more disturbed, as is illustrated by the schistose character in many places, than it is in the Cobalt area. In the Porcupine area, however, some of the Keewatin rocks have escaped dynamic metamorphic agencies sufficient to show their original character. Probably volcanic fragmental rocks of Keewatin age occur in the area, but they have not been definitely recognized. Associated with the Keewatin, especially in the southern part of the township of Whitney, there is much iron formation. This iron formation is what is commonly called jaspilite, and consists of alternate thin bands of magnetic and siliceous iron ore, frequently red in color. Many of the Keewatin rocks contain considerable carbonate—dolomite or a ferruginous carbonate. The Huronian in this area has been subjected to intense dynamic metamorphism, and it is difficult to distinguish Huronian schist or other highly metamorphosed rocks of this age from the Keewatin. Laurentian—About 10 miles to the southeast of Porcupine outcrops of hornblende granite are frequently seen. This granite intrudes the Keewatin. In a patch of conglomerate on the southern edge of Langmuir township, pebbles of hornblende granite occur, probably of the Bureau of Mines. He points out that the district gives promise as a gold field.

ing that some of the granites are pre-Huronian. A few outcrops of a somewhat fine grained, biotite granite, of the southern part of Whitney township, if it intrudes the Keewatin series, but its relation to the Huronian has not been determined. Huronian—A belt of Huronian fragmental rocks, that outcrops thru the drift covering at irregular intervals, of the Porcupine river in the township of Cobden southwest across the northern part of the township of Whitney and as is illustrated by the schistose character in many places, than it is in the Cobalt area. In the Porcupine area, however, some of the Keewatin rocks have escaped dynamic metamorphic agencies sufficient to show their original character. Probably volcanic fragmental rocks of Keewatin age occur in the area, but they have not been definitely recognized. Associated with the Keewatin, especially in the southern part of the township of Whitney, there is much iron formation. This iron formation is what is commonly called jaspilite, and consists of alternate thin bands of magnetic and siliceous iron ore, frequently red in color. Many of the Keewatin rocks contain considerable carbonate—dolomite or a ferruginous carbonate. The Huronian in this area has been subjected to intense dynamic metamorphism, and it is difficult to distinguish Huronian schist or other highly metamorphosed rocks of this age from the Keewatin. Laurentian—About 10 miles to the southeast of Porcupine outcrops of hornblende granite are frequently seen. This granite intrudes the Keewatin. In a patch of conglomerate on the southern edge of Langmuir township, pebbles of hornblende granite occur, probably of the Bureau of Mines. He points out that the district gives promise as a gold field.



York County and Suburbs

MODEL VILLAGE TO BE BUILT ON YONGE STREET

No Grounds for Criticism re Lawrence Park—Barn Raising in Scarborough—Suburbs.

NORTH TORONTO, May 19.—(Special.)—A model town wholly distinct from anything hitherto attempted in the line of suburban improvement, is said to have an outline within the next few days and the scene of the suggested transformation is laid immediately to the north of the town beyond York Mills and across the municipal boundary in the north-western part of the city. While the accredited agent of the group of capitalists is John H. Letcher of this town, the personal promoter, who is being religiously in the background as is the exact location of the lands secured by option and otherwise. It is proposed, however, to build a model town and its nearness of access to North Toronto ought to constitute it a valuable asset to this municipality.

The plan proposed includes 650 acres on Yonge-street and running parallel with it and at distances of 650 feet will be wide avenues, and intersecting these again at right angles at distances of 265 feet. Yonge-street will be widened to 100 feet and running thru the centre of the town will be a boulevard 100 feet wide, with concrete sidewalks 5 feet in width will be put down on every side of every street, and to all this will be added electric lighting, sewerage and water supply, and other improvements presumably obtained from the Lemonville Springs, away to the north.

Permanent roadways will be a feature of the scheme, when it is completed that there will be no local improvement rates or anything of the kind and no worries which go to make up the average life of a citizen. The beauties of a home in the new model town will be readily apparent.

Sufficient capital is behind the enterprise to insure its success and it is said that with the final completion of the plans and their submission to the York Township council, which will be held on Saturday, the scheme will be put into effect.

The statement in an evening paper regarding the Dovercourt Land Company impugning their good faith in charging that they were surreptitious seeking to evade the sanitary laws of the city, and that they were in a position to know the facts. The charges made by the commissioner of public safety at the meeting of the local board of health, in which the basis of attack and the members present were vitally exercised. Mayor Brown is reported to have said, "We will have to look into this matter, but this is the worst place any thing of the kind could be established," while Dr. Jeff said, "It is an outrageous proposal and will certainly get them at once."

The sewerage from the club-house, which is a private one, will go first into a cesspool, and the effluent comes out and goes into the bowling green, which has an area of 125 by 110 feet, and you imagine anything here called a sewerage attraction, when it is connected to do any harm to anyone? When the town's sewerage system is completed we will share in the benefit with all other citizens.

The splendid administrative ability shown by the Dovercourt Land Company, the era of high-class residential buildings, the manner in which in all their dealings they have kept faith with the town and the large amount of money they have disbursed in North Toronto is the best safeguard this town can desire as to their future relationship. The Dovercourt Land Company has always stood behind their word and the freedom of this town from "shacktown" environment is largely due to the high ideals and ways maintained by the board of health and Dr. Jeff are anxious to get into the limelight, there are plenty of places in town where they can doubtless find a sewerage attraction, even without unduly standing in the way of well directed and conscientious reform.

SUMMER RESORTS.

Hollinger Kicks Up Didoes Again---Price Moves Up a Dollar

Hollinger the Only Firm Spot General List Continues Weak

Star Porcupine Performer Takes Another Spurt, But Other Issues Do Not Follow—Cobalts Sooner Easier.

World Office, Friday Evening, May 19.

Hollinger was the star performer in the mining markets to-day, the action of this stock being on a par with its recent sensational spurt. The shares opened at \$12.00 or around yesterday's high price, and a gradual advance was made through the stock reaching \$12.54 by noon. On the afternoon board trading quieted down considerably, but this was due entirely to the paucity of offerings, the price being advanced by leaps and bounds without attracting any material selling. The high figure recorded was \$12.50, which was only 10 points below the stock established last week, and which represented an advance of an even dollar over last night's close.

No reason was assigned for the rapid upbidding of Hollinger to-day, and none was required. The action of the stock since its listing last December has been such that traders express no surprise whatever when the shares begin to soar as they do at intermittent periods. Brokers and market followers have given up making predictions, and would not move a hair if they were to wake up some morning and find that the price had jumped considerably on them overnight.

There was evidently a better market for Hollinger on the Toronto stock market curb and in New York than on the Standard Exchange to-day. At the close of the session the shares were bid for on the curb at \$12.56, and at the same time the stock was offering on the Standard at \$12.50, with the best bid four points below that figure. In New York 12 7-8 was bid at the close.

Outside of the advance in Hollinger there was very little of interest to the market. Rea continued under pressure and the stock made a new low record at \$5.35, and Foley-O'Brien also hit a new bottom price at \$1.25. West Dome lost six points at \$2.52, and the cheaper issues were all inclined to ease off, with lower prices for Vipond and Preston. Dome-Extension was firm at \$9 to \$9 1-2.

The Cobalts showed a reactionary trend and small losses were general throughout most of the list. In the case of Peterson and Right of Way the advance extended to a point where Beaver dropped a fraction, selling as low as \$3 1-4, with 38 bid at the close.


