Winning Deciding Race After Apparent Defeat

CHICAGO, Aug. 14.—(Special.)—Patricia, the crack Canadian sloop yacht, sailed by Norman H. Gooderham of the Royal Canadian Yacht Club, today won the fourth and deciding race from the American yacht Michigan, sailed by Roy Barcal of the Chicago Yacht Club, for the S. O. Richardson cup.

The wind at this juncture of the race was very light and Barcal managed to keep his light canvas drawing all the time, while the Canadian's spinnaker was absolutely useless. On nearing the mark the wind began to shift, and when Michigan rounded over seven minutes in the lead, it was seen that the next leg would be almost a reach.

WITNESS DEAD; SAW RAZOR USED

Frank Misener, 70 Years Old, Saw Drunken Fight in Hamilton and Gave Important Statement.

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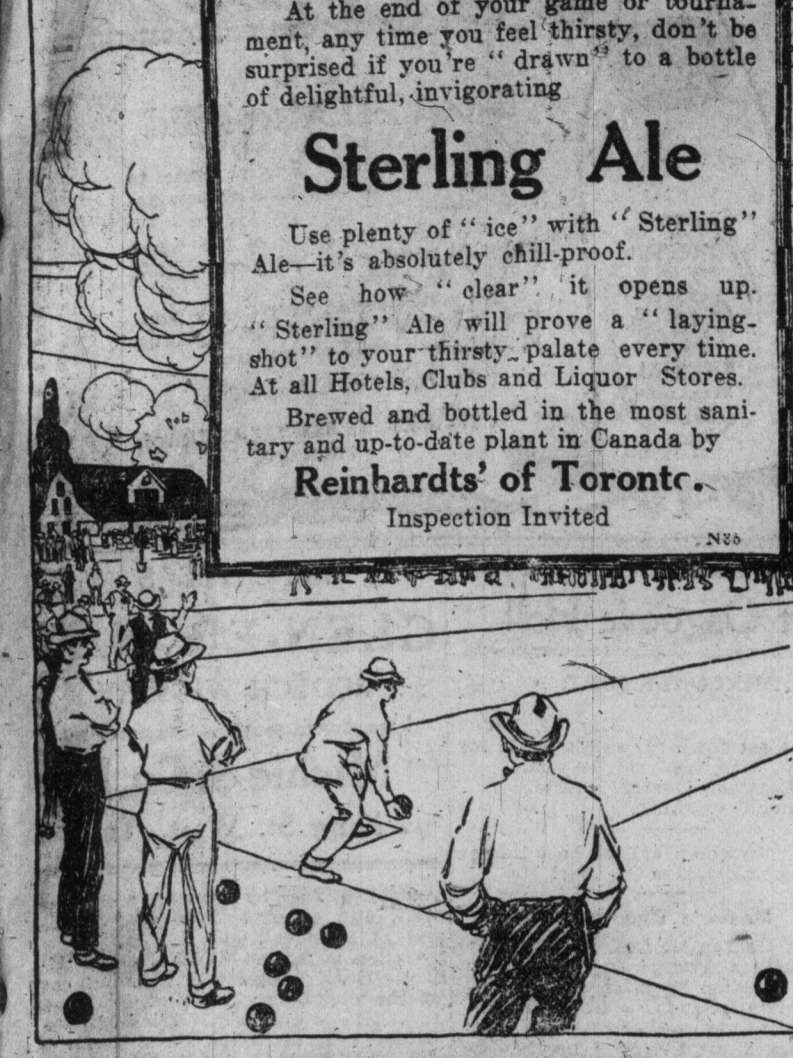

SHOULD CITIES MINE COAL?
