It is some little time since The World has regaled its readers with information concerning the inner workings of the various "Emigration Associations" of England, more generally known to Canadians as "Farm Pupil Bucket Shops," which have for years past been accumulating immense profits as a result of their traffic in young men, between the Mother Country and the most promising of the British Colonies. It was reasonably believed that the exposures which were made by The World at this end and The London Truth at the starting point would effectually stamp out the detestable business; but it appears that there yet remains many ambitious fathers and mothers in the Old Country who do not read the papers, or if they do, they, are not persuaded by what they read, for the farm pupil business continues to thrive, though by no means as extensively as before the exposures were

The so-called emigration companies of England are not disposed to worry over the dropping off in their business; on the contrary, they satisfy themon the contrary, they satisfy themselves that this is not the season of the year to bring young men to this country to learn the farming business, and they are now mapping out pleans to fleece the parents of promising youths in early spring, and figure, probably not without reason, that the notoriety they have lately acquired at the hands of the press will prove to be a splendid advertisement for their business. If their calculations are right, it is but additional evidence of the correctness of P. T. Barnum's somewhat sensational charge that "the people like to be humbugged," for if there ever existed a humbug in the strictest sense of the term it is to be found in the modus operandi of the emigration associations of England.

They have lied to him, practically stolen his money and treated him like a dog and the knowledge that they are at last done with him is more than gratifying to them. Once in a while, though, a young man becomes ensured in their nets who refuses to be cast aside without objection from him. He may not be successful in obtaining legal redress for the wrongs which have been heaped upon him, but he can publish the information he has gathered concerning the farm pupil industry, that it may prove a warning to others who are contemplating a residence in Canada, through the offices of these swindling institutions. The International Emigration Association of London imported such a young man during the past four months, and his contribution to the long list of complaints which have been filed against the nefarious business makes an exceptionally interestives cheater. Editor World: Having read the many Editor World: Having read the many instructive articles in your journal on the "Farm Pupil" industry, or farm pipil deception (as I shall call it), I commence by relating my experience with the International Emigration Association, Ltd., 47 Victoria-street, London England

About a month or so before I started on my journey out to this country from England, which took place on Sept. 11, from London, my father showed me an advertisement in the newspaper of a vacancy for a gentleman wishing to learn farming and eventually to be able to start farmman wishing to learn farming and eventually to be able to start farming on his own account. I went and received information from the abovementioned association. I saw Mr. Atkinson there, and he gave me a glowing account of farm pupil life in Canada. On my next visit I saw Mr. Todd the secretary, and Mr. Todd was also profuse in his encouragement to me regarding the fine time I would have in the winter, only very little work to do—feeding and watering cattle and a few minor details. After those few details were completed I would have lots of sport in spearing fish through the ice skating, sleighing, tobogganing and attending winter parties and sports in general. This talk of Mr. Todd's was only a repetition of Mr. Todd's was only a repetition of Mr. Atkinson's statements, which impressed me that life in Canada was pressed me that life in Canada was one round of pleasure, which to my mind far surpassed a student's life in Cxford or Cambridge; in fact, my friends all envied me, and only wished that they could accompany and revel with me in the bliss that was in store. My father and I talked the matter over, and my father asked me if I was satisfied to go to Canada. I told him that I was; in fact, I was only too anxious for him to complete arrangements for me.

Before finally deciding, my father and mother asked them for reference, and they gave Mrs. Stone, a lady residing in London, and my mother had an interview with her, and her knowledge of the farm pupil business only ex-tended to a friend of hers, who had a son who came out as a "pupil" from the above association. She gave a fa-verable account, and so impressed my parents that it was finally agreed that my father was quite willing to part with his 21 British pounds, and I was to come to Canada. I am quite satisfied now that Mrs. Stone was in league with Atkinson and Todd. I arrived in Toronto Sept. 22 last, and took my instructions from F. F. McArthur, superstructions from F. F. McArthur, super-intendent of the said society, who sent me to the County of Wellington to work as a farm pupil—to labor and delve more like a slave than to enjoy the happiness and bliss that Atkinson, Tcåd & Co., including the, will I say, gcod Mrs. Stone, pictured for me; but that does not exist for the farm pupil. I have toiled as a menial with the usu-al farm drudgery, and gave three al farm drudgery, and gave three months and five days without receiving the value of one farthing in return. If there are any more young Englishmen in London whose aspirations are in the farm pupil line, they can have it all in so far as I am concerned. But I would advise them to beware of At-kinson, Todd, McArthur & Co., including Mrs. Stone's recommendations—and all "farm pupil" emigration sharks in England. It will only cost their arrival in this country they will get steady employment and lots of work from the farmers if they will do it for nothing—the same as I did.

I like Canada, its climate and its people: they are frank and friendly, and Englishmen, if they wish to come to this country, there are openings for them here. By honest work and industry they can better their condition. There are properts of better their There are prospects of better times, when work and wages will be more plentiful. No man should come here only with the intention of getting wages for his work.
