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REPORT OF THE KIRK SESSION.

The Kirk Session, in presenting their Annual Statement, would humbly acknowledge the continued goodness of God. They recognise in the present condition of the Congregation cause both for regret and for gratitude. They regret that the increase of Communicants is so small in proportion to the number of families connected with the Congregation; yet they recognise with gratitude the growing activity of some departments of our congregational life, shewn especially in the increased support given to the Schemes of the Church.

There have been entered on the Church Registers during the year 31 baptisms and 25 deaths.

Among those whom God has removed by death, the Session specially regret the loss of Mr. Duncan Graham, who was for twenty-four years an elder in this Congregation. They hold in grateful remembrance his deep attachment to the Church, his conscientious discharge of duty, his wise counsel, and his patient resignation to the will of God and confident hope in Christ amid the bodily infirmities of his declining years.

The Sabbath Schools continue vigorous and efficient.

There are on the roll, including Bible Classes, 38 office-bearers (teachers and librarians), and 276 scholars.

During the year Mr. Chrysler resigned the superintendence of the Uppertown S. School; the teachers, regretting his resignation, elected Mr. Geo. L. Orme as his successor.

On the roll of this School there are 28 office-bearers and 214 scholars.

Mr. Larmonth still continues to superintend the Lowertown S. School, which has upon its roll 10 office-bearers and 62 scholars.

The Schools continue to support two orphans in India.

The receipts of the S. S. Treasurer for the year have been \$440.87, expenditure \$401.91, leaving a balance of \$38.96; present liabilities, chiefly on account of S. S. Library, \$151, so that, after present balance is expended the liabilities will be \$112.04.

The Session are glad to observe some improvement in the attendance at the Weekly Prayer Meeting, although it is still far short of what might be reasonably expected. The constant effort is made to render these meetings interesting by "Bible-readings," sketches of Mission Work, &c., in addition to the ordinary exercises. The collections taken at Prayer Meeting are devoted to some of the Missions of the Church.

The Ladies' Aid Society have held weekly meetings during the winter.

Committees of this Society engage in the work of poor relief and district visiting; and the Society arrange

occasional social gatherings of the Congregation, and assist, out of their funds, various departments of Church work.

During the past season, in which, owing to the scarcity of work, an unusual amount of poverty has prevailed in the city, the services of the Poor Relief Committee have not been confined to the poor of our own Congregation. 36 families have received assistance: \$391.45, have been expended, part of which (\$79.44) was balance of "Soup Kitchen Fund," and a large amount of clothing has been distributed by the Committee.

To the District Visiting Committee of the Ladies' Aid Society, the gratitude of the Congregation is especially due, as it is by them that the contributions of the Congregation to the schemes of the Church have been collected, and the success of the Schedule System ensured.

This system was introduced a year ago for the purpose of securing contributions to the Schemes of the Church. Schedules were supplied to the members of the Congregation, wherein they stated the amounts that they would contribute to the various Church Schemes in monthly, quarterly, semi-annual or annual payments. These contributions have been regularly collected by the District Visitors, there being only one district in which any irregularity has occurred, and in that instance it was caused by sickness. The contributions not allocated by the donors have been distributed among the Schemes by the Kirk-Session.

The results of the Schedule System have been very gratifying. The schemes for which contributions have been made through it are (1) Interest on our own Church Loan. (2) Home Missions. (3) Foreign Missions. (4) French Evangelisation. (5) College Fund. (6) Ministers' Widows' and Orphans' Fund. The success that has attended its introduction may be seen by comparing the contributions of the Congregation for these purposes during the past year with those of the preceding year, when an effort was made to raise our "Interest Fund" by special contributions through the "Envelope System," while the contributions to the general Schemes of the Church were taken in Church on certain appointed Sabbaths.

The amount thus contributed to Interest Fund, with part of the Balance acknowledged in last annual Report, makes up payment of interest for the past year; and the contributions to the Schemes of the Church are considerably greater than those of any previous year.

It is gratifying to note this improvement, and the Session record their obligation to the District Visiting Committee for their zeal and regularity in collecting the contributions of the Congregation.

There are still some members who are not contributing anything to the Schemes of the Church, and others who might probably, without much difficulty or self-denial, increase their contributions. The Session hope that in both these respects an improvement may be witnessed during the current year, so that when all contribute, and when each contributes the fullest possible amount, we may, as a Congregation, render a worthy support to the general work of the Church. An increase of contributions to the "Interest Fund" is necessary from the fact that the amount of \$2100 will be required for this purpose during the current year, instead of the amount contributed during the past year.

In addition to the work of collecting these contributions of the Congregation, the District Visitors distribute tracts, and, at the monthly meetings, furnish the Pastor with information regarding cases of sickness, poverty, change of residence, etc., among the members of the Congregation, of which he might not otherwise be notified.

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The Districts assigned to the Elders for visitation remain the same as last year, viz:

District No. 1—*Mr. Paterson*, Hull, Victoria Island, Le Breton Flats, and Richmond Road beyond the toll-gate.

District No. 2—*Mr. Bronson*, Richmond Road from the toll-gate eastward, Rochesterville and Albert Street West.

District No. 3—*Mr. G. P. Drummond*, Ashburnham Hill and eastward to Bank Street, northward to Sparks Street.

District No. 4—*Mr. Hamilton*, from Maria Street southward, and from Bank Street eastward to Elgin Street.

District No. 5 *Mr. Henry*, from Maria Street northward to Sparks Street, and from Bank Street eastward to the Canal.

District No. 6—*Mr. A. Drummond*, from Sparks Street northward to the Ottawa River.

District No. 7—*Mr. Elliott*, Lowertown from Rideau Street northward, and New Edinburgh.

District No. 8—*Mr. Clegg*, Sandy Hill, from Rideau Street southward, and from the Canal eastward to Rideau River.

District No. 9—*Mr. Borthwick*, Gloucester, and Country Sections beyond Rideau River.

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REPORT OF THE TEMPORAL COMMITTEE.

To the Congregation of St. Andrew's Church,

In conformity with the usual custom and the requirements of the Act of Incorporation, the Temporal Committee of St. Andrew's Church, Ottawa, beg leave to submit to the Congregation an account of their stewardship for the past year. They do this with confidence, believing that they can show a state of affairs reflecting credit as well upon the Congregation as upon the management; but feeling also that the humble gratitude and thanksgiving alike of Congregation and Managers are due to the Great Dispenser of both temporal and spiritual blessings.

The features in the management of the year just ended which appear to your Committee worthy of particular mention, are those relating to the completion of the Church building and to the consolidation of the liabilities of the Congregation. With reference to the Church building and its surroundings, the Treasurer's statement will show that \$4,947.04 were paid on this account during the year, making the total amount paid on this account the sum of \$62,812; \$3,000 of which were paid for the two half lots purchased to extend the grounds immediately adjoining the Church. The building account has now been closed, and the balance at the credit of that account has been transferred to the ordinary account, to meet expenses not connected with the Church proper. It is interesting to note that the total expenditure on account of the Church building and fence, and the half lots before mentioned, exceeds by only some \$4,000 the estimated cost, while the amount received from subscriptions has exceeded by about \$1,750 the amount subscribed at the commencement of the work. That such an undertaking should be completed and carried through so thoroughly and so

nearly within the estimated cost, shows how faithfully and wisely those who have managed your affairs in the past have worked for your interest. The result of their labors has been indeed gratifying. For a comparatively moderate cost we are now able to worship in a building which is generally admired for its architectural beauty, its handsome and massive exterior, and its interior elegance and comfort.

Since their last report your Committee have consolidated the Church debt by borrowing £6,000 sterling, on a mortgage of part of the Church property, for a period of 20 years, and paying off with the proceeds of such loan the debts to the Canada Landed Credit Company, Richard McConnell, Esq., and Mrs. Austin, and also the managers' notes held by the Bank of Montreal, and other floating liabilities then due. The interest charged on the loan is $6\frac{1}{2}$ per cent., or about £420 sterling per annum, payable half yearly on the first days of March and September.

It will be seen that the pew rents collected during the past year amount to \$3,778.48 up to the 15th February last, the day upon which the books were closed. \$279.75 have since been paid, making the total receipts from this source \$4,058.23, being somewhat less than last year, but the deficiency is not greater than, with the continued commercial distress from which the community generally is suffering, might have been expected.

Your Committee hearing that the Government were prepared to sell a part of the Ordnance lands along the Rideau Canal reserved for canal purposes, thought proper to apply for that strip forming the frontage of that part of the Glebe lot east of the Canal, and containing about $4\frac{1}{2}$ acres. They did so believing that its acquisition would materially increase the value of the adjoining land already owned by the Church, and that a sale of it to others might considerably detract from the value of such adjoining property. In making this application your Committee called attention to the fact that they had a special and preferential claim to the consideration of the Government, inasmuch as the strip in question originally formed a portion of the Glebe Lot (part of the Clergy Reserves) and would have been granted in the first instance to the Church, if not required for canal purposes. The applica-

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tion of your Committee was granted and the sale to them has been authorized by an Order in Council, on payment by them at the rate of \$400 per acre; and at the same time a lease to them was authorized of the strip of land on the bank of the canal lying in front of the strip so purchased, and also of the corresponding strip on the other side of the canal, for a term of years at a nominal rent. This transaction will secure an excellent frontage for that part of the Glebe Lot, and will enable the Managers to make sales or leases of such part on much more advantageous terms.

For the payment of the purchase-money to the Government a sum of about \$1,800 has to be provided. This sum it is proposed to raise by borrowing on the security of that portion of the Glebe Lot east of the canal, adjoining the portion of the Canal reserve purchased, and arrangements to this effect are being made. These arrangements it will be the duty of our successors to complete and carry out as soon as possible in the manner prescribed by the Act of Incorporation.

Full information on the foregoing and other temporal matters of the Congregation can be obtained from the Treasurers books and statements.

The financial position of the Congregation is now such as to relieve us from anxiety respecting its internal affairs. This may or may not prove a blessing according to the view which may be taken of the duties thereby cast upon us. Prosperity, as well as adversity, has its uses—a wider influence for good, larger scope for missionary and charitable effort;—if this be the result in our case then assuredly will prosperity prove a blessing; and with the Divine favour continuing to attend us we may confidently look forward to a future of yearly increasing usefulness.
