## EXPLANATION OF THE CALENDAR PAGES.

## LEFT HAND PAGE.

Columi 1st and 2d, contain the days of the month and of the weel 3d and 4th. The rising and setting in mean time, of the highe point, or of the upper limb of the sun, corrected $f$ refraction.
5th. Days length in hours and minutes.
6th. The Equation of Time (or quantity by which the Sun slow or fast of the clock) at noon, apparent time (nd mean) at Greenwich. The interval of time between th Sun being on the meridian or sourhing, on one uay, an his being on the meridian or southing there next day, not always the same; and, therefore, solar days are no equal in duration; about one-half are a little more, an about one-half are a little less than 24 hours. A cloc regulated by the Sun, or the Sun-dial, would need frequer adjustment ; to avoid this, an imaginary Sun is suppose to move, so that the interval of time between its consect tive passages over the meridian is always the same, viz 24 hours; such a time represents a mean solar day, an it is the average of all the apparent solar days in a yea The difference of time between the imaginary Sun an the true Sun passing the meridian, is called the "Equatio of Time," the amount of which at noon on every day is inserted in this column. There are only four days $i$ the year when apparent and mean time are the same, o the Equation of Time is nothing. In this year these day are April 15, June 15, Septr. 1, and Decr. 24. Betwee April 15 and June 15, and between Septr. 1 and Decr. 24 the imaginary Sun follows the true Sun, and the Equatio of Time is subtractive; the true time being earlier tha that shown by the Sun. Between June 15 and Septr. and between Deer. 24 and April 15, the imaginary Su precedes the true Sun, and the "Equation of Time"

By the assistance of the numbers in this column, a clock can be set by a Sun-dial as follows : When fast is placed above the number opposite to the day, then the clock ought to be set fast on the time shown by the Sun-dial, and when slow is above the numbers, the clock ought to be set so much slower. Example:-when the sun shows noon on the Sun-dial on June 1, and July 1, what are the true times? On June 1, from the Almanack, the Equation of time is, subtract 2 m .28 s ., therefore the clock should be 2 m . 28 s . before noon; so the true time is $11 \mathrm{~h}, 57 \mathrm{~m} .32 \mathrm{~s}$. A. M. On July 1, the Equation of time is, add, 3 m .30 s ., therefore the clock should be 3 m .30 s . afternoon, or the time is 0 h .3 m , 30s. P. M. The greatest difference between msan time (common clock time) and apparent time (time by the Sun-dial) occurs on the 3 rd Nov., and it is 16 m .16 s . subtractive. On the 12th Feby. the greatest additive difference occurs, viz. 14 m . 33 s .
7th. The Sun's declination, for the same as the Equation, 6th column.
sth. The rising or setting of the Moon. The setting being given from the New Moon to Full, and her rising from Full to New Moon.
9th. The place of the Moon in the Ecliptic.
10th. The time of the Moon's southing, or passing the meridian. 11th. Days increase or decrease in hours and minutes.
The top of the columns of each month shows the moon's phases, or the times of new and full moon, and of the first and last quarters, or two quadratures with the sun.
The Farmer's Calemdar is placed at the foot of the columns of each month.

These four columns being computed on the supposition, that the time of High Water on the days of New and Full Moon (L'etablissement du port) is 10 h .15 m . 7 h .15 m .-at Annapolis, 10h. 45 m .-at Charlotte Town, calculations in this Calendar are made to mean solar time, a mode of computation now in general use, and which will very soon supercede the old mode of reckoning. Mean time can be converted into apparent time, by subtracting the quantity in the sixth column of the left hand calendar pages, when the Sun is slow of clock, and adding it when fast.
