Military collaboration with Switzerland would mean simplify-ing the question of an invasion of Italy to such an extent as to render it an easy matter. The Swiss government was not alarmed when warned about Italy's ap gressive intentions against the Ticino, but merely solicited explanations in a riendly way from Italy and got them. As a result the Swiss troops concen-rated along the German frontier have een reinforced while those guarding the bouthern frontier where the Italians are trengthening their fortifications have een diminished.
