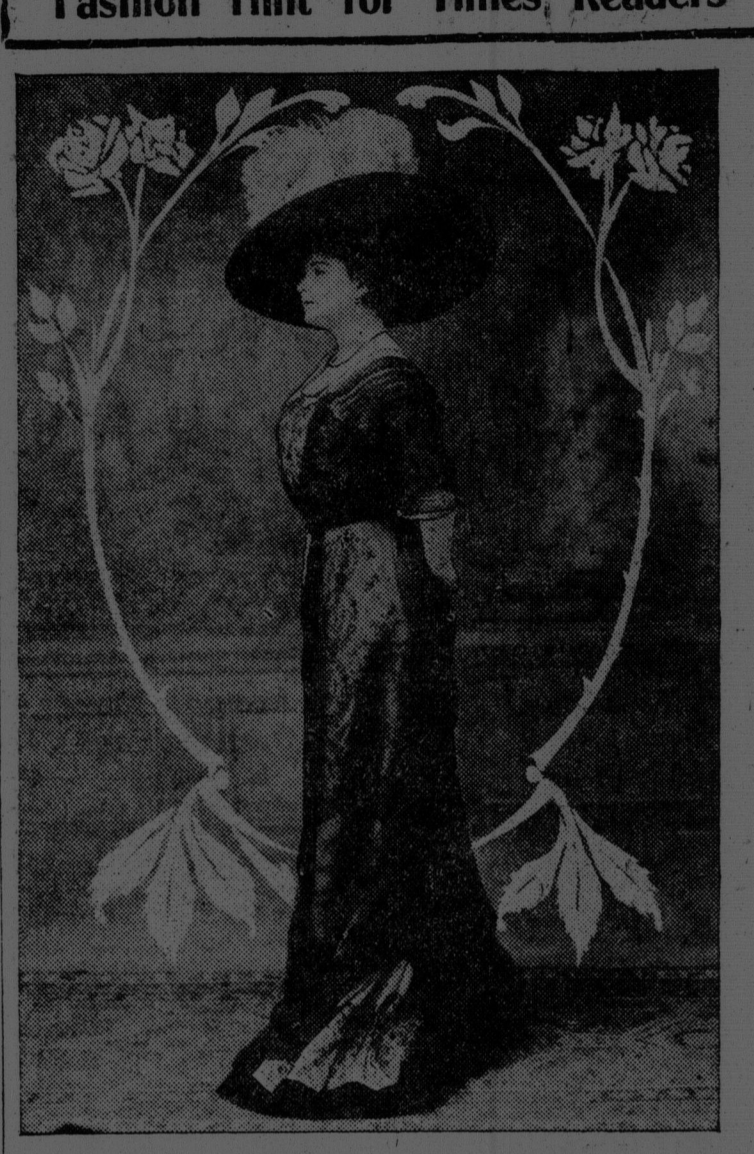

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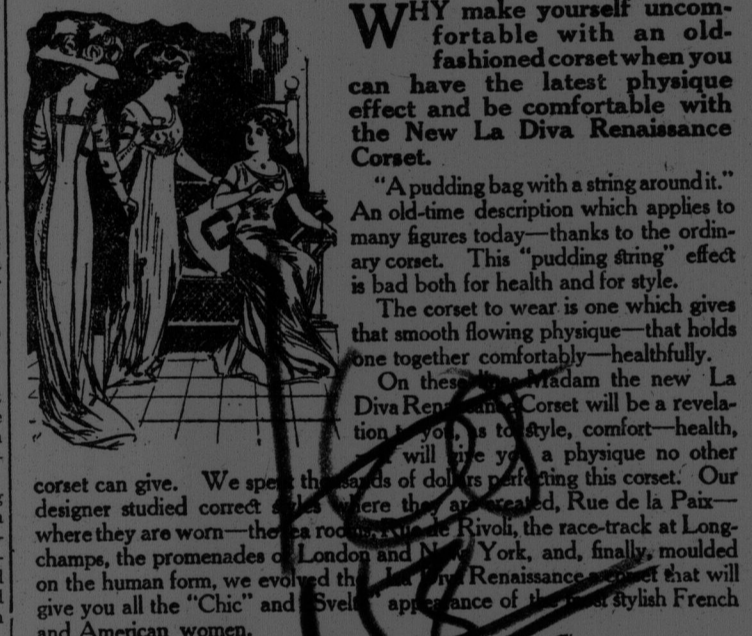

New York, May 23.—The week promises to see bullish activity in the stock market. We would by good stocks on little reactions and also during sudden developing bullish activity after dormancy. Developments in the newspapers over Sunday do not contain anything startling. The best information seems to be the improvement noted by the trade journals, advice of which we submitted last week.

The Outlook.
New York, May 21.—The keynote of the recent situation is, as usual at this season of the crops, should the latter prove satisfactory—and contrary expectations are of yet justified—we shall witness a revival of confidence, more activity in business and a better stock market. Just now there is an excess of pessimism abroad, more than is justified by actual conditions. The present period of rest will enable the country to regain its nerve and pave the way for renewed activity upon a lower and safer level. When that time draws near, the stock market, as usual, will lead in its anticipation. The big holders are still under the market, and the short interest is more sufficiently large to be an element of strength. The probability of a rise in the market for our securities through the month should also not be overlooked.

Wall Street Today.
New York, May 23.—There was considerable volume of orders for execution in the opening stock market but the price movement was narrow and irregular. Realizing sales had set in on the London market on the earlier advance there before news began here. A rise of a point Missouri Pacific was the only consistent change in the active list. Lake Erie & Western Pfd. sold at a decline of 1/8.

Montreal Stocks.
Montreal, May 23.—The outlook for stock trading was not very bright at the opening of the week's business today. The price was generally strong but there was a little doing. Pacific sold at 196; Steel 78; Coal 67; Quebec Ry. 45 1/4; Shawcan, 109; Toronto Ry. 120; Scotia, 49.

EMPIRE DAY This is Empire Day. Patriotic fervor is clouded by regret that the empire has lost the inestimable services of the late king, but joyfully greets the new occupant of the throne.

In taking a quick glance over the empire we are reminded that one week from tomorrow flags will be flying in Canada in honor of the first natal day of United South Africa. We have the Dominion of Canada, the Commonwealth of Australia, and now Britain and Boer are to form a United South Africa.

Canada and Australia have made great progress since last Empire Day, and have developed naval policies which will be a great source of strength to the imperial whole. India has received a larger measure of self-government. Along with material progress has gone a broadening of liberty. In the mother country old traditions are breaking down, and thoughtful reactionaries profess to see danger in the change that is taking place there.

Two young fellows, Stanley Colwell and John Stephens, having promised the judge to refrain from liquor of all kinds until they were thirty years of age, were ordered to go. They were arrested by Police-man Marshall in the Old Bural Ground, because they did not satisfy him in answering for their presence there at 1.30 on Sunday morning. Marshall said he thought both were intoxicated.

Colwell said that he was taking Stephens to his home, since he had missed his trip in the ferryboat, and was going to give him a bed in a barn. They had gone to Carroll's restaurant in Union street, and Colwell had purchased a lamp to give light in the barn. The lamp was ordered back to Carroll this morning, and Colwell was told to exchange it for the 20 cents he had paid for it.

Robert McKee was remanded on a charge of escaping from the Boys' Industrial home on May 17. He will be given a preliminary hearing before being sent to trial.
