# NEOLITHIC SKULL

Ten Thousand-Year-Old Cranium Presented to Redpath Museum-Mrs. W. E. Wilson's Gift.

A skull ten thousand years old has been added to the archaeological collection of the Redpath Museum at McGill University through the courtesay of a former Montrealer, Mrs. W. E. Wilson, now living at Walton-on-the-Naze, Essex, Lagland. It was in this locality that the skull was found, Mrs. Wilson oringing it to Canada for the express purpose of presenting it to McGill University. She is a native of Montreal. Mrs. Wilson found the skull at a point just above the beach at Walton-on-the-Naze, from which the sea at one time ecceded. This spot is thought to have een a Neolithic burial ground, as sevra other specimens have been found here. This is, however, the most perfect of specimens yet collected. It is he complete skull of the upper part of he jawbone, nose and cheek bones alone eing missing. It is longer, shallower, and very much narrower than the averge modern head.

Dr. Arthur Willey, M. A., D. Sc., F. S., Strathcona Professor of Zoology the Faculties of Arts and Medicine, in honorary curator of the Redpath seum, has examined the skull. "It is

stone Age, the period between the stone Age and the Bronze Age. In Great Britain traces of Neolithic man are found in burial mounds. Evidences go to show that inhumation often took place only after the corpse d been allowed to decay. This has a nadduced to prove that cannibalism hiled at that time. Most of the veolithic bodies, however, were interred after cremation. No traces of metal are found in the barrows with the exception of gold which was used for ornaments. All implements were made of polished stone or horn, and all weapons of polished stone or bone.

## ST. JOHN A STATION IN WORLD-GIRDLING FLIGHT

Arrangements Completed for Attempted Air Trip Around the Earth By Two Australian Brothers, Sir Ross Smith and Sir Keith Smith, Starting From Croydon, Near London, on April 25.

(Canadian Press Despatch.)

London, April 12-Arrangements have been completed for the attempted flight around the world to be undertaken by the two Australian brothers Sir Ross Smith and Sir Keith Smith. With an engineer they plan to start from Croydon near London on April 25.

The aviators expect to cover the 21,500 miles in 240 hours of actual flying. The time will be spread over a period of three months. They will use a flying boat fitted with wheels for alighting on land and propelled by an engine of 450horse power. They intend to fly three consecutive days and rest every fourth day. The route will be by way of France, Cairo, Asia, China, Japan, across the Pacific Ocean via the Aleutian Islands, touching land southeast of Vancouver, thence to New York via Winnipeg, thence to St. John (N. B.), and then across the Atlantic.







New York District Attorney

District Attorney Banton of New York has announced that his first move to check crimes of violence in this city in compliance with his promise to Governor Miller would be made on April 17, when he would present calendars in ten parts of the criminal courts for the immediate arraignment of 262 prisoners accused as hold-up men, gunmen and burglars now awaiting trial on indictments.

Sixty of the men now awaiting trial, he added, were out on ball, and the balance were in the Tombs. Sessions and three parts of the Supreme Court available for the trial of such cases.

"As soon as these calenders are cleaned up," Mr. Banton continued "we'll begin the presentations of the new cases of the kind on which indictments have been presented in the interim. As fast as persons are indicated for robberies, burglaries and carrying pistols they go to trial. There won't be a day's delay when we have the calendars cleared.

"After we have cleaned up the indictments charging crimes of violence we'll get down to the less urgent cases, such as forgery, bucketing and ordinary larcenies. I felt it was necessary to put aside the trial of all such cases as a matter of public safety. We've got to clean up the robber and the gunman and the burglar. I consider the armed burglar as great a menace to society as the hold-up man. When we have rid the calendars of all such cases I shall feel that we have done a good work.

"My move is not going to become popular among the criminal element of the city, but I feel that if I can increase the population of the state aprisons within the next few months the hold-up man, the burglar and the gunman will understand that New York is not the place for them.

The policy of requiring every athlette in the maritime provinces to take an affidavit attesting to his simon pure amateur status was endorsed by a vote of 55 to 33 after a lengthy discussion at a special meeting of the M. P. B. A. A. U. of Canada held here yesterday afternoon. The vote calling for an endorsement of the policy came after a lengthy discussion of the affidavit, during the course of which it was urged, on the one hand, that no real amateur had any good reason for refusing to take the affidavit, and, on the other hand, that the compulsory taking of the affidavit by all athletes was unfair and that only those upon whom suspicion of professional practices had alighted should be obliged to take the affidavit. Fault was found also with the wording of the document itself and it was urged that many who were in spirit amateurs would be prevented from conscientious reasons from taking the affidavit. In answer to this objection, it was explained that if for any relatively unimportant reasons an athlete could not take the affidavit he might submit a statement of his particular case with the assurance that the registration committee of the association would deal generously with his case and recommend his admission to the amateur ranks providing his transgressions had been only of a minor nature.

Princeton, N. J., April 18—The most thorough housecleaning in college athletics in many years has been revealed by the announced resignation of Thomas H. McNamara, captain of the Princeton baseball team, who has resigned after being declared ineligible. It was learned that McNamara's action was forced not by the Princeton University authorities, although it was through them that the matter was investigated, but by the committee representing Princeton, Harvard and Yale, of which a representative of each university is a member.

Five Princeton men altogether have been declared ineligible by this intercollegiate committee, acting under the agreement among the three universities which has been in force for many years. Their names have been carefully guarded, but it is known that Ralph Gilroy, last year's football star, who is now a junior and was looked upon as one of the mainstays of the team next fall, has been declared ineligible, and that C. H. Treat, a freshman, who was in Boston College before coming to Princeton, has also been placed on the list. Treat, of course, has not yet had a chance to play for Princeton, as under the first year rule he was ineligible last fall.

So difficult did the faculty committee find this problem that the cases were in some way not fully explained and placed in the hands of the committee of three.

The reason for this difficulty was that many students going through college receive outside assistance, borrow money to make up the difference between what they can earn and what it costs them to complete their studies, and most of them do so with the sincere intention of paying the money back. 




