MILITARY SENTENCE STANDS; JUDGMENT BY CHIEF JUSTICE

His Honor Chief Justice Hazen today handed down an important judgment in the case of John Fogan, which came before His Honor on Habeas Corpus proceedings. The chief justice refused the application for certiorari to quash the conviction. The conviction of Fogan was made by a military tribunal on a charge of being intoxicated after previously having been warned for duty. He was sentenced to nine months imprisonment with hard labor.

He said that since the armistice only one British warship, namely a light eruiser, had been sold—to India; but an arrange ment was proceeding for the sale of eleven other warships. Also he hoped soon fo dispose of a further 150 ships. All of these vessels were obsolete. Vessels of fighting value, he added, would be broken up.

The Big Fight.

(New York Herald.)

After a long series of surmises as to where the Willard-Dempsey bout for the world's championship would be held on July 4 the mystery was cleared up when Tex Rickard announced that Toledo, Ohio, was the selection. The bout will be to a referee's decision and must be confined to twelve rounds, the legal limit for the State of Ohio. Thus will the contest be the shortest number of rounds on record for a championship fight.

Rickard said that he started working on the Toledo proposition six weeks ago and the usual obstacles when politicians are to be conferred with were encountered. Definite consent to hold the bout had to come from Mayor Schreiber, who heads the boxing commission of Toledo. The following statement issued by Rickard shows what he considers the situation:—

"Having consulted my attorney, I find the part it had played in the war.

Not only is this true, but the rate of pay is going up daily, and is now said to be at the highest point in the history of industrial Detroit.

Employers have decided that they will have none of the Bolshevik element and other disturbers. The Red Cross bureau has an order for 375 men a week from a single large industrial plant. These 375 men are to take the places of Bolshevik will and other agitators, who are un American. They are being dropped from the payrolls of factories as rapidly as their tendencies are learned, and regular Americans are being engaged to take their places. This one firm will keep up its system of employing only such men as are loyal Americans until there is not a Bolshevik or an anarchist in its entire organization. It figures that there will be vacancies for decent men in its organization at the rate of 375 a week. As it hires loyal men, it raises their pay over that given to disloyal men discharged.
